

2nd Lt. (actg. Capt.) Ronald Sutherland Brook Sinclair, Glouc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great coolness and initiative in organising a party which captured an enemy machine gun. Later, he superintended the digging of an advanced position under heavy fire.

Temp. Lt. (actg. Capt.) Harold Arthur Slade, Rif. Bde.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of his company. He handled his men with marked skill, and was of the greatest assistance to the left half of the battalion. He set a splendid example throughout the operations.

Capt. Thomas Slingsby, Lan. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He held an advanced trench for two days and two nights. During this trying period under heavy fire, and although short of food, he set the highest example of courage and tenacity to his men.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Arthur Wilfrid Lucius Smith, W. York R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. While in command of a patrol, he, with one man, attacked and dispersed a party of the enemy with bombs, thus saving his patrol from a difficult situation.

Lt. Edward Glanville Smith, Lond. R., and M.G. Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. His Tank was set on fire by hostile shell fire, and under heavy fire of all kinds. He got his crew out to shell holes, and went back and extinguished the fire, collected his crew and returned to his rallying point.

2nd Lt. George Ernest Smith, R.G.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He got his battery into action in spite of the most difficult conditions, and rendered invaluable assistance to the infantry at a critical time.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Herbert Smith, York. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and ability when his platoon became cut off, himself killing several of the enemy and extricating his men with great coolness. He has at all times led his men with great courage and determination.

Temp. Lt. Harold Rees Smith, M.G. Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He commanded his Tank in a most successful manner. He destroyed a machine gun emplacement and several snipers' posts, and later, materially assisted in stemming the enemy advances.

2nd Lt. Leslie Coleman Smith, S. Staffs. R., Spec. Res., attd. Linc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon with great skill

and gallantry under heavy fire. It was due to his initiative and courage that that part of the village was taken with such small loss to us.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Louis Victor Smith, M.G. Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When in command of a Tank he rendered most valuable service by putting several enemy machine guns out of action. Later, he gave great assistance to the infantry by driving the enemy out of their houses and doing great execution with his machine guns.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) Ralph Colley Smith, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great skill and energy in getting his guns into action under heavy fire. It was a very difficult task, and it was only due to his gallant conduct and example that the battery got into action.

Temp. Lt. (actg. Capt.) Owen Brice Smyth, K.R.R.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company in the most gallant manner, and was largely responsible for the success of the operations. He has at all times set a splendid example of courage and determination.

2nd Lt. George Henry Southall, Rif. Bde., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a patrol forward and succeeded in establishing an advanced post. During the next twenty-four hours he was indefatigable in organising the right flank of the battalion. He was subsequently wounded.

2nd Lt. James St. George Sproule, R.F.A., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He repeatedly repaired telephone wires under very heavy fire, thus enabling communication to be maintained. He has previously done fine work.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Richard Henry Stallard, Worc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He occupied a difficult position under very heavy fire and established several strong points. His fine leadership largely contributed to the success of the operation.

Temp. Capt. Humphrey Meigh Stephenson, R.A.M.C., attd. Rif. Bde.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He tended the wounded under heavy fire, and showed a complete disregard for his personal safety. He set a magnificent example throughout.

2nd Lt. Charles Harold Isidore Stewart, London R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon to their objective with great gallantry and dash, and by his coolness and grasp of the situation contributed largely to the successful outcome of the operation.
