ACT OF ADJOURNAL RELATIVE TO CRIMINAL JUSTICE ADMINISTRATION ACT, 1914.

At Edinburgh, the Eighteenth day of March,
One thousand nine hundred and fifteen.

THE Lord, Justice General, Lord Justice Clerk, and Lords Commissioners of Justiciary, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by Section 42 (12) of the Criminal Justice Administration Act, 1914, DO HEREBY ENACT AND DECLARE :—

- I. That the application of an accused person for an allowance of further time for payment of a fine adjudged to be paid by such accused shall be made to the Court of Summary Jurisdiction which adjudged the fine to be paid, and the said Court shall not allow further time for payment unless (1) the application is made within the time originally allowed for payment, and (2) the Court is satisfied that the accused has been and will be unable to pay within the time allowed through

unforeseen circumstances, and has a reasonable prospect of being able to pay if further time is allowed.

- II. A person appointed by a Court of Summary Jurisdiction, under Section 42 (2) (c) of the foresaid Act, to have supervision of an accused who is between sixteen and twenty-one years of age, and who has been allowed time for payment of a fine, shall advise him with a view to secure the payment of the same and shall report to the Court, immediately on the expiry of the time within which the fine is adjudged to be paid, as to the accused's conduct and means.

- III. When a Court of Summary Jurisdiction considers that the money found on an accused on apprehension or after he has been searched by Order of the Court, should not be applied towards payment of the sum adjudged to be paid by said accused, the Court shall make a direction in writing to that effect which shall be written on the extract of the sentence before the same is issued by the Clerk of Court. In regard to any sum of money which may be found on his person when taken to prison—

(a) The accused may make an application to the said Court either verbally or in writing through the Governor of the prison in whose custody he may be at the time, that the said sum of money should not be applied in payment of the fine adjudged to be paid by him.

(b) A person alleging that the money found on the person of an accused is not the property of the accused, but belongs to him, may apply to the said Court for a direction that the money should not be applied in payment of the fine adjudged to be paid, and the Court on enquiry may so direct.

(c) The Magistrate may order the attendance in Court of an accused who has been sentenced and is in prison for the purpose of ascertaining the ownership of the money found on the accused, and a notice to the Governor of the prison signed by a Magistrate of a Court of Summary Jurisdiction will be a sufficient warrant to the Governor of the said prison for conveying the accused to the Court.

IV. In all cases where time is not allowed for payment by a Court of Summary Jurisdiction the reasons of the Court for not so allowing time shall be set forth in the extract of the finding and sentence as well as in the finding and sentence itself.

V. The forms in Schedule A. annexed hereto shall be in supplement of the forms contained in Schedules E. and F. annexed to the Summary Jurisdiction (Scotland) Act, 1908, and the Second Schedule annexed to the foresaid Criminal Justice Administration Act, 1914, and may be used with such variations as circumstances may require for the purposes of the foresaid Criminal Justice Administration Act, 1914.

VI. This Act of Adjournal shall come into operation on the First day of April 1915, and in order that due notice thereof may be given it shall be forthwith printed and published in His Majesty's Edinburgh Gazette.

SCHEDULE A.

DIRECTION OF COURT AS TO MONEY FOUND ON ACCUSED (Sec. 4 (1)).

The Court directed that the money found on the person of an accused should not be applied to payment of the fine.

ORDER OF DETENTION IN PRECINCTS OF COURT (Sec. 12).

The Court ordered the accused to be detained within the precincts of the Court until o'clock p.m. of this day.

ORDER FOR DETENTION IN POLICE CUSTODY NOT EXCEEDING FOUR DAYS, INSTEAD OF IMPRISONMENT (Sec. 13 (2)).

The Court order the accused to be detained in the custody of the Police, at (State place) for the space of (State time).

FORM OF SENTENCE OF FINE OR IMPRISONMENT WHERE TIME IS ALLOWED FOR PAYMENT OF FINE (Sec. 42 (2) (a)).

Fined £ , and in default of payment within days from this date, days' imprisonment.

ORDER FOR EXTENSION OF TIME FOR PAYMENT OF FINE (Sec. 42 (3)).

