Honours for Services in the Operations against Zeebrugge and Ostend on the Night of the 22nd-23rd April, 1918.

Admiralty, 23rd July, 1918.

The KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the award of the Victoria Cross to the undermentioned Officers and men:—

Commander (Acting Captain) Alfred Francis Blakeney Carpenter, R.N.

For most conspicuous gallantry.

This officer was in command of "Vindictive." He set a magnificent example to all those under his command by his calm composure when navigating mined waters, bringing his ship alongside the mole in darkness. When "Vindictive" was within a few yards the mole the enemy started and maintained a heavy fire from teries, machine guns and rifles on to He showed most conspicuous the bridge. bravery, and did much to encourage similar behaviour on the part of the crew, supervising the landing from the "Vindictive" on to the mole, and walking round the decks directing operations and encouraging the men in the most dangerous and exposed positions. By his encouragement to those under him, his power of command and personal bearing, he undoubtedly contributed greatly to the success of the operation.

Capt. Carpenter was selected by the officers of the "Vindictive," "Iris II.," and "Daffodil," and of the naval assaulting force to receive the Victoria Cross under Rule 13 of the Royal Warrant, dated the 29th January, 1856.

Lieutenant Richard Douglas Sandford, R.N. For most conspicuous gallantry.

This officer was in command of Submarine C.3, and most skilfully placed that vessel in between the piles of the viaduct before lighting his fuse and abandoning her. He eagerly undertook this hazardous enterprise, although well aware (as were all his crew) that if the means of rescue failed and he or any of his crew were in the water at the moment of the explosion, they would be killed outright by the force of such explosion. Yet Lieutenant Sandford disdained to use the gyro steering, which would have enabled him and his crew to abandon the submarine

at a safe distance, and preferred to make sure, as far as was humanly possible, of the accomplishment of his duty.

Lieutenant Percy Thompson Dean, R.N.V.R. (Motor Launch 282).

For most conspicuous gallantry.

Lieutenant Dean handled his boat in a most magnificent and heroic manner when embarking the officers and men from the blockships at Zeebrugge. He followed the blockships in and closed "Intrepid" and "Iphigenia" under a constant and deadly fire from machine and heavy guns at point blank range, embarking over 100 officers and This completed, he was proceeding out of the canal, when he heard that an officer was in the water. He returned, rescued him, and then proceeded, handling his boat throughout as calmly as if engaged in a practice manœuvre. Three men were shot down at his side whilst he conned his On clearing the entrance to the canal gear broke steering down. manœuvred his boat by the engines, and avoided complete destruction by steering so close in under the mole that the guns in the batteries could not depress sufficiently to fire on the boat. The whole of this operation was carried out under a constant machinegun fire at a few yards range. It was solely due to this officer's courage and daring that M.L.282 succeeded in saving so many valuable lives.

Captain Edward Bamford, D.S.O., R.M.L.I.

For most conspicuous gallantry.

This officer landed on the mole from "Vindictive" with numbers 5, 7 and 8 platoons of the marine storming force, in the face of great difficulties. When on the mole and under heavy fire, he displayed the greatest initiative in the command of his company, and by his total disregard of danger showed a magnificent example to his men. He first established a strong point on the right of the disembarkation, and, when satisfied that that was safe, led an assault on a battery to the left with the utmost coolness and valour.

Captain Bamford was selected by the officers of the R.M.A. and R.M.L.I. detachments to receive the Victoria Cross under Rule 13 of the Royal Warrant, dated the 29th January, 1856.

Serjeant Norman Augustus Finch, R.M.A., No. R.M.A./12150.

For most conspicuous gallantry.

Serjeant Finch was second in command of the pompoms and Lewis guns in the foretop of "Vindictive," under Lieutenant Charles N. B. Rigby, R.M.A. At one period the "Vindictive" was being hit was being hit chiefly inseconds, few every upper works, from which splinters caused many casualties. It was difficult to locate the guns which were doing the most damage, but Lieutenant Rigby, Serjeant Finch and the Marines in the foretop, kept up a-continuous fire with pompoms and Lewis guns, changing rapidly from one target to another, and thus keeping the enemy's fire down to some considerable extent.

