His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to award a Bar to the Distinguished Service Order to:—

Maj. (temp. Lt.-Col.) Austin Claude Girdwood, D.S.O., North'd Fus., attd. Bord. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when he made a daring and invaluable reconnaissance under heavy rifle and machine gun fire. He concentrated his battalion in daylight, and organised a most successful attack over 200 yards of open ground. (D.S.O. Gazetted 27th September, 1901.)

Maj. (temp. Lt.-Col.) Roland Haig, D.S.O., Rif. Bde., attd. R. Berks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of his battalion during an attack on the enemy's position. The success of this attack was due to the ability and energy with which he trained his battalion, made his preparations and handled the troops under his command during the battle

Maj. (temp. Lt.-Col.) John Hamilton Hall, D.S.O., Midd'x R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of his battalion. His initiative and good leading and the determined way in which he pressed the attack of his battalion home greatly contributed to the success of the operations. The high moral of his battalion and its fine spirit in attacking qualities are greatly due to his personal efforts

#### AUSTRALIAN IMPERIAL FORCE.

Lt.-Col. Charles Hazel Elliott, D.S.O., Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during an enemy attack. Although the enemy had penetrated our line and were within 500 yards of Battalion Headquarters, he took up a position with batmen, cooks and signallers and checked the enemy's advance, thus enabling the counter-attacking to come forward and drive the enemy back. His action at a most critical time turned what might have been a defeat into a victory.

Temp. Brig.-Gen. John Gellibrand, D.S.O.,

Infy. Brig.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. His Brigade reached its third objective, but was ordered back owing to the division on the right being held up at the first objective. His Brigade repelled several counter-attacks and held on when the Brigade on the right was in difficulties. It was largely owing to his influence and presence in this advanced position that the operations were successful.

Maj. Noel Medway Loutit, D.S.O., Infy.
For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to
duty in laying out the jumping off tape
under heavy shell and rifle fire. Later, he
took forward a machine gun and platoon, and
opened a surprise burst of fire into the
enemy, thus relieving the pressure at a
critical time. He did not leave the line until
the whole front was secure.

Lt.-Col Iven Giffard MacKay, D.S.O., Infy.
For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. While acting as Brigadier, when the Brigade on the right was broken into by the enemy, the battalion under his orders counter-attacked and assisted to drive out the enemy and restore the position. His action in repelling the counter-attack was of the utmost value, and his prompt action and extreme resolution showed leadership of a high order.

Capt. (temp. Maj.) Henry William Murray;

V.C., D.S.O., Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He gallantly led his company over 1,200 yards of fire-swept ground. Later, he went along the whole frontage, organising the defence, encouraging the men of all units by his cheerfulness and bravery, and always moving to the points of danger. He is not only brave and daring, but a skilful soldier, possessing tactical instinct of the highest order.

Col. (temp. Brig.-Gen.) Robert Smith,

D.S.O., Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and initiative. By his skilful dispositions he met and held a powerful enemy attack, and personally conducting operations under heavy rifle fire, he counter-attacked, retook the lost ground, and pushed the enemy back for two miles at the point of the bayonet.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the appointments of the undermentioned Officers to be Companions of the Distinguished Service Order in recognition of their gallantry and devotion to duty in the Field:—

Temp. 2nd Lt. Charles Frederick Nelson Ambrose, M.G. Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. After his tank had been badly

damaged by shell fire, and all his gunners had become casualties, he continued to keep a brisk fire on the enemy, who were surrounding his tank and attacking it with bombs. His conduct throughout the action displayed the greatest courage.

Capt. (actg. Maj.) John Redmond Barry, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He maintained his position at a very advanced observation post throughout the day, in order to cut wire preparatory to the infantry advancing. Later, he made a reconnaissance and handed in a report which was of the utmost value.

Temp. Capt. the Hon. Arthur Michael

Bertie, Rif. Brig.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of his company. When the attacking company was held up by intense machine gun fire and the situation was becoming critical, he, taking a machine gun with him, advanced to a position where he could engage the enemy machine gun. He subsequently went back alone under the most intense fire and brought up ammunition for his gun. He set a magnificent example to his men.

Capt. William Avery Bishop, Can. Cav., and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. While in a single-seater he attacked three hostile machines, two of which he brought down, although in the meantime he was himself attacked by four other hostile machines. His courage and determination have set a fine example to others.

Lt.-Col. Alfred Burt, D.G.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. His regiment was ordered forward when the situation was most obscure, and by his skilful leading he was able to seize an important position and thus prevent the enemy from counter-attacking. His personal bravery was a fine example to all.

Maj. Hugh Campbell, Lond. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. The ammunition lorries were being heavily shelled when he personally drove two of them which were in flames out of the danger zone. He then organised a party to get the fire under and remove ammunition from the vicinity of the flames. This task was carried out under continuous shell fire, and by his prompt action and gallantry undoubtedly saved many lives and averted a disaster.

\*2nd Lt. Robert Chichester Durnford, Hants. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although severely wounded he continued to struggle on, encouraging his men for over a mile, when he was again hit, but he would not allow his wounds to be dressed until the position gained had been consolidated.

Maj. Francis FitzGibbon, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He moved his battery up by daylight over exposed ground under shell fire, and -came into action with the most successful results.

Capt. (temp. Lt.-Col.) James Forbes-Robertson, M.C., Bord. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of his battalion during an enemy attack. He collected all the men he could find, and, taking up a position on the outskirts of the village, brought the hostile advance to an end by his fire. He undoubtedly saved a very critical situation by his promptness, bravery and example.

Temp. 2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Gilbert Ware M. Green, M.C., R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He has set a magnificent example by his gallant conduct in attacking the enemy's aeroplanes when in superior numbers. He brought down three enemy machines within twenty-four hours.

\*2nd Lt. Bassett Fardell Hornor, Norf. R.,

Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. was the first of his regiment to land on the left bank of the river, and displayed great courage and resource in promptly putting out of action single-handed an enemy machine gun which was about to open fire. Later, he gallantly led his company forward in the face of heavy fire and was responsible for the capture of three more machine guns.

Capt. (actg. Lt.-Col.) James Lochhead Jack, Sco. Rif., attd. W. York. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He conducted the attack of his battalion with marked skill and foresight and attained all his objectives in the minimum time and with very small loss. He has set a most inspiring example of gallantry to all.