The Court having considered the application of the accused for extension of time for payment of the foregoing fine allowed payment to be made within days from this date.

SENTENCE OF FINE AND IMPRISONMENT WHERE TIME IS NOT ALLOWED FOR PAYMENT (Sec. 42 (2) (a) and (d)).

Fined £ (or £ each), and in default of immediate payment, days' imprisonment (or days' imprisonment each).

Time was not allowed for payment in respect (Here state reason or reasons).

SENTENCE OF FINE AND IMPRISONMENT AND ORDER OF SUPERVISION PENDING PAYMENT OF FINE, IN CASE OF PERSON BETWEEN 16 AND 21 YEARS OF AGE (Sec. 42 (2) (c)).

Fined £ and in default of payment within days from this date, days' imprisonment. The Court ordered that the accused be placed under the supervision of A. B. (Name and designation) during the above period.

NOTICE, UNDER SECTION III (C) HEREOF, TO THE GOVERNOR OF A PRISON WHEN THE ACCUSED IS IN CUSTODY.

SALMON FISHERIES (SCOTLAND) ACTS, 1828 TO 1868.

THE DISTRICT OF THE RIVER BRORA (ANNUAL CLOSE TIME) ORDER, 1915.

In pursuance of the powers vested in me, and upon application by Petition from His Grace the Duke of Sutherland acting under Section nineteen of the Salmon Fisheries (Scotland) Act, 1862, with the powers of a District Fishery Board for the River Brora, I, the Right Honourable Thomas M'Kinnon Wood, His Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, do, in terms of Section 9 of the Salmon Fisheries (Scotland) Act, 1868, hereby make the following Order:—

1. The Annual Close Time for the District of the River Brora shall commence on the 27th day of August, and terminate on the 10th day of February, both days inclusive.
2. It shall be lawful to fish for and to take salmon with the rod and line in the District of the River Brora from the 11th day of January to the 30th day of September, both days inclusive in each year.
3. This Order shall take effect forthwith, and

may be cited as the District of the River
Brora (Annual Close Time) Order, 1915.

WHEREAS it is provided by Section 2 of the
Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act,
1914, that any Proclamation or Order in Council
made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland
Revenue Act, 1879, as amended by the Act
now in recital, may, whilst a state of war exists
be varied or added to by an Order made by the
Lords of the Council on the recommendation of
the Board of Trade:

And whereas it is provided by Section 2 of
the Customs (Exportation Restriction) Act,
1914, that any Proclamation made under Section
one of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, may,
whether the Proclamation was made before or
after the passing of the Act now in recital, be
varied or added to by an Order made by the
Lords of the Council on the recommendation
of the Board of Trade:

And whereas by a Proclamation, dated the
3rd day of February 1915, and made under
Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue
Act, 1879, and Section one of the Exportation
of Arms Act, 1900, and Section one of the Customs
(Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, the exporta-
tion from the United Kingdom of certain Warlike
Stores was prohibited:

And whereas by an Order of Council, dated
the 2nd day of March 1915, the said Proclamation
was amended and added to in certain particulars:

And whereas there was this day read at the
Board a recommendation from the Board of
Trade to the following effect:—

That the Proclamation, dated the 3rd day of
February 1915, as amended and added to by
the said Order of Council, dated the 2nd day of
March 1915, should be further amended by
making the following amendments in and
additions to the same:—

- (1) That the heading "Thorium nitrate" in
the list of goods the exportation of which
is prohibited to all destinations should be
deleted, and there should be substituted
therefor the heading "Thorium oxide,
"thorium nitrate, and other salts of
"thorium."
- (2) That the heading "Salicylic acid and Sali-
"cylate of soda" in the list of goods the
exportation of which is prohibited to all
destinations should be deleted, and there
be substituted therefor the heading "Sali-
"cylic acid, Salicylate of soda and Methyl
"salicylate."
- (3) That the following article should be added
to the list of goods the exportation of
which is prohibited to all destinations:—
Sheepgut.