Unfortunately two heavy shells made direct hits on the foretop, which was completely exposed to enemy concentration of

fire. All in the top were killed or disabled except Serjeant Finch, who was, however, severely wounded; nevertheless he showed consummate bravery, remaining in his battered and exposed position. He once more got a Lewis gun into action, and kept up a continuous fire, harassing the enemy on the mole, until the foretop received another direct hit, the remainder of the armament being then completely put out of action. Before the top was destroyed Serjeant Finch had done invaluable work, and by his bravery undoubtedly saved many lives.

This very gallant serjeant of the Royal Marine Artillery was selected by the 4th Battalion of Royal Marines, who were mostly Royal Marine Light Infantry, to receive the Victoria Cross under Rule 13 of the Royal Warrant dated 29th January, 1856.

Able Seaman Albert Edward McKenzie, O.N. J31736 (Ch.).

For most conspicuous gallantry.

This rating belonged to B Company of seaman storming party. On the night of the operation he landed on the mole with his machine-gun in the face of great difficulties and did very good work, using his gun to the utmost advantage. He advanced down the mole with Lieutenant-Commander Harrison, who with most of his party was killed, and accounted for several of the enemy running from a shelter to a destroyer alongside the mole. This very gallant seaman was severely wounded whilst working his gun in an exposed position.

Able Seaman McKenzie was selected by the men of the "Vindictive," "Iris II," and "Daffodil" and of the naval assaulting force to receive the Victoria Cross under Rule 13 of the Royal Warrant dated the 29th

January, 1856.

The KING has been graciously pleased to give orders for the appointment of the undermentioned Officers-

To be Companions of the Distinguished Service Order:-

Cdr. Edward Oliver Brudenell Seymour Osborne, R.N. Gunnery Officer on Staff of Vice-Admiral Dover.

Was responsible for the fitting out of "Vindictive" with howitzers, mortars, pompom and machine-guns. During the action displayed an exceptional combination of knowledge, skill, courage and devotion to duty in circumstances of great difficulty and danger.

Cdr. Alfred Edmund Godsal, R.N. (Since

killed in action).

This officer in "Brilliant" led the Ostend blockships and stood in to the shore in the face of a tremendous barrage from the shore batteries, the wind having shifted and driven back the smoke screen at a critical moment. His spirit and bearing were those of a very gallant officer; he at once volun-teered on hearing that another operation was in contemplation.

Lieut.-Cdr. Kenneth Cary Helyar, R.N. ("North Star").
While his vessel was lying totally dis-

abled and under heavy fire from shore batteries off Zeebrugge, displayed the greatest bravery and devotion to duty. He refused to leave his ship until she was sinking under his feet. Showed throughout an admirable example to those under him.

Eng. Lieut.-Cdr. Ronald Charles Boddie, R.N. ("Thetis"). When both engines of "Thetis" had been disabled and the order to clear the engine-room given, the ship being in a sinking condition, this officer returned to the engine-room. He got the starboard engine going ahead, thereby enabling the ship to be turned into the fairway before she was sunk.

Lieut. (actg. Lieut.-Cdr.) Keith Robin Hoare, D.S.C., R.N.V.R. When "Sirius" was sinking he went

alongside in his motor-launch under very heavy fire and took off 50 of the crew; then proceeding to "Brilliant" he took on board 16 men, and afterwards returning to

"Sirius" took off remainder of officers and crew. He showed the utmost coolness and judgment in handling his vessel throughout.

Lieut. Harold George Campbell, R.N. 'Daffodil '').

Handled his ship magnificently under extremely heavy and unceasing fire; but for his skill and devotion the storming parties from "Vindictive" could neither have landed, nor, having been landed, recovered. During the greater part of the time he was suffering from a wound in the eyes.

Lieut. Stuart Sumner Bonham-Carter, R.N. ("Intrepid").

Handled his ship with great skill and coolness in a position of considerable danger under heavy fire. Great credit is due to him for his success in sinking "Intrepid" in the Bruges Canal.

Lieut. Cecil Courtenay Dickinson, R.N.

Was in command of the demolition party displaying able leadership, and did splendid work on the mole. Was of the greatest assistance in securing "Vindictive" alongside and in facilitating the retirement from the mole. His work after the ship had left the mole was invaluable.

Lieut. Oscar Henderson, R.N. ("Iris II."). When a shell carried away the port side of the bridge of his ship and caused a serious fire amongst the ammunition and bombs, he led a volunteer fire party with a hose on to the upper deck to quench the fire. Took over the command of the ship after Cdr. Gibbs had been mortally wounded.