Temp. Lt.-Col. Edward Marlborough Ley, K.R.R.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of his battalion. He handled his battalion with the greatest dash and judgment throughout and was largely responsible for the success of the operations. He showed great qualities as a leader.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) John Sherbrooke Coafe

Oates, M.C., Notts. & Derby. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed the greatest skill and gallantry while commanding the battalion at a critical period. During the day he re-peatedly crossed the open a distance of 500 yards under continual sniping in order to superintend operations, and by his courage and determination succeeded in obtaining complete ascendency over the enemy.

Maj. (actg. Lt.-Col.) Dulas Bentley Parry, Lond. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He inspired all ranks with the greatest confidence, and thus materially assisted the battalion under his command to carry through a most difficult operation. He displayed great skill and untiring energy in training the battalion beforehand.

\*Capt. Charles Robert Senhouse Pitman,

M.C., Ind. Army.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. In spite of the most difficult conditions he succeeded in landing and reorganising his party. He inflicted much damage on the enemy and brought back a trench mortar. It was owing to his coolness and good leading that the object of the raid was achieved and the whole party withdrawn with but few casualties.

Maj. (actg. L Priaulx, K.R.R.C. Lt.-Col.) George Kendall

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of his battalion. With the utmost confidence and determination he fought his battalion through the village, overcoming all obstacles and gaining his objectives. He set a magnificent example throughout.

Capt. (temp. Maj.) Walter Marlborough Pryor, Hert. R., attd. R. War. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He rendered most valuable service in collecting parties of men who were lost and putting them on to the work of consolidating the position gained. It was largely due to his efforts that a strong position was created, thereby facilitating the dispersing of enemy counter-attacks. This task was accomplished at great personal risk from enemy machine gun fire.

Lt. (actg. Capt.) George William Richmond,

R.E. Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and determination while forcing a passage of the river. His coolness and resource were mainly responsible for the successful launching of the pontoons which effected the crossing, and his attitude was an inspiring example to all under his command. He has previously done fine work.

Capt. Theodore Emmanuel Rodocanachi, M.C., Ox. & Bucks. L.I. (Lt., Hamp. R. Spec.  $\mathrm{Res.}).$ 

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to Although wounded he led his company with great gallantry and pressed on to his objective in the face of heavy fire. Although again wounded during the advance he continued to lead on into the hostile position, where he immediately organised the consolidation and continued to command his company until finally incapacitated by a third wound.

\*2nd Lt. Robert Tor Russell, I.A.R.O.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in charging the enemy's trench, which was strongly held. He then led a bombing attack and cleared 200 yards of the trench. Later, he maintained his position for four hours, when reinforcements arrived.

\*Capt. Claude Innes Shepherd, Ind. Army. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during an enemy counter-attack. rallied men who were without leaders, and by his personal example and leading saved a difficult situation. He was wounded in three places.

Capt. Ernest Stanley Stork, M.B., R.A.M.C., attd. Yeo.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed untiring energy and devotion to duty in evacuating a large number of wounded under heavy fire. He set a magnificent example of courage and determination.

\*Temp. 2nd Lt. Cyril George Toogood, Glouc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of the first batch of pontoons to cross the river. On landing he so disposed his men and cleared the banks of the enemy that he was able to establish a foothold. In spite of heavy casualties, he held on for over six hours, thereby enabling a bridge to be built.

Capt. (temp. Maj.) Alfred Charles Foster Turner, M.B., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He attended wounded under heavy fire day and night without rest. He was ever present along the line from the A.D.S. to the most advanced trenches, and on several occasions faced enemy artillery barrages in order that reserves of stretcherbearers might reach their objectives.

Temp. Capt. (actg. Maj.) William Lambert White, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of his battery. He reconnoitred by daylight in front of our infantry outposts, and established an O.P. in a shell-hole 200 yards in front of our outposts, whence he controlled the wire-cutting operations all day. In addition to cutting wire, his battery carried out important bombardment tasks.

Capt. William Ferguson Wood, M.B., R.A.M.C., Spec. Res., attd. Hrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Under most trying circumstances and heavy fire he collected and tended the wounded without rest or food. He frequently made dangerous tours looking for wounded men.

#### AUSTRALIAN IMPERIAL FORCE.

Capt. Robert Smith Somerville, M.C., Infy. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of his company. He showed great skill in the handling of a delicate situation, and his cheerful courage under most trying circumstances inspired his men to the magnificent efforts which they undoubtedly made. He was severely wounded.

Capt. Harrold Eustace Woodman, Infy.
For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to
duty. He prepared strong defences in carefully chosen positions, and not only he, but
all his officers and men, knew the ground
thoroughly as the result of well-organised

reconnaissances. At an early stage of the action he counter-attacked a large force of the enemy, and succeeded in holding up their advance until reinforcements arrived. Hewas largely responsible for saving a critical situation.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to award a Bar to the Military Cross to the undermentioned Officers:—

Lt. (temp. Capt.) John Percival Bate, M.C., Worc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of his company. He led his men in the most gallant manner, and was largely responsible for the success of the operations. He set a fine example of courage and determination.

(M.C. Gazetted 1st January, 1917.)

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Kenneth Edward: Brown, M.C., Oxf. & Bucks. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company in the most gallant manner, and personally made several attempts to cut the enemy's wire. He set a splendid example of courage and determination

(M.C. Gazetted 20th October, 1916.)

Temp. 2nd Lt. Charles Thornton Cleaver, M.C., Gen. List and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When flying at a low altitude, on reconnaissance patrol, he was wounded in the arm. He continued flying for some time, gaining most valuable information. On landing he insisted on being taken to Headquarters to impart the results of his reconnaissance

Temp. Capt. Frank Fisher, M.C., K.R.R.C.
For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. As Adjutant he ably carried out his duties under exceptionally arduous conditions. Later, he went forward and took command of two companies at a critical period and led them until he was wounded. He displayed great courage and leadership throughout.

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Temp. Capt. James Arthur Gravett, M.C., N. Lan. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed the utmost gallantry and determination when leading his company. By his behaviour and coolness he kept his men together, and rendered most valuable service at a critical time.

Lt. (actg. Capt.) Henry Wilfred Persse, M.C., R. Fus., Spec. Res. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to

duty. As second in command he had to take over the front after midnight, a very difficult task under heavy shell fire and the line un-After daylight he made a bold reconnaissance of the whole line. His fearless example and great skill were mainly instrumental in making good the defence of a critical part of the line.

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Charles Ridley Pawsey, M.C., Worc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. After establishing superiority of fire in a very difficult position, he gallantly led the final assault and personally captured two unwounded prisoners.

