ORDER.

In pursuance of the powers conferred upon him by Regulation 30A of the Defence of the Realm Regulations, the Minister of Munitions hereby Orders that the war material to which that Regulation applies shall include war material of the following class, that is to say:—

Steel—Slabs, Plates, Strips and pieces cut from Plates, suitable for re-rolling.

Steel—Plates, Sheets, and Black Plate, all open annealed produced in Sheet Mills.

NOTICE OF ADDITION TO GENERAL PERMIT.

30th November 1917.

With reference to the above Order, the Minister of Munitions hereby gives notice that the General Permit of the 1st November 1916, under the Orders of the 7th July and 31st October 1916, shall henceforth take effect as if the war material referred to in the above Order were included in the Order of the 31st October 1916, and the following material and prices were specified in the Schedule to the said General Permit. Provided always that Condition 2 of the said General Permit shall not apply to any sale or purchase of the war material referred to in the above Order of this date under a contract in writing entered into prior to the date of this notice, and that the proviso contained in the said Condition that such Condition shall not apply to any sale by a manufacturer of finished Steel rolled from Steel purchased by him, or to a sale or purchase of material the export of which has been duly sanctioned, shall not apply to any sale or purchase of the war material referred to in the above Order of this date. Provided also that nothing herein con-

tained shall affect or prejudice the provisions of the Order of the Minister of Munitions as to control of Steel supplies dated the 20th November 1916.

In recognition of his services in submarines.

Lieut.-Cdr. (now Act. Cdr.) Francis Walter Belt, R.N.V.R.

In recognition of his services with a Naval armoured car squadron throughout the war. He conducted an expedition into Persia in trying circumstances with conspicuous success. He was later second in command of the squadron during the Dobrudja and Roumanian operations, where he was wounded. He has since done admirable work in Galicia. On all occasions he has shown himself to be a loyal and most reliable officer.

Lieut. Thomas Benbow M'Nabb, R.N.V.R.

HONOURS FOR THE ROYAL NAVAL AIR SERVICE.

The KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the award of the following honours and decorations to Officers of the Royal Naval Air Service:—

To be a Companion of the Distinguished Service Order.

Wing Cdr. Christopher Lloyd Courtney, R.N.A.S.

In recognition of his services in command of a Wing of the Royal Naval Air Service at Dunkirk. Squadrons attached to his Wing have invariably shown a high standard of efficiency, and the success of the fighting squadrons generally is largely due to his knowledge and initiative.

Obs. Lieut. Russell William Gow, D.S.C., R.N.A.S.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in carrying out a photographic reconnaissance of the Belgian coast under difficult

conditions on the 15th October 1917. Obs. Lieut. Gow has also carried out a large amount of valuable spotting work for H.M. Monitors, both by day and night, including the successful operations against Zeebrugge on 12th May 1917, and against Ostend on 5th June 1917.

To receive the Distinguished Service Cross.

Act. Flt. Cdr. Fred Carr Armstrong, R.N.A.S.

In recognition of his services with a Wing of the R.N.A.S. at Dunkirk between February and September 1917. He has destroyed several hostile machines, and has led his flight with very great skill and gallantry.

In recognition of his services with a Wing of the R.N.A.S. at Dunkirk between January and September 1917, during which time he has destroyed several hostile machines and driven down numerous others.

In recognition of his services with a Wing of the R.N.A.S. at Dunkirk between March and September 1917. During a flight of over two hours, during which time he attacked transport and railways, he never exceeded a height of 1000 feet.

In recognition of his services with a Wing of the R.N.A.S. at Dunkirk between March and September 1917, during which period he has been continuously employed on the Belgian coast, and on many occasions has been in charge of a flight. On the 22nd September 1917 he led his flight against a formation of twenty enemy aircraft, and engaging three consecutively, brought them all down.

Flt. Sub-Lieut. John Ellis Langford Hunter, R.N.A.S.

In recognition of his services with a Wing of the R.N.A.S. at Dunkirk between July and September 1917, during which time he has carried out continuous work on offensive patrols. On the 22nd September 1917 he destroyed two enemy aircraft which were attempting to interfere with our spotting machines.

THE SALE OF WASTE (WORSTED AND HOSIERY) No. 2 ORDER, 1917.

In pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by the Defence of the Realm Regulations, the Army Council hereby order as follows :—

1. No person shall sell after the 30th day of November 1917 to any spinner or manufacturer any laps or waste or any blends or material wholly or partly composed thereof, without a permit issued by or on behalf of the Director of Wool Textile Production, or at prices exceeding those set out in Schedule "A" hereto annexed, or at such other prices as in any particular case may be allowed by or on behalf of the Director of Wool Textile Production.

2. No person shall, without a permit issued by or on behalf of the Director of Wool Textile Production, sell for export any laps or waste.

3. The remuneration of dealers in laps or waste shall be determined at the rates and for the services set out in Schedule "B" hereto annexed, and no dealer shall make any sale of laps or waste at a price exceeding the purchase price thereof by more than the amount to which he may be entitled under such scale of charges, having regard to the services performed by him.

4. All persons having in their custody or control any laps or waste shall furnish such particulars as to their business as may be required by or on behalf of the Director of Wool Textile Production.

5. No person shall, without a permit issued by or on behalf of the Director of Wool Textile Production, deliver any laps or waste in pursuance of any contract entered into prior to the 25th day of June 1917, provided that where such contract shall have been entered into at any time prior to the 1st day of April 1917 no such permit shall be necessary, and the contracting parties may be and are hereby authorised to complete such contract by delivery before the 31st day of December 1917.

6. No dealer in laps or waste shall, without a permit issued by or on behalf of the Director of Wool Textile Production, convert, or cause to be converted, any laps into tops.

7. For the purpose of this Order the expression "laps or waste" shall mean laps, waste, and other by-products indicated in Schedule "A" hereto annexed, produced in the spinning or manufacture of worsted or hosiery material.

8. The Sale of Waste (Worsted and Hosiery) Order, 1917, is hereby cancelled.

9. This Order shall come into force on the 1st day of December 1917.

10. This Order may be cited as the Sale of Waste (Worsted and Hosiery) No. 2 Order, 1917.

AYRSHIRE (MOVEMENT OF SHEEP) ORDER OF 1917.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Application of Part 1 of the Sheep (Double Dipping) Order of 1914.

1. Part 1 (*Restriction on Movement of Sheep out of a Movement Area*) of the Sheep (Double Dipping) Order of 1914 (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Order") is hereby applied to each of the Areas described in the Schedule hereto.

Notice of Intended Dippings to be Given.

2. For the purpose of compliance with paragraph (3) of Article 2 of the principal Order, the owner or person in charge of any sheep required to be dipped under that Article shall deliver, or send by post, to a constable of the police force for the police area wherein the sheep is, a written notice of his intention to dip the sheep, so as to reach the constable three clear days, at least, before the intended time of dipping.

Provision for Movement through Areas by Road.

3. For the purposes of the principal Order and this Order, sheep shall not be deemed to be moved out of either of the Areas described in the Schedule hereto, where they are moved through the Area by road from a place outside the Area to another place outside the Area, provided that such movement is authorised by a licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority.

Commencement.

4. This Order shall come into operation on the fifth day of December nineteen hundred and seventeen.

Short Title.

5. This Order may be cited as the **AYRSHIRE (MOVEMENT OF SHEEP) ORDER OF 1917.**
