His Majesty the KING has been graciously

pleased to approve of the award of a Bar
to the Distinguished Service Order to:

\*Maj. Malby Richard Henry Crofton,
D.S.O., R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He went forward under the most intense fire to a position 150 yards from the enemy's trenches, from where he controlled the fire of his battery with great skill.

Capt. and Bt. Maj. (Temp. Lt.-Col.) Gerald Victor Wilmot Hill, D.S.O., R. 1r. Fus., attd. Suff. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and good leadership when in command of his battalion. He formed up his battalion under very heavy fire and under the most difficult conditions. The successful start of his battalion and the accomplishment of its task in the attack was in a great measure due to his personal example and fine leadership.

Maj. Ronald Campbell Ross, D.S.O., Jats, Ind. Army.

For conspicuous gallantry and good leadership when in command of his

battalion. He gallantly led his battalion to the assault of the enemy's position, and the success of the operation was largely due to his fine example and able leadership. Later, while leading his men, he was severely wounded.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the appointments of the undermentioned Officers to be Companions of the Distinguished Service Order in recognition of their gallantry and devotion to duty in the Field:—

Temp. Lt.-Com. Arthur Melland Asquith, R.N.V.R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He obtained leave to go up to the front when he heard a fight was imminent. Later, although wounded, he returned to Brigade Headquarters and gave a clear account of the situation and of the fighting, which had been going on during the night. He has previously done fine work.

Temp. Maj. Kenneth Arrowsmith Brown, Devon. R.

For conspicuous gallantry during a raid. It was largely owing to his initiative and courage that the operations met with such success. Previous to the raid he carried out two reconnaissances close to the enemy's

wire, and brought back most valuable information.

Temp. Capt. Geoffrey Fenwick Jocelyn Cumberlege, R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He dashed along the line rallying his own battalion and men of other units. He succeeded in restoring order and in re-organising the line at a most critical time. Throughout the day he inspired all ranks by his high example of courage and devotion to duty.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) James Ferrand Dearden, M.C., R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in commanding his company. By his splendid example of courage and fine leadership several strong enemy counterattacks were repulsed. At a critical stage he jumped on to the parapet with a machine gun and accounted for many of the enemy.

\*Lt. Douglas Hamilton Gordon, Sikhs, Ind.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of two platoons. He led his men to reinforce the right flank, and commenced bombing along the enemy trench, thereby regaining much lost ground. Later, he handled a machine gun with great skill, and succeeded in establishing a block under very heavy fire. He set a splendid example throughout the day.

Temp. Maj. Roland Vaughan Gwynne, Sussex Yeo., attd. R. W. Surr. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and judgment in commanding and carrying out a daylight raid with his battalion. His personal example of courage and coolness was of great value throughout the operation. He personally went over to the enemy lines and supervised. He was wounded.

Temp. Lt. John Maximilian Hammond, M.B., R.A.M.C., attd. Devon. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in evacuating a large number of wounded under the most difficult conditions. He was himself subsequently wounded, and although both his feet were practically blown off he ordered his stretcher-bearers to carry away another wounded man first.

Lt.-Col. William Frederick Mildren, C.M.G., Lond. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a strong raiding party. He made admirable arrangements both as regards the preparation and the execution of the raid, and inspired his battalion with his own fine example.

Temp. Capt. The Hon. Lionel Samuel Montagu, R.M.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company in the first attack and captured his objective. Later, under very heavy fire, he personally took out a covering party and kept his men consolidating the trenches for over 24 hours. On another occasion he single-handed captured 50 prisoners, and later, although wounded, remained at duty.

Maj. Harold Ozanne, R.M.L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He directed the consolidation of the position with marked ability, and was largely responsible for holding the position against subsequent enemy counter-attacks. He displayed great courage and determination throughout the operations.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Thomas Reginald Price, North'n R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He took command of his battalion and led it from the first to the second objective. He organised two successive defensive positions under very heavy fire, thereby saving a critical situation. He inspired all ranks by his high example of courage and devotion to duty.

Temp. Lt.-Com. Robert Howard Shelton, R.N.V.R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He was repeatedly counter-attacked by the enemy, and some of his posts were driven in, and it was only by his personal bravery in placing himself at the head of his men and charging the enemy that the position was held.

T/Lt.-Com. Charles Skeffington West, R.N.V.R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rendered invaluable service by most ably guiding and placing companies of the battalion in their battle positions within 400 yards of the enemy. He worked continuously under heavy hostile shell-fire, and was largely responsible for the success of the operations.

T/Capt. (actg. Maj.) Spencer Vaughan Percy Weston, M.C., R. Berks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in forming up the brigade in their assembly positions previous to an attack. He worked continuously under very heavy fire, and rendered invaluable assistance throughout.

Capt. (actg. Maj.) John Price Wylie, Notts. and Derby. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. He handled his party with great skill, and carried out the task allotted to him with conspicuous success. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

#### CANADIAN CONTINGENT.

Lt.-Col. Reginald Danbury Davies, Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a strong raiding party. He personally superintended the assembly of all parties prior to the attack, and carried out the task allotted to him with conspicuous success. He has previously rendered excellent service on many occasions.

#### SOUTH AFRICAN FORCE.

Temp. Lt.-Col. John George Rose, Serv. Corps.

For conspicuous devotion to duty and the able manner in which he organised and maintained the Motor Tractor Service. It

was largely due to his energy and resource that the forces in the field were able to receive supplies, without which the success of the operations would have been impossible.

(The names marked with an asterisk appeared in the London Gazette dated 17th March, 1917, without deeds.)

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to award a Second Bar to the Wilitary Cross to the undermentioned Officer:—

Capt. Richard William Oldfield, M.C.,  $\mathbb{R}.F.A.$ 

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and initiative in organising parties of men to clear away tarpaulins which had caught fire on various ammunition dumps. He undoubtedly saved a large quantity of heavy ammunition from destruction.

(M.C. Gazetted 18th Feb. 1915.) (1st Bar Gazetted 14th Nov. 1916.)

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to award a Bar to the Military Cross to the undermentioned Officers:—

Lt. (Actg. Capt.) Henry Wyndham Francis Blackburne Farrer, M.C., R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when a gun team became casualties. He went to the gun and rendered assistance to the wounded under very heavy fire. He has at all times set a splendid example of courage and determination.

(M.C. Gazetted 23rd June 1915.)

2nd Lt. Thomas Gronow, M.C., Bord. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in leading an attack against a village. Although his clothing was twice pierced by machine gun fire, he himself drove back an enemy machine gun team which was holding up the advance.

(M.C. Gazetted 3rd Mar. 1917.)

2nd Lt. Leslie George Hartmann, M.C., R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He successfully guided a patrol to its objective and established an observation post in close proximity to the enemy. He set a fine example of coolness and courage throughout. He was severely wounded.

(M.C. Gazetted 1st Jan. 1917.)

Temp. Lt. Cyril Dudeney Hayfield, M.C., E. Kent R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when acting as Battalion Intelligence Officer. On several occasions he carried out reconnaissances under very heavy fire and contained most valuable information.

(M.C. Gazetted 25th Nov. 1916.)

Temp. Capt. Albert Alexander Pargiter Humfrey, M.C., R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He successfully consolidated a dangerous flank under very heavy hostile fire. He showed great powers of organisation and leadership throughout the operations.

(M.C. Gazetted 13th Feb. 1917.)

Temp. Capt. Ernest Emrys Isaac, M.C., R.A.M.C., attd. R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He worked continuously under very heavy fire and was responsible for the successful evacuation of the wounded. He set a splendid example of courage and determination throughout the operations.

(M.C. Gazetted 20th Oct. 1916.)

2nd Lt. Percy Keevill, M.C., K. R. Rif. C. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He reorganised his men, together with those of other units, and formed bombing posts at a critical time. He personally repulsed several enemy bombing attacks and set a splendid example to his men throughout the operations.

(M.C. Gazetted 25th Nov. 1916.)

Temp. Capt. Patrick Joseph Lane, M.C., M.B., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. On several occasions he led out squads of stretcher bearers under very heavy fire and succeeded in bringing in many wounded men. He set a splendid example of courage and determination throughout.

