PRESENT.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS there was this day read at the W Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 14th day of August 1915, in the words following, viz.:-

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, inter alia, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being, or having been, an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions, as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas by Your Majesty's Order in Council dated the 7th day of March 1913, authority was given for the entry on a Supplementary List of Your Majesty's Navy of a certain number of Officers of the Mercantile Marine:

"And whereas we consider that Officers thus entered who may perform meritorious service during war, or specially distinguish themselves in action, should be eligible for transfer, at our discretion, to the General List of Officers of Your Majesty's Fleet in vacancies, and, if so transferred, should be allowed to count the service which they were entitled to count when on the

Supplementary List:
"We beg leave humbly to recommend that

Order in Council, to authorise us to make such transfers accordingly.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to award the Victoria Cross to the Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your | undermentioned Officers and Non-commissioned Officers in recognition of their most conspicuous bravery and devotion to duty in the Field:

Captain John Fitzhardinge Paul Butler, The King's Royal Rifle Corps, attached Pioneer Company, Gold Coast Regiment, West African Frontier Force.

For most conspicuous bravery in the Cameroons, West Africa.

On 17th November 1914, with a party of 13 men, he went into the thick bush and at once attacked the enemy, in strength about 100, including several Europeans, defeated them, and captured their machine-gun and many loads of ammunition.

On 27th December 1914, when on patrol duty, with a few men, he swam the Ekam River, which was held by the enemy, alone and in the face of a brisk fire, completed his reconnaissance on the further bank, and returned in safety. Two of his men were wounded while he was actually in the water.

Captain Charles Calveley Foss, D.S.O., 2nd Battalion, The Bedfordshire Regiment.

For most conspicuous bravery at Neuve

Chapelle on 12th March 1915.

After the enemy had captured a part of one of our trenches, and our counter-attack made with one Officer and 20 men having failed (all but two of the party being killed or wounded in the attempt), Captain Foss, on his own initiative, dashed forward with eight men, under heavy fire, attacked the enemy with bombs, and captured the position including the 52 Germans occupying it.

The capture of this position from the enemy was of the greatest importance, and the utmost bravery was displayed in essaying the task with so very few men.

Captain John Aidan Liddell, 3rd Battalion, Princess Louise's (Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders), and Royal Flying Corps.

For most conspicuous bravery and devotion

to duty on 31st July 1915.

When on a flying reconnaissance over Ostend-Bruges-Ghent he was wounded (his right thigh being broken), which caused momentary unconsciousness, but by a great effort he recovered partial control after his machine had dropped nearly 3000 feet, and notwithstanding his collapsed state succeeded, although continually fired at, in completing his course, and brought the aeroplane into our lines—half an hour after he had been wounded.

The difficulties experienced by this Officer in saving his machine, and the life of his observer, cannot be readily expressed, but as the control wheel and throttle control were smashed, and also one of the undercarriage struts, it would seem incredible that he could have accomplished his task.

Lieutenant Frederick William Campbell, 1st Canadian Battalion.

For most conspicuous bravery on 15th June 1915, during the action at Givenchy.

Lieutenant Campbell took two machineguns over the parapet, arrived at the German first line with one gun, and maintained his position there, under very heavy rifle, machinegun, and bomb fire, notwithstanding the fact that almost the whole of his detachment had then been killed or wounded.

When our supply of bombs had become exhausted, this Officer advanced his gun still further to an exposed position, and, by firing about 1000 rounds, succeeded in holding back the enemy's counter-attack.

This very gallant Officer was subsequently

wounded, and has since died.

No. 8980 Corporal William Cosgrove, 1st Battalion, The Royal Munster Fusiliers.

For most conspicuous bravery in the leading of his section with great dash during our attack from the beach to the east of Cape Helles, on the Turkish positions, on 26th April 1915.

Corporal Cosgrove on this occasion pulled down the posts of the enemy's high wire entanglements single-handed, notwithstanding a terrific fire from both front and flanks, thereby greatly contributing to the successful clearing of the heights.

No. 168 Acting Corporal Issy Smith, 1st Battalion, The Manchester Regiment.

For most conspicuous bravery on 26th April 1915, near Ypres, when he left his Company on his own initiative and went well forward towards the enemy's position to assist a severely wounded man, whom he carried a distance of 250 yards into safety, whilst exposed the whole time to heavy machinegun and rifle fire.