Lieut. Arthur Eric Pole Welman, D.S.C.,

During the action the units of the coastal motor-boat flotilla under his command were handled in a masterly manner, rendering the greatest service in screening and rescue work. He, himself, was in a coastal motorboat, and was always in the most exposed positions across the harbour entrance covering "Vindictive," "Iris II." and "Daffodil" by smoke screen.

Lieut. John Campbell Annesley, R.N.

In command of a coastal motor-boat showed great bravery when under heavy machine-gun and battery fire at short range. He continued to make smoke screens, and only withdrew when he and all his crew had been wounded.

Lieut. Edward Whaley Billyard-Leake, R.N. ("Iphigenia").

Exhibited the greatest bravery, and is deserving of much credit for placing his ship by calculated manœuvring under heavy fire exactly where he wanted to place her to block the canal, before blowing his charges and leaving the ship.

Surg. Frank Pearce Pocock, M.C., R.N. (" Iris II.").

By his devotion to duty, he undoubtedly saved many lives. When "Iris II." was hit he at once commenced tending the wounded, and as all the sick-berth staff were killed, had all the work to do alone. After

the dynamo was damaged, he had to work by candle and torchlight.

Lieut. John Howell-Price, D.S.C., R.N.R. (H.M. Submarine C3).

His assistance in placing Submarine C3 between the piles of the viaduct before the fuse was lighted and she was abandoned was invaluable. His behaviour in a position of extreme danger was exemplary.

Lieut. Roland Bourke, R.N.V.R. Throughout the action sho action showed the greatest coolness and skill in handling his motor-launch. Repeatedly went alongside "Brilliant" under very heavy fire and took off 38 officers and men. Took in tow and brought back to harbour another motorlaunch which was damaged.

Lieut. Hugh Alexander Littleton, R.N.V.R. Handled his motor-launch in a magnificent manner. Embarked over sixty officers and men from "Thetis" under heavy machinegun fire at close range. It was solely due to his courage and daring that his boat succeeded in making good her escape with the survivors of the "Thetis."

Capt. Arthur Reginald Chater, R.M.L.I. Was of the greatest assistance in keeping up communication between the various units of the battalion, and carried out his duties in a calm manner, which greatly contributed to the success of the operations. Gave great assistance in the preparation of the plan for the assault.

Lieut. (actg. Capt.) Reginald Alexander Dallas Brooks, R.M.A. ("Vindictive"). He imbued his men with the highest de-gree of devotion to duty. The manner in which the howitzer, in its exposed position on the quarter deck, was used under his personal direction was very fine.

Chaplain Rev Charles John Eyre Peshall, B.A., R.N. ("Vindictive").

His cheerful encouragement and assistance to the wounded, calm demeanour during the din of battle, strength of character, and splendid comradeship were most conspicuous to all with whom he came in contact. Showed great physical strength, and did almost superhuman work in carrying wounded from the mole over the brows into " Vindictive."

Lieut. Theodore Frederic Vernon Cooke, R.M.L.I.

By his personal bravery under fire set a magnificent example to his men, and led them forward with the greatest courage and dash in spite of being wounded. He was wounded a second time whilst endeavouring to carry a wounded man back to the ship.

To receive a Bar to the Distinguished Service Order.

Lieut. Francis Charles Harrison, D.S.O.,

Was in charge of a coastal motor-boat division operating off Ostend. Led his division with conspicuous ability and resource, and carried out the whole programme up to the last noment. Laid out the calcium flares to mark the pier ends in a most efficient manner under a heavy fire from both shore batteries and machine-guns.

Distinguished Service Cross.

The KING has further been graciously pleased to give orders for the award of the Dis-tinguished Service Cross to the undermentioned Officers:

Francis John Lambert, Lieut.

(" Thetis ").

Carried out his duties with perfect coolness and judgment under very heavy fire. Although gassed, he showed great bravery in returning from the boat to "Thetis," after she had been abandoned, to look for an officer, who, he supposed, had been left behind.

Lieut. Victor Alexander Charles Crutchley, R.N. ("Brilliant").

Showed great coolness under heavy fire, and set a fine example to his men. once volunteered on hearing that another operation was in contemplation.

Lieut. Alan Cory-Wright, R.N. ("In-

trepid ").

Showed great coolness during the action, and by his bravery and cheerfulness throughout set a fine example to his men.

Lieut. Cuthbert Francis Bond Bowlby, R.N.