(M.C. Gazetted 25th Nov. 1916.)

Lt. (Temp. Capt.) Norman Allen Lewis, M.C., R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out a most valuable reconnaissance under very heavy fire. Later, he showed marked courage and resource in consolidating the line under the most trying conditions.

(M.C. Gazetted 13th Feb. 1917.)

Lt. (Actg. Capt.) Herbert Athelstan Maynard, M.C., Midd'x R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a daylight raiding party. He handled his men with marked ability, inflicted many casualties on the enemy and captured twenty-five prisoners. He set a splendid example to his men.

(M.C. Gazetted 26th Sept. 1916.)

Lt. Bruce Samuel Kirkman Guise Moores, R.G.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and initiative in digging out, under heavy fire, a man who had been buried. He has at all times set a splendid example.

(M.C. Gazetted 3rd June 1916.)

Capt. and Bt. Maj. Francis Poitier Nos-

worthy, M.C., R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of his company. Although much shaken by the explosion of three large enemy shells he carried out the work allotted to him with conspicuous success. Later, he made a reconnaissance of the enemy's position and obtained most valu-

able information. He was subsequently severely wounded.

(M.C. Gazetted 8th May 1915.)

Rev. the Hon. Maurice Berkeley Peel, M.C., Army Chap. Dept., attd. R. Welsh Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He went out to the advanced patrols with two stretcher bearers and succeeded in bringing in several wounded men. Later, he worked for thirty-six hours in front of the captured position and rescued many wounded under very heavy fire.

(M.C. Gazetted 18th Feb. 1915.)

Capt. Rudolph Albert Peters, M.C., M.B., R.A.M.C., attd. K. R. Rif. C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He continually tended the wounded under very heavy fire. He set a splendid example and showed an absolute disregard for his own personal safety. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

(M.C. Gazetted 20th Oct. 1916.)

Capt. John Ashton Pottinger, M.C., Punjabis, Ind. Army.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. By his skilful dispositions he concealed the presence of his company from the enemy. Later, he took a prominent part in the fighting, and handled his company with marked courage and efficiency under the most difficult circumstances.

(M.C. Gazetted 14th Jan. 1916.)

Temp. Capt. John Caruthers Sale, M.C., R.A.M.C., attd. R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage in collecting and dressing the wounded in the face of a very heavy hostile barrage. He set a splendid example to all ranks.

(M.C. Gazetted 25th Nov. 1916.)

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to confer the Military Cross on the undermentioned Officers and Warrant Officers in recognition of their gallantry and devotion to duty in the Field:—

2nd Lt. James Syme McEwan Ancott, Sco. Rif., attd. K. O. Sco. Bord.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. He entered the enemy's trenches, inflicted many casualties, and captured nine prisoners. He set a splendid example to his men

.Temp. Lt. Bernard Ashmole, R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and skill in forming his company up for the attack under very heavy fire. Later, although wounded, he continued in command until he was wounded a second time and collapsed.

2nd Lt. John Atkin, Yorks. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out a dangerous reconnaissance under very heavy fire, and obtained most valuable information. He has at all times set a splendid example to his men.

Capt. Arthur Bracton Bagley, R. Dub. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He forced his way through uncut wire into the trench and killed two of the enemy. Later, finding his company could not get through the wire, he returned and organised bomb-throwing parties while the wire was being cut.

2nd Lt. Noel Baines, H.A.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out a dangerous reconnaissance under heavy fire, and later occupied an enemy trench. He organised patrols which got into touch with the troops on his right and established a strong point in order to secure his left flank.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Thomas Baird, North'd Fus..

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He took a party of men forward to bridge a gap, and succeeded in establishing touch with the battalion on his rght. On another occasion he led a bombing attack and drove off the enemy. Later, he assisted in rescuing many wounded men.

Temp. Lt. William Edmund Brian Barclay, R.N.V.R., attd. M.G. Coy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He captured an enemy machine gun and brought it into action, thereby materially assisting in repelling an enemy counter-attack. He set a splendid example to his men.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Richard Baxter, S. Staff. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rendered invaluable service in rallying and re-organising the remnants of the companies, and taking out parties for the repair of our wire. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Lt. Brian Brock Bayly, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out a daring reconnaissance, obtaining valuable information, blew up two enemy mine shafts, and captured three prisoners. He has previously done fine work.

Temp. Lt. Joseph Noble Beasley, North'n R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He brought a train of pack animals up to the ammunition dump under very heavy fire, thereby ensuring that the ammunition supply was maintained at a critical time. He has previously done fine work.

Temp. Captain Percy Holman Bentley, A.S.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination in removing a large quantity of shells from a dump which had caught fire, thereby saving many lives. He was wounded.

Lt. Thomas Gerald Glynn Bolitho, R.F.C.,

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when his balloon was attacked by a hostile aeroplane. He saw his observer safely out, and then descended by parachute himself. He has at all times set a fine example, and has done much to preserve a high standard of efficiency in his section.

2nd Lt. (actg. Capt.) Percivale David Bol-

land, Welsh R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He set a splendid example throughout and was largely responsible for the success of the operations. He has previously done fine work.

Temp. Sub-Lt. Philip Henchman Bolus,  $\mathbb{R}.N.V.R.$ 

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He collected men from different units, reorganised them, and led them forward to the attack. Later, although severely wounded, he still continued to give orders and encourage his men.

Temp. 2nd Lt. James Barker Bradford, Durh. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He gallantly led his men into the enemy's trench, capturing many prisoners and two machine guns. He himself killed three of the enemy. Later, he succeeded in repelling a determined enemy counterattack.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) Edgar Bewick Brewer, Lond. R., attd. T.M. By.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in carrying out the bombardment of the enemy's front line prior to a raid. He set a splendid example throughout, and was largely responsible for the success of the raid.

2nd Lt. Mitchell Miller Brodie, North'd

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon with great gallantry and repelled a hostile raiding party at a critical time. He set a splendid example to his men.

2nd Lt. Alfred Ernest Brown, Som. L.I., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He crossed 500 yards of open ground under very heavy fire in order to report that communication with battalion headquarters was cut off. Later, he displayed great courage and determination in tending the wounded under heavy fire.

2nd Lt. Frank Frederick Brown, R.G.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He took command of a party of infantry and organised the defence of a trench. Later, although wounded, he remained in command for three hours and materially assisted in repelling an enemy

Temp. 2nd Lt. William Francis Bryden,

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He kept his men in hand, and succeeded in withdrawing his party, together with the wounded, in the face of very heavy fire.

2nd Lt. Thomas Lewis Burrell, R.G.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although having been unconscious for two hours, he re-established communication, returned to his observation post, and carried out an important registration for his battery, remaining on his duty for 36 hours.

2nd Lt. Herbert Fitzroy Cardwell, Conn.

Rang., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his men forward with great courage and determination in the face of intense hostile fire. Later, he organised and executed a skilful withdrawal. severely wounded.

2nd Lt. Leslie Bert Chambers, York and Lanc. R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although wounded, he, with his sergeant, covered the retreat of the remainder of his party by throwing bombs so successfully that the party was able to retire with only one man wounded.

2nd Lt. Reginald Charlesworth, Midd'x R. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He took command of his company and carried out the task allotted to him with conspicuous success. Later, he took command of two companies and consolidated the position won.

Capt. John Rhynallt Chidlow-Roberts, Notts. and Derby. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He reorganised the parties in "No Man's Land," and led them forward. He conducted the withdrawal with great skill, and himself helped to bring in four dead men.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Geoffrey William Church, E. Kent R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led out a patrol under heavy fire and obtained most valuable information. Later, he greatly assisted his company in maintaining direction, and did invaluable work in keeping down heavy enemy sniping

Lt. Charles Francis Chute, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He went forward, and by his magnificent example of personal courage and coolness under very heavy fire succeeded in rallying the men and checking a withdrawal. Later, he established communication, and

by his accurate reports on the situation greatly assisted in the capture of a most important position.

