PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS an Army Council has been constituted under His Majesty's Letters Patent, and it is expedient to make such provision as is hereinafter contained with respect thereto :

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :—

1. The Secretary of State is to be responsible to His Majesty and Parliament for all the business of the Army Council.

All business, other than business which the Secretary of State specially reserves to himself, is to be transacted in the following principal divisions :—

(a) The Chief of the Imperial General Staff shall, in addition to performing such other duties as may from time to time be assigned to him by the Secretary of State be responsible for issuing the orders of His Majesty's Government in regard to Military Operations.

(b) The Deputy Chief of the Imperial General Staff shall be responsible for the performance of such duties as the Chief of the Imperial General Staff may assign to him from time to time.

(c) The Adjutant-General, the Quartermaster-General, and the Master-General of

the Ordnance shall be responsible to the Secretary of State for the administration of so much of the business relating to the organisation, disposition, personnel, armament, and maintenance of the Army as shall be assigned to them, or each of them, from time to time by the Secretary of State.

(d) The Civil Member of the Army Council shall be responsible to the Secretary of State for the administration of business affecting the Territorial Force Associations, the Volunteer Force, and War Department lands, and for so much of the other business of the Army Council as may be assigned to him from time to time by the Secretary of State.

(e) The Finance Member of the Army Council shall be responsible to the Secretary of State for the finance of the Army, and for so much of the other business of the Army Council as may be assigned to him from time to time by the Secretary of State.

(f) The Director-General of Military Aeronautics shall be responsible to the Secretary of State for so much of the business relating to the administration of the Army Air Service as is not subject to the control of either the Air Board or the Military of Munitions, and as may be assigned to him from time to time by the Secretary of State.

(g) The Director-General of Movements and Railways shall be responsible to the Secretary of State for so much of the business relating to the transport by rail or inland water-ways at home or abroad of the

personnel and materiel of the Army as may be assigned to him from time to time by the Secretary of State.

(h) The Surveyor-General of Supply shall be responsible to the Secretary of State for so much of the business relating to the commercial administration of Army supplies as is not under the control of the Ministry of Munitions, and as may be assigned to him from time to time by the Secretary of State.

2. The Secretary of the War Office will act as Secretary of the Army Council, and will be charged with the interior economy of the War Office, and the preparation of all official communications of the Council, and with such other duties as the Secretary of State may from time to time assign to him.

3. During the period of the War the Military Members of the Army Council shall have precedence amongst themselves according to their Army seniority.

4. This Order in Council shall be substituted for the Orders in Council dated the 10th day of August 1904, the 22nd day of November 1909, the 14th day of October 1915, and the 27th day of January 1916.

WHEREAS by Section 2 of the Pharmacy Act, 1868, it is enacted that the several Articles named or described in the Schedule (A) to that Act shall be deemed Poisons within the meaning of that Act, and that the Council of the Pharmaceutical Society of Great Britain may, from time to time, by Resolution, declare that any Article in such Resolution named ought to be deemed a Poison within the meaning of that Act, and that thereupon the said Society shall submit the same for the approval of the Privy Council; and that if such approval shall be given, then such Resolution and approval shall be advertised in the London Gazette; and, on the expiration of one month from such advertisement, the Article named in such Resolution shall be deemed to be a Poison within the meaning of that Act:

And whereas by Section 1 of the Poisons and Pharmacy Act, 1908, it is enacted that Schedule (A) to the Pharmacy Act, 1868, be repealed, and the Schedule to the Poisons and Pharmacy Act, 1908, substituted therefor, and that the said last-named Schedule may be amended by adding thereto any Article in the manner provided by Section 2 of the Pharmacy Act, 1868:

And whereas the Council of the Pharmaceutical Society of Great Britain did, on the 4th day of April 1917, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them by Section 2 of the Pharmacy Act, 1868, as modified by Section 1

of the Poisons and Pharmacy Act, 1908, resolve and declare as follows:—

“That Lead in combination with oleic acid, or other higher fatty acids, whether sold as diachylon or under any other designation (except machine-spread plasters) ought to be deemed a Poison within the meaning of the Pharmacy Act, 1868, as amended by the Poisons and Pharmacy Act, 1908, and ought to be deemed a Poison in Part 1 of the Schedule of Poisons to that Act:”

And whereas the said Society have submitted their Resolution for the approval of the Privy Council, and the Lords of the Privy Council are of opinion that the said Resolution should be approved:

Now, therefore, their Lordships are hereby pleased to signify their approval of the said Resolution.

ISSUE OF TREASURY BILLS.

UNDER THE TREASURY BILLS ACT, 1877, THE NATIONAL DEBT ACT, 1889, AND THE WAR LOAN ACTS, 1914 TO 1916.

1. With reference to their notice dated the 23rd March 1917, the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that, as from the 28th instant, applications for limited amounts of Treasury Bills to be issued at fixed rates of discount will be received from Banks and Banking and Discount Houses only from time to time, until further notice, between the dates appointed for the receipt of Tenders.

5. The persons whose applications are accepted will be informed of the same, and payment in full of the amount due must be made to the Bank of England not later than Three o'clock (Saturdays One o'clock) on the next succeeding business day by means of cash or banker's draft on the Bank of England.

6. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any application.

ARMY COUNCIL ORDER.

HIDES, SKINS, AND LEATHER.

In pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by the Defence of the Realm Regulations, the Army Council hereby require all persons engaged at any time before or after the date hereof in the purchase, sale, distribution, storage, or shipment of hides or skins of any description or in the manufacture of leather from such hides or skins as aforesaid or of any articles wholly or partly manufactured therefrom, or in the purchase, sale, distribution, storage, or shipment of such leather or articles aforesaid, or of any articles or materials required for the purpose of such manufacture as aforesaid, to furnish to the Director of Army Contracts such particulars as to their business as may be required on his behalf.
