

\*Lt. John Newton Lamont, Midd'x R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rallied his own men and those of other units at a critical time, and by his personal example inspired them to hold on to the position. He remained in command directing operations until the line had been consolidated.

\*Capt. Arthur John Lunn, Punjabis, Ind. Army.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He assumed command of the third wave, and led it to the enemy's trench, and then returned under heavy fire to report the situation. Later, when communication failed, he again proceeded across the open to make a further report.

2nd Lt. Ronald MacDonald, R. Lanc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He collected a party and led them out to occupy an enemy mine crater. Later, he established and maintained his position under the most trying circumstances.

2nd Lt. William Alexander MacInnes, High. L.I., attd. Bord. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon in a most gallant manner, and inflicted many casualties on the enemy. Later, he reorganised his men and materially assisted in repulsing a hostile counter-attack.

2nd Lt. Sidney Charles Maxwell, York. & Lanc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He succeeded in bringing his Commanding Officer, who had been wounded, to a place of safety under very heavy fire. He set a splendid example of courage and determination.

\*Temp. 2nd Lt. Robert McDowell, N. Staff. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his company in the assault, and after all the remaining officers of the battalion had become casualties, he assumed command of the whole line. He reorganised his men and maintained his position, in spite of a strong enemy counter-attack.

2nd Lt. William Henry Purvis McKenzie, Yeo., attd. Light Car Patrols.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He commanded a light car patrol throughout the action with great courage and skill. He was responsible for the evacuation of a large number of wounded men.

Temp. 2nd Lt. William Francis Mead, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He registered his battery with conspicuous success, working continually for five hours under very heavy fire. He has previously done fine work.

Temp. Lt. Phillip Edmund Mitchell, King's Afr. Rif.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He gallantly led his half company in a charge, and captured an enemy machine gun, together with several prisoners.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) Charles Reginald Morris-Eyton, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He, with great coolness and personal courage, directed the arrangements for extricating guns and wagons which had become stuck in the mud, and eventually succeeded in getting his guns into position under very heavy hostile fire.

Temp. Lt. Charles Fletcher Musgrave, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in handling his battery under heavy hostile shell fire, and under very difficult circumstances. He set a fine example to all ranks.

Temp. Capt. William Cecil Neild, Essex R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led the right assaulting company in a most gallant manner, and succeeded in capturing his objective. Later, he skilfully organised the defence of the captured position.

Lt. Harry Thomas Onyett, B.S.A. Police.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. With a small party, he captured an enemy entrenched position held by 150 rifles and three machine guns.

2nd Lt. Kenneth Kemble Pelton, Leins. R., Spec. Res., attd. R. Ir. Rif.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He formed a defensive flank and brought two machine guns into action, thereby forcing a strong enemy raiding party to retire. He subsequently led a bombing party with great gallantry.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Charles Edward Murray Pickthorn, A.S.C., Spec. Res., and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in attacking hostile aircraft, and in carrying out difficult reconnaissances. On one occasion, although wounded, he continued his combat and brought down a hostile machine. On two other occasions he brought down hostile machines in flames.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) John Ronan, Leins. R., attd. Mach. Gun Serv.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He ran his car over obstacles into a village, in spite of his armour being pierced in many places, and all the crew, including himself, being wounded. He greatly assisted in the success of the operations.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Frederick Sherlock, Norf. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed marked courage and determination in carrying out the work of clearing a village. He set a fine example to his men throughout, and succeeded in capturing twenty-seven prisoners.

Temp. Lt. Thomas Slattery, King's Afr. Rif.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. By his own magnificent personal