In command of a coastal motor-boat. Showed great coolness under very heavy fire, stopping his boat abreast the seaplane sheds at a range of 60 to 70 yards, and continued firing, making numerous direct hits.

Philip Lieut. Edward Vaux, R.N. (" Iphigenia ")

Performed valuable services as navigating officer, in a position of considerable danger, at times under heavy fire.

Act. Lieut. George Devereux Belben, R.N.

'' Thetis '')

Carried out his duties with perfect coolness and judgment under very heavy fire. abandoning "Thetis" he took charge of the overcrowded boat, which was holed and partially waterlogged, and handled her most ably, keeping her affoat until picked up by a motor launch.

Eng. Lieut. Wilfrid Long, R.N. ("Brilliant").

Whilst his ship was under very heavy fire approaching the position where she was to be sunk, this officer showed great bravery, and by his devotion to duty set a fine example to his men.

Eng. Lieut William Richard McLaren, R.N. ("Sirius").

Rendered great services in "Sirius" during the operations off Ostend. "Sirius" had been sunk, pulled thirteen miles out to sea with ten men of "Sirius" so as to avoid capture. Volunteered for the second operation as soon as he knew it was contemplated.

Surg. William Little Clegg, M.B., R.N.

" Vindictive ").

Was in charge of the stretcher parties on the upper deck of "Vindictive." Landed Landed on the mole to recover casualties. when he was proceeding with his party along the forward mess deck of "Vindictive," a shell entered and burst close to him, killing one of his stretcher-bearers. He continued his work immediately, and by his personal example kept his stretcher-parties going.

Lieut. Leonard James Lee, R.N.V.R.

Volunteered for specially dangerous work in charge of machine-guns in a motor-launch. Took command when the commanding officer was killed and the vessel so damaged that she had to be sunk to avoid capture. great coolness, setting a fine example to his men in spite of a severe wound.

Lieut. James Courtenay Keith Wright, R.N.V.R.

Second in command of H.M. Motor Launch 282. Showed great courage and coolness in embarking the crews of "Intrepid" and "Iphigenia." It was largely due to the magnificent manner in which he and others carried out their duties that so many officers and men were rescued from the blockships in the canal at Zeebrugge. was dangerously wounded during the operation.

Lieut. John William Robinson, R.N.V.R., 2nd in command of H.M. Motor Launch 424.

When the captain was killed and the vessel completely disabled Lieut. Robinson took command. He got the wounded and crew away in the dinghy and destroyed the motor launch by setting fire to the engine-room. Showed great coolness throughout.

Lieut. Arthur Gerald Bagot, R.N.V.R., 2nd in command of H.M. Motor Launch 283.

Showed great coolness under fire. It was largely due to the magnificent manner in which the officers and men of Motor Launch 283 carried out their duties that so many officers and men of "Brilliant" and "Sirius" were rescued.

Lieut. George Frederick Bowen, R.N.V.R., 2nd in command of H.M. Motor Launch 110.

When the captain was killed and the vessel completely disabled Lieut. Bowen took command, got the wounded and crew away in the dinghy, and sank the motor launch by firing the Lewis gun through the bottom of each compartment. Showed great coolness throughout.

Lieut. Malcolm Stuart Kirkwood, R.N.V.R. Volunteered for rescue work and showed coolness and courage throughout the operations off Ostend. After his vessel was damaged alongside "Brilliant" and the engineers gassed, he went down to the engineroom, which was full of fumes, and started the starboard engines, thereby saving the vessel from being either sunk or captured. Shortly afterwards he lost consciousness and was rescued with difficulty.

Act. Lieut. Harold Vivian Rogers, R.N.R.,

Navigating Officer of "Daffodil.

Throughout the operations was of the greatest assistance, performing any duty required of him with promptness and fearlessness in an exposed position, and at times under very heavy fire. When his commanding officer was temporarily incapacitated by wounds, took command of the ship, and did everything possible to ensure the safety of the ship and crew.

Sub-Lieut. Cedric Robert Leonard Outhwaite, R.N.V.R.

In command of a Coastal Motor Boat.

Under considerable gunfire from shore defences, torpedoed an enemy destroyer proceeding eastward from Zeebrugge harbour.

Mate (E.) Sidney Greville West, R.N.

Throughout the preparations and the operation this officer worked his department in an admirable manner. After the alarm bell for blowing the charges had been rung he. returned to the engine room in order to start the engines ahead, and did not finally leave until he received an order from the com-manding officer to do so. He was thus of the greatest assistance in the accurate placing of the blockship.