Subsequently Corporal Smith displayed great gallantry, when the casualties were very heavy, in voluntarily assisting to bring in many more wounded men throughout the day, and attending to them with the greatest devotion to duty regardless of personal risk.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to award the Victoria Cross to the under-mentioned Officers, Non-commissioned Officer, and man, in recognition of their most conspicuous bravery and devotion to duty in the field :-

Captain Richard Raymond Willis, 1st Battalion, The Lancashire Fusiliers.

No. 1293 Serjeant Alfred Richards, 1st Battalion, The Lancashire Fusiliers.

No. 1809 Private William Kentally, 1st Battalion, The Lancashire Fusiliers.

On the 25th April 1915, three Companies and the Headquarters of the 1st Battalion, Lancashire Fusiliers, in effecting a landing on the Gallipoli Peninsula to the West of Cape Helles, were met by a very deadly fire from hidden machine guns which caused a great number of casualties. The survivors, however, rushed up to and cut the wire entanglements, notwithstanding the terrific fire from the enemy, and, after overcoming supreme difficulties, the cliffs were gained and the position maintained.

Amongst the many very gallant Officers and men engaged in this most hazardous undertaking, Captain Willis, Serjeant Richards, and Private Keneally have been selected by their comrades as having performed the most signal acts of bravery and devotion to duty.

Captain Lance George Hawker, D.S.O., Royal Engineers and Royal Flying Corps.

For most conspicuous bravery and very

great ability on 25th July 1915.

When flying alone he attacked three German aeroplanes in succession. The first managed eventually to escape, the second was driven to ground damaged, and the third, which he attacked at a height of about 10,000 feet, was driven to earth in our lines, the pilot and observer being killed.

The personal bravery shown by this Officer was of the very highest order, as the enemy's aircraft were armed with machine guns, and all

carried a passenger as well as the pilot.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the appointment of the undermentioned Officers to be Companions of the Distinguished Service Order, in recognition of their gallantry and distinguished service in the Field:—

Major Manners Ralph Willmot Nightingale, 1st Battalion, 5th Gurkha Rifles (Frontier Force).

For most conspicuous gallantry on 4th June 1915, during operations in the neighbourhood of Krithia, Dardanelles, in leading an attack up a difficult spur after he had been wounded. He reached the crest and was again wounded, but coming back a few yards rallied his men and again led them on. He was then wounded a third time, but still endeavoured to advance until he fainted.

Captain Frank Berkeley Abbott, 1st Battalion, 6th Gurkha Rifles.

For gallant and distinguished conduct on 28th and 29th June 1915, during operations

on the Gallipoli Peninsula.

He showed great skill in organising bombing attacks which resulted in regaining a portion of a trench which had been captured by the enemy. Advancing single handed, he cleared the enemy out of one-third of the trench. He was wounded for the third time during the war when leading a bayonet charge after the bombs were exhausted.

He showed exceptionally fine leadership,

dash, and resource.

Captain Stanley John Anderson, 5th Canadian Infantry Battalion.

For conspicuous gallantry at Festubert on 20th May 1915, when he refused to go to the ambulance after being wounded until his tour of duty was completed.

Captain Anderson was again wounded in the head on 24th May, but remained the whole day and night gallantly leading his men in the attacks.

Captain Hugh Griffith Coke Fowler, 2nd Battalion, The South Wales Borderers.

For great gallantry on the 18th and 19th June 1915, during operations on the Gallipoli Peninsula. In a counter-attack on a Turkish trench he led the party which eventually cleared it. This Officer himself threw some 30 bombs, some of which were enemy bombs which he picked up and threw back at great personal risk.

Captain Russell Mortimer Luckock, The King's Own (Royal Lancaster Regiment).

For gallantry during the fighting at Neuve Chapelle from 10th to 14th March 1915, when he performed excellent work as a Brigade Major, showing marked ability as a Staff Officer.

Captain Frank Morison, 16th Canadian Infantry Battalion.

For conspicuous gallantry and ability on 20th May 1915, when he commanded the leading company in the attack on the orchard at La Quinque Rue.

Captain Morison captured the enemy's position, which was of primary importance, under heavy shrapnel, rifle, and machine gun fire.

Captain John Foster Paton Nash, 5th Canadian Infantry Battalion.

For conspicuous gallantry throughout the action at Festubert, 22nd-24th May 1915, He repaired the telephone wires personally under very heavy fire.

