11509	Private ...	Hesson, B. ...	2nd Battalion, South Staffordshire Regiment (attached 170th Mining Company, Royal Engineers)	For conspicuous gallantry on 25th and 26th April 1915, at Givenchy, in assisting to rescue Officers and men from a deep mine full of poison-gas. The courage and devotion to duty displayed were very pronounced, the risk of death through asphyxiation being very great.
6458	Lance-Corporal	Henson, E. ...	2nd Battalion, Lincolnshire Regiment	For gallant conduct and devotion to duty in bringing the wounded into cover and attending on them, after all the stretcher bearers had been shot.
2179	Private ...	Higgins, T. ...	1st Battalion, Manchester Regiment	For conspicuous gallantry at Neuve Chapelle on 12th March 1915, in bringing several wounded men into cover whilst exposed to heavy fire. One of the wounded men whom he went out to rescue was shot a second time whilst Private Higgins was bandaging him, but he got him away to safety nevertheless.
5932	Private ...	Hill, G. ...	2nd Battalion, Leicestershire Regiment	For conspicuous gallantry near Neuve Chapelle on 10th March 1915, when he carried numerous messages across open ground under very heavy fire from the enemy, who were only 100 yards away. He was eventually wounded by a bomb whilst assisting to clear the enemy from a trench.
8844	Private ...	Hill, W. ...	4th Battalion, South Staffordshire Regiment (attached 2nd Battalion)	For gallant conduct on 10th March 1915, at Givenchy, in going forward at night under heavy sniping fire whilst flare lights were being thrown up, digging out a wounded man who had been nearly buried, and bringing him into safety.
8490	Serjeant ...	Hillings, G. B. ...	1st Battalion, Wiltshire Regiment	For conspicuous gallantry during the assault at Spanbroek Molen on 12th March 1915. When the retirement was ordered he went forward into the open under heavy fire and carried a badly wounded Officer a distance of 100 yards into safety.
50012	Gunner ...	Hobbs, F. L. ...	7th Battery, Royal Field Artillery	For gallant conduct at Neuve Chapelle from 10th to 13th March 1915. Rendered excellent service as telephonist at Neuve Chapelle from 30th October 1914, until wounded on 13th March 1915.
6809	Private ...	Homer, S. H. ...	3rd Battalion, Coldstream Guards	For conspicuous gallantry on 25th and 26th April 1915 at Givenchy, in assisting to rescue Officers and men from a deep mine full of poison-gas. The courage and devotion to duty displayed were very pronounced, the risk of death through asphyxiation being very great.
4336	Serjeant-Major	House, A. G. ...	1st Battalion, Highland Light Infantry	For gallantry and valuable service at Neuve Chapelle on 12th March 1915, in keeping up the supply of ammunition by day and organising stretcher parties by night. In the cheerful performance of his duties he showed a fine example.
4091	Serjeant ...	Howlett, F. ...	6th Dragoon Guards	For conspicuous gallantry and ability on many occasions, especially at Mauchny on 31st August 1914, when his troop was cut off by the enemy for two days. He brought his men back with only slight loss. Again on 31st October he displayed great courage and was badly wounded, losing an arm.