Lieut. Charles Robert Wharram Lamplough, R.M.L.I.

Was in the Marine storming party. In spite of great difficulties, showed the greatest dash and determination in leading his men. He covered the retirement with great resource.

Lieut. George Underhill, R.M.L.I.

Was in the Marine storming party. Showed great coolness and courage. a critical time he organised and led reinforcements with the greatest dash and con-tempt of danger. His action was of the utmost value to the success of the operation.

Act. Sub-Lieut. (Act.) Peter Booth Clarke,

In command of a Coastal Motor Boat.

Showed great coolness and courage under very heavy fire, returning to "Sirius" after she had been abandoned to look for an officer and some men who, it was thought, had been He handled his boat with left behind. marked ability.

Act. Sub-Lieut. (Act.) Leslie Robert Blake, R.N.R.

In command of a Coastal Motor Boat.

Led an attack on enemy vessels moored inside the mole at Zeebrugge with skill and coolness under heavy fire from the shore defences. His boat, though damaged, was successfully brought back into harbour.

Act. Sub-Lieut. (Act.) Alfred Victor Knight, R.N.R. ("Sirius").

Showed great coolness under heavy fire,

and was most useful throughout the opera-He at once volunteered on hearing that another operation was in contemplation.

Gnr. (T.) Thomas William Galletly, R.N. ("North Star").

Took charge of his gun with coolness and ability under a very heavy fire until it was put out of action. He showed an energetic example to the men, and successfully evacuated all the wounded before abandoning ship, she being in a sinking condition and continually hit.

Art. Eng. William Mark Sutton, R.N. ("Daffodil").

Displayed wonderful leadership and devotion to duty. At the commencement of the operations it appeared doubtful whether sufficient head of steam could be kept in the boilers to enable "Daffodil" to perform the duties required. Mr. Sutton's untiring exertions, initiative and resource enabled this difficulty to be overcome. Throughout the pushing operation he managed to maintain 160 lbs. of steam, a pressure which would have seemed impossible in view of previous experience. The engine-room was holed and two compartments flooded, but these were immediately and efficiently dealt with by Mr. Sutton.

Act. Art. Eng. William Henry Edgar, R.A.N. ("Iris II.").

It was due to this officer that the ship was kept going during the action under very heavy fire, and though holed several times, succeeded in returning to base under her own steam. He did invaluable work in the engine-room and boiler-room throughout the operation for a period of seventeen hours He showed great bravery without rest. when ship was under very heavy fire, by coming on to the upper deck, and with the help of an engine room artificer turned on the smoke apparatus.

Serjt.-Maj. Charles John Thatcher, R.M.L.I.

Was mainly instrumental in conveying the heavy scaling ladders from the ship to the Mole, and throughout the operation displayed great coolness and devotion to duty.

To receive a Bar to the Distinguished Service Cross.

Lieut. Edward Lyon Berthon, D.S.C., R.N.

("Sirius").
This o officer accompanied Lieut.-Cdr. Hardy to look for an Engineer Lieut. and some men who, it was thought, had been left This was done under heavy and behind. accurate fire from 4.1-inch and machine guns.

Sub-Lieut. Maurice Charles Humphrey Lloyd, D.S.C., R.N. ("Iphigenia"). (Since died of wounds).

Showed great coolness under heavy fire, and by his bravery and devotion to duty set a fine example to his men. On abandoning ship, after she had been sunk, Sub-Lieut. Lloyd was severely wounded. This very gallant young officer has since died of wounds.

To receive the Conspicuous Gallantry Medal.

The three ratings above mentioned were amongst those who volunteered to man the motor launches detailed to rescue the crews of the blockships, and it was largely due to the coolness and courage with which the crews of these motor launches carried out their duties that so many officers and men were rescued. These three men displayed most conspicuous gallantry in the face of intense gun and machine-gun fire at short range.

Sig. Thomas Charles Bryant, O.N. 215297

This man, like all the crew of "Iris II.," behaved with great coolness and in a most exemplary manner under very heavy fire

throughout the whole operation.

Shortly after leaving the mole at Zeebrugge the ship came under very heavy fire from the mole and shore batteries, being ten times hit by small shell and twice by The first large shell carried large ones. away the port side of the bridge on which Signalman Bryant was stationed, seriously wounding him and causing many other casualties.