Captain Nash was again brought to notice for excellent work performed under fire at Fleurbaix and at Gravelstafen.

Captain Creswell Duffield Rawson, Royal Artillery, 21st Kohat Mountain Battery (Frontier Force), Indian Army.

For gallant conduct and distinguished service on 14th May 1915, during operations in the neighbourhood of Gaba Tepe, Dardanelles. Having discovered that the enemy had constructed an emplacement enfilading an important position, he constructed a position for one gun in the firing-line facing the enemy's gun at a range of 650 yards. He then arranged with neighbouring Field Artillery to occupy the attention of other enemy guns whilst he knocked down the parapet in front of his own gun, and engaged the enemy by direct fire and without cover, and sueceeded in destroying the new emplacement he had observed. He distinguished himself by unceasing good work from 26th April to 26th June, on which latter day he was wounded.

Captain Denis George Jocelyn Ryan, 1st Battalion, 6th Gurkha Riffes.

On the 13th May 1915, during operations near Krithia, Dardanelles, for carrying out a daring and well executed reconnaissance of the enemy's position. The success of the subsequent attack leading to the capture of the Turkish position was due in a great measure to this Officer's work. He was again brought to notice for gallant work on the 28th and 29th June.

Captain Stanley Alwyn Smith, No. 3 Field Ambulance, Canadian Army Medical Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty at Festubert on the night of 20th May 1915.

Captain Smith, with a party of eight men, went out voluntarily to remove the wounded from an orchard whilst under heavy fire, and eventually succeeded in bringing all into safety. Four of the eight men of the rescue party were wounded, and two of these have since died.

Captain (temporary) Major George Butler Stoney (Egyptian Army), 1st Battalion, The King's Own Scottish Borderers.

For conspicuous gallantry and ability during operations south-west of Krithia, Dardanelles, from the 4th to 7th June 1915. He showed great coolness and good leading, holding together in a most praiseworthy manner the Battalion, which had suffered greatly. He had been previously brought to notice for gallant conduct during the operations up to May 5th.

Captain John Herbert Thom, Royal Artillery, 21st Kohat Mountain Battery (Frontier Force), Indian Army.

For exceptionally gallant conduct on 21st June 1915, near Gaba Tepe, Dardanelles. He engaged two of the enemy's guns at a range of 450 yards with one 10 pr. B.L. gun, which he had concealed in a tunnelled emplacement in the firing line parapet, and put them out of action. During this duel, which lasted about an hour, he was knocked down by a high explosive shell from other guns. Recovering, he continued to direct the fire of his gun, and having won the fight, withdrew it undamaged and without casualty.

Again, on 26th June, he was in an observation station with another Officer and gunner. Both Officers were wounded and the gunner killed by a shell, but Captain Thom remained at duty until the following day, when a large piece of metal was removed from his head.

Captain Oscar Clayton Downes, 1st Battalion, The Rifle Brigade (The Prince Consort's Own).

For conspicuous gallantry and ability when organising and leading the assault on the enemy's trenches south of Pilkem, on 6th July 1915. He carried out his duties with great bravery and efficiency until he was wounded.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to confer the Military Cross on the Strathcona's Horse (Royal Canadians).

undermentioned Officers and Warrant Officers in recognition of their gallantry and distinguished service in the Field.

Captain Frederick Norman Chambers Rossiter. Royal Artillery, 26th Jacob's Mountain Battery, Indian Army.

For conspicuous gallantry on 13th June 1915, in the operations on the Gallipoli Peninsula, when the enemy's high explosive shells had set fire to a gun emplacement and ammunition boxes: he extinguished the fire at great personal risk from the enemy's heavy fire as well as from our own ammunition, some of which exploded.

Captain Everard Le Grice Whitting, Royal Artillery, 26th Jacob's Mountain Battery, Indian Army.

For consistently good and gallant service during operations near Gaba Tepe, Dardanelles, from 25th April 1915, and especially on 27th April in directing the fire of a warship whilst exposed to the enemy's heavy rifle fire.

Captain Whitting again displayed conspicuous gallantry on 13th June; when his emplacement came under severe fire he withdrew the whole of his men and remained himself in the position as an observer, under heavy fire the whole time and at great personal risk.

Lieutenant Bernard Montague Basil Bateman, 108th Battery, Royal Field Artillery.