2nd Lt. Alfred Oliver Pollard, V.C., M.C.,  $\mathbf{H}.\mathbf{A}.\mathbf{C}.$ 

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He carried out a dangerous reconnaissance of the enemy's front line under very heavy fire, and obtained most valuable information. He set a splendid example of courage and determination.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) Victor Owen Robinson, M.C., Notts. & Derby. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. By his skilful dispositions and personal energy he enabled his company to reach their objective with small loss to themselves, at the same time causing heavy casualties to the enemy. His skill and experience were of the greatest assistance.

Capt. Geoffrey Keith Rose, M.C., Oxf. & Bucks: L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to When in command of a raid on the enemy's trenches, he displayed the greatest skill and energy. He organised an effective resistance to the enemy counter-attack, and conducted a masterly withdrawal under heavy machine gun and rifle fire.

Temp. Capt. Eric Lancelot Routh, M.C., R. War. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He showed the utmost gallantry and good leadership when commanding his company. Though wounded in three places, he refused to be attended to and ordered his men forward. This fine example inspired his company, who carried out its task with great credit.

Capt. James Alwin Colville Scott, M.C., M.B., R.A.M.C., attd. Durham L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He behaved with great courage and coolness in attending the wounded under heavy shell fire. For two days he worked continuously, with an utter disregard for his own safety. By his efforts he was able to ensure the rapid evacuation of the wounded, and undoubtedly saved many lives.

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Charles Parker Watson, M.C., Lond. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When in command of a raiding party he performed his duties with great energy and decision, and was largely responsible for the success of the raid.

Lt. Leslie Dadson, M.C., Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He took a small party forward and formed a protecting flank, personally directing their fire. Although hard pressed by weight of numbers, he stood his ground and succeeded in driving the enemy back. He showed a fine example of tenacity and pluck.

Capt. Albert Jacka, V.C., M.C., Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out a daring reconnaissance of the enemy's position and obtained most valuable information. Later, he rendered invaluable assistance in guiding troops to their assembly positions.

(M.C. Gazetted 14th November, 1916.)

Capt. Eric William Stutchbury, M.C., Infy. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He gallantly led his company forward in the face of very heavy fire, and succeeded in gaining his objective. Later, he superintended the consolidation of his battalion frontage until relieved.

Lt. Frank Wadge, M.C., Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out several daring reconnaissances of the enemy's position and obtained most valuable information. Later, during the attack he kept his Battalion Headquarters well informed as to the situa-

#### CANADIAN FORCE.

Lt. Ralph Willcock, M.C., Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. He led his men in the most gallant manner and carried out the task allotted to him with conspicuous success.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to confer the Military Cross on the undermentioned Officers and Warrant Officers in recognition of their gallantry and devotion to duty in the Field:

Temp. Lt. (now actg. Maj.) James Abbey,

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to

duty. He crossed a field under very heavy fire, attended to a man who had been wounded, and finally succeeded in carrying him to a place of safety.

2nd Lt. Matthew Adam, R. Sco. Fus., attd. R. War. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He laid a most important wire and maintained communications in spite of heavy machine-gun and rifle fire, thereby rendering a most valuable service.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Peter Adam, Rif. Bde.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. The vanguard being held up by snipers, he promptly rushed forward with a small party and succeeded in driving them out. His prompt action, which was at the same time most gallant, enabled the objective to be reached without further casualties.

Temp. 2nd Lt. James Frederick Addy, Shrops. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. In spite of being subjected to heavy fire, he succeeded in digging a trench across "No Man's Land" to connect up the captured enemy trenches to our own front line.

\*2nd Lt. Frank Addison Adlard, I.A.R.O.
For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to
duty. He towed several pontoons which had
drifted down stream back to the landing
place under very heavy fire. He was
severely wounded.

\*2nd Lt. James Dykes Aitkenhead, I.A.R.O.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He went forward with a party on to an open beach under heavy fire, and successfully distributed his men to their various boats. He was severely wounded.

2nd Lt. Thomas Telfer Archibald, Arg. & Suth'd Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He commanded the company after they had reached the final objective, and continued with great coolness and ability to direct the defence. The retention of this captured position, which was under continuous heavy shelling, greatly assisted in the success of the operation.

2nd Lt. Vernon Hay Armitage, Notts. & Derby. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled his platoon with the utmost coolness and courage under heavy fire. Although he was himself wounded he continued to direct operations, particularly in assisting to rescue some of his men who had become buried by hostile shelling. Throughout he set a fine example.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Clifford Elliston Ashby,

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company with the utmost gallantry and skill, and by his personal example of courage and coolness largely contributed to the success of the operation.

Temp. Capt. Vincent Edgar Badcock, M.D., R.A.M.C., attd. High. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He has behaved in a most gallant manner on several occasions in attending to wounded under intense shell fire, showing an utter disregard of personal danger, and setting a splendid example to all.

2nd Lt. Harry Lothain Baillieu, R.G.A., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He went forward to the front line under very heavy fire, and sent back most valuable information to his battery.

\*2nd Lt. William Sidney Baker, I.A.R.O.
For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He forced an enemy machine gun team to withdraw. He then collected a Lewis gun team and some bombers, built a block, and drove off two enemy counterattacks. He set a splendid example to his men.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Horace Munton Baker-Munton, R.F.A., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. While moving one of the guns, the carburetter of the lorry caught fire. The lorry was stopped and the fire got under. At the same time the enemy opened rapid shell fire on that part of the road. In spite-of this he refused to go on until the carburetter was sufficiently cool to ensure it not catching fire again. He finally succeeded in getting the gun and detachment into safety.

2nd Lt. Frank Oseland Baron, S. Lan. R., attd. Lond. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When in command of a patrol he penetrated the enemy front line and brought back valuable information, owing to which a serious obstacle to the advance was greatly diminished.

Temp. 2nd Lt. (actg. Capt.) Thomas William Baron, York. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion toduty. When in command of the support company, he engaged three strong points held by snipers in strength, and in the faceof heavy rifle and shell fire finally succeeded in capturing the posts. He set a fine example throughout a most difficult operation.

2nd Lt. (actg. Capt.) Wilfrid Morris: Barrett, Lond. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion toduty. Although wounded in the head, hecontinued to lead his company with the utmost gallantly until they reached their objective. He then organised the position and continued to superintend for some time.

Temp. Capt. James Harding Barry, R.A.M.C., attd. Lond. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion toduty. He showed the utmost coolness and bravery in going out under heavy machinegun fire and assisting to bring in and attend wounded men. Throughout he set a splendid example to all. Temp. Capt. Bertram Henry Barton, M.D., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He worked continuously under very heavy fire, and succeeded in bringing in many wounded men. His devotion to duty saved many lives.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Robert Appleby Bar-

tram, R. Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon with conspicuous ability during a raid, capturing several prisoners who were urgently required. He set a splendid example to his men.