Capt. Donald Gordon Clark, Gord. Highrs. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out several daring reconnaissances prior to a raid, and personally superintended the cutting of gaps in the enemy's wire. Later, he displayed great gallantry during the raid and assisted in bringing back many wounded to our lines.

2nd Lt. William Richmond Clephan, North'd Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He carried out several dangerous reconnaissances and obtained most valuable Later, he led an offensive information. patrol and made a gallant attempt to rush an enemy sap. He was wounded.

2nd Lt. George Herbert Coleman, L'pool R. For conspicuous gallantry in leading two separate bombing attacks against the enemy. He remained to the last superintending the withdrawal of his party, and then carried a wounded man back to safety under heavy fire.

2nd Lt. Edward Glenister Cotching, E. Kent R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He gallantly led his platoon to their objective and consolidated his position under very heavy fire. He has previously done fine work.

Temp. 2nd Lt. (actg. Lt.) John Cromie,

Gen. List, attd. T.M. By.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He carried out a valuable reconnaissance under heavy fire, got four guns and a large quantity of ammunition up to within 300 yards of the enemy's position, and succeeded in cutting a large quantity of wire in front of the hostile trenches.

Temp. Surg. Frederick Hugh Lester Cunningham, R.N.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He displayed great courage and determination in searching for the wounded in exposed positions and tending them under very heavy fire. He has previously done fine work,

2nd Lt. John Wright Davies, S. Lan. R.,

Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although his party sustained heavy casualties, he pushed forward on his own, and by his fine example succeeded in getting the remnant of his party into the enemy's trenches.

2nd Lt. Rufus Coates Davison, Notts. & Derby R., attd. Rif. Brig.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He maintained his position under the most trying conditions and succeeded in capturing a hostile patrol. Later, he effected the relief of his company with marked ability.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Charles Ffolliott Denning, R.W. Surrey R., Spec. Res. and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when acting as escort to a recon-naissance machine. He attacked a hostilemachine and succeeded in forcing it to land. Later, he landed beside the hostile machine, which was on fire, and extinguished the

2nd Lt. Ernest George Dowdell, Bord. R.,

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He twice passed through a very duty. heavy hostile barrage and obtained most valuable information. He was wounded.

2nd Lt. Eric Alexander Ogilvie Durlacher,

Worc. R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He carried out the task allotted to him with conspicuous success, displaying great courage and initiative throughout the raid.

Temp. Lt. Frank Falconer Dutton, Ches. R. For conspicuous gallantry when in command of a raiding party. In spite of the most determined opposition he successfully extricated his command and inflicted heavy casualties on the enemy.

Temp. Capt. Victor Thomas William

Eagles, R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised and led search parties for wounded, and worked continuously under very heavy fire for over 24 hours. He set a splendid example of courage and determination throughout.

Temp. Capt. Percival George Edwards, Midd'x R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a large party of carriers upto the front line under very heavy fire, thereby ensuring that the supply of ammunition was maintained at a critical time. He set a splendid example of courage and determination throughout.

2nd Lt. Reginald Charles Holme Ellam, L'pool R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination on several occasions in leading patrols under very heavy fire. He has at all times set a fine example to his men.

\*2nd Lt. Harry Richard Elliott, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty as forward observing officer. He fraquently went forward to exposed positions under very heavy fire. Later, he took command of a company and effected a skilful withdrawal at a critical time. He set as splendid example throughout the operations. 2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Edward Nevylle Evans, R. Welsh Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Accompanied by one man, he succeeded in capturing the enemy's position, together with six prisoners. Later, he took command of his company and drove off an enemy counter-attack.

Temp. 2nd Lt. George Henry Evans, R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rallied his men and led them forward to the attack under very heavy fire. He was wounded. He has on many occasions carried out most valuable reconnaissances.

Temp. Lt. Harold Charles de Courcy Evans,

Genl. List, attd. King's Afr. Rif.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He took command of a platoon which was without an officer, and by his fine example of courage and determination rallied the men at a critical time. He has rendered invaluable service as machine-gun officer.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) Hubert Edward Eve, Lond. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He led his company most gallantly, captured all his objectives, inflicted many casualties on the enemy and captured several prisoners.

Temp. Capt. Gordon Lancaster Mountford Fache, Suff. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rendered invaluable service in assisting to form up the battalion under the most difficult conditions. He has on several occasions carried out daring reconnaissances and obtained most valuable information.

2nd Lt. Cecil Hubert Farrington, R. Lanc. R., attd. Lond. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He drove the enemy out of the front line, securing many prisoners and inflicting many casualties. Later, he assumed command of another platoon, and on withdrawal covered the right flank under heavy fire.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) George Douglas Filby, R.F.A., attd. Medium T.M. By.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He put two mortars in position in shell holes, in full view of the enemy, and succeeded in knocking out two enemy strong points. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

2nd Lt. (actg. Capt.) Henry Rawson Forde, York. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devetion to duty. He led his company in the attack with great gallantry, and captured an enemy line of strong posts, together with 40 prisoners. He has previously done fine work.

Lt. Gerald Arthur Gamble, York. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company in the attack with great gallantry and succeeded in capturing his objective. Later, he consolidated

his position and led two attacks against a hostile post.

Temp. Capt. Alan Spencer Gardner, R. Fus.
For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to
duty. He organised three companies and
men of other units, pushed forward his
machine guns and consolidated the position,
after which he established posts further forward. He set a splendid example of courage
and initiative throughout the operations.

Captain Austin Gardner, Essex R., Spec. Res., attd. Nigerian Bde.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He gallantly led a charge across the open in the face of heavy fire, and by his courage and initiative succeeded in capturing an enemy howitzer together with several prisoners.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Frederick James Gaywood, E. Surr. R., attd. T.M. By.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He established his two guns within 100 yards of the enemy and bombarded an enemy post, thereby enabling the Infantry to capture the post.

2nd Lt. William Douglas Gowthorp Gifford, York & Lanc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He personally conducted the raiding parties back to the supporting troops, and, on hearing that one group had not returned, he went back, found it and led it back through the gap. He previously carried out several daring reconnaissances of the enemy's position.

2nd Lt. Walter Goldsworthy, Mon. R., attd. R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He discovered the entrance to a mine system in a crater behind the enemy front line, and leaving four sappers to hold the entrance he descended the mine shaft with a corporal. He captured four prisoners and wrecked the workings of the mine.

2nd Lt. Frederick George Goodyear, Lond. R.

For conspicuous gallantry during a raid. He rushed the enemy trenches and pursued a party of the enemy into a swamp, where he effected the capture of six prisoners.

\*Lt. (actg. Capt.) Douglas David Gracey, Gurkha Rif., Ind. Army.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when commanding two companies in the attack. He succeeded in leading the two companies to their objective in spite of a determined opposition, and by his untiring energy and resource was largely responsible for the success of the operations.

Lt. (actg. Capt.) William Herbert Smith

Grant, Gord. Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. Although wounded, he continued to direct operations, bombed a hostile machine gun, and killed two of the enemy. He set a splendid example throughout, and was largely responsible for the success of the raid.

Lt. Eric James Greene, Suff. Yeo.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rendered invaluable assistance in forming up the battalion previous to the attack. Later, he took command of his company and was instrumental in turning the enemy's flank.

Temp. Lt. (actg. Capt.) Albert Edward Greenhill, Bord. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled his company with marked ability, and his fine personal example had the effect of steadying all ranks. His company captured over eighty prisoners and inflicted many casualties on the enemy.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) Henry Maurice Benedict Gun Cuninghame, R. Dub. Fus., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He was the first man of his company to enter the enemy's trenches. He set a splendid example of courage and determination throughout the day.

2nd Lt. Edward Victor Hallinan, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He gallantly led forward a party of infantry whose officer had become a casualty, took the trench in front of him, and repelled a bombing attack: Later, he repaired telephone wires under heavy fire.

2nd Lt. William Eric Hands, Notts & Derby. R., Spec. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He showed great courage and determination in leading his party and rallying others during the raid. He worked along the trench with only two men, and himself pursued four of the enemy into a dug-out.

