GEORGE THE FIFTH, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas King, Defender of the Faith, to

Our Right Trusty and Well-beloved Counsellor Sir Henry William Primrose, Knight Commander of Our Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Companion of Our Most Exalted Order of the Star of India, Companion of the Imperial Service Order;

Our Trusty and Well-beloved Sir John Herbert Roberts, Baronet; and

Our Trusty and Well-beloved Sir William Plender, Knight;

Greeting!

Whereas by an Act passed in the Fifth year of Our Reign, intituled "An Act to terminate the establishment of the Church of England in Wales and Monmouthshire, and to make provision in respect of the Temporalities thereof, and for other purposes in connection with the matters aforesaid," it is, amongst other things, enacted that such persons, not exceeding three in number, as We may by Warrant under Our Sign Manual appoint, of whom one at least shall be a member of the Church of England, shall be Commissioners under the said Act:

Now know ye that We, pursuant to the powers so vested in Us, have appointed, and do

by these Presents appoint you, the said Sir Henry William Primrose, Sir John Herbert Roberts, and Sir William Plender to be Commissioners for the purposes of, and to hold office as provided by, the said Act.

Given at Our Court at Saint James's, the twenty-third day of September 1914, in the Fifth Year of Our Reign.

BOARD OF TRADE, WHITEHALL.

WHEREAS by Royal Proclamation relating to Trading with the Enemy dated the 9th day of September 1914, it was, amongst other things, declared as follows:—

"The expression 'enemy country' in this Proclamation means the territories of the German Empire and of the Dual Monarchy of Austria-Hungary, together with all the Colonies and Dependencies thereof.

"The expression 'enemy' in this Proclamation means any person or body of persons of whatever nationality resident or carrying on business in the enemy country, but does not include persons of enemy nationality who are neither resident nor carrying on business in the enemy country. In the case of incorporated bodies enemy character attaches only to those incorporated in an enemy country."

AND WHEREAS it was also declared by the said Proclamation that from and after the date of the said Proclamation, all persons resident, carrying on business, or being in His Majesty's Dominions were prohibited from doing certain acts therein more specifically referred to :

AND WHEREAS it was further declared by the said Proclamation as follows :

" Nothing in this Proclamation shall be taken to prohibit anything which shall be expressly permitted by Our licence, or by the licence given on Our behalf by a Secretary of State, or the Board of Trade, whether such licences be especially granted to individuals or be announced as applying to classes of persons."

AND WHEREAS it appears desirable to grant the licence hereinafter set out :

NOW THEREFORE the Board of Trade, acting on behalf of His Majesty, and in pursuance of

the power reserved in the said Proclamation, do hereby give and grant licence to all persons resident, carrying on business, or being in His Majesty's Dominions,

To pay any fees necessary for obtaining the grant, or for obtaining the renewal of Patents, or for obtaining the registration of Designs or Trade Marks, or the renewal of such registration in an " enemy country."

And also to pay on behalf of an " enemy " any fees payable on application for or renewal of the grant of a British Patent or on application for the registration of British Designs or Trade Marks or the renewal of such registration.

Whereas by paragraph 5 (1) of the Trading with the Enemy Proclamation No. 2, dated 9th September 1914, the payment of any sum of money to or for the benefit of any person or body of persons resident in the territories of the German Empire or in the Dual Monarchy of Austria-Hungary or in the respective colonies and dependencies thereof, in this licence and in the said Proclamation referred to as "enemy country," is prohibited:

And whereas by paragraph 8 of the said Proclamation it is provided that nothing in the Proclamation shall be taken to prohibit anything which shall be expressly permitted by the licence of a Secretary of State, whether such licence be expressly granted to individuals or be announced as applying to classes of persons:

Now I, the Right Honourable Reginald M'Kenna, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, hereby authorise such persons as may be empowered by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury in that behalf to make such payments and to carry out such exchange transactions for the benefit of persons resident in an enemy country as their Lordships may from time to time sanction, or to receive payment of monies from persons resident in an enemy country in such cases as their Lordships may from time to time sanction.

The KING has taken into His Royal consideration that upon the decease of John Douglas Sutherland, Duke of Argyll, which happened on the 2nd day of May last past, the title and dignity of Duke of Argyll devolved upon Niall Diarmid, now Duke of Argyll, as the only son and heir of Archibald Campbell, who was, at the time of his death, brother and heir presumptive of the said John Douglas Sutherland, Duke of Argyll, whereby, according to the ordinary rules of honour, the sister of the said Niall Diarmid, now Duke of Argyll, cannot enjoy that title, rank, place, pre-eminence, and precedence which would have been due to her had her father, the said Archibald Campbell, survived his brother, and thereby succeeded to the title and dignity of Duke of Argyll, His Majesty has been graciously pleased to ordain and declare that Elspeth Angela Campbell, spinster, sister of the said Niall Diarmid, now Duke of Argyll, shall henceforth have, hold, and enjoy the same title, rank, place, pre-eminence, and precedence as the daughter of a Duke, to which she would have been entitled had her father, the said Archibald Campbell, survived his brother, the said John Douglas Sutherland, Duke of Argyll, and thereby succeeded to the title and dignity of Duke of Argyll.

And to command that the said order and declaration be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms.

Now therefore, the Board of Trade hereby announce that British owners of cargo now lying in a neutral port in a ship owned by an enemy may for the purpose of obtaining possession of such cargo pay freight and other necessary charges to the Agent of the ship-owner at such port.

THE MOTOR CARS REGULATION (BURGH OF DOLLAR) ORDER, 1914. Dated 28th September 1914.

In pursuance of the powers vested in me by Section 9, as read with Section 18 of the Motor Car Act, 1903, I, the Right Honourable Thomas M'Kinnon Wood, His Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, on the application of the Town Council of the Burgh of Dollar, being the local authority of the said Burgh, do hereby make the following Regulations:—

1. This Order may be cited as "The Motor Cars Regulation (Burgh of Dollar) Order, 1914," and the Regulations hereby prescribed shall take effect within the limits or places referred to therein on and after the respective dates at which, for the purpose of giving effect thereto, the local authority shall, in terms of Section 10 of the Motor Car Act, 1903, place notices in conspicuous places on or near such limits or places.
2. A person shall not drive a motor car at a speed exceeding ten miles per hour within the limits or places specified in the Schedule to this Order.
