His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the appointments of the undermentioned Officers to be Companions of the Distinguished Service Order in recognition of their gallantry and devotion to duty in the Field:—

2nd Lt. Norman Brearley, M.C., L'pool R. and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. With another pilot he gallantly attacked seven hostile machines. Later, although severely wounded, he displayed great courage and determination in reaching our own lines.

Maj. (temp. Lt.-Col.) William Denman Croft. R. Scots.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He showed great courage and initiative in organising and supervising a successful attack. He established posts before dawn and joined

them up the following night under heavy fire. He has previously done fine work.

Maj. (temp. Lt.-Col.) Gilbert Burrell Spencer Follett, M.V.O., C. Gds.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although wounded, he inspected the front-line trenches under heavy fire. Later, he remained with the battalion until they were relieved. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Maj. (temp. Lt.-Col.) Charles Harman, Leins. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his battalion throughout the action with great courage and initiative. He set a splendid example to his men, and materially assisted in the success of the operations.

Temp. Capt. Frederick Elliott Hotblack, M.C., Intelligence C., attd. M. Gun C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He guided a Tank into action by walking in front of it under very heavy fire. He displayed great courage and determination throughout.

Temp. Capt. Arthur Plater Nasmith, Bord.

 ${f He}$ For conspicuous gallantry in action. displayed great courage and initiative in organising and leading a successful attack. He set a splendid example throughout.

Capt. George Alec Parker, M.C., North'n R. and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. attacked hostile aeroplanes on three occasions during the same flight, killing an enemy observer. On another occasion he drove off three enemy machines, pursuing one of them down to 750 feet three miles behind the enemy's lines.

Temp. 2nd Lt. (Actg. Capt.) Richard Pennington, Linc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. led his men in the attack with great courage and initiative, himself killing at least seven of the enemy. He set a splendid example throughout, and materially assisted in the . success of the operations.

Capt. (temp. Maj.) Josiah James Robertson,

Sea. Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. reorganised several small parties under heavy fire, and drove off an enemy bombing attack. He formed with twenty men a strong post in the enemy's second line. Later, he led the men forward again and consolidated an advanced defensive line. He set a splendid example throughout.

AUSTRALIAN IMPERIAL FORCE.

Captain William John Rendall Scott, Aus.

Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He organised the troops in the vicinity and formed a strong point, and by the judicious use of machine guns kept off several threatened enemy attacks, thereby saving a critical situation.

CANADIAN FORCE.

Maj. George Lemuel Drew, Can. Fld. Arty. For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although crippled by rheumatism, he continued to command his battery under very trying conditions. He set a splendid example of courage and determination throughout the operations.

Lt.-Col. Cameron Macpherson Edwards,

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He organised his battalion for attack, and carried out a dashing assault in a snowstorm with conspicuous success. He set a splendid example of courage and initiative throughout.

Lt.-Col. Reginald William Frost, Can. Inf. For conspicuous gallantry in action. He carried out a successful attack under very trying conditions. The entire objective was gained, and a strong patrol was sent forward, remaining out for 24 hours until ordered to withdraw. He set a splendid example of courage and coolness throughout. Maj. Valentine Vivian Harvey, Can. Inf.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He showed great coolness and power of organisation during preparation, also in reorganising and directing the consolidation under very heavy fire. He set a splendid example throughout, and materially assisted in the success of the operations.

Lt.-Col. Arnold Henry Grant Kemball, C.B., Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his battalion in the attack with conspicuous success, and carried out every task allotted to him. He set a splendid example of courage and good leadership throughout.

Capt. Thain Wendell MacDowell, Can. Inf.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his company against an enemy position with great courage and initiative, capturing three machine guns and fifty prisoners. Later, although wounded, he remained at his post and greatly assisted in the success of the operations.

Lt.-Col. John Weightman Warden, Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his battalion in the attack with conspicuous success under the most trying conditions. He set a fine example of good leadership throughout.

Maj. Charles Benson Worsnop, Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his battalion in a night attack with conspicuous success, gained his objective, captured thirty-two prisoners and two, machine guns, and successfully consolidated the position. He set a fine example throughout.

The undermentioned have been awarded a Bar to their Distinguished Service Order for subsequent acts of conspicuous gallantry:-

Maj. (temp. Lt.-Col.) Thomas Macaulay Booth, D.S.O., Gord. Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his battalion with great courage and determination throughout the operations. He set a splendid example to his men, and greatly assisted in clearing up a critical

Capt. and Bt. Maj. (temp. Lt.-Col.) Thomas George Cope, D.S.O., R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although wounded, he continued to direct the operations, and, when the attack was momentarily checked, went out into "No Man's Land" under very heavy fire to reorganise his battalion. He was again

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to confer the Military Cross on the undermentioned Officers and Warrant Officers in recognition of their gallantry and devotion to duty in the Fie d:—

2nd Lt. Henry Cecil Allen, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and determination in laying and repairing a line under heavy fire.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Charles Barrington-Anderson Sea. Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He showed marked courage and ability in organising and conducting the supplies of bombs and ammunition during the operations. He has previously done fine work.