2nd Lt. Reginald Andrew Bateman, Manch. R., attd. R. War. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Throughout the operations his bravery and inspiring leadership under heavy fire were largely responsible for the gaining of the position. He set a splendid example to all.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) John Bazley-White, W. York. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. While commanding a patrol, although detected and fired on, he pressed forward, and did not withdraw until he obtained the information he desired.

\*Temp. Lt. (temp. Capt.) Harry S. Beau-

mont, N. Lan. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When cut off from all help and attacked by overwhelming numbers, he held out for many hours, and eventually succeeded in joining up with another party.

Temp. Lt. Daniel Jamieson Bell, M.G.

Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He handled his machine guns with great skill, and was largely responsible for the success of the raid. He has at all times set a splendid example.

\*Temp. Lt. Donald John Bell, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. In spite of heavy casualties among his men, he succeeded in launching three pontoons. He set a magnificent example of courage and determination.

2nd Lt. Douglas John Bell, R.F.C., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a long distance bomb raid. Owing to his good leadership and skill a large ammunition dump was destroyed. Later, he single-handed carried out a difficult mission and succeeded in reaching his objective under extremely adverse weather conditions.

Capt. Sydney James Belsham, Midd'x R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his men with great gallantry to their final objective. He at once consolidated his position under heavy fire, and after establishing his line proceeded to Headquarters to report on the situation. He set a splendid example to all.

Temp. Capt. Oswald Stanhope Benbow-

Rowe, Shrops. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He took command of two companies, and gallantly led them to their objective. He set a splendid example of courage and initiative.

2nd Lt. Thomas Norman Benson, Glouc. R. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled his company with great skill and courage under most critical conditions. He withdrew his men in the face of heavy fire with slight casualties. By his personal bravery and determination he set a fine example to those under him.

Temp. Capt. Eric Biddle, R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He showed great gallantry in supervising the removal of wounded from a heavily shelled area. By his untiring energy and disregard of personal danger he saved many lives.

2nd Lt. Stanley Heathfield Blakey, Lond. R. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a flank guard. He led his men with great gallantry, and repulsed several enemy attacks. Later, although wounded, he maintained his ground and continued in command in spite of loss of blood until he was satisfied that all danger was past.

2nd Lt. John Bogle, Sco. Rif., attd. K.R.R.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. His swift decisive action and splendid control over his men saved many casualties in getting through the enemy's wire in front of the village. He set a fine example of courage and initiative.

Temp. 2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Beauchamp St. John Boultbee, Gen. List and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty while on contact patrol. He descended to a height of 400 feet and attacked a large party of the enemy. He subsequently effected a safe landing, in spite of very adverse weather conditions. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Lt. Martin Bowen, Oxf. & Bucks. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company in the most gallant manner, and in spite of very difficult conditions succeeded in gaining his objective. He set a fine example to his men.

2nd Lt. Charles Dennis Bowerman, R.F.A.
For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great skill and initiative in moving his section several times in quick succession to avoid hostile shelling. In one position, which was still being shelled by the enemy, he remained behind and attended a wounded man remaining with him until he was taken away.

2nd Lt. (actg. Lt.) Arthur Mervyn Bown, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. During hostile shelling the ammunition in the gunpit was set on fire. He went to the pit to extinguish the fire. While thus employed a large number of trench mortar bombs exploded a short distance away, wounding a man in the pit. He removed the man to a dug-out, and returning succeeded in extinguishing the fire, thus saving a large quantity of ammunition.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Frank William Bracecamp, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He reconnoitred a position upon which it was necessary to bring observed fire. He got within two hundred yards of the spot, and in spite of rifle fire and continuous sniping completed his observation.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Frank Brindley, Notts. & Derby. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He covered the retirement of the Battalion to a fresh position with a machinegun, and was the last man to leave the position. He set a fine example to his men.

2nd Lt. Francis Benjamin Brooke, Yeo.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He was sent up to the firing line to observe the situation, and when the Infantry advanced he went with it, and was able to send and bring back most valuable information, crossing time after time under heavy fire.

2nd Lt. George Brown, E. Kent R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. He led his men to the assault with great dash and succeeded in inflicting many casualties on the enemy.

2nd Lt. John Wilfred Brown, Linc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out several daring reconnaissances under heavy fire, and brought back most valuable information. His fine example added greatly to the spirit and initiative of the patrols working under him.

Lt. (actg. Capt.) George McIllree Stanton Bruce, Linc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When his company was strongly counter attacked he went from post to post under heavy fire encouraging his men. It was greatly owing to his fine leading and example that the enemy attack was beaten off.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Frederick Stawell Bryan, Midd'x R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He gallantly led his platoon forward in the face of the most intense hostile fire. He has at all times set a magnificent example to his men.

Temp. Capt. Joseph Michael Buckley, Rif. Bde.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led two companies in the most

gallant manner, and was largely responsible for the success of the operations. He gained his objective, capturing sixty prisoners and two machine-guns.

2nd Lt. Richard Edward Walter Burke, R. Ir. Regt., Spec. Res., attd. Conn. Rang.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on enemy trenches. Although wounded early in the proceedings he continued to lead his men until ordered to the rear. He has on all occasions set a fine example under fire.

2nd Lt. Frank Burn-Callander, R.F.A.,

Spec. Res

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When acting as Brigade F.O.O., the post was heavily shelled, but he succeeded in sending back timely and valuable information. During operations it was due to his great daring and knowledge of the situation that communications were maintained with the rear.

Capt. Richard Thompson Caesar, M.D., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. On taking over the line, the cellars of the village were full of wounded. He proceeded with bearers to search all the cellars and organised removal of patients. Although the shelling was heavy and practically continuous, he remained all day and succeeded in clearing the village of all wounded.

Temp. Lt. Peter Forbes Campbell, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He was commanding a party assisting to consolidate the captured position. He went forward to reconnoitre, but was wounded; he continued his reconnaissance and was again wounded. He was finally wounded a third time before being picked up thirty hours later. He succeeded in having his report sent in to his O.C. before being evacuated.

Temp. Capt. Frederick George Cangley,

D.S.O., L'pool R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He personally assisted in cutting enemy wire under close rifle and machine gun fire. The success of the attack was largely due to his determination and dash.

