Regimental No.	Rank.	Name.	Corps.	Action for which commended.
53298	Acting Bombardier	Creasey, H. A. ...	98th Battery, Royal Field Artillery	For conspicuous gallantry and consistent good service in the heavy fighting during April and May 1915, east of Ypres, and particularly for great bravery on the 25th April 1915, at Potijze, when, with an Officer, he assisted to unload a burning ammunition wagon under a very heavy shell fire.
712	Serjeant ...	Cross, W. A. ...	13th Australian Infantry Battalion (New South Wales)	For conspicuous gallantry on the 9th May 1915, during operations near Gaba Tepe (Dardanelles), in taking an enemy's trench. Out of a party of 40 men to which he belonged, only 12 reached their objective. On the Officer in Command being wounded he endeavoured to assist him back, but the Officer was again shot and killed. Sergeant Cross then immediately returned to the forward position.
2122	Private ...	Cuddy, J. ...	1/8th (Irish Battalion, Liverpool Regiment (T.F.))	For conspicuous gallantry on the 16th June 1915, at Rue d'Ouvart, in rescuing three wounded men belonging to another regiment who had been lying in front of the enemy's trenches for twelve hours. This gallant act was performed under heavy and sustained rifle fire from the enemy, and many previous attempts to rescue the men had failed.
10113	Private ...	Cullen, T. ...	1st Battalion, Royal Dublin Fusiliers	For conspicuous gallantry on the 26th April 1915, during the capture of Sedd-el-Bahr (Dardanelles). He was the first man to enter the fort.
2242	Private ...	Currie, G. H. ...	1/9th (Glasgow Highland) Battalion, The Highland Light Infantry (T.F.)	For great bravery and devotion to duty on the 17th May 1915, at Richebourg. Private Currie volunteered to carry three messages up to captured German breastworks under heavy shell and rifle fire. These messages had been passed along the trench from hand to hand, but when he found they had not gone beyond the end of the trench, he collected them, carried them across 100 yards of open ground and delivered them.
1417	Private ...	Cutler, R. ...	Honourable Artillery Company (T.F.)	For gallant conduct near Hooge on 16th June 1915, when he worked for over an hour without cover, and under heavy shell fire, in digging out a Signaller who had been buried by shell fire.
6701	Company Serjeant-Major	Daniels, W. ...	2nd Battalion, Dorsetshire Regiment	For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty at Barjisiyah (Turkey in Asia) on 14th April 1915, throughout the action. He took back a message to his Commanding Officer explaining the situation, and returned to the firing line carrying a box of ammunition on his shoulder. He bound up three wounded men under heavy fire, and twice went back and brought up reinforcements. He was eventually shot in the knee.
8300	Lance-Corporal	Darke, T. R. ...	2nd Battalion, Royal Scots Fusiliers	For gallant conduct and coolness on the 22nd October 1914, at Ypres, when he conveyed a message to a Company of his Battalion, which was practically cut off. The delivery of this message was most important, and he had to pass over very open ground under heavy shell and rifle fire. Although held up for a time by the severity of the fire, he succeeded in delivering the message and in returning with the answer.