Temp. 2nd Lt. John Harrison, E. York. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled his platoon with great courage and skill, reached his objective under the most trying conditions, and captured a prisoner. He set a splendid example throughout.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Richard Leo Higgins, R. Dub. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and initiative in withdrawing his patrol in broad daylight when surrounded on three sides and under very heavy fire.

Temp. Capt. John Reid Hinmers, Shrops. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry when in charge of a raiding party. Although wounded, he rallied his men and successfully rushed the trench, killing one of the enemy and capturing another. He set a splendid example to his men.

\*Lt. Edward Barclay Holmes, Manch. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He repeatedly rallied and led forward his men in the face of a strong enemy counter-attack and under the most intense hostile fire. He was wounded.

Temp. 2nd Lt. George Ronald Honey, Lanc.

For conspicuous gallantry when in command of a patrol. He deliberately attacked the superior force of the enemy, accounted for four of them, and drove off the remainder. He set a splendid example to his men.

2nd Lt. Edward Lambert Hopkins, Worc. R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He handled his men with marked ability, and himself accounted for two of the enemy. Later, he effected a skilful withdrawal and brought all his party safely back.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Walter Dagleish Howick, R. Welsh Fus., attd. Mon. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rapidly reconnoitred the position, and marked out a communication trench, and by his own magnificent example encouraged his men to complete a difficult task in spite of very heavy hostile fire.

Temp. Capt. Noel Baring Hudson, R. Berks.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He launched his company into the attack under very difficult conditions, and their success was largely due to his gallantry in continually reorganising his waves to make good casualties caused by the hostile shell fire.

Temp. 2nd Lt. William Charles Hull, Suff.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rendered invaluable assistance in forming up the battalion previous to the attack. Later, he took command of two companies, and gallantly led them forward, in spite of very heavy hostile fire.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Benjamin Hutchinson, E. York. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He, with his platoon, took sixty boxes of bombs across "No Man's Land" to a patrol which was carrying out a reconnaissance of the enemy's line. Later, he laid a guiding tape under the most trying conditions.

2nd Lt. Ernest Henry Huxford, R.G.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination in extinguishing a fire, thereby saving a considerable amount of ammunition, and avoiding a dangerous explosion.

Temp. Lt. Lawrence Inkster, R.W. Surr.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He handled his company with marked ability, and carried out the task allotted to him with conspicuous success. He subsequently reorganised the defence of the front line.

Capt. Norman Parsons Jewell, M.B., E. African Med. Serv.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He worked continuously for sixty-two hours, and, single-handed, attended to over 100 wounded men. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Temp. Capt. Albert Ernest Jones,  $\mathbb{R}$ . Welsh Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He gallantly led his men forward in the face of very heavy fire, and was largely responsible for the success of the operations. He set a splendid example to his men.

Temp. Lt. Richard Hodkinson Jones, L'pool

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled his party with great courage and initiative throughout. On one occasion he was in command of a party which accounted for eleven of the enemy.

Temp. Lt. Charles Gordon Kemp, M.B., R.A.M.C., attd. North'n R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He worked unceasingly for two days under very heavy fire, and succeeded in evacuating a large number of wounded. He displayed great courage and determination throughout the operations.

Temp. 2nd Lt. John Albert Victor Kent, Conn. Rang.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although wounded, he led his men forward with great courage and determination under very heavy fire. Later, he withdrew his men in perfect order, covering their withdrawal himself, and continuing to fire until his wound rendered this no longer possible.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Herbert Philip Montague Kesterton, R. Welsh Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He went forward when the attack was held up by an enemy strong point, and covered a further advance. Later, he succeeded in capturing the strong point and destroying two hestile machine guns.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Osbert Richmond Knight, R. W. Surr. R., and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when attacked by two hostile machines. Although wounded, he succeeded in driving the two machines away, and continued to observe for his battery. Later, he again drove off an enemy machine and continued his observation.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Arthur Haughton Lamb, Lanc. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to

duty. He took command of his company, organised the defence, and repulsed several strong enemy counter-attacks. He set a fine example to his men.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Ralph Whittington Landon, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devetion to duty. He successfully constructed a strong point in advance of the line held by the infantry under very heavy fire. He set a splendid example of courage and determination throughout.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Mathias Henry Lansdown, R.W. Surr. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He assumed command, and gallantly led his company to their objective, maintained his position there, and conducted the withdrawal from the farthest point in the enemy's lines with marked skill.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Roy Launceton, attd. Midd'x R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He cleared up the first line of trenches and pushed on to assist in the capture of a further objective, displaying great courage and initiative. Later, he effected a skilful withdrawal under difficult conditions.

2nd Lt. Tom Lee, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He remained in observation throughout the day under very heavy fire, and sent back most valuable information. He set a splendid example of courage and determination.

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) James Leith Leith, Hamp. R., and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When leading a formation of five machines he drove down one of eleven hostile scouts which attacked his patrol. He completed his reconnaissance, and, although again attacked, succeeded in leading his patrol safely back to our lines. On previous occasions he has brought down three hostile machines.

Temp. Lt. Frederick William Lewis, A.O.D.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and initiative in organising parties of men to clear away tarpaulins which had caught fire on various ammunition dumps.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Theodore George Alexander Lima, Welsh R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty as sniping officer. He set a splendid example throughout, and was largely responsible that so few casualties were sustained. He was severely wounded.

Temp. Capt. David Lindsay, North'd Fus.
For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to
duty. He went forward through a heavy
hostile barrage to the new front line and

returned with most valuable information. Later, he took command of a company, and was largely responsible for saving a critical situation.

2nd Lt. Richard Sackville Lovett Thomas, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He kept up communication over ground that was constantly under artillery and machine gun fire. He succeeded in establishing communication with a forward Infantry Report Centre under the most difficult conditions.

Capt. Stanley James' Linzell, M.B., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in superintending the evacuation of the wounded. He continually visited the forward Battalion Headquarters, passing under very heavy fire. He set a splendid example of courage and determination throughout.

2nd Lt. Daniel Roy Lyne, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although severely wounded, he successfully completed his work of erecting wire in front of a captured position in close proximity to the enemy. He has previously done fine work.

Temp. Lt. Hugh Albert Martin, High. L.I.
For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of his company, which had been detailed as a carrying party. He handled his company with marked ability and brought up the stores almost as soon as the hostile trenches had been entered, thereby enabling the attacking force to proceed with the consolidation of the captured position without delay.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Charles Arthur Stirling Mathias, E. Kent R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led out a patrol and brought back most valuable information. Later, he established a post on the left flank of the Battalion, and maintained his position there in spite of heavy hostile fire.

Temp. Capt. Valentine Goold McArthur, R. Berks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled his Company in the attack with marked ability, and succeeded in reaching his final objective. Later, he established connection under the most trying conditions and consolidated a strong point. He was severely wounded.

Temp. Capt. Thomas McCosh, M.B., R.A.M.C., attd. Welsh R.

For conspicuous gallantry when his Aid Post was subjected to heavy shell fire for over three hours. He, with absolute disregard for his own personal safety, set a splendid example of courage and devotion to duty.

Temp. Surg. William James McCracken, M.B.,  $\mathbb{R}.N$ .

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He continually attended to the

wounded under very heavy fire. He has previously done fine work.

Lt. Cecil Michael McFeely, R. Dub. Fus.
For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to
duty. He kept his company well in hand
all day, and personally killed one enemy
officer and five other ranks. He set a splendid example of courage and initiative.

2nd Lt. Cameron Holmes McIntosh, L'pool R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led four parties to search for an officer and a man, and was out for four hours under heavy fire. Later, he carried out a daring reconnaissance and obtained most valuable information.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Percy Merryfield Meeson, Rif. Brig.

F'or conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Accompanied by a rifleman he made a daring reconnaissance and succeeded in reaching a dead man, from whose body he obtained several most valuable documents.

Lt. William Geoffrey Meggitt, Welsh R., Spec. Res. and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty whilst one of a patrol engaging five hostile machines. He drove down one enemy machine and then attacked another, which was seen to go down vertically. He has previously brought down three hostile machines.

