For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and initiative in extinguishing a fire in a burning gun pit, undoubtedly saving many lives.

Temp. Capt. Herbert Bruce Low, M.D., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He dressed the wounded and supervised the work of the bearers under very heavy fire. He set a splendid example of courage and coolness throughout.

2nd Lt. Frank Lupton, Sea. Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He rallied and reorganised the men under very heavy fire. He displayed great courage and determination throughout.

2nd Lt. George Monro MacBey, Sea. Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although severely wounded, he remained on duty, collecting men and directing operations. He set a splendid example throughout, and himself captured 50 prisoners.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) John Charles MacCorkindale, R.F.A., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although he himself was twice knocked down by shell fire, he continued to serve his trench mortar guns until the enemy's fire was silenced. He set a splendid example of coolness and courage throughout.

2nd Lt. Alexander John MacKay, Sea. Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his men with great courage and determination, capturing 60 prisoners. Later, he established a defensive position under heavy fire.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Donald Archibald Mackay, Arg. & Suth'd Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and determination in rallying and re-organising his company under very heavy fire. He set a splendid example throughout.

Temp. Lt. James Mackie, Arg. & Suth'd Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He assumed command of and handled his company with great courage and initiative, making excellent dispositions for defence and assisting to repel a strong enemy counter-attack.

Temp. 2nd Lt. John Fisher Macmillan, E. Surr. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He rallied his men under heavy fire, and attacked and captured an enemy machine gun. He set a splendid example of coolness and courage throughout.

2nd Lt. Frank Mahoney, Bord. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his section of the attack with great

courage and determination, setting a splendid example and materially assisting in the success of the operations.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his company with great courage and initiative, capturing his objective, and effectively dealing with a party of the enemy. He was wounded.

2nd Lt. William Fisher McCash, Gord. Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although severely wounded, he continued to lead and encourage his men. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

2nd Lt. John McFarlane, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He laid and repaired a wire under heavy fire. Later, he observed from an exposed position and sent back most valuable information.

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Angus McMillan, Sea. Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his company in the attack with great courage and determination, himself returning to Battalion Headquarters under very heavy fire to report the situation. Later, he established a good trench in a forward position.

Capt. John Wright Malcolm, M.B., R.A.M.C., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination in constantly directing bearer squads under heavy fire. On another occasion he rescued several men who were buried.

Temp. Capt. Victor Harold Mason, M.B., R.A.M.C., E. York. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination in tending and dressing the wounded under very heavy fire.

2nd Lt. John Hugh Matheson, Gord. Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his men with great courage and determination, capturing two enemy officers and 34 other ranks and clearing the enemy trenches.

Temp. Capt. Lloyd Remington Meech, R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He worked continuously for forty-eight hours collecting wounded under very heavy fire. He set a splendid example throughout.

Capt. Stewart Bates Merrylees, Arg. & Suth'd Highrs., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although wounded, he led his company in the attack with great courage and initiative. He was again wounded while advancing.