Subsequently, being the only Signalman left in the ship, he was carried to the upper deck, and, although both his legs were shattered, he endeavoured to answer signals which were being made, behaving with great fortitude while in considerable pain.

O.N. 272442 (Ch.).

The ratings above mentioned were members of the crew of Submarine C.3, which was skilfully placed between the piles of the Zeebrugge mole viaduct and there blown up, the fuse being lighted before the submarine was abandoned. They volunteered for and, under the command of an officer, eagerly undertook this hazardous enterprise, although they were well aware that if the means of rescue failed, and that if any of them were in the water at the time of the explosion, they would be killed outright.

Ldg. Sea. Albert Oscar Davis, O.N. 189243 (Ch.).

Leading Seaman Davis remained at his station in "Iphigenia" after the mines had been fired and after the cutter had left, awaiting, in accordance with instructions previously given, orders to destroy his gun. The order was not received, and he stayed at his post until the ship sank under him, when he jumped into the water and swam to the boats.

Ply./15995.

After the No. 1 and No. 2 of his Lewis gun section had become casualties in the ship in which Private Hopewell was serving, he took the Lewis gun ashore and brought it into action. He continued to fire the gun throughout the operation, and was almost the last man to retire, bringing his gun out of action with him, until it was rendered useless by a direct hit by a shell.

Sergt. Frank John Knill, R.M.A., No.

R.M.A./12738.

This non-commissioned officer was in charge of "Vindictive's" howitzer, which fired continuously under the most difficult conditions during the whole period that the ship was alongside the mole at Zeebrugge. In spite of being semi-gassed, Sergt. Knill did not leave his post, but remained in charge of his gun until it ceased firing.

A.B. Ferdinand Eugene Minns Lake,

This Able Seaman formed one of the seaman storming party. His commanding officer reports that when "Iris II." was hit by several large shells, he found Able Seaman Lake extinguishing a fire under the forebridge with sand, under very heavy shrapnel fire. Regardless of his own safety, Able Seaman Lake assisted his commanding officer to throw overboard Stokes and Mills bombs, which were quite hot. He then took the wheel, and acted as quartermaster for six hours.

Pte. John Denis Lyons Press, R.M.L.I., No. Po./15394.

Private Press landed on the mole at Zeebrugge as runner to an officer of the Royal Marines. When his officer was seriously wounded in the head and rendered unconscious, Private Press remained with him, and, although himself wounded, eventually succeeded in carrying him back on board "Vindictive."

P.O. David Percy Smith, O.N. 225904

(Po.).

Petty Officer Smith acted as quartermaster of "Iris II.," and carried out his duties with great coolness throughout. On leaving the mole at Zeebrugge, the bridge of his ship was partially shot away, the captain and the navigator being severely wounded. Petty Officer Smith remained at his exposed post under heavy fire, steering the ship to safety with one hand while lighting the compass with a torch held in the other.

P.O., 1st Cl., Edwin George Youlton, O.N.

183625 (Po.).

This petty officer steered "Vindictive" when going alongside the mole at Zeebrugge, after which he remained with his commanding officer throughout, and gave a fine example of courage when standing in a most exposed position.

When a bursting shell caused a fire in a pile of boxes containing fused Stokes bombs, he averted a catastrophe by stamping without the slightest hesitation on the burning parts. This brave action was repeated shortly afterwards, when the fire restarted, just before he was struck down and severely wounded by a shell.

The following promotion has been made, to date the 23rd April, 1918:-

Cdr. (act. Capt.) Alfred Francis Blakeney Carpenter, R.N., to be Capt.

Other special promotions and notations for early promotion were announced in the London Gazette of the 21st May, 1918.

Statements of the services of the officers concerned are as follows:-

Cdr. Ralph S. Sneyd, D.S.O., R.N.

This officer commanded the "Thetis," and was the senior officer and leader of the three Zeebrugge Blockships. "Thetis" forced her way through the net obstruction protecting the inner harbour, by which both her engines were brought up. Her way carried her to the west side of the Channel, where she settled on the bottom in a sinking condition, due to the enemy's fire.

Commander Sneyd, seeing it was impossible to take the ship further, blew the charges to make salvage of the vessel impracticable. In this position, while still under heavy fire, and himself wounded, he gave valuable directions which ensured "Intrepid" and "Iphigenia" taking up the positions in which they were ordered to be sunk, and did not abandon his own ship until he was satisfied that he could be of no further assistance in attaining the objective.

