For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his company with great dash, and, on reaching the final objective, was the senior officer in the front line. He dealt with a difficult situation with great skill and determination, consolidating his position, and getting into touch with the battalions on his flanks. All this was carried out under heavy shell-fire.

Temp. Lt. Sydney Esmond O'Hanlon, Gen. List and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. As observer, on many occasions, he has rendered most valuable reports, displaying great courage and determination throughout.

Temp. Capt. Patrick Joseph O'Reilly, R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He tended the wounded under intense fire, displaying great courage and determination. Later, although wounded, he stuck to his post.

Temp. 2nd Lt. William James Palk, E. Surr. \mathbf{R} .

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his men with great gallantry during the attack. Later, he rescued a wounded man under very heavy fire. He set a fine example

The Rev. Reginald Palmer, temp. Chapl. (4th Class), A. Chapl. Dept.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although wounded, he rescued several wounded men with the greatest courage. He has on many previous occasions displayed great bravery.

Temp. Capt. Wyndham Parker, M.B., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He tended the wounded under very heavy fire for 36 hours, displaying great courage and determination. Later, he rescued wounded officers under intense fire.

Temp. Capt. Victor Henry Parr, R. Innis.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. rallied men of different units in a wood, during an enemy counter-attack, though wounded, led them forward and beat off the attack.

Temp. Capt. Francis Alexander Parry, R.

For conspicuous gallantry during opera-

He commanded his company with great skill and determination, after suffering heavy casualties. Though wounded, he remained with his company, and displayed great devotion to duty.

Temp, Capt. William Henry Parsons, M.D.,

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He established the most advanced aid post of the brigade front, and, although slightly wounded, cleared over 300 cases. Subsequently, working all night, he cleared in all over 400 cases.

2nd Lt. John Pashley, R.A.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. As observation officer he carried out his work for 24 hours under very heavy fire with great skill and determination.

2nd Lt. Arthur Oxford Cecil Patman, R. Ir.

Regt., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He saved a serious situation by repulsing a counter-attack from flank and rear. When ammunition was nearly exhausted, he personally went back for more, and brought it up under fire.

2nd Lt. Howard Alan Pattinson, E. Surr. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led a patrol under heavy fire, with great courage and determination. Later, although wounded, he continued to carry out his work. He has previously done fine work.

Lt. George Francis Pauling, G. Gds.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his company and formed a strong point on the left flank, displaying great courage and initiative. Later, he maintained himself for 24 hours, causing considerable loss to the enemy until relieved.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Herbert George Pearsall, M. Gun C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He fought his Tank with great gallantry, protecting the flank of the infantry and repulsing an enemy counter-attack. Later, when his Tank was disabled, he fired a machine gun from the trenches, displaying great coolness and initiative.

2nd Lt. Thomas Sydney Pearson, R.A. and

For conspicuous skill and gallantry. has done fine contact patrol work. On one occasion, with another officer as pilot, he flew for a long time at about 500 feet under heavy rifle-fire, in order to locate a lost battalion.

Temp. Capt. Arthur Ernest Percival, Bedf. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. During the advance he showed fine leadership and determination under heavy shell and machine-gun fire. He worked unceasingly, with absolute disregard of danger, in completing every detail in the consolidation of the captured position.