2nd Lt. William Bruce Anderson, Gordon

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He assumed command of and led his company with great courage and determination, capturing 170 prisoners.

Temp. Sub-Lt. William Arblaster, R.N.V.R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He carried out three most valuable reconnaissances under heavy fire, and obtained information of vital importance.

2nd Lt. Henry Armstrong, North'd Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and ability in reorganising his men. Later, he successfully held 150 yards of the captured enemy trench for 36 hours until he was relieved.

2nd Lt. Gilbert Ashton, R.F.A., Spec. Res. For conspicuous gallantry in action. He repeatedly repaired his telephone line under a very heavy fire, and maintained communication with his Battery all day.

Temp. 2nd Lt. William George Baker, Som. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and coolness when in command of a party of grenadiers. On one occasion a grenadier dropped a bomb after the safety-pin had been withdrawn, causing confusion amongst the remainder of the men in that part of the trench. 2nd Lt. Baker at once rushed forward, picked up the bomb, and threw it over the parapet, when

it immediately exploded, thereby preventing fatal consequences by his prompt action and coolness.

Temp. 2nd Lt. John Richard Aubrey Balchin, M. Gun C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and determination when in charge of two machine guns. Although severely wounded, he gave a N.C.O. instructions to carry on, and himself continued to encourage his men.

Temp. 2nd Lt. William George Barker, Gen. List and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He flew at a height of 500 feet over the enemy's lines, and brought back most valuable information. On another occasion, after driving off two hostile machines, he carried out an excellent photographic reconnaissance.

2nd Lt. Richard Cox Bartlett, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He extinguished a fire in a gun emplacement, and afterwards removed several wounded men to a place of safety, setting a splendid example of coolness and courage.

2nd Lt. Archibald Bates, North'n R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although several times buried by shells, he remained at duty, and showed a fine example of courage and coolness to his men in very difficult circumstances. He has previously done fine work.

2nd Lt. Henry Spencer Bell, R.F.A., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and determination on several occasions when cutting enemy wire with his trench mortar battery. On one occasion he directed the fire from "No Man's Land."

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Henry Charles Bennett, N. Lanc. R., formerly Lrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led the three assaulting companies of his Battalion with great courage and determination. Although wounded, he continued to command, gained his objective, and consolidated the position.

Temp. Lt. Charles William Biggs, L'pool R. For conspicuous gallantry in action. He dug a trench under the most intense fire, setting a splendid example throughout, and by his initiative undoubtedly saved many lives.

Capt. Edward James Blair, M.B., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He tended and dressed the wounded under heavy fire continuously for 18 hours. He set a splendid example of courage and determination throughout.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) James Bliss, Sea. Highrs

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his men to their objective with great

courage and initiative. Later, he rallied men of several units and led them forward, setting a splendid example to his men.

Temp. Lt. Leslie Arthur George Bowen, Suff. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his company with great courage and determination. Later, he continued going about in the open under heavy fire, encouraging his men and helping the wounded, and was himself twice wounded.

Temp. Lt. Christopher Basil Brewer, Essex R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his company in the attack with great courage and determination. Although twice wounded, he continued to encourage his men, and re-organised the company.

Temp. Capt. Clarence Morland Brisco-Owen, R.E., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He remained twelve hours supervising repairs to a railway under heavy artillery fire.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Harold James Brown, S. Wales Bord.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and determination during a raid on the enemy's trenches. Later, he went out alone and rescued a wounded N.C.O. and a man under heavy fire.

Capt. Hawtrey William Browne, M.B., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He made a tour of five Regimental Aid Posts under very heavy fire, and carried in many wounded men. He set a splendid example throughout.

Temp. 2nd Lt. William Crichton Brownlie, Gord. Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his platoon out on patrol and remained out for four hours under very heavy fire, bringing in most valuable information. He set a splendid example throughout.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Alexander Charles Seaton Buist, Gord. Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. In daylight he led a daring patrol and obtained most valuable information. On a previous occasion he displayed great courage and determination in rescuing several buried men under heavy fire.

Temp. Lt. Frederick Whitmore Burch, E. Yorks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He visited all the strong points established in the enemy's lines and assisted in their consolidation. Later, he assumed command and carried out his work with great courage and determination.

Temp. Lt. William Thomas Calderwood, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. With four men he traced, under rifle and

shell fire, a length of 300 yards of front line, joining two advanced posts which had been captured the previous day.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Alexander Campsie, R.

Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led bombing attacks and drove back the enemy at a critical time. He displayed great courage and determination throughout.