Lieut.-Cdr. Robert R. Rosoman, R.N.

Was First Lieutenant of "Vindictive," and, in the absence of his Captain, who was employed on the Vice-Admiral's Staff, at Dover, was mainly responsible for the very complete preparation of the ship for the special service required. He set a magnificent example during the action, and refused to leave the conning position during the return voyage, though shot through both legs.

Lieut.-Cdr. Hubert E. Gore-Langton, R.N. Was in command of "Phoebe." When Was in command of "Phoebe." "North Star" was disabled, he handled his vessel with conspicuous gallantry under heavy fire. He repeatedly circled round "North Star" making smoke screens, and under their cover he towed her out of action. The hawser being shot away, he stood by "North Star" and took off all the survivors.

Lieut.-Cdr. Henry N. M. Hardy, D.S.O.,

Was in command of "Sirius." Although the ship did not actually reach her objective, she stood in to the shore in the face of tremendous fire from the batteries, the wind having shifted, and driven back the smoke screen at a critical moment. After the ship had been sunk and abandoned, he returned to look for the engineer officer, who was thought to have been left behind. He at once volunteered on hearing that another operation was in contemplation.

Lieut.-Cdr. Francis H. Sandford, D.S.O.,

This officer's staff work in the preparation of the demolition arrangements generally, and in the fitting out of submarines particularly was invaluable. He carried out the rescue of the crew of submarine C.3., by

means of a service picket boat, in which he covered 170 miles during the voyage to and from the Belgian Coast.

Lieut.-Cdr. Bryan F. Adams, R.N. Was in command of "A" Company of the Grand Fleet storming parties. Was amongst the first to land on the mole, and remained there the whole time, behaving with great coolness and bravery. He was the senior surviving officer of the Grand Fleet contingent at Zeebrugge, consisting of 10 officers of whom 5 were killed and 2 wounded.

Sub-Lieut. Felix E. Chevallier, R.N.

Was in command of Nos. 1 and 3 parties of demolition party in "Daffodil." He proceeded with great bravery and determination over the bows of "Daffodil," as the duties of that vessel prevented her going alongside the "Vindictive" as intended.

Sub-Lieut. Dudley A. Babb, R.N.
Navigating officer of "Intrepid." By his bravery and cheerfulness throughout the action set a fine example to his men.

Sub-Lieut. Angus H. Maclachlan, R.N. ("Brilliant").

Showed great coolness throughout the operation, and set a fine example to his men by his bravery under heavy fire. He at once volunteered on hearing that another operation was in contemplation.

Gnr. John H. Cobby, R.N. ("Vindictive").
Was employed in the most exposed positions, assisting in placing brows and mole anchors, disembarking and re-embarking storming parties, securing "Daffodil" in place, and carrying the wounded below. Displayed throughout an entire disregard of personal danger and high qualities of initiative and resource.

Eng. Lieut.-Cdr. William A. Bury, R.N. ("Vindictive").

During the preparation of the expedition this officer worked with untiring energy and exceptional ability, not only in his own department, but in every possible way in which he could assist other departments in furthering the general interests of the enter-prise. When "Vindictive" was alongside the mole, he displayed great bravery in helping to bring in the wounded, and in generally assisting the medical staff.

Ch. Art. Engr. Frederick Steed, R.N. ("Phoebe").

Remained in the engine room during the whole of the operation, rendering great assistance by the prompt way in which he obeyed all orders from the bridge. Set a very good example to his men below by his bravery and devotion to duty in a position of considerable danger under heavy fire.

Eng. Sub-Lieut. Edgar V. Meikle, R.N. ("Intrepid")

Rendered invaluable services throughout the preparation for and during the operation. It became necessary to blow the sinking charges before he could get out of the engine room. He displayed the most admirable spirit throughout.

Art. Eng. Percy R. Brooker, R.N. (" North Star '').

Behaved splendidly when his ship was hit in the engine room and boiler room, all the boilers being put out of action and the en-gine room wrecked. He endeavoured with great courage to repair the damage, working in a thick and suffocating smoke, under very difficult conditions, until the ship was sinking under his feet, and had to be abandoned.

