8840	Private	Farmer, C	lst Battalion, South Staffordshire Regi- ment	For conspicuous gallantry on the 16th to 18th May 1915, at Festubert, when in charge of a machine-gun team in a most exposed position. Most of the team were killed or wounded, but he remained working his gun with extra men, although on one occasion he was blown into the trench from his position on the bridge by a shell.
1684	Private	Farnworth, A	1/8th Battalion, Lancashire Fusiliers (T.F.)	On the 6th June 1915, during operations near Krithia (Dardanelles), for gallant conduct on four occasions in bringing in wounded under heavy fire.

H	lst Field Company, New Zealand Engineers	For conspicuous gallantry on the night of 9th and 10th June 1915, in the neighbourhood of Gaba Tepe (Dardanelles), in volunteering to demolish a Turkish Blockhouse which was within twelve yards of the enemy's trench, and which could only be approached over ground swept by rife and machine-gun fire. He exhibited great skill in approaching and demolishing the blockhouse and was exposed to fire for an hour.
7766	Private	Fitch, W. R	Royal Army Medical Corps (attached 1st Battalion, Hampshire Regi- ment)	For conspicuous gallantry and initiative on the 26th April 1915, at Ypres. Private Fitch was marching with a column of transports which was under very heavy shell fire. The driver of a cart was shot, and the horses started to bolt, when he with great courage stopped the horses and brought the cart along, thereby averting a block and congestion of traffic, which under heavy shell fire would undoubtedly have led to great loss of life and stores.
8736	Serjeant- Major -	Fleming, R	2nd Battalion, Gordon Highlanders	For conspicuous gallantry, ability, and resource from the 26th October to the 7th November 1914, at Ypres, during which period he continually supplied his battalion with ammunition under heavy shell fire. On many occasions he assisted to collect stragglers of various units, keeping them well in hand at critical times. He gave a splendid example of courage and cheerfulness under the most trying conditions.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty on 15th June 1915, at Rue D'Ouvert, in attending on the wounded under very heavy fire, continuing at that work after he had been twice wounded, and even after his battalion had been withdrawn.