Capt. Edward Ballantyne Methven, Yorks. L.I., attd. R. Berks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company forward to reinforce the front line and greatly assisted in clearing up a difficult situation. Although twice wounded during the course of the operations he continued to command his company until ordered back to the aid post.

Temp. Capt. Theodore Guthrie Morgan, Welsh R.

For conspicuous gallantry in leading his party to the assault. He was instrumental in capturing several prisoners and set a splendid example throughout the raid.

Temp. Capt. George Bond Morton, R. Fus.
For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to
duty. He succeeded in forming up his company and launching them in the attack in
spite of very heavy hostile fire. He set a
splendid example throughout. He was
severely wounded.

Capt. (actg. Maj.) George Henry Neely, Lond. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He established a forward position in the enemy lines and from there maintained communication with all the companies and greatly assisted in the success of the operations.

2nd Lt. Jasper Edmund Henry Nicolls, R.G.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although suffering from shell shock he worked for three hours digging out men who had been buried and undoubtedly saved many lives. He set a splendid example of courage and determination.

2nd Lt. Charlton Walter Palin, Baluchis, Ind. Army.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in defending a redoubt. Although three times buried by falling parapets, he kept his men together under the most intense fire and maintained hold of his position.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Percy Reginald Palmer, R.W. Fus., attd. Leic. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination in firing a torpedo under most difficult conditions. Later, he rescued two wounded men.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Alfred Parkinson, Manch. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon in a most gallant manner, driving the enemy out of their position and reaching his final objective.

Temp. Capt. John Burnell Passmore, Devon.

For conspicuous gallantry and skill in leading his company into the enemy's trenches in face of determined opposition. He set a fine example, and by his courage and determination several counter-attacks were successfully repulsed. He was wounded.

Temp. 2nd Lt. George Stanley Pearcy, R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He went forward, and by his magnificent personal example of courage and coolness under very heavy fire, rallied the men of his battalion and greatly assisted in saving a critical situation.

Temp. Lt. (temp. Capt.) John Pearson, R. Marines.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out the consolidation of the battalion's left front and materially assisted in repulsing an enemy counterattack at a critical time.

Lt. Joscelyn Edward Seymour Percy, Durh. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his men with great determination and himself killed two of the enemy. Later, although severely wounded, he remained in the enemy's trenches until the last man of his party had withdrawn.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Frank Mayvour Perraton, R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rallied and reorganised elements of three companies, and rendered valuable assistance in repulsing a strong enemy counter-attack. He set a splendid example of courage and determination.

2nd Lt. Thomas Barnes Pollard, Durh. L.I.,

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. He led his men with great determination, and himself killed three of the enemy. Later, although severely wounded, he continued to conduct the operations, eventually bringing his party back without the loss of a man.

Capt. Robert Hugh Poyntz, Shrops. L.I., attd. Gold Coast R.

For conspicuous gallartry and devotion to duty when suddenly attacked by the enemy. He most gallantly brought up men to meet the attack, thereby undoubtedly saving a critical situation. He was wounded in five places. He has previously done fine work.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Norman Henry Priday, W. York. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon forward in spite of a very heavy hostile barrage, and occupied the enemy second line trench, where he established his position by using a supply of enemy hand grenades. He displayed great courage and determination throughout.

Temp. 2nd Lt. William Lloyd Ashley Cooper Reade, R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. By his energy and total disregard for his own personal safety he kept the front line supplied with bombs and ammunition at a critical time.

Rev. Herbert Richards, temp. Chapl., 4th Class, A. Chapl. Dept., attd. E. York. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He buried the dead and tended the wounded under very heavy fire. He has at all times set a splendid example of courage and determination.

Temp. Lt. Patterson Reay Ridley, Cyclist Bn., attd. W. Rid. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his party with great dash, himself killing one of the enemy and capturing another. He displayed great coolness and resource in the attack and in organising the defence of the trench.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Edward Lancelot Roberts, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled his section with marked ability whilst in the enemy's trenches, and succeeded in firing twelve charges of explosive, doing considerable damage loth to material and personnel.

Lt. Richard Adair Rochfort, R. Innis. Fus., attd. R. Berks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rendered invaluable assistance in laying out the forming up tape line for the battalion. On two occasions he carried out daring reconnaissances under heavy fire, and obtained most valuable information.

Temp. Capt. Andrew Duncan Rollo, E. Lanc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He personally cut his way through the enemy's wire, entered a redoubt, and drove the defenders out with his revolver. He set a fine example of courage and initiative throughout.

2nd Lt. Sidney Alexander Salmon, R.F.A., attd. T.M. By.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He fought two trench mortars with great skill during a heavy hostile bombardment. On another occasion he remained at his post for  $2\frac{1}{2}$  hours after he had been severely wounded.

Temp. 2nd Lt. (actg. Lt.) James Henry Simcock, Gen. List, attd. T.M. By.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He made a personal reconnaissance of an enemy strong point under heavy fire, and then returned, placed his trench mortars in position, and bombarded the post so effectively that the enemy evacuated it later under cover of darkness.

Temp. 2nd Lt. George Kenneth Simpson, R.F.C., late R.G.A., Gen. List.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty whilst observing from a balloon which was set on fire. He went to the assistance of his fellow observer, and would not leave the balloon himself until he had seen the other observer clear. He was severely burnt.

2nd Lt. Francis Johnston Smith, Gord. Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He was the first to enter the enemy's trench, and himself accounted for two of the enemy. He set a splendid example throughout, and was largely responsible for the success of the operations.

2nd Lt. Charles Alec Southin, Lond. R. For conspicuous gallantry when in charge of a raiding party. He accounted for five of the enemy, and supported another party at a critical time. He has on many previous occasions carried out daring raids.

2nd Lt. John William Spencer, Lond. R.
For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches.
He cleared several dugouts of their occupants and captured many prisoners. He set a splendid example of courage and initiative. He was wounded.

Temp. Lt. Edmund Augustus Sprange, R.N.V.R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company most gallantly in the assault, subsequently consolidating the captured position and establishing a line of posts beyond the final objective. He has previously done fine work.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Maurice William Campbell Sprott, Norf. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He carried out the task allotted to him with conspicuous success, and showed great pluck in getting back the wounded under very heavy fire.

2nd Lt. (actg. Capt.) John Gwatkin Steel, I.A.R.O., attd. Baluchis.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of the firing line during a stiff engagement which lasted for four hours. He kept his C.O. well informed of the progress of the fight, and inspired his men throughout by his splendid example of courage and determination.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Herbert Richard Strong, Midd'x R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. By his energy and coolness, he kept the bomb supply going, and finally when the enemy retired he opened rifle fire on them, inflicting a number of casualties.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Timothy Sugrue, Welsh R.
For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to
duty. He led his Company with great gallantry and handled a difficult situation with
conspicuous success. He set a fine example
to his men.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Henry Geoffrey Nelson Tarrant, R. Berks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He pushed home the attack with such determination that, in spite of weak numbers, he succeeded in capturing 70 prisoners. He finally got in touch with the unit on his left, and consolidated the position he had gained.

2nd Lt. Rupert William Taylor, R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage on several occasions in getting his men and mules through heavy shell fire. He set a splendid example to his men throughout under the most difficult circumstances.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Alfred James Thackray, E. York. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon with great courage and determination, captured his objective, together with an enemy machine gun. He set a splendid example throughout.

2nd Lt. William Sutherland Thatcher, I.A.R.O., attd. Baluchis.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a bombing party with great gallantry, driving the enemy out of his position and securing an important tactical position. He was wounded.

Temp. Lt. Geoffrey Tilley, R.F.A., attd. T.M. By.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and skill during many wire-cutting operations and was largely instrumental in bringing three raids to a successful conclusion.

2nd Lt. Thomas Philip Toovey, R.W. Surr.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a daylight raid on the enemy's lines. He assumed command and gallantly led his company to their objective. Later, he rescued many wounded under very heavy fire. 2nd Lt. John Eric Trevor-Jones, Rif. Brig.,

Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Accompanied by two men, he cut a lane through our wire under very heavy fire. Later, he organized a bombing party and drove off an enemy attack. On another occasion he established a block under heavy fire, thereby saving a critical situation.