Temp. Sub-Lt. William Carnall, D.S.M., R.N.V.R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led out a battle patrol into the presence of the enemy, chose a position within a few yards of them, and thus made secure the right flank. He set a splendid example of coolness and courage throughout the operations.

2nd Lt. Ronald Vaughan Clark, L'pool R. For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led a successful raid against the enemy with great courage and initiative, capturing eight prisoners.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Charles Osbeck Haywood Clarke, R.F.A

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He picked up a bomb, the fuse of which was burning, and carried it to a disused trench, where it immediately exploded, thereby undoubtedly saving many lives.

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) John Bates Cockhill, W. Rid. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led a successful raid against the enemy with great courage and initiative. He has previously done fine work.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Cyril Joseph Charles Codd, M. Gun C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and determination during the consolidation of the position, and by skilful handling of his guns was instrumental in repelling two counter-attacks.

2nd Lt. Walter Collings, Mon. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination in organising and leading stretcher parties to collect wounded underheavy fire.

Rev. Alfred Edmund Cousins, Temp. Chapl. to the Forces, 4th Class, Army Chaplus. Dept.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination in tending and dressing wounded men under heavy fire. On one occasion he assisted to dig out some buried men.

Temp. 2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Sydney Austin-Cowper, Gord. Highrs., attd. M.G.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He took command of three companies and rendered invaluable assistance in reorganising them, forming and superintending working parties and looking after the wounded.

Temp. Sub-Lt. Thomas Edwin Cresswell, R.N.V.R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although severely wounded, he continued to lead his men forward with great courage and determination.

2nd Lt. George Cuttle, Spec. Res., attd. $\mathbf{R}.\mathbf{F}.\mathbf{A}.$

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and determination in endeavouring to relieve a wounded observation officer under intense fire. He sent back information by lamp signal from time to time, and was on duty continuously for some twenty hours.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Harold Frederick Dann, E. Yorks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He assumed command of and handled his company with great courage and skill, setting a splendid example throughout.

Temp. 2nd Lt. William Harrington Hulton Dawson, Manch. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and ability in organising the consolidation and defence of the position won. Later, although wounded, he reported the situation to battalion head-quarters.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) John Arthur Gerald de Courcy, R.G.A. and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He has located numerous hostile batteries, and by directing the fire of our howitzers has been instrumental in destroying a number of them. On one occasion he drove off three hostile machines.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Herbert Golden Dix, R. W.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led a flank attack on the enemy with great courage and determination. Later, with another officer, he carried out a daring patrol. He set a splendid example throughout.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) Charles Herbert Dixon, York. L.I., Spec. Res., and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He deliberately made himself a bait for a hostile machine, thereby enabling two of our machines to approach unseen and shoot down the enemy machine. He has carried out many bombing raids with great courage and success.

Temp. Lt. (temp. Capt.) Alexander Watt Donald, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He went forward with a Corporal, and under most intense fire dug out an officer and several men who were entombed.

Temp. Sub-Lt. Albert Edward Dossett, $\mathbf{R}.\mathbf{N}.\mathbf{V}.\mathbf{R}$.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although severely wounded, he continued to lead and encourage his men, displaying great courage and determination.

Capt. William Edmonstone Duncan, R.F.A.
For conspicuous gallantry in action. As
Liaison Officer he displayed great courage

and skill throughout the operations and obtained most valuable information.

Temp. Sub-Lt. Geoffrey Dunn, R.N.V.R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and initiative in extinguishing a fire in an ammunition dump, thereby undoubtedly saving many lives.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) Robert Bruce Ellis, R. Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He carried out a daring reconnaissance under heavy fire, and obtained most valuable information. He was wounded.

Lt. (temp. Maj.) Thomas Smythe Emery, E. Kent R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He, with a private, attacked and held off ten of the enemy, thereby preventing the enemy from entering our line at a vital point. He displayed great courage and initiative throughout.

Lt. John Fattes Falconer, I.A. R. of O., Lrs., attd. M.G. Sqdn.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although severely wounded, he fired a machine gun himself with great courage and skill, thereby materially assisting in repelling an enemy counter-attack.

2nd Lt. David Fallon, Ox. & Bucks. L.

For conspicuous gallantry in action: Although wounded, he carried out a daring reconnaissance, and obtained most valuable information. He set a splendid example throughout.

Lt. Robert Alister Field, York. R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and initiative during a bombing attack. Meeting an obstacle in the trench, he went along the parapet under heavy fire, jumped into the trench again, and killed one of the enemy.

2nd Lt. Lawrence Alexander Lewis Fink, Bedf. R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his company forward with great courage and determination under intense fire, and succeeded in capturing about 200 yards of the enemy's trench.