For conspicuous gallantry on 10th June 1915, near Ypres, when he was dangerously wounded in endeavouring to restore telephone communication under very severe fire.

Lieutenant Bateman has been noted for consistent gallantry, and was wounded on two previous occasions.

Lieutenant Charles Stuart Craig, 4th Battery, 1st Canadian Field Artillery.

For conspicuous gallantry, resource, and ability on many occasions, especially on 15th June 1915, at Givenchy, when he used an 18-pounder gun in the trenches with great effect, destroying 40 yards of the enemy's parapet, two of their machine guns, and a stretch of 75 yards of the wire entanglements.

Lieutenant Craig was seriously wounded on this date after he had completed his task, . and was twice wounded on previous occasions.

Lieutenant Eric Edwin Longfield Lloyd, 1st Battalion (New South Wales) Australian Imperial Force.

For exceptionally gallant conduct on 5th June 1915, during the operations in the Gallipoli Peninsula, in personally leading a party of 100 men to take a trench from which an enemy machine gun was severely harassing his position. Although unable to remove the machine-gun owing to the heavy head cover, he destroyed it with rifle fire.

He personally shot two Turks with his own pistol, and with his party inflicted severe

losses on the enemy.

Lieutenant Donald John MacDonald, Lord

For conspicuous gallantry and ability near Festubert on 24th May 1915. Although wounded in three places he continued to lead his men with great dash in the advance to the attack on the enemy's position, and succeeded in entering their redoubt accompanied by two men.

Lieutenant Terence Patrick M'Sharry, 2nd Australian Light Horse Regiment (Queensland).

For exceptional bravery and resource on many occasions since 25th April 1915, especially on night of 28th-29th May, during operations in the neighbourhood of Gaba Tepe, Dardanelles, in organising several assaults, and at great personal risk making several valuable reconnaissances. He was again brought to notice for gallant conduct on the night 4th-5th June.

Lieutenant William Disraeli Sprinks (Brigade Grenadier Officer), 1st Canadian Infantry Brigade.

For conspicuous gallantry and ability at Festubert on 21st-22nd May 1915, in organising and directing the grenade company in the attack carried out by the 2nd Canadian Infantry Brigade.

Lieutenant Sprinks maintained the position gained by continuous bombing for twenty hours, during the whole time being subjected to very severe shelling, machine gun and rifle fire.

Lieutenant Reginald Graham Trower, formerly 9th Battalion, The Border Regiment, attached 170th Company, Royal Engineers.

For conspicuous gallantry, ability, and resource when temporarily in command of the 170th Company, Royal Engineers, during two minor enterprises (which included mine explosions) on 24th and 29th June 1915, at Cuinchy. The success of these enterprises is mainly due to the manner in which Lieutenant Trower organised the offensive mining operations. His resource and courage were beyond praise and inspired the greatest confidence.

Lieutenant Robert Leigh Withington, 9th Field Company, Royal Engineers.

For conspicuous gallantry and ability during operations south of Pilkem between 6th and 8th July 1915, when he assisted in bringing an 18-pounder gun across the Yser Canal under fire, and in getting it into position in a gun pit which he had dug in the fire trenches within 60 yards of the enemy's sap. When the enemy's sap was blown in he superintended the joining up of our sap with that of the enemy under heavy and close fire.

Second Lieutenant Geoffrey Rowley Cassels, 175th Company, Royal Engineers.

For very valuable services, during the months of June and July 1915, in conducting the mining operations at Hooge with conspicuous ability and energy, which materially contributed to the success achieved.

Second Lieutenant James Dickens, 4th Battalion, The Worcestershire Regiment.

For distinguished and gallant conduct on 4th June 1915, during the action south-west of Krithia, Dardanelles. When his battalion's line was being consolidated after the attack a party of Turks threatened the left flank, and he at once organised a party and led a bayonet charge against them, which was entirely successful.

This Officer has done consistent good work since 25th April. He was previously brought to notice for coolness and gallantry on 18th and 19th June.

Second Lieutenant Richard Frank Parkinson, 63rd Field Company, Royal Engineers (Special Reserve).

For conspicuous gallantry at La Quinque Rue on the night of 1st July 1915.

This Officer was in charge of a party of Royal Engineers engaged in erecting wire entanglements under very severe fire, and they were eventually driven in after losing 50 per cent. in casualties.

