WHEREAS His Majesty has been pleased, in exercise of the power in that behalf conferred on Him by Section one, sub-section one, of the Trading with the Enemy (Extension of Powers) Act, 1915, by divers Proclamations, and in particular by a Proclamation dated the 23rd day of May 1916, entitled “The Trading with the Enemy (Statutory List) Proclamation, 1916, No. 3,” to prohibit all persons or bodies of persons, incorporated or unincorporated, resident, carrying on business, or being in the United Kingdom from trading with any of the persons or bodies of persons mentioned in the List contained in the last mentioned Proclamation, such List being therein referred to as the Statutory List :

And whereas by Section one, sub-section two, of the said Act, it is provided that any List of persons and bodies of persons, incorporated or unincorporated, with whom such trading is prohibited by a Proclamation under the said Act may be varied or added to by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of a Secretary of State :

And whereas the Statutory List contained in the last mentioned Proclamation has been varied and added to by subsequent Orders of Council :

And whereas there was this day read at the Board a recommendation from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs to the following effect :—

That the Statutory List should be further

varied and added to as set forth in the Schedule hereto.

Now, therefore, Their Lordships, having taken the said recommendation into consideration, are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Statutory List be varied and added to as set forth in the Schedule hereto.

Whereof the Right Honourable Arthur James Balfour, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Controller of the Foreign Trade Department, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

NOTE (1).—All persons or firms resident,
 carrying on business, or being in the United
 Kingdom are prohibited from having with any
 person or firm mentioned in this List, or in any
 List issued under the Trading with the Enemy
 (Statutory List) Proclamation, 1916, No. 3,
 any dealings other than such as are expressly
 authorised by Paragraph 5 of the Proclamation.
 A List, consolidating all previous Lists, was
 published on the 22nd June 1917 (The Con-
 solidating List No. 29a), which, together with
 List No. 30 of the 6th July 1917, and the List
 herewith annexed, contains all the names which
 up to this date are included in the Statutory List.

Additions to and variations in these Lists
 will be published at intervals approximately of
 two weeks.

The Lists are published in the London Gazette
 and reproduced in the Board of Trade Journal,
 and separate copies of all Lists may be obtained at
 a small cost from the Superintendent of Publica-
 tions, His Majesty's Stationery Office, Imperial
 House, Kingsway, W.C.

† NOTE (2).—Where a person or firm men-
 tioned in the List has more than one address
 in the country or group of countries under which
 the name of the person or firm appears, all dealings
 in that country, or in any country in the group,
 with such person or firm are prohibited, even
 in cases where one only of the addresses or
 one only of the countries is specifically mentioned.

NOTE (3).—Trading is prohibited under the
 Trading with the Enemy Proclamations of 25
 June and 10 November 1915, with any person
 or firm of enemy nationality resident or carrying
 on business in China, Siam, Persia, Morocco,
 Liberia or Portuguese East Africa. Persons or
 firms in the United Kingdom are therefore
 prohibited from trading with any person or firm
 of enemy nationality in any of those countries,
 even though such person or firm is not mentioned
 by name in the Statutory List.

NOTE (4).—In order to minimise as far as
 possible any inconvenience which may be caused
 to British traders by the dislocation of export

trade owing to the inclusion in the Statutory List of a former connection, the Foreign Trade Department is collecting and classifying the names of non-enemy firms who may be able to act as substitutes for firms mentioned in the Statutory List. A considerable amount of information is already available at the Foreign Trade Department, and it is in many cases possible to suggest the names of satisfactory substitutes without the necessity of referring the matter abroad. The Department is, however, prepared on application to inquire of His Majesty's Representatives abroad for the names of suitable substitutes. When the applicant wishes this done by telegraph he is required to undertake to pay the cost of telegraphic correspondence. It would greatly facilitate the work of the Foreign Trade Department if applicants in making inquiries would specify the particular trade or trades for which substitutes are required.

NOTE (5).—The Statutory List for each country is telegraphed, on the day of issue, to His Majesty's Representative in that country, who is instructed to notify accordingly British Consular Officers, to whom persons abroad should apply for information as to names on the List. Persons and firms in the United Kingdom with agencies or branches abroad would, however, be well advised to furnish such agencies or branches with issues of the List as they appear. The Lists for all countries in Central or South America are also telegraphed to His Majesty's Ambassador at Washington, who transmits them to H.M. Consul-General at New York and to other centres in the United States likely to be interested.

