The King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.
It is this day ordered by his Majesty in Council, that the Parliament, which was to meet on Tuesday the seventh day of January next, be further prorogued to Tuesday the 21st day of the same month, then to meet for the dispatch of business: And the Right Hon. the Lord High Chancellor of that part of the united kingdom called Great Britain, is to cause a commission to be prepared in the usual manner, for proroguing the Parliament accordingly.