Second Lieutenant Parkinson then went out twice and rescued two wounded men whilst exposed to heavy fire.

Second Lieutenant George Streynsham Rawstorne, 2nd Battalion, Seaforth Highlanders (Ross-shire Buffs, the Duke of Albany's).

For conspicuous gallantry and ability on 4th July 1915, north of Ypres, when he commanded the storming party which captured a German sap and covered the Royal Engineer party detailed to destroy the sap. He showed the greatest dash in carrying out this difficult task, and finally, although wounded, carried out the withdrawal most satisfactorily.

Second Lieutenant Arthur William Roberts, 4th Battalion, The Worcestershire Regiment.

For gallantry and coolness during the operations in the Gallipoli Peninsula in leading his men across the open in face of a very heavy fire and capturing some Turkish trenches on 18th-19th June 1915.

Second Lieutenant William Parr Aldous Robinson, 135th Battery, Royal Field Artillery.

For conspicuous gallantry and ability during operations between 6th and 8th July 1915, south of Pilkem.

He rafted his 18-pounder gun across the Yser Canal under fire, placed it in the fire trenches within 60 yards of the enemy's sap, and blew in the sap and some 30 yards of thick wire entanglements under very heavy shell fire, thus greatly assisting our infantry in capturing the enemy's position.

He showed great enterprise, and inspired confidence by his coolness. The gun was safely brought back the following night.

Second Lieutenant Arthur Eustace Stevens, 2nd Battalion, The Prince of Wales's Volunteers (South Lancashire Regiment), attached 1st Battalion, The Hampshire Regiment.

For conspicuous gallantry in the operations south of Pilkem, on 6th July 1915, when in charge of the Grenadier platoon of the Hampshire Regiment, he led his men with the greatest courage, was the first man into the German trenches, and used his grenades with deadly effect until he was wounded.

Temporary Second Lieutenant George Wheldon Wanstall, Royal Engineers.

conspicuous gallantry ou several occasions during the operations on the Gallipoli Peninsula, especially on the 19th June 1915, when he successfully repaired telegraph lines, with the assistance of three men, making 35 joints in a space of 150 yards, whilst under heavy shell fire.

Lieutenant Wanstall performed similar valuable service on 5th and 7th July, on all occasions under shell fire.

Second Lieutenant Eric Fitzwater Wilkinson, 1st/8th Battalion, West Yorkshire Regiment (Leeds Rifles), Territorial Force.

For conspicuous gallantry and coolness on 15th July 1915, near St. Julien, in assisting to carry a wounded soldier for a distance of 120 vards into cover under circumstances of great difficulty and danger.

Serjeant-Major George Edward Framingham, 1st Battalion, The Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers.

For conspicuous gallantry on 18th and 19th June 1915, during operations on the Gallipoli Peninsula. In the final counterattack on the Turkish trench he played a conspicuous part in bomb throwing and in driving out the enemy. His gallantry on this occasion was very marked, and he has done excellent work throughout the operations since 25th April.

Serjeant-Major Edgar Paul, 1st Battalion, Prince Albert's (Somerset Light Infantry).

conspicuous ability and gallantry throughout the period of the campaign.

Has rendered very valuable service at all times in the firing line, especially near Pilkem on 6th July 1915, when he organised carrying and working parties and supervised them under heavy shell fire.

ORDER of the Local Government Board for Scotland, authorising the Local Authority of the Burgh of Ayr to prepare a Town Planning Scheme in respect of an area of land situated wholly within the said Burgh.

THEREAS the Provost, Magistrates, and Councillors of the Burgh of Ayr, being the Local Authority within the said Burgh under the Housing, Town Planning, &c., Act, 1909, passed a resolution on the twenty-second day of February 1915, applying to Us, the Local Government Board for Scotland, to authorise the Local Authority to prepare a Town Planning Scheme in respect of land situated wholly within the said Burgh, the area of which land is shown by a boundary line coloured pink on a certain map marked "Map No. 2," and referred to in the aforesaid resolution, and is more particularly described in the Local Authority's advertisements of their intention to apply to Us for authority to prepare the said Scheme:

And whereas the resolution of the Local Authority, together with the map above referred to, has been transmitted to Us, and We have enquired into the application and into the circumstances connected therewith:

Now THEREFORE WE, the Local Government Board for Scotland, do hereby, under the pro-visions of sub-sections (2) and (3) of Section 54 of the Housing, Town Planning, &c., Act, 1909, authorise the Local Authority to prepare a Town Planning Scheme with reference to the land (including land already built upon and land not likely to be used for building purposes) to which the aforesaid application relates.