Temp. Capt. Herbert Walker, R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his stretcher-bearers with great courage and determination for a period of 36 hours. It was due to his energy and resource that a large number of wounded were evacuated under the most trying conditions.

Lt. John Cameron Wallace, R.E., Spec. Res.

This Officer has always shown a most magnificent example to all ranks by his absolute fearlessness and disregard of danger. He has on many occasions gone out under very heavy shell fire to repair lines himself.

2nd Lt. Philip Aubrey Watson, Yorks. Dns., attd. York & Lanc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and cool leadership when on patrol. Although wounded, he handled his patrol with marked ability, inflicted many casualties on the enemy, and successfully extricated his command from a critical position.

2nd Lt. Percy Charles Watson, Leic. R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although wounded, he led his party into the enemy's trenches. Later, he carried a wounded man back to safety under heavy fire.

2nd Lt. Stuart Davies Webb, Bord. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised a bombing party and succeeded in repelling an enemy counterattack. He has carried out several valuable reconnaissances.

2nd Lt. (actg. Capt.) Charles James Richard Whitmore, R.G.A., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although wounded, he continued to observe for his battery, in spite of heavy hostile fire. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

2nd Lt. Reginald Coleridge Wilde, L'pool R. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a fighting patrol across "No Man's Land," and captured an enemy sap, together with two prisoners. Later, although wounded, he continued in command of his patrol.

2nd Lt. Arthur Wood, R.G.A., Spec. Res., attd. T.M. By.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. With the assistance of a bombardier, he extricated a trench mortar which had been buried, and continued firing, in spite of heavy hostile shelling. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Temp. Lt. John Leslie Wood, W. York. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devetion to duty. On several occasions he personally went out under very heavy fire in order to lay and repair his lines. He set a splendid example of courage and determination throughout the operations.

Temp. Capt. Llewellyn Wood, E. Kent R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although his flank was exposed, he organised the line held by his company with great skill. He set a splendid example throughout, and sent in most valuable reports on the situation.

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) John William Woods, York L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Accompanied by six men, he pushed forward in front of his company, thereby effecting the capture of sixty prisoners. Later, he took charge of the right-half battalion and consolidated his position under the most difficult conditions.

3513 Sqdn. S./M. (actg. R.S.M.) Arthur Collier, Hussars (attd. Permanent Staff, Oxfordshire Hussars).

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion. He brought in six wounded men from the front of the trenches under a heavy fire, the men having been left out from the previous day's engagement. He has invariably shown great bravery and coolness under fire, and set a fine example to all ranks.

(The award of a bar to D.C.M. which was announced in the Gazette of 11th March, 1916, page 2736, is cancelled, the Military Cross having now been awarded instead.)

3/10252 C.S.M. Owen Cuthbert, North'n R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rendered invaluable assistance in forming up his company previous to the attack, and set a splendid example of coolness under very heavy fire. Later, although wounded, he remained at his post.

L/7448 C.S.M. Joseph Warner, Midd'x R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He took command of part of his company, and by his quick grasp of the situation materially assisted the assaulting battalions by filling a gap between them. He set a splendid example of courage and determination throughout.

AUSTRALIAN IMPERIAL FORCE. 2nd Lt. Angus Herbert Boileau, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in charge of a group of three posts in the front line. By his fine example and initiative an enemy attack was driven off and twelve prisoners captured. Later,

accompanied by one man, he succeeded in capturing four more prisoners.

#### Lt. Victor Vincent Brown, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He maintained his position, in spite of being attacked by very superior numbers, and inflicted many casualties on the enemy, thereby saving a critical situation. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

#### Lt. Colin Graham Forrest, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a bombing party with great gallantry and established a block which he held for 27 hours, thereby enabling a valuable part of the line to be connected.

#### Lt. Harold Maurice Griffiths, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although there was a heavy hostile barrage on his line, he moved from post to post and encouraged his men to drive off a determined enemy counter-attack.

#### Lt. Roy Cyril Buik Mortimer Gunter, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He showed great courage and determination in collecting the wounded from the enemy's trenches and sending them back across "No Man's Land."

#### Capt. Gladston Montague Hunt, A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He showed an absolute disregard of danger and set a splendid example to his stretcher-bearers, working with them over ground continually swept by heavy fire. He worked for six consecutive weeks in a forward area in charge of an advanced dressing station.

#### Capt. John Bruce Laing, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He showed great coolness and resource in controlling his party in the enemy trench until their task was completed. He set a splendid example throughout, and contributed largely to the success of the raid.

#### Capt. Harrie Bertie Lee, A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in evacuating the wounded. He set a splendid example throughout and worked continually under very heavy fire. He has previously done fine work.

#### Lt. John Wilson McDonald, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. In spite of intense fire he made repeated attempts to enter the enemy's trenches, and at last succeeded in forcing an entry at another point. He has previously done fine work.

#### 2nd Lt. William Donald McKenzie, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his party with great dash and inflicted many casualties on the enemy. He himself shot three of the enemy and captured two prisoners. Later, he superintended the evacuation of the wounded under heavy fire.

#### Lt. Walter Davies Price, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. Although severely wounded, he reorganised parties and led them into the enemy's trenches, where he continued to direct operations.

#### Capt. Clarence Henry Taylor, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his men throughout in a most gallant manner, and succeeded in capturing a party of eighteen of the enemy. He set a fine example to his men.

#### 2nd Lt. Athol Muir Teare, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although wounded, he remained at duty, and by his magnificent personal example inspired his Company under the most trying conditions.

#### Lt. James Charles Todd, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led several daring patrols and obtained most valuable information. Later, he covered the assembly of four raiding Companies in "No Man's Land," and assisted in bringing back several wounded men.

#### CANADIAN FORCE.

#### Lt. George Albert Allan, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. Although wounded, he continued in command, and himself killed two of the enemy. Later, he assisted in rescuing a wounded man, and was the last to leave the enemy trench

#### Lt. Thomas Brown Barrie, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out several dangerous reconnaissances and obtained most valuable information. Later, during a raid on the enemy's trenches, he led his men with great gallantry and succeeded in capturing his objective, together with several prisoners.

#### Lt. Frederick George Bird, Engrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He successfully demolished fifty yards of the enemy's wire, thereby enabling a raiding party to enter the enemy's trenches. Later, although severely wounded, he continued to carry on his work.

#### Lt. John Marshall Baker, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He personally led the advance to the extreme end of the task allotted, supervising the establishment of posts, and displaying great gallantry and initiative.

Capt. (temp. Maj.) Dougall Carmichael,

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to determination in carrying out the destruction of an important enemy work. He has previously done fine work.

#### Lt. William Albert Dawe, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. He cleared 100 yards of the enemy trench and captured two prisoners. Later, he remained behind after the withdrawal and blew up a concrete machine-gun emplacement.

#### Lt. Wilfred Derbyshire, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He gallantly led his party to their objective, bombed several dug-outs, and inflicted many casualties on the enemy. Later, he rescued several wounded men of his party under very heavy fire. He set a splendid example of courage and determination throughout.

#### Lt. Andrew Warwick Duncan, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. He gallantly led his men into the enemy trench, in spite of heavy fire, and carried out the task allotted to him with conspicuous success.

#### Lt. Frederick Charles Gillingwater, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although severely wounded, he continued to lead his men with great dash, and himself killed two of the enemy. He was again severely wounded.

#### Lt. Charles Ridgeway Gilpin, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party He carefully organised his party and carried out the task allotted with conspicuous success. He set a splendid example to his men.

#### Lt. Robert Dickson Harkness, M.M.G. Ser.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He handled his machine gun with marked ability, and later, although suffering from shell shock, effected the withdrawal of his guns. He carried a wounded man to a place of safety.

#### Lt. David Vandewater Ketcheson, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. Although wounded, he continued in command of his men, and led the assault on the enemy trench in a most determined manner. Later, he was again severely wounded.

#### Lt. James Arthur Murphy, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He rallied several raiding parties at duty. displayed critical time. Hе great gallantry throughout, and, although by his example and effort wounded, rendered invaluable assistance in making the operation a success.