- (4) That the heading "All vegetable oils
"other than linseed oil, boiled and un-
"boiled, unmixed with other oil, and not
"including essential oils)" in the list of
goods the exportation of which is pro-
hibited to all destinations abroad other
than British Possessions and Protectorates
should be deleted, and there be substituted
therefor the heading "Oils, all vegetable,
"and fats (other than linseed oil, boiled
"and unboiled, unmixed with other oil
"and not including essential oils.)"
- (5) That the heading "Oleo oil, Premier jus,
"and animal tallow" in the list of goods
the exportation of which is prohibited
to all destinations abroad other than
British Possessions and Protectorates
should be deleted, and there be substituted
therefor the heading "All animal oils
"and fats."
- (6) That the heading "Rubber (including
"raw, waste, and reclaimed rubber)
"and goods made wholly of rubber;
"including tyres for motor vehicles
"and for cycles, together with articles
"or materials especially adapted for
"use in the manufacture or repair of
"tyres" in the list of goods the exporta-
tion of which is prohibited to all destina-
tions abroad other than British Posses-
sions and Protectorates should be deleted,
and there be substituted therefor the
heading "Rubber (including raw, waste
"and reclaimed rubber, solutions contain-
"ing rubber, jellies containing rubber,
"or any other preparations containing
"rubber) and goods made wholly of
"rubber; including tyres for motor
"vehicles and for cycles, together with
"articles or materials especially adapted
"for use in the manufacture or repair of
"tyres."
- (7) That the heading "Sheepskins, woolled,
"i.e., with the wool left on" in the list
of goods the exportation of which is
prohibited to all destinations abroad
other than British Possessions and Pro-
tectorates should be deleted, and there
be substituted therefor the heading
"Sheepskins, whether woolled or not."
- (8) That the heading "Vessels, boats and craft
"of all kinds (including floating docks)
"and their distinctive component parts"
in the list of goods the exportation of
which is prohibited to all destinations
abroad other than British Possessions
and Protectorates should be deleted, and
that there be substituted therefor the
words "Vessels, boats and craft of all
"kinds; floating docks and their dis-
"tinctive component parts."
- (9) That the following articles should be
added to the list of goods the exportation
of which is prohibited to all destinations
abroad other than British Possessions
and Protectorates:—

Chemicals, drugs, medicinal and pharma-
ceutical preparations:

Ammonia and its salts, whether simple
or compound, other than ammonium
nitrate, perchlorate and sulpho-
cyanide (the exportation of which is
already prohibited to all destinations).
Ammonia liquor.

The compounds of aniline, except aniline salt (the exportation of which is already prohibited to all destinations).

Chloride of Tin.

Copper Iodide.

Tanning substances of all kinds (including extracts for use in tanning) except chestnut extract, oak-wood extract, and valonia (the exportation of which is already prohibited to all destinations).

Urea and its compounds.

Deer skins, dressed and undressed.

Goat skins, dressed and undressed.

Metals and ores, namely :—

Tin and tin ore.

Neat's foot oil.

Provisions and victuals which may be used as food for man, namely :—“Peas, except tinned and bottled peas and peas packed in cardboard boxes and similar receptacles.”

- (10) That the heading “Goat skins, undressed” in the list of goods the exportation of which is prohibited to all foreign ports in Europe and on the Mediterranean and Black Seas, other than those of France, Russia (except Baltic ports), Belgium, Spain and Portugal, should be deleted.

- (11) That the exportation of the following goods should be prohibited to all foreign ports in Europe and on the Mediterranean and Black Seas, other than those of France, Russia (except Baltic ports), Spain and Portugal :—

Provisions and victuals which may be used as food for man, namely : Compressed and desiccated soups.

Now, therefore, Their Lordships, having taken the said recommendation into consideration, are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the same be approved.

Whereof the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs and Excise, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

SPECIAL REGULATIONS RESPECTING OPEN COMPETITIVE EXAMINATIONS FOR THE SITUATION OF CLERK IN THE DEPARTMENTS OF HIS MAJESTY'S GENERAL REGISTER HOUSE, EDINBURGH, OTHER THAN THE SASINES DEPARTMENT.*

(Supplementary to the General Regulations respecting Open Competitive Examinations for situations in the Civil Service included in Schedule A of the Order in Council of 10th January 1910).

5. A fee of £2 will be required from every Candidate attending the Examination.