Capt. Ughtred Eliott Carnegy Carnegy, D.G.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He prepared the cavalry track through the trenches immediately after the advance of the infantry and under heavy fire. He also showed great gallantry in organising the evacuation of the wounded.

\*Temp. 2nd Lt. Joseph Carr Archer, R.E.
For conspicuous gallantry while ferrying troops across the river. He showed great coolness and resource in launching the first pontoon. He was largely responsible for the success of the operations.

Temp. Capt. John Donal Carroll, M.B., R.A.M.C., attd. R. War. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. An observation post had been hit, he immediately went to the spot and attended the wounded, although the enemy continued to concentrate heavy shell fire on the post.

Temp. Lt. (actg. Capt.) Thomas Cartman, Manch. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He showed great coolness and courage in organising the consolidation and defence of the position under very heavy fire. Although wounded, he continued to direct operations until compelled to retire.

2nd Lt. William Victor Cavill, W. York. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty, while in command of a small patrol. He remained in the enemy's front line for a considerable time, finally securing a prisoner and important information.

2nd Lt. Leonard Saunders Chamberlen, Rif. Bde., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed the utmost courage and determination under heavy fire. Although wounded and having frost bitten hands, he maintained and personally supervised communications throughout the operations.

2nd Lt. Morris Tonge Chambers, Linc. R.
For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led the second wave of his company with great dash and initiative. When held up by an enemy machine gun, he led his men through the wire and charged the gun. Capturing the gun, he turned it on the enemy, causing great execution. He set a fine example to his men.

Lt. James Cottingham Chaplin, Yeo.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When commanding the leading squadron of the brigade in the face of heavy shell fire, he continued his advance without hesitation, thereby securing most important positions.

Temp. Lt. James Douglas Chassereau, R.E. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He succeeded in cutting the enemy's wire, and although wounded, coolly guided the assaulting parties through gaps. Later, he assisted a wounded officer back to safety. He was himself again wounded.

2nd Lt. Donald Chippindale, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He did exceptionally good work as F.O.O. The trench in which he was posted was shelled continuously. In spite of this he maintained communications, and three times reported the enemy massing for an attack, thus enabling steps to be taken which brought the enemy attack to nothing.

Lt. (actg. Capt.) Frederick William Clifton, Linc. R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great initiative and courage when part of the attack was held up by uncut wire. Later, under heavy fire, he superintended the consolidating of the objective with utmost skill and gallantry. His example and leading were largely responsible for the success of the enterprise

Lt. John Coburn, R.G.A., attd R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He was in command of a survey post close to the front line, and, though subject to almost continuous shell fire for a fortnight and under most trying conditions of weather, he maintained communications throughout.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Percy Gerald Cocks, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He showed great courage and determination in laying out a line of assembly. Though wounded, he insisted in carrying on the work. This he succeeded in doing under heavy shell and machine gun fire.

2nd Lt. Edwin Stewart Travis Cole, R.F.C., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. On one occasion he, in a scout, attacked and brought down an enemy two-seater biplane. He has brought down two hostile balloons. He has at all times set a splendid example of courage and initiative.

\*Temp. 2nd Lt. John Henry William Collins, N. Lan. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When cut off from all help and attacked by overwhelming numbers, he held out for many hours, and eventually succeeded in joining up with another party.

Temp. Capt. James Alphonsus Conway, M.D., R.A.M.C., attd Ox. & Bucks. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He worked indefatigably under heavy fire, and by his personal attention saved the lives of a number of men. He set a fine example to all ranks.

Lt. Melville Charles Dymoke Cordeaux,  $\mathbf{R}.\mathbf{G}.\mathbf{A}.$ 

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed the greatest skill and courage when in command of his section in moving his position when they had become untenable. This was always carried out under heavy shell fire. He set a splendid example to those under him.

\*Temp. Capt. Charles Stephan Cowan, M.M.G. Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He caused his armoured car to be driven straight through the enemy trenches, and inflicted heavy loss on the enemy with his machine gun. He has previously done fine work.

Temp. Lt. Walter Nicholas Cowie, R.F.A.
For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to
duty. He went forward under very heavy
fire to ascertain the situation, and sent back
most valuable information. He was largely
responsible for the success of the operation.

Lt. (actg. Capt.) Cecil Herbert Vaughan Cox, Leic. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. He led his men in the most gallant manner, and was largely responsible for the success of the raid.

2nd Lt. George Cyril Addison Cox, Bord. R.
For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon against an enemy strong point in a most gallant manner. He himself, though severely wounded, succeeded in reaching a point close to the objective. He thoroughly reconnoitred the position under heavy machine gun fire, and brought back most valuable information.

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) John Henry Crosskey, R. War. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He was acting as second in command of the Battalion. By his skill and gallantry in directing the companies in the assault, and afterwards in consolidating the position gained, he made the attack a complete success

Temp. Lt. (actg. Capt.) Percy Crow, R.F.A. (Lt., Unattached List).

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He observed fire throughout the day in the most exposed position under heavy fire, and by his gallantry and resolution furnished most valuable reports.

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Philip Basil Cuddon, Hamp. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great ability in placing a part of the village in a good state of defence at a most critical stage. On a later date he led his company into action, captured a trench containing a large number of the enemy, and defended the right flank of the Division when the advance was held up.

2nd Lt. James Joseph Ignatius Cunningham, Lond. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. His company being held up by thick wire and fired on by an enemy machine gun, he led his platoon and broke through the wire into the enemy trench, where he attacked and dispersed the machine gun team. His prompt action saved many casualties.

\*Temp. Lt. A. Yeshwant Dabholkar, I.M.S. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although himself wounded, he displayed great courage and determination in tending wounded men under heavy fire. He set a splendid example to those around him.

\* Temp. Lt. Erach Ruttonji Daboo, I.M.S.
For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to
duty. He went forward at great personal

risk and dressed many wounded men under very heavy fire. He was himself wounded.

2nd Lt. Lance Ernest Cecil Dale-Lace, Dns. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When in command of a patrol sent to get in touch with the infantry in the front line he came under heavy shell and machinegun fire, but succeeded in sending back most valuable information to the artillery.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Harold Eborall Davis, Gen. List and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out a valuable reconnaissance of the enemy lines, flying for half are hour at a height of 500 feet. Although attacked by five hostile machines he succeeded in completing his task, effecting a safe landing. He was himself badly burnt, but rendered a valuable report.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Stephen Edwin Davis, R.E. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out a personal reconnaissance by daylight under considerable shell fire, and during the night succeeded in completing a strong point, all the time exposed to active sniping and machine gun fire.