#### Lt. Melbourne Parker Neily, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. Although severely wounded on entering the enemy trench, he continued to direct operations, and later effected a skilful withdrawal. He set a splendid example of courage and determination throughout.

#### Lt. Hubert Nelson Pitcher, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. Although wounded before reaching the enemy trench, he continued to lead his men, and was subsequently the last man to leave the trench. He set a splendid example to all ranks.

#### Lt. Samuel John Reeves, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. Although wounded, he led his men with great gallantry, and succeeded in establishing a block at a critical time. Later, he searched "No Man's Land" for two and a half hours in order to find a wounded N.C.O.

#### Lt. Harry Reymes, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. He led his men with great gallantry, and himself accounted for several of the enemy.

#### Lt. William Cameron Ross, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He reorganised his men under heavy fire, and led them forward to their objective. He set a splendid example throughout, and was largely responsible for the success of the operation.

#### Lt. Conn Smythe, Fld. Arty.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised some men and led them forward with great dash, thereby dispersing an enemy party at a critical time. He himself accounted for three of the enemy with his revolver. He has previously done fine work.

#### Lt. John Henry Grassett Strathy, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion He displayed great courage and to duty. determination in assisting to destroy an enemy work under the most difficult conditions.

#### Lt. Nathaniel William Symonds, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. He gallantly led his men into the enemy trench in spite of a most determined opposition. Later, although suffering from a badly lacerated hand, he personally killed two of the enemy with his revolver.

#### Lt. Maurice Bensley Thornhill, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He gallantly led his men to their objective, blew up a mine shaft, wrecking the enemy front line for a distance of 70 yards, and inflicting many casualties. Later, after returning with his party, and although wounded, he went back to the enemy's lines to look for a wounded N.C.O.

410001 S./M. William Henry Marsden, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He displayed great courage and determination in rescuing several wounded men and an officer under very heavy fire. He has at all times set a splendid example.

#### NEWFOUNDLAND CONTINGENT.

2nd Lt. Gerald Guy Byrne, Newfoundland R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised and gallantly led a bombing attack, driving the enemy back at a critical time. He set a splendid example of courage and initiative.

#### NEW ZEALAND FORCE.

Capt. Arthur Charles Hubbard, Auckland R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and initiative in leading his company in the assault on the enemy front line. Later, he was largely instrumental in rescuing several wounded men.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) James Edward Hedley Mewett, Auckland R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He led his men with great gallantry, and himself accounted for three of the enemy. Later, although severely wounded, he continued to direct the operations.

# Lt. Charles Hastings Alexander Senior, Auckland R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although wounded, he continued to lead his platoon with great gallantry, and carried out the task allotted to him. He has previously done fine work.

Lt. Francis John William Stallard, New Zealand Fld. Arty., attd. N.Z. T.M. By.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. At great personal risk he remained in the open under very heavy fire and passed from mortar to mortar, personally supervising repairs. He set a splendid example to his men, and kept his battery in action throughout the raid.

#### SOUTH AFRICAN FORCE.

Temp. Capt. (now temp. Maj.) Charles Stewart Hastings Snow, S.A. Serv. Corps.

For conspicuous devotion to duty and the able manner in which he controlled the Supply Column. He maintained his command in a high state of efficiency, in spite of the most trying conditions, and it is largely due to his personal zeal and energy that the forces were kept continually supplied.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He assumed command of his party and led the operation with great coolness until the enemy retired. Later, he assisted to bring in a wounded officer. He was himself wounded.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although his party suffered heavy casualties before reaching the enemy's line he nevertheless carried out his work with only three men, and inspired all ranks by his bravery and disregard of danger.

1655 (now 320277) L./Corpl. W. J. Bailey, Lond. Regt.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a section to cut off a party of the enemy who tried to escape, killing two and capturing the remainder. He rendered invaluable service throughout the operations.

G./9646 Sjt. T. H. Baker, R. W. Surr. R.,

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in charge of a bombing party. Although severely wounded he refused to leave his post, and succeeded in capturing 25 prisoners. He set a splendid example of courage and determination throughout.

9276 C./Q./M./Sjt. J. A. Battles, K.O. Sco. Bords.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He went to the assistance of a small party at a critical time, and succeeded in capturing 23 prisoners. He set a fine example of courage and initiative.

10511 L./Cpl. A. E. Bierton, York & Lanc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry during the withdrawal of a patrol in the face of greatly superior numbers. He handled his men with marked ability and by his fine personal example contributed largely to the successful withdrawal.

2141 Corpl. W. Brain, Lanc. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rallied the men of a blocking party at a critical time and re-established confidence by his own magnificent personal example.

9651 C./S./M. J. Bramley, Yorks. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rendered invaluable service in collecting men and leading them forward to their objective. Later, he led a bombing attack and cleared the enemy trench.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He proceeded 50 miles from our nearest post to a point on the enemy's line of communication, tapped the enemy telegraph line and returned across a river with his cable.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He went forward to an exposed position 150 yards from the enemy's trenches, and from there continued to send in most important messages. On one occasion he repaired his telephone line under very heavy fire. He was wounded.

7024 Sjt. J. Campbell, Sco. Rif., attd. Gold Coast R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although his machine gun was buried by a shell he remounted it and continued to fire until another shell buried him with earth. He continued firing his gun for five hours.

K./680 Corpl. J. W. Carr, R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rallied his men under heavy fire and materially assisted in the success of the operations. He set a splendid example to all ranks.

2258 L./Sjt. A. H. R. Chapman, E. Kent

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised a post on the left flank of the battalion, thus securing this flank against attack. On another occasion he went forward with a section and obtained valuable information.

3/5332 Pte. P. Collins, Conn. Rang.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination during a daylight operation against the enemy's trenches. Later, he rescued several wounded men under very heavy fire.

29659 Pte. W. Cooke, York. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He single-handed attacked a party of nine of the enemy, and after a violent struggle succeeded in capturing the leader of the hostile party, identification being thus obtained.

9734 Pte. B. Croft, K.R.R.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He single-handed took a machine gun forward and opened fire on the enemy, thereby greatly assisting in repelling an enemy counter-attack.

7505 Pte. F. I. English, K.R.R.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He brought in several wounded men in spite of very heavy fire, and showed an absolute disregard to his own safety. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

62089 Corpl. A. W. Faulkner, R.G.A., attd. T.M. Bty.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. In spite of a heavy hostile barrage he kept his gun in action and carried out the work allotted to him. He set a splendid example of courage and coclness throughout. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

79938 2nd Corpl. J. Foram, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He entered a mine shaft dug-out, killed one of the enemy and captured fourteen prisoners. Later, having handed his prisoners over, he again entered the mine shaft and obtained much useful information.

13625 Sjt. E. S. Garrod, Norf. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in charge of a carrying party. In spite of very heavy fire he got his party to the first objective shortly after the leading waves had reached it. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Spts. 1775 Sjt. J. T. Gore, R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He continually went backwards and forwards between the front line and Battalion Headquarters under very heavy fire, gaining most valuable information. He set a splendid example throughout.

33305 Sjt. G. W. Grinnell, Worc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He organised a bombing party and succeeded in making a block in the enemy's trench at a critical time. He set a splendid example of courage and initiative.

1203 Pte. J. Hailstones, Mach. Gun Corps.
For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rendered invaluable service in rallying and reorganising the men at a critical time. Later, he went forward and obtained most valuable information, and himself killed an enemy officer.

14821 L./Corpl. E. J. Hazlewood, Suff. R. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination in tending the wounded under very heavy fire. He worked unceasingly all day and far into the night, and was continually urging others to carry on with the work.

9485 Cpl. (A./C./S./M.) J. Hearn, Yorks.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He assumed command of a party of men and attacked an enemy strong point, which he captured together with a machine gun. Later, he materially assisted in repelling an enemy counter-attack.

1634 Pte. R. G. Hill, British S. Afr. Police. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in carrying out dangerous reconnaissances. On one occasion, accompanied by another man, he penetrated the enemy's position and captured an outpost, obtaining most valuable information, which enabled a successful attack to be made.