2nd Lt. Gilbert Clare Fitzherbert, York. & Lan. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He, with three men, took a torpedo across "No Man's Land," and successfully fired it under the enemy's wire. He set a fine example of courage and coolness throughout.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Raymond George Fonteyn, R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He. with a small party, successfully laid and fired a torpedo in the enemy's wire. Later, he displayed great courage and determination in rescuing several wounded men under fire.

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2nd Lt. John Roger Fox, Sea. Highrs., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He continually took charge of carrying parties and led them through heavy barrages, keeping up a full supply of ammunition.

Temp. Lt. William French, Arg. & Suth'd Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and ability in maintaining the supply of ammunition and stores during the operations.

Temp. Sub-Lt. Ernest Victor George Gardner, R.N.V.R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He showed great courage and initiative in keeping his men together and continuing the attack at a critical time. He personally carried out several valuable reconnaissances under heavy fire.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Thomas Smith Gibson, Arg. & Suth'd Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although wounded, he showed great courage and determination in getting his guns into action during a heavy bombardment. On another occasion he organised some men at a critical time.

Temp. 2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) William Good, R.G.A., attd. T.M. By.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although wounded, he continued to observe the fire of his trench mortar battery for $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours, until his task was completed. He has previously done fine work.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Thomas James Gordon, R. E., T.F

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He carried out the work of blowing a trench by means of explosives under heavy shell and close rifle fire. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Davis Ingle Gotch, North'n R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although several times buried himself, he was constantly helping to dig out others, and by his cheerfulness and courage afforded a fine example to all ranks.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Norman Carlos Grant, K.O.S.B.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and determination in repeatedly clearing up the situation during the attack under very trying conditions.

Temp. Lt. Robert Llewellyn Griffiths, F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He extinguished a fire in a gun-pit, and personally removed a lot of bursting cartridges from the emplacement, setting a splendid example of coolness and courage.

Temp. Lt. Cornelius William Grogan, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He, with a serjeant and a sapper, taped out a

new front-line trench, remaining out all night under intense fire. He set a splendid example throughout.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Victor Gareth Gundrey, Welsh R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led a successful raid with great courage and determination, capturing twenty prisoners and accounting for many of the enemy.

Temp. Lt. Arnold Lawson Harrow-Bunn, Notts. & Derby. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and determination when acting as observer to his pilot, and brought down a hostile machine. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Temp. Lt. Harold George Head, M.G.C. For conspicuous gallantry in action. He handled his Tank with great courage and skill, remaining out for over an hour under heavy fire, and accounting for many of the enemy.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Frederick Kenneth Headington, R.F.A., T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination in withdrawing guns under heavy fire and the most trying conditions.

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Arthur Henderson,

Arg. & Suth'd Highrs., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his company in the attack with great courage and determination, advancing our line and consolidating the position won with great skill. He has previously done fine work.

Temp. Capt. William George Thomas

Hepplewhite, M.D., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He worked unceasingly day and night supervising his bearers, clearing the wounded under very heavy fire. He set a splendid example throughout.

2nd Lt. Hamilton Elliott Hervey, Genl. List

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Hehas done most efficient work in co-operation with our artillery, and has displayed greatgallantry in numerous aerial combats.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Richard Percival Heywood, L'pool R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He assumed command of and led his company forward on three separate occasions. On the same occasion he marked out under fire the assembly position for the battalion.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Percy Harrowell Higham, North'n R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Accompanied by a N.C.O. and one man, he carried out a difficult and dangerous reconnaissance, and obtained most valuable information. On another occasion he rendered valuable services when in charge of a carrying party.

Temp. Sub-Lt. Frederick Charles Hill, R.N.V.R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He collected ammunition from casualties under heavy fire, which was of the utmost importance. Later, he chose positions for eighteen guns and guided the teams, thus making a thinly-held line secure.

2nd Lt. Hugh Lewis Hope, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He rendered most valuable services in maintaining communication under heavy fire. Later, he carried out a perilous reconnaissance, and obtained most valuable information.

Temp. Capt. Archibald Hunter, Cam'n Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and determination in consolidating the position and organising bombing parties, which repelled enemy counter-attacks. He set a splendid example throughout.

Temp. 2nd Lt. John Alexander Johnston, R. Innis. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led a successful raid against the enemy with great courage and initiative. He has previously done fine work.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Reginald Tom Keen, Word, R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although twice wounded he remained at duty, thereby setting a splendid example to his men.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Arthur Frederick Hastings Kelk, Welsh R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He hastily reorganised the men, led them to their objective, and was instrumental in finding and capturing the majority of prisoners taken

Temp. Capt. Frank Lumsden Farquharson Kelty, Sea. Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and determination in continually digging trenches under very heavy fire. He set a splendid example throughout.

Temp. 2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) David Hew Kennedy, R. Scots Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He showed great courage and determination when in charge of an ammunition dump under very heavy fire.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Robert Douglas Kent, R.W. Kent R.
