

The undermentioned have been awarded a Clasp to their Distinguished Conduct Medal for subsequent acts of conspicuous gallantry :—

Regimental No.	Rank.	Name.	Corps.	Action for which commended.
8743	Acting Company Quarter-master-Serjeant	Andrews, A. ...	2nd Battalion, High-Light Infantry	For conspicuous gallantry on the 16th and 17th May 1915, near Richebourg, as Signalling Serjeant. He carried out his duties with great bravery and devotion, under a very heavy shell fire, and under conditions of serious difficulty. He maintained the telephonic communications throughout, frequently mending his wires and carrying messages to the front and rear. (The Distinguished Conduct Medal was awarded in Gazette dated 9th July 1915, page 1007.)
5180	Serjeant-Major	Davenport, V. H. S.	2nd Battalion, Border Regiment	For gallant conduct and devotion to duty on the 16th May 1915, at Festubert, when, assisted by another man, he carried back an Officer who was wounded, from half-way between the British and German lines, under a very heavy and destructive fire. (The Distinguished Conduct Medal was awarded in Gazette dated 6th April 1915, page 497.)
10690	Corporal ...	Frazier, E. ...	1st Battalion, Worcestershire Regiment	For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty on the 10th May 1915, near Rouges Bancs, when he went out on several occasions in front of our lines, exposed to heavy fire and at great personal risk, and brought in eleven men of another Regiment who had been lying out since the morning of the 9th May. Corporal Frazier reconnoitred a sap over open ground between the lines, and found over sixty wounded men. In conjunction with Private Williams he organised a rescue party of volunteers, and during the afternoon and night they brought in eighty more wounded men. (Awarded Distinguished Conduct Medal in Gazette dated 9th July 1915, page 1025. The name was incorrectly shown therein as "Frazer.")
8276	Company Serjeant-Major	Sayers, M. ...	1st Battalion, East Lancashire Regiment	For conspicuous gallantry and ability on the 13th May 1915, east of Ypres. A platoon had lost its Officer and N.C.O.s, and was retiring in disorder from its breastwork, when Serjeant-Major Sayers ran out, rallied it, and led it back again. Later, on the same day, when reinforcements were required, he led out another platoon which had no Officer, from the support trenches to the firing line under a very heavy fire, during which he was wounded. (Awarded Distinguished Conduct Medal in Gazette dated 9th July 1915, page 1049.)
2084	Acting Serjeant	Shepherd, F. W. ..	1/13th Princess Louise's Kensington Battalion, The London Regiment (T.F.)	On the 9th May 1915, during the operations near Rouges Bancs, he made his way from the firing line for over 400 yards to the enemy's breastwork with a telephone line. Before he reached his destination the line was cut. He crawled on to the Signal Section and started back laying another line, which he eventually got through. He was under a heavy fire the whole time; fourteen men had already been killed and wounded passing over the same ground. He subsequently carried two wounded men to a place of safety under a heavy fire. His conduct throughout the action was magnificent. (Awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal in Gazette dated 6th April 1915, page 517.)