AND WE do further authorise the Local Authority in the preparation of the Scheme as aforesaid to provide therein for the demolition or alteration of any of the buildings on the land included in the area in respect of which a scheme may be prepared as aforesaid, so far as may be necessary for carrying the Scheme into effect.

MAINTENANCE OF LIVE STOCK (SCOTLAND) ORDER OF 1915.

The Board of Agriculture for Scotland, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Maintenance of Live Stock Act, 1915, and for the purpose of maintaining a sufficient stock of cattle and swine, do hereby order as follows :-

Restriction of Slaughter of Animals In-calf or In-pig.

1. No animal which is visibly or obviously incalf or in-pig shall be slaughtered, or sold or exposed for sale to be slaughtered.

Restriction of Slaughter of Calves.

- 2. From the commencement of this Order until the thirtieth day of September nineteen hundred and fifteen, no calf under the age of twelve weeks shall be slaughtered or sold or exposed for sale to be slaughtered (but this restriction shall not apply to a male calf of any of the following dairy breeds, that is to say, Channel Islands, Ayrshire, and Kerry breeds).
- 3.—(1) After the thirtieth day of September nineteen hundred and fifteen, until the Board shall by Order otherwise provide, and subject to the provisions of this Article, no calf, as defined by clause (5) of this Article, shall be slaughtered or sold or exposed for sale to be slaughtered.
- (2) This Article shall not apply to the slaughter of a calf of any of the following dairy breeds, that is to say, Channel Islands, Ayrshire, Kerry, and Dexter breeds.
- (3) This Article shall also not apply to the slaughter of a calf which has been offered for sale by public auction at any market or saleyard in England, Wales, or Scotland, without reserve or subject to a reserve price of thirty shillings or less, and for which no bid exceeding thirty shillings has been made on such occasion; but this provision shall have effect only—
 - (a) if the calf so offered for sale is before movement from the market or saleyard marked by, or under the direction of, the auctioneer in the manner prescribed by this Article; and
 - (b) if such mark is on the calf at the time of slaughter.
- (4) The prescribed mark for the purposes of this Article shall be a broad arrow branded, in hot pitch or a mixture of hot pitch and tar, on the back of the calf midway between the hips, the shaft and two barbs of the arrow to be a quarter of an inch in width, and the length of the shaft and of the barbs (outside measurement) to be two and a half inches.
- (5) For the purposes of this Article the expression "calf" means, except where otherwise expressly stated, a bovine animal in which the first permanent molar or grinder tooth is not cut and visible.

Exceptions from Restrictions.

- 4. The restrictions of slaughter imposed by the preceding Articles of this Order shall not apply to—
 - (a) slaughter of an animal under the powers conferred by the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, or any Order made thereunder; or
 - (b) slaughter of any animal rendered desirable by illness or accidental injury; or
 - (c) slaughter of any animal authorised by a licence granted by the Board of Agriculture for Scotland or an officer of that Board on cause shown.

Powers of Entry.

5. For the purpose of executing and enforcing this Order any officer of the Board of Agriculture for Scotland may, subject to any directions given by that Board, and upon production, if so required, of his appointment, enter any slaughter-house or other premises on which animals are slaughtered for human food, and examine any animals or carcases therein.

Application of Order.

6. This Order applies to Scotland.

Commencement.

Revocation of Existing Order.

7. This Order shall come into operation on the first day of September nineteen hundred and fifteen, and on that date the Slaughter of Animals (Scotland) Order of 1915 shall cease to operate, except in relation to proceedings for any offence committed before such date, and any licence issued under that Order shall have effect as a licence granted under this Order.

Short Title.

8. This Order may be cited as the Maintenance of Live Stock (Scotland) Order of 1915.

CAUTION WHEN APPROACHING BRITISH PORTS.

PART I.

Closing of Ports.

Former Notice.—No. 274 of 1915; hereby cancelled.

(1) My Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, having taken into consideration the fact that it may be necessary to forbid all entrance to certain ports of the Empire, this is to give Notice that on approaching the shores of the United Kingdom, or any of the ports or localities of the British Empire, referred to in Part III. of this Notice, a sharp look-out should be kept for the signals described in the following paragraph, and for the vessels mentioned in paragraph (5), Part II., of this Notice, and the distinguishing and other signals made by them. In the event of such signals being displayed, the port or locality should be approached with great caution, as it may be apprehended that obstructions may exist.