For conspicuous gallantry and resource in bringing up reinforcements, in the performance of which duty he had continually to pass over open ground under heavy machine gun and rifle fire, and in endeavouring to bring in a wounded officer, who was killed whilst being brought in.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to
duty. Although he had a leg and an arm
blown off he remained at his post until relieved by the No. 1 of the gun, and insisted on handing over his reports.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Accompanied by another sapper he entered an enemy underground system, killing one of the enemy and capturing three prisoners. Later, he laid explosive charges and fired them successfully. He has previously done fine work.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although very severely wounded he completed the repair work he was engaged upon, and carried a wounded comrade back to his battery under heavy fire. He has previously done fine work.

Spts. 1967 Pte. G. W. King, R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He brought in a machine gun and rescued several wounded officers under very heavy fire. He set a splendid example of courage and determination throughout. He has previously done fine work.

241077 Pte. (acting L./Cpl.) J. R. Lawrence, Gord. Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He set a splendid example throughout the raid and was the last man of his squad to leave the enemy's trench. He killed an enemy machine gunner and destroyed his gun.

60989 Sjt. B. W. Leaversuch, Trench Mortar Bty., R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. In spite of a very heavy hostile barrage he maintained his gun in action for over an hour. Later, when his officer became a casualty, he took command and handled three gun detachments with marked ability.

7230 L./Sjt. A. R. Lewis, Rif. Brig. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to

for conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He went out three times under heavy fire, and on each occasion brought back into the trench a number of men who were carrying out the relief. Later, he assisted in dressing the wounded.

22826 L./Cpl. A. Lumb, Yorks. L.I., Spec. Res

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He established his machine gun under very heavy fire and maintained his position for three days until relieved.

28242 Gunner G. McKay, R.G.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and initiative in laying a wire to the enemy's front line under very heavy fire. He set a splendid example throughout the operations.

17406 Cpl. J. McLaughlin, K.O. Sco. Bord. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He himself killed several of the enemy and set a splendid example throughout the raid. He has on many previous occasions done fine work

12056 Sjt. A. Milgrove, R. Berks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He shot three of the enemy dead and directed the fire of a machine gun on the remainder, causing them to scatter. He then assisted his wounded officer to escape and skilfully withdrew his party.

K/700 L./Sjt. A. Mobley, R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He succeeded in forcing a gap in the enemy's wire at a critical time. Later, although severely wounded, he continued to encourage his men. He set a splendid example of courage and determination.

3786 (now 491208) Corpl. W. Mullins, Lond. R. .

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He blew up a dugout and killed many of the enemy. Later, when a bomb fell in the middle of his section, he picked it up and threw it out of the trench, the bomb exploding on leaving his hand.

15470 Sjt. G. New, S. Lancs. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He maintained his position until ordered to withdraw, and succeeded in getting back all his wounded in spite of heavy fire. Later, he rescued three wounded men and a machine gun.

40022 L./Cpl. (actg. Cpl.) T. O'Connell, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He dressed a wounded man, and remained with him for twenty minutes under very heavy fire until a stretcher party arrived. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

M.Z.529 Able Sea. F. Price, R.N.V.R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although wounded and partially buried, he managed to extricate himself. He then worked for an hour under heavy fire, and succeeded in digging out five men who had been buried.

13937 Sjt. G. Quartermain, North'n R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He assumed command of the first wave, and led it forward in a most gallant manner. He set a splendid example of courage and fine leadership. He was wounded.

12731 Pte. E. A. Ratty, R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He frequently led his squad out under very heavy fire, and succeeded in bringing in many wounded men. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

17914 L./Cpl. A. Reid, R. Innis. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. After his machine gun had jammed, and although himself wounded, he corrected the stoppage and opened fire on a strong enemy raiding party, driving them off at a critical time.

12612 Sjt. T. H. Rogers, S. Staff. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rendered most valuable assistance to his platoon commander in the attack. Later, although severely wounded, he continued to crawl from shell hole to shell hole, urging his men to the attack.

G/3396 L./Sjt. G. Rowe, Midd'x R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He took command of his company, led them to their objective, and continued in command until relieved by an officer two days later. He has previously done fine work.

96878 Sjt. A. M. Russell, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When in charge of a relief, he succeeded, after twelve hours' continuous work under the most trying conditions, in rescuing three men who had been buried. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

G/1258 Corpl. C. W. H. Sadd, R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He assumed command of his company, reorganised it, and consolidated his position. Later, he carried a wounded man back to the aid post under very heavy fire.

43293 Gnr. R. G. Sanders, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although very severely wounded, he assisted in digging out a man who had been buried by a shell, thereby undoubtedly saving this man's life.

10/14 Corpl. T. E. Saunderson, E. Yorks.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although very severely wounded, he continued to encourage his men, and refused help until the company had taken up its new position. He was exposed to heavy fire throughout, and in great pain.

14694 L./Corpl. W. Savage, Suff. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Accompanied by seven men, he forced his way through a small gap in the enemy's wire, killed four of the enemy, and captured fourteen prisoners, together with a machine gun.

5919 C./S./M. H. Smith, Manch. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised bombing parties, and led them forward under heavy fire. Later, he took command of two platoons, and ably beat off a strong enemy counter-attack.

34302 L./Sjt. S. J. W. Towler, Som. L.I. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination in endeavouring to dig out a buried officer during an intense hostile bombardment. Later, although he had been

unconscious for three hours, he again took over command of his post.

16301 Sjt. H. Uttley, Notts. and Derby. R. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rallied several parties in "No Man's Land" under very heavy fire, and led them into the enemy's trenches.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled three trench mortars with marked ability, and greatly assisted in clearing up a difficult situation. He set a fine example throughout.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He picked up a trench mortar bomb which fell into the emplacement owing to a defective time fuse, and instantly unscrewed the time fuse, thereby undoubtedly saving the lives of the whole detachment. He has previously done fine work.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although wounded, he handled his platoon with marked ability, and contributed largely to the success of the raid.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He took command of a post, and by his own magnificent personal example inspired his men to drive off a strong enemy counter-attack.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He made a daring reconnaissance, and led raiding parties across "No Man's Land" to the point of assembly. Later, he carried five wounded men back to a place of safety.

For conspicuous galfantry and devotion to duty. He assisted in laying a cable to an advanced patrol under very heavy fire. Later, he returned along the line alone, and repaired a break, thereby re-establishing communication at a critical time.

3087 L./Cpl. R. Laity, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry when on patrol. He crawled through the enemy wire to within a dozen yards of the enemy parapet, and threw bombs into the trench. He has at all times set a splendid example of courage and devotion to duty.

2199 L./Cpl. N. F. Lindhe, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. With a few men he succeeded in

driving off a strong party of the enemy. He set a fine example of courage and initiative throughout.

3904 Sjt. P. B. Malone, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great bravery during a bombing raid, and later materially assisted in establishing a block at a critical time.

5136 Pte. T. D. Merton, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He advanced under cover of a fog and took up a position in "No Man's Land," from which he shot five of the enemy. He has at all times displayed great courage and initiative.

866 Pte. G. F. Seagrott, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He went out alone to the enemy's wire under very heavy fire and succeeded in bringing his officer back to safety. He set a splendid example of courage and determination.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although wounded, he gallantly led his party to their objective in the enemy's third line, and I'ersonally accounted for four of the enemy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When the leading platoons of his company failed to effect an entrance through the enemy's wire, he led his party to another place in the wire and succeeded in forcing an entry into the enemy's trenches. He set a fine example of courage and determination.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. Although wounded, he ran along the enemy parapet and, single handed, engaged an enemy bombing post which was holding the party up. He has previously done fine work.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He himself killed several of the enemy and set a splendid example throughout the raid. On one occasion he picked up an enemy bomb which fell amongst some of his party and immediately threw it back at the enemy, where it exploded.

164208 Pte. G. G. Webster, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He seized a bomb, the fuse of which was burning, and threw it to a place of safety, thereby undoubtedly saving many lives and avoiding a serious explosion in the bomb store.