Staff-Surg. James McCutcheon, M.B., B.A., R.N. ("Vindictive").
Was the Senior Medical Officer of the

force. It would be difficult to exaggerate the splendid qualities displayed by this officer. He organised the medical arrangements excellently, and imbued his subordinates with a fine spirit, and by his own personal skill and attention contributed to the saving of the lives of many gallant officers and men.

Surg. Henry St. C. Colson, M.B., R.N. Was attached to the R.M. storming party. Worked for many hours under the greatest disadvantages in gas fumes and by the light of a torch only with the utmost devotion to duty.

Maj. Bernard G. Weller, D.S.C., R.M.L.I. Did invaluable work in the training of personnel and preparation of material for the R.M. storming party. The Lieutenant-Colonel and Second-in-Command of the party having been killed before landing, the command devolved on Major Weller, who directed the landing on the mole and the reembarkation in a very gallant manner.

Capt. Edward Bamford, D.S.O., R.M.L.I. For services see announcement of award of Victoria Cross above.

Capt. Arthur R. Chater, R.M.L.I. For services see announcement of award of D.S.O. above.

Sub-Lieut. George L. Nicolle, R.N.R. Was in command of a Coastal Motor Boat detailed to approach Ostend Harbour for the purpose of locating the entrances and laying calcium light floats. Remained within close range of the shore under very heavy

fire until he observed both "Brilliant" and "Sirius" ashore, when he proceeded to their vicinity with the intention of picking up. survivors.

Act. Sub-Lieut. (Act.) Peter B. Clarke, R.N.R.

For services see announcement of award of D.S.C. above.

Mid. Henry C. P. Clifford, R.N.R. Showed great coolness under heavy fire with a Coastal Motor Boat which attacked Zeebrugge mole at close range.

Mid. John P. Wheeler, R.N.R. Second in Command of the Coastal Motor Boat detailed to attack enemy craft inside Zeebrugge mole. Performed his duties in a most cool and efficient manner under very heavy fire.

Asst. Payr. Edward J. L. Young, R.N.R. Did good work in assisting the wounded in exposed positions, and showed an admirable bearing throughout.

Cdr. Ion H. Benn, D.S.O., M.P., R.N.V.R.
The Senior Officer in the R.N.V.R. in the Dover Patrol. By his energy and fine spirit he inspired the officers and men of the Motor Launches with devotion to duty and readiness for self-sacrifice. During the engagement he was in Motor Launch 582, in one of the most inshore berths, and went alongside "Brilliant" under very heavy fire, after she had grounded.

Act. Lieut.-Cdr. William W. Watson, R.N.V.R. (Motor Launch 105).

Led the Eastern Division of Motor Launches at Ostend, and it was largely due to his good judgment and initiative that the smoke screen was so successful.

Act. Lieut.-Cdr. Lionel S. Chappell, D.S.C., R.N.V.R. (Motor Launch 558).

Showed great coolness and good judgment under heavy fire. His Motor Launch was damaged by shell fire in screening "Iris II." by smoke screen in the retirement.

Act. Lieut.-Cdr. Keith R. Hoare, R.N.V.R. For services see announcement of award of D.S.O. above.

Act. Lieut.-Cdr. Jean L. Miéville, R.N.V.R. (Motor Launch 280).

Act. Lieut.-Cdr. Arthur G. Watts, R.N.V.R. (Motor Launch 239).

Lieut. Alec E. Dixon, R.N.V.R. (Motor Launch 258).

Lieut. Géoffrey H. Drummond, R.N.V.R. (Motor Launch 254).

Volunteered for rescue work, but owing to a breakdown in his engines, did not arrive in time. He, however, went in and took off the crew of Motor Launch 424, when that vessel was sinking, under heavy fire.

Lieut. Roland Bourke, R.N.V.R.

Sub-Lieut. Thomas Turnbull, R.N.V.R.
Second in Command of Motor Launch 556.
When this vessel was in an extremely exposed position for several hours, he set a splendid example to his crew, and materially assisted in the maintenance of the smoke screen at this dangerous point.

Sub-Lieut. William Scott, R.N.V.R.

Showed great coolness and steadiness under fire in Motor Launch 397, and rendered most valuable assistance to his commanding officer throughout the operations.

Lieut. Theodore F. V. Cooke, R.M.L.I. Act. Capt. Reginald A. Dallas Brooks, R.M.A.

Cdr. Edward O. B. S. Osborne, R.N. Cdr. Alfred E. Godsal, R.N.

For services see announcement of award of D.S.O. above.
