His MAJESTY THE KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the award of the Distinguished Conduct Medal to the undermentioned Warrant Officers, Non-commissioned Officers, and Men, for acts of gallantry and devotion to Duty :—

Regimental No.	Rank.	Name.	Corps.	Action for which commended.
10569	Lance Corporal	Adams, J.	5th Signal Company, Royal Engineers	For conspicuous gallantry and ability. Has rendered very valuable services during the campaign in laying cable lines, whenever and wherever required, in moments of urgency, and constantly under fire.
41878	Corporal ...	Anderson, W.	84th Battery, Royal Field Artillery	For gallant conduct at Givenchy, on 20th December 1914, in riding to his battery observation station with a supply of rockets. The rockets were urgently required by the battery, and Corporal Anderson was exposed to a heavy fire.
6437	Serjeant ...	Archer, W.	1st Battalion Somerset Light Infantry	For gallant conduct and ability on several occasions whilst on reconnaissance duties at Bucy le Long, between 12th and 23rd September 1914.
4636	Serjeant ...	Bailey, D. B.	115th Heavy Battery Royal Garrison Artillery	For conspicuous gallantry on many occasions, especially on 1st November 1914, at Ypres, when he continued to work his gun after being wounded in the head by a shrapnel bullet, and on the previous day for the gallant spirit in which he worked his gun after regaining consciousness. The breach mechanism of his gun being overheated resulted in premature firing, which caused the carriage to recoil on Sergeant Bailey, throwing him down on several occasions.