§ NOTE (6).—It is not unusual for firms in Holland and the Netherland East Indies to be registered under names commencing with descriptive terms such as "Handel Maatschappij" (Trading Company) or "Naamlooze Venootschap" (Limited Liability Company). In such cases it has been found more convenient to publish the firm under its proper name, followed by the general descriptive term "Handel Maatschappij" or "Naamlooze Venootschap" (N.V.), as in the case of an English company. For instance, Handel Maatschappij van den Berg & Company and Naamlooze Venootschap de Komeet v/h Dumonceau Frères will be found under "Berg" and "Komeet" respectively, and not under "Handel" or "Naamlooze."

In recognition of his services in the East Indies and Egypt Seaplane Squadron during the period 1st April 1916–31st March 1917. During this time he took part in several valuable reconnaissances and bombing flights, obtaining important information, and doing considerable damage to enemy organisations.

Flt. Cdr. Thomas Francis Netterville Gerrard, R.N.A.S.

In recognition of his services during an air fight on the 4th June 1917. This officer led his flight against 15–20 hostile aeroplanes, and alone had ten engagements with these machines.

He attacked one, and fired sixty rounds into its cockpit at point-blank range, the enemy machine rolling over and over for 3000 feet, and then falling vertically out of control.

He then attacked another enemy machine which had dived on to one of our machines from behind, and with the help of a scout he shot it down, the enemy being seen to crash to the ground.

Another hostile scout was then attacked by pilot, end-on, and received a long burst at very close range, the enemy going down in a spin, but apparently righting himself lower down.

During this last encounter Flt. Cdr. Gerrard's machine was riddled with bullets, but, by fine piloting, he landed safely, although all but his lateral controls were shot away and his machine damaged to such an extent as to require return to Depot for complete rebuilding.

This officer has now destroyed at least seven hostile aircraft. He was on active service in France and Belgium from April to September 1916, and during that period performed much valuable work.

Flt. Cdr. Reginald Frederick Stuart Leslie, R.N.A.S.

In recognition of his gallantry in pursuing hostile raiding aeroplanes out to sea in a land machine on the 25th May 1917. He attacked one hostile aeroplane, and caused it to descend in a steep nose dive, emitting smoke and steam. He was unable to observe its fate, as he was himself immediately attacked from behind by two other hostile machines and temporarily lost control. When he regained control, the machine which he had first attacked had disappeared, and two others were proceeding eastwards at a considerable height above him. He then returned safely to his aerodrome.

ARMY COUNCIL ORDER.

LEATHER—ROUGH AND CURRIED, PRODUCED FROM BRITISH OR IRISH MARKET HIDES.

In pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by the Defence of the Realm Regulations, the Army Council do hereby order that from the 14th July 1917, until further notice, all persons engaged in the purchase, sale or production of any or all of the Leathers specified in Schedule A hereto annexed, shall comply with the following regulations :—

(1) No person shall, without a permit issued by or on behalf of the Director of Army Contracts, sell or deliver any Leather of the description aforesaid otherwise than in exchange for a guarantee in the form set out in Schedule B hereto annexed.

(2) No Tanner shall, without a permit issued by or on behalf of the Director of Army Contracts, sell or deliver any Leather of the description aforesaid at a price exceeding that authorised in writing by or on behalf of the Director of Army Contracts, in the case of each Tanner.

(3) No Currier shall, without a permit issued by or on behalf of the Director of Army Contracts, sell or deliver any curried leather produced by him from rough leather of the description aforesaid at a price exceeding the net cost of the rough leather, labour, and currying materials by more than 12½ per cent., such cost to be calculated after deducting all the discounts and allowances received by him, and the currier's sale price as herein determined to include all discounts and allowances made by him.

The Currier on any such sale or delivery shall allow by way of discount for cash payment within thirty days 2½ per cent. of the price calculated as aforesaid to the person or persons to whom such sale or delivery is made.

(4) No person other than the Tanner or Currier thereof shall, without a permit issued by or on behalf of the Director of Army Contracts, sell or deliver Leather of the descriptions aforesaid at a price exceeding the Tanner's or Currier's sale price thereof as determined by Clauses 2 and 3 hereof respectively.

(5) It shall be the duty of all purchasers of the Leathers aforesaid to require and of all sellers of such Leathers to give the guarantee in the form set out in Schedule C hereto annexed, that the prices at which the Leathers are sold and bought do not exceed those which under the provisions of this Order are duly authorised at the time of sale.

(6) The Orders made by the Army Council relating to Leathers of the descriptions aforesaid, and dated 16th January and 9th March 1917, are hereby cancelled.