Temp. Capt. Oswald John Day, M.B., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He worked continuously under very heavy fire, and was responsible for the evacuation of a large number of wounded.

2nd Lt. James Hamilton Dick, R. Scots-Fus., attd. R. War. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He took forward two platoons and dug four posts close to the enemy line under heavy fire. Later he attacked, and, capturing the position, proceeded to consolidate it. He effected a withdrawal under heavy machine gun and rifle fire with great ability and courage.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Henry Dinsmore, K.R.R.C. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He assumed command of his company at a critical time, and by his fine personal example enabled the objective to be captured.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt. and actg. Capt.) John William Nash Dorrington, K.R.R.C., Spec. Res

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company with great coolness and courage, and succeeded in establishing himself in the most important points of the village. Although twice wounded he remained at his post until the company was relieved.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Roger Downes, Lan. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon with great courage and coolness to the front line, under extremely heavy shell and machine gun fire. It was entirely due to his fine example that the operation was successfully carried through.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Herbert George Downing, Gen. List and R.F.C.

For consistent skill and gallantry as an observer. On one occasion when on patrol, by holding his fire until within very short range and by skilful co-operation with his pilot, he succeeded in shooting down two hostile machines.

Lt. Francis Collingwood Drake, Hrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised and defended a detached post with great resource and ability, despite heavy casualties. His cheerfulness and example under very heavy fire were most marked.

2nd Lt. Ralph Zouch Drake Brockman, R.F.A., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in charge of an ammunition party. In spite of heavy hostile fire he kept his men well in hand and succeeded in preventing the horses from stampeding.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) Sidney Herbert Wells Eames, Lond.  $\mathbf{R}$ .

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He showed great ability while commanding a trench mortar battery, succeeding in placing a barrage on the enemy front line, under cover of which the infantry successfully advanced and raided the position.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Henry Ernest Karslake Eccles, Gen. List and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He has shown great skill and gallantry in carrying out night raids on the enemy lines. He has also caused material damage to enemy railways while flying at a low altitude.

Lt. William Humble Eric Ward, Viscount Ednam, Hrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He assumed the duties of Adjutant, and carried messages under very heavy fire. His resource and calmness were most marked, and his assistance to his C.O. was invaluable.

Lt. (actg. Capt.) Thomas Buchanan Maclean Egleston, A.S.C., Spec. Res., and M.G. Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rendered invaluable assistance, under heavy fire of every kind, in going to the assistance of several tanks and repairing them, and also attended several wounded men to safety. He exposed himself continuously for several hours.

Lt. (actg. Capt., now actg. Maj.) William Eills, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. During a heavy bombardment he went across the open to the signal pit and assisted several wounded men. He exposed himself fearlessly during the whole bombardment.

Capt. Walter Elliot Elliot, M.B., R.A.M.C., Spec. Res., attd Dns.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He worked continuously throughout

the night tending the wounded under heavy fire. His devotion to duty saved many lives.

\*Capt. Dudley MacNeil Evans, Ind. Army.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although wounded early in the action, he continued to command the firing line for five hours under heavy fire. He has previously done fine work.

\*Temp. 2nd Lt. Henry Richard Evans, R. Lan. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He superintended the launching of pontoons under very heavy fire. It was chiefly due to his coolness and resource that a difficult task was accomplished.

Capt. Henry William Evans, M.B., R.A.M.C., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He showed the utmost bravery and zeal when commanding a stretcherbearer division. He directed the bearers and tended the wounded in the open. By his exertions he secured the efficient clearing of the wounded over very long distances.

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Frederick Luther Fane, W. York R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty while commanding a patrol. Having obtained valuable information, he withdrew his men from a difficult position under heavy machine gun fire. He displayed the greatest coolness and determination.

\*Temp. 2nd Lt. Alwyne Malcolm Fawcett, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He established and maintained communication throughout the day under very heavy fire, thereby enabling effective artillery support to be rendered.

2nd Lt. John Ernest Ferrario, King Edward's Horse.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty, while on reconnaissance. He displayed great coolness and skill in withdrawing his patrol under heavy fire, covering the retirement himself. His personal example was splendid.

Temp. Lt. (actg. Capt.) John Findlay, Cam. Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rendered very gallant and able assistance to the assaulting battalion during a very critical period and materially assisted in clearing up a difficult situation.

2nd Lt. Stanley William Fischel, R.G.A., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Assisted by a serjeant, he removed several wounded men from a burning gun pit and extinguished the fire. He set a splendid example by his coolness and complete disregard of personal danger. 1176

Capt. Alfred George Timbrell Fisher, M.B., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. The advanced dressing station of which he was in command was destroyed by shell fire, and although himself severely shaken, he succeeded in forming a fresh dressing station.

Temp. Capt. Frederick George Flood, M.B.,

R.A.M.C., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination in tending the wounded under very heavy fire. His disregard of personal danger inspired all ranks. He has previously done fine work.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Thomas Ronald Fortescue, Oxf. and Bucks. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He re-organised his company under very heavy fire, and, in spite of strong opposition, continued his advance. He set a splendid example of courage and initiative.

Temp. Lt. Edward Roland Foster, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination in superintending the digging of assembly trenches under very heavy fire.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) William Foster, Notts. & Derby. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great coolness and determination when commanding a night patrol. They penetrated some distance into the enemy lines, and, although attacked, succeeded in routing the enemy party and returning to their lines with much valuable information.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Herbert Henry Charles Fowler, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in charge of a working party. In spite of very heavy hostile fire, he kept his men well in hand, and succeeded in completing his task.

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Arthur John Field, R. War. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised a most successful attack and led his platoon against an enemy strong point, capturing the position. Though wounded in the head, he remained in the field directing operations, thereby setting a fine example of courage and devotion to duty.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Edward William French, A.C.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When in command of the company he was forced to reorganise the whole line owing to a withdrawal on his flank. This he effected with great skill under most trying circumstances, improving his position, and getting in touch with both his flanks.

2nd Lt. Edward Henry Garner, Lan. Fus., attd. R. War. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He assumed command of his company, and displayed great bravery in the face of heavy fire, and succeeded in reaching his objective.

2nd Lt. Albert Edward Gearey, Notts. & Derby. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He showed great skill and courage when leading his platoon during house-to-house fighting. He drove the enemy from various positions, and later repelled a counter-attack with complete success.

2nd Lt. Jack Ross Gifford, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when acting as Forward Observing Officer. He went forward under very heavy fire, and sent back most valuable information to his battery.

