For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He got on to the parapet and enabled a Lewis gun to be placed on his back in order to give the required elevation to clear the enemy trench.

394 Pte. E. T. Colbert, M.G. Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When ordered to fire on the enemy he placed his gun in the open and dispersed the enemy with losses. He continued to work his in spite of machine gun and rifle fire, thus greatly checking the enemy advance.

1437 Pte. L. M. Courtney, Infy

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised a party of men and gallantly led them forward, inflicting many casualties on the enemy. He set a fine example to all ranks.

2631 L./Cpl. (now 2nd Lt.) D. B. Crisp, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his men in the most gallant manner, and inflicted heavy casualties on the enemy. Later he carried an important message a distance of 1,000 yards over the open under very heavy fire.

78 Sjt. R. Cumming, M.G. Coy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled his machine guns with the greatest skill, and materially assisted in repelling an enemy attack.

2451 Cpl. L. A. Ewart, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He personally shot two of the enemy and captured the machine gun they were firing. He set a fine example to all ranks.

308 L./Cpl. J. Fletcher, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rendered valuable service in pushing forward with a party of men, establishing a position, and getting into communication with the rear. He held this position under heavy fire until relieved.

1915 Sjt. C. C. Garratt, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised a bombing party, and succeeded in repulsing an enemy counterattack. By his cheerfulness, bravery, and coolness, he set a splendid example to all ranks.

2131 Sjt. T. R. Gilday, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He took command of his platoon and inspired his men by his fine personal example. He personally covered the withdrawal.

627 Sjt. I. G. Grinlington, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon with great dash, dislodged the enemy from a strong point. and captured a machine gun.

1406 Sjt. S. Hillman, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion toduty. He displayed great courage and determination in maintaining his position against very superior numbers of the enemy. He was wounded.

2620 Pte. A. J. Hubble, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion toduty. He handled his machine gun section with great skill, and although surrounded by the enemy succeeded in effecting his withdrawal. He was wounded.

3126A Sjt. G. S. Hughes, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion toduty. Although wounded, he took command of his platoon and handled it with marked skill. He set a fine example to his men. He was again wounded.

1849 L./Cpl. B. M. Johnson, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although under heavy fire from close range, he several times cut paths through the enemy's wire. He set a fine example of courage and determination.

5700 L./Cpl. A. W. P. Jones, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He directed his machine gun team through the enemy's wire under very heavy fire. He rendered invaluable service throughout the operations.

187 L./Cpl. T. M. Keith, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled his machine gun with great skill, and inflicted many casualties on the enemy. Later, although wounded, he continued to fire his gun.

2240 Pte. W. H. Lang, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He dashed forward alone and destroyed an enemy machine gun which was holding up the advance.

2631 Sit. G. C. Lukin, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon with great dash and gallantry, and later, though wounded himself, remained and continued to direct until the objective was obtained. He set a fine example throughout.

1028 L./Cpl. A. E. Mackay, L.H. Regt.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He located an enemy snipers' position in a very daring manner, and on his own initiative proceeded to crawl along the side of a bank for 150 yards, shooting one and making the other a prisoner. This action was performed under heavy fire.

2778 Cpl. A. McMillan, Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He maintained his post for thirty-six hours against repeated enemy attacks. He set a splendid example of courage and determination.
