Regimental No.	Rank.	Name.	Corps.	Action for which commended.
8788	Corporal ...	Mitchell, W. ...	1st Battalion, Liverpool Regiment	For conspicuous gallantry on 22nd June 1915, at Cuinchy, in entering a mine after an explosion had occurred and rescuing a Serjeant who had a leg and an arm broken, and afterwards assisting in the rescue of five men. In effecting this rescue work great danger had to be faced from "after-damp," and also from the ruined condition of the mine consequent on the destruction of the limbering supports.
9579	Serjeant ...	Moloney, W. ...	2nd Battalion, Royal Scots Fusiliers	For conspicuous gallantry on the 17th May 1915, at Festubert, when in charge of a machine-gun section. His gun became clogged with mud when under fire of the enemy 200 yards away. He cleaned the gun and brought it into action, causing the enemy to retire. He has shown great coolness and ability throughout the campaign.
2102	Acting Serjeant	Morel, F. C. ...	8th City of London Battalion, The London Regiment (Post Office Rifles), T.F.	For conspicuous gallantry and ability on the 26th May 1915, at Festubert. During an attack on the German trenches, when all the bombers had been killed or wounded, although without previous experience he volunteered to act as a grenadier, and did so with such skill as to materially contribute to the success of the operations.
4274	Serjeant ...	Mortimer, J. ...	1st Royal Dragoons	For gallant conduct and great coolness and daring on 13th May 1915, near Ypres, in handling a party detailed to carry up ammunition to the North Somerset Yeomanry at a critical period.
7359	Private ...	Mourphy, J. O. ...	2nd Battalion, Norfolk Regiment	For conspicuous gallantry at Barjisiyah (Turkey in Asia) on 14th April 1915. When his machine gun was running short of water he volunteered to procure some from the rear. On his return journey he was wounded, but continued to advance until he collapsed ten yards in rear of the gun. The arrival of water, however, enabled the machine gun to continue firing.
613	Company Serjeant-Major	Murray, E. F. H. ...	Honourable Artillery Company (T.F.)	For conspicuous gallantry and marked ability on 16th June 1915, at Hooge, in carrying the wounded into safety whilst under fire. He subsequently organised a party of men belonging to various units, led them forward, and occupied trenches which had been vacated. Later he took command of the trench after his Officer had been wounded.
315	Lance-Corporal	Murray, H. ...	16th Australian Infantry Battalion (South Australia)	For distinguished service on several occasions from 9th to 31st May 1915, during operations near Gaba Tepe (Dardanelles), when attached to the machine-gun section. During this period he exhibited exceptional courage, energy, and skill, and inflicted severe losses on the enemy, he himself being twice wounded.
1771	Lance-Corporal (now Corporal)	Napier, C. G. D. ...	47th Divisional Cyclist Company (T.F.)	For conspicuous gallantry on the 25th and 26th May 1915, at Givenchy. After the withdrawal of a bombing party, and having become separated from it, he remained in the trenches with a Serjeant and some men of another Battalion, and greatly assisted this small party by the use of his bombs in retaining possession of a captured trench.