\*2nd Lt. Stephen Deiniol Gladstone, I.A.R.O.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his men in the most gallant manner, and maintained his position for four hours. He undoubtedly saved a critical situation.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Maurice Gliddon, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty while in command of a daylight raid. He led his men with great skill and gallantry, and was able to bring back valuable information.

Capt. Robert Cecil Gordon Canning, Hrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled his squadron and put his position in a state of defence under very heavy fire. He also took his squadron to reconnoitre the enemy position with great ability and courage. He set a splendid example to his men.

\*2nd Lt. James Wensley Gray, I.A.R.O.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although wounded in both thighs and the head, he continued to lead his company during the advance along the railway line under an intense and well-directed fire from the enemy's guns.

2nd Lt. Robert William Griffin, R. War. R. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. During operations his platoon became isolated, and came under heavy fire from a machine gun. He organised a party of bombers, and forced the enemy to withdraw the gun, thus enabling the attack to continue with success.

2nd Lt. Robert Harry Groves, Lond. R.
For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to
duty. When digging in, his company came

under heavy machine gun fire. He assumed command of his company, and by his gallantry and example, constantly exposing himself, succeeded in getting the men dug in

Temp. 2nd Lt. Percy Norman Grubb, Glouc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When commanding his platoon he made a successful attack under heavy fire and very adverse weather conditions. His skill and gallantry largely contributed to the success of the operation.

Temp. Lt. (actg. Capt.) Stanley Ronald Kershaw Gurner, A.C.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company with great skill and determination in the face of heavy shell fire. By his total disregard to danger he set a splendid example to his men.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He was largely responsible for repelling a strong enemy counter-attack, and although wounded continued to lead his men in the most gallant manner.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Clarence Peter Halliday, York, L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon with great skill in the face of heavy fire, and placed his machine guns to such advantage that he was able to materially check the enemy counterattack, thereby rendering valuable assistance at a critical period.

Temp. Capt. Cecil Francis Tyssen Haigh, A.O.D.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He collected a party of men and personally assisted in extinguishing a fire which broke out in an ammunition dump. His gallant action undoubtedly avoided a serious catastrophe.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to
duty. He rallied the men of several units

under very heavy fire, and materially assisted in repelling an enemy counter-attack. He set a fine example to all ranks.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When in command of two guns he showed great courage and determination in getting his guns into position under heavy fire. Although wounded, he continued to command his guns with great coolness and ability.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during the consolidation of a newly-captured position. He organised working parties sent forward to support operations, and carried out his difficult task with complete success.

2nd Lt. Lewis Aloysius Macdonald Hastings, R.F.A., Spec Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He established and maintained communication under the most intense hostile fire. He set a splendid example of courage and determination.

Lt. (actg. Capt.) Charles Cedric Walter Havell, Suff. R., attd. T.M. By.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled his trench mortar guns with the greatest skill throughout the operations. It was mainly due to him that the guns remained in action and were so effective in carrying out their task.

Capt. Richard Frederick Hayward, Lond.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rendered most valuable service and displayed the utmost skill and determination when commanding a machine-gun company. His personal disregard of danger was a fine example to all.

Temp. 2nd Lt. (actg. Lt.) Arthur Heads, R.F.A., attd. T.M. By.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of his battery. He handled his guns with great skill, and was largely responsible for the success of the operations.

2nd Lt. John Galloway Heard, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in charge of a working party. In spite of very heavy hostile fire he kept his party well in hand and succeeded in completing his task.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Archibald Cecil Heaven, Gen. List and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when acting as an observer. On one occasion, when his pilot was wounded, he steered the machine back, and, landing in front of our front lines, he assisted his pilot into a shell hole, and eventually into our own trenches, under continuous rifle fire.

Capt. Arthur Stuart Hebblethwaite, M.B., R.A.M.C., attd. Lond. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised and trained a detachment of stretcher bearers and supervised their operation under heavy fire. All casualties were cleared within a short time of the completion of the operations. This was due to the excellent training and example set by this officer.

Lt. John Guy Henderson, R.G.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He has done consistert good work over a long period. He has at all times set a splendid example under heavy shelling, and his work has been of the greatest value to the men of his battery.

Lt. Cyril De Villiers Hinde, R. Berks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led out a patrol and inflicted heavy casualties on the enemy. Later, although wounded, he remained in command and successfully withdrew his men.

Temp. 2nd Lt. William Maurice Holden, Lan. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. He led his men in the most gallant manner, and himself shot two of the enemy with his revolver. Later, he succeeded in capturing 50 prisoners.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He showed great courage and determination while acting as F.O.O. During operations he was in constant touch with the infantry, and gained, by reconnaissance, information which was of the utmost value in enabling the situation to be dealt with.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great gallantry and initiative when the enemy evacuated their position. He pushed out patrols and advanced his company, and established a commanding position. His prompt action undoubtedly prevented the enemy from putting up a strong resistance.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of his company. He

led his men in the most gallant manner, and carried out the task allotted to him with conspicuous success.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He laid a telephone line across 500 yards of open country under very heavy fire. He sent back most valuable information throughout the operations. He has previously done fine work.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He behaved in a most gallant manner when one of our aeroplanes fell in front of our lines. He went out to the assistance of the wounded observer, and under heavy rifle fire succeeded in bringing him into our own lines.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Claud Mitchell Hughes-Games, Glouc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great coolness and initiative when in command of a daylight patrol, obtaining valuable information. He has at all times displayed great gallantry under fire.

Temp. Lt. Noel Forbes Humphrey, M.G.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. His tank becoming stranded, he commenced to dig it out, and though wounded, he completed his task and continued in action the whole day, finally bringing his tank out of action to the rallying point.

2nd Lt. Henry Armroid Hyde, R.F.A.. Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination in maintaining communication and sending back most valuable information, although his wire was repeatedly cut.

2nd Lt. (actg. Capt.) Arthur Ideson, R.H.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed the utmost courage and bravery when three men were buried in the gun line by a shell. Despite a very heavy and accurate hostile bombardment, he worked for an hour in order to extricate the buried men.

2nd Lt. Ronald Eustace Jardine, S. Lan. R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He established and maintained communication under very heavy fire. He set a magnificent example to his men.

2nd Lt. (actg. Capt.) Charles William Jones,

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. On a dump of cartridges being set on fire by hostile shelling, he immediately went and removed the unfired boxes. His brave action and example under shell fire saved many casualties and much material.