(2) If entrance to a port is prohibited, three red vertical lights by night, or three red vertical balls by day, will be exhibited in some conspicuous position, in or near to its approach, which signals will also be shown by the vessels indicated in paragraph (5), Part II., of this Notice.

If these signals are displayed, vessels must mentioned DISEASES in SCOTLAND for | either proceed to the position marked "Examination Anchorage" on the Admiralty charts and

anchor there, or keep the sea.

(3) At all the ports or localities at home or abroad referred to in Part III. of this Notice, search-lights are occasionally exhibited for exercise.

Instructions have been given to avoid directing moveable search-lights during practice on to vessels under way, but mariners are warned that great care should be taken to keep a sharp look-out for the signals indicated in paragraph (2) above, when search-lights are observed to be working.

PART II.

Examination Service.

- (4) In certain circumstances it is also necessary to take special measures to examine vessels desiring to enter the ports or localities at home or abroad, referred to in Part III. of this Notice.
- (5) In such case, vessels carrying the distinguishing flags or lights mentioned in paragraph (7) will be charged with the duty of examining ships which desire to enter the ports and of allotting positions in which they shall anchor. If Government vessels, or vessels belonging to the local port authority, are found patrolling in the offing, merchant vessels are advised to communicate with such vessels with a view to obtaining information as to the course on which they should approach the Examination Anchorage. Such communication will not be necessary in cases where the pilot on board has already received this information from the local authorities.
- (6) As the institution of the Examination Service at any port will never be publicly advertised, especial care should be taken in approaching the ports, by day or night, to keep a sharp look-out for any vessel carrying the flags or lights mentioned in paragraph (7), and to be ready to "bring to" at once when hailed by her or warned by the firing of a gun or sound rocket.

In entering by night any of the ports mentioned in Part III., serious delay and risk will be avoided if four efficient all round lamps, two red and two white, are kept available for use.

(7) By day the distinguishing flags of the Examination Steamer will be a special flag (white and red horizontal surrounded by a blue border) and a blue ensign.

Also, three red vertical balls if the port is

By night the steamer will carry:—

- (a) Three red vertical lights if the port is closed.
- (b) Three white vertical lights if the port is open.

The above lights will be carried in addition to the ordinary navigation lights, and will show an unbroken light around the horizon.

(8) Masters are warned that, when approaching a British port where the Examination Service is in force, they must have the distinguishing signal of their vessel ready to hoist immediately the Examination Steamer makes the signal.

(9) Masters are warned that, before attempting to enter any of these ports when the Examination Service is in force, they must in their own interests strictly obey all instructions given to them by the Examination Steamer. In the

absence of any instructions from the Examination Steamer they must proceed to the position marked "Examination Anchorage" on the Admiralty Charts and anchor there, or keep the sea.

Whilst at anchor in the Examination Anchorage, Masters are warned that they must not lower any boats (except to avoid accident), communicate with the shore, work cables, move the ship, or allow anyone to leave the ship, without permission from the Examination Steamer.

- (10) In case of fog, Masters are enjoined to use the utmost care, and the Examination Anchorage itself should be approached with caution.
- (11) Merchant vessels when approaching ports are especially cautioned against making use of private signals of any description, either by day or night: the use of them will render a vessel liable to be fired on.
- (12) The pilots attached to the ports will be acquainted with the regulations to be followed.

Sweeping Operations.

H.M. Vessels are constantly engaged in sweeping operations off ports in the United Kingdom.

Whilst so engaged, they work in pairs connected by a wire hawser, and are consequently hampered to a very considerable extent in their manœuvring powers.

With a view to indicating the nature of the work on which these vessels are engaged they will show the following signals:—

A black ball at the foremast head and a similar ball at the yardarm, or where it can best be seen, on that side on which it is dangerous for vessels to pass.

For the public safety, all other vessels, whether steamers or sailing craft, must keep out of the way of vessels flying this signal, and should especially remember that it is dangerous to pass between the vessels of a pair.

Note.

This Notice is a repetition of Notice No. 274 of 1915, with the addition of Sunderland to the list of ports mentioned in Part III.