2nd Lt. Charles William Jones, York. R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He went out in broad daylight and carried out a lengthy reconnaissance, furnishing a valuable report. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

2nd Lt. Harold Jones, Ox. & Bucks. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great coolness and judgment when commanding the flank guard of the company, which was raiding the enemy lines. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. With both flanks in the air, he maintained his position all day against several enemy counter-attacks. He showed great bravery under very trying circumstances.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He tended the wounded under very heavy machine gun shell fire, to which he was continuously exposed. It was owing to his bravery and untiring devotion that many lives were saved.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. He led his men in the most gallant manner, and carried out the task allotted to him with conspicuous success.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. After he and several of his crew had been wounded, he returned to the starting-point and took a fresh crew on board. He remained in action until unable to carry on owing to casualties, and brought his Tank back and all his crew.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. While commanding his battery, he displayed the utmost gallantry and coolness in removing shells from a dump which had caught fire. He organised and superintended the rescue of buried men, and by his courage and determination under heavy shell fire greatly diminished the loss in personnel and material.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Frederick George Lancaster. W. Yorks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He was in command of a patrol which the enemy threatened to completely surround. He, although wounded, so engaged the enemy as to inflict severe casualties, covering the withdrawal of his party with a machine gun in the face of heavy odds.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. His energy and utter disregard of personal safety were a splendid example to all ranks. He was largely responsible for the success of the operations.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He commanded a patrol of bombers on reconnaissance which came under heavy fire. In spite of several casualties, he completed his task, and brought back most valuable information. The success of the enterprise was entirely due to his own personal courage and determination.

2nd Lt. John Harold Ernest Joseph Leahy, R.F.A., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. In spite of very heavy hostile fire and the most difficult conditions, he succeeded in establishing and maintaining communication throughout the operations.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Charles Milward Le Clair, E. Surr. R., attd. M.G. Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although his Tank was subjected to very heavy shell fire and most of his crew wounded, he continued to fight his Tank and assisted to clear the village until his Tank was disabled.

Temp. 2nd Lt. John Wannen Tait Leith. Gord. Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company in the most gallant manner, and was largely responsible for the success of the operations. He set a splendid example to his men.

Temp. 2nd Lt. James Albert Lewis, Gen. List. attd R. Ir. Regt.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's lines. He walked up and down the enemy trench under heavy fire encouraging his men, and arranged the successful evacuation of the

wounded.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination when leading a night attack on the enemy lines. Under heavy shell fire he rushed an enemy machine-gun, which was captured mainly as a result of his own personal efforts. He then organised the consolidation of the position with the utmost energy and initiative.

\* 2nd Lt. Robert Stuart Lloyd. Norf. R., Spec.  $\mathbf{R}$ .

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Under heavy fire he organised, controlled and generally superintended every boat load leaving the right bank of the river. Later he stormed and captured a fort under very heavy fire. Temp. Capt. Louis Hudson Lockett, Midd'x

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination in driving off a strong enemy counter-attack against both his flanks. He set a splendid example to his men.

2nd Lt. Alan Parker Lockwood, Notts. &

Derby. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company with great gallantry and coolness. During the bombardment of the captured position he showed a fine example to all ranks of endurance and devotion to duty.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when acting as Forward Observing Officer. He went forward under very heavy fire and succeeded in obtaining most valuable information.

\* Temp. Capt. John Low, M.B., R.A.M.C. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He brought forward his Bearer Sub-Division and established a dressing station under heavy fire, thereby relieving the regimental aid posts. He worked continuously for thirty-six hours.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to When commanding a S.A.A. column one of his dumps was blown up by enemy shell fire. Under heavy shell and machine-gun fire he succeeded in getting the other dump forward to its position, making twelve consecutive journeys through the barrage.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to Although wounded early in the operations, he continued to lead the second wave of the assaulting troops, and showed great courage and coolness in directing his command until he was again wounded. has previously done fine work.

Lt. (actg. Capt.) (now actg. Maj.) John Forbes Macdonell, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. After withdrawing his men to a flank he remained behind and extinguished a fire which had broken out in an ammunition dump.

2nd Lt. John McPhail Macdonald, Sco. Rif., attd. K.R.R.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company with great ability and judgment at a critical period, materially assisting in carrying through to the final objective. Later he assumed command of the two companies, and superintended the consolidation of the position.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to Although wounded early in the action, he continued to lead his company with great courage and determination. He was largely responsible for the success of the operations.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He repaired a line under very heavy fire. Later, he assisted a wounded officer back to safety. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

\*Lt. Kenneth Eustace Lee Pennell, R.E., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry. He showed great courage and determination under heavy fire as Officer in charge of the six pontoons which crossed the river in high flood at night. He was largely responsible for the success of the operations.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. A magazine containing cartridges and fuses was set on fire, and the enemy proceeded to shell the spot. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He got his battery into action in spite of the most difficult conditions, and rendered invaluable assistance to the infantry at a critical time.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and ability when his platoon became cut off, himself killing several of the enemy and extricating his men with great coolness. He has at all times led his men with great courage and determination.

Temp. Lt. Harold Rees Smith, M.G. Corps. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He commanded his Tank in a most successful manner. He destroyed a machine gun emplacement and several snipers' posts, and later, materially assisted in stemming the enemy advances.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion toduty. He displayed marked coolness and, foresight in handling several difficult situations. His fine leadership saved many casualties.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination in tending the wounded under heavy fire. His devotion to duty saved many lives.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He remained in the open cutting the enemy's wire in spite of being subjected to the most intense fire. He was severely wounded.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He personally stopped two counter-attacks on his front with a mere handful of men. He himself firing the machine gun with great accuracy and determination. Although his right flank was cut off, he remained for 48 hours until relieved.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He maintained control of his guns throughout the whole operations in a very effective manner. He inflicted severe losses on the enemy, and his coolness and determination was a splendid example to all.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He fought his battery with great skill throughout the operations, and was largely responsible for the successful cutting of the enemy's wire.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He was superintending the unloading of stores at a very forward dump. The carrying parties of infantry were removed owing to a threatened enemy attack. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his men with great gallantry and captured an enemy machine gun. He himself shot two of the enemy and captured two prisoners.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed the utmost courage and devotion in tending the wounded under heavy fire, assisting them to places of safety until they could be evacuated. He showed the greatest gallantry throughout.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He, single-handed, brought back a pontoon under very heavy fire. He was wounded.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He, single-handed, attacked an enemy machine gun, which he captured. He carried the gun and belt of ammunition to a position in advance of our own line amidst heavy shelling and sniping, and opened fire on the enemy.
