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His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the award of the Victoria Cross to the undermentioned Officers, Noncommissioned Officers and Men :---

Lt.-Col. Cyrus Wesley Peck, D.S.O., Mani-toba R.

For most conspicuous bravery and skilful leading when in attack under intense fire.

His command quickly captured the first objective, but progress to the further objective was held up by enemy machine-gun fire on his right flank.

The situation being critical in the extreme, Colonel Peck pushed forward and made a personal reconnaissance under heavy machine-gun and sniping fire, across a stretch of ground which was heavily swept by fire.

Having reconnoitred the position he returned, reorganised his battalion, and, acting upon the knowledge personally gained, pushed them forward and arranged to protect his flanks. He then went out under the most intense artillery and machine-gun fire, intercepted the Tanks, gave them the necessary directions, pointing out where they were to make for, and thus pave the way for a Canadian Infantry battalion to push forward. To this battalion he subsequently gave requisite support.

His magnificent display of courage and fine qualities of leadership enabled the advance to be continued, although always under heavy artillery and machine-gun fire, and contributed largely to the success of the brigade attack.

T./Comdr. Daniel Marcus William Beak, D.S.O., M.C., R.N.V.R.

For most conspicuous bravery, courageous leadership and devotion to duty during a prolonged period of operations.

He led his men in attack, and, despite heavy machine-gun fire, four enemy positions were captured. His skilful and fearless leadership resulted in the complete success of this operation and enabled other battalions to reach their objectives.

Four days later, though dazed by a shell fragment, in the absence of the brigade commander, he reorganised the whole brigade under extremely heavy gun fire and led his men with splendid courage to their objective. An attack having been held up he rushed forward, accompanied by only one runner, and succeeded in breaking up a nest of machine guns, personally bringing back nine or ten prisoners. His fearless example instilled courage and confidence in his meñ, who then quickly resumed the advance under his leadership.

On a subsequent occasion he displayed great courage and powers of leadership in attack, and his initiative, coupled with the confidence with which he inspired all ranks, not only enabled his own and a neighbouringunit to advance, but contributed very materially to the success of the Naval Division in these operations.

Lt. Charles Smith Rutherford, M.C., M.M., Quebec R.

For most conspicuous bravery, initiative and devotion to duty. When in command of an assaulting party Lt. Rutherford found himself a considerable distance ahead of his men, and at the same moment observed a fully armed strong enemy party outside a "Pill Box" ahead of him. He beckoned to them with his revolver to come to him, in return they waved to him to come to them. This he boldly did, and informed them that they were prisoners. This fact an enemy officer disputed and invited Lt. Rutherford to enter the "Pill Box," an invitation he discreetly declined. By masterly bluff, however, he persuaded the enemy that they were surrounded, and the whole party of 45, including two officers and three machine guns, surrendered to him.

Subsequently he induced the enemy officer to stop the fire of an enemy machine-gun close by, and Lt. Rutherford took advantage of the opportunity to hasten the advance of his men to his support.

Lt. Rutherford then observed that the right assaulting party was held up by heavy machine-gun fire from another "Pill Box." Indicating an objective to the remainder of his party he attacked the "Pill Box" with a Lewis gun section and captured a further 35 prisoners with machine guns, thus enabling the party to continue their advance.

The bold and gallant action of this officer contributed very materially to the capture of the main objective and was a wonderful inspiration to all ranks in pressing home the attack on a very strong position.

T./2nd Lt. William Allison White, M.G. Corps.

For most conspicuous bravery and initiative in attack.

When the advance of the infantry was being delayed by an enemy machine gun, he rushed the gun position single-handed, shot the three gunners, and captured the gun. Later, in similar circumstances, he attacked a gun accompanied by two men, but both of the latter were immediately shot down. He went on alone to the gun position and bayoneted or shot the team of five men and captured the gun. On a third occasion, when the advance was held up by hostile fire from an enemy position, he collected a small party and rushed the position, inflicting heavy losses on the garrison.

Subsequently, in consolidating the position by the skilful use of captured enemy and his own machine guns, he inflicted severe casualties on the enemy. His example of fearless and unhesitating devotion to duty under circumstances of great personal danger greatly inspired the neighbouring troops, and his action had a marked effect on the operations.

No. 240194 Sgt. Laurence Calvert, M.M., K.O.Y.L.I. (Conisbro').

For most conspicuous bravery and devotion to duty in attack when the success of the operation was rendered doubtful owing to severe enfilade machine-gun fire. Alone and single-handed Sjt. Calvert, rushing forward against the machine-gun team, bayoneted three and shot four.

His valour and determination in capturing single-handed two machine guns and killing the crews thereof enabled the ultimate objective to be won. His personal gallantry inspired all ranks.

No. 24/213 Sjt. Harry John Laurent, N.Z. Rif. Bde.

For most conspicuous bravery, skill, and enterprise when during an attack he was detailed to exploit an initial success and keep in touch with the enemy. With a party of twelve he located the enemy support line very strongly held, at once charged the position, followed by his men, and completely disorganised the enemy by his sudden onslaught.

In the subsequent hand-to-hand fighting which ensued he showed great resourcefulness in controlling and encouraging his men, and thirty of the enemy having been killed, the remainder surrendered, a total of one officer and 111 other ranks in all.

The success of this daring venture, which caused his party four casualties only, was due to his gallantry and enterprise.

No. 426402 A./Sjt. Arthur George Knight, late Alberta R.

For most conspicuous bravery, initiative, and devotion to duty, when after an unsuccessful attack, Sjt. Knight led a bombing section forward, under very heavy fire of all descriptions, and engaged the enemy at close quarters. Seeing that his party continued to be held up, he dashed forward alone, bayoneting several of the enemy machinegunners and trench mortar crews, and forcing the remainder to retire in confusion. He then brought forward a Lewis gun and directed his fire on the retreating enemy, inflicting many casualties.

In the subsequent advance of his platoon in pursuit, Sjt. Knight saw a party of about thirty of the enemy go into a deep tunnel which led off the trench. He again dashed forward alone, and, having killed one officer and two N.C.O.'s, captured twenty other ranks. Subsequently he routed, singlehanded, another enemy party which was opposing the advance of his platoon.

On each occasion he displayed the greatest valour under fire at very close range, and by his example of courage, gallantry, and initiative was a wonderful inspiration to all.

This very gallant N.C.O. was subsequently fatally wounded.

No. 28939 Cpl. John McNamara, E. Surr. R. (Preston).

For conspicuous bravery, initiative, and devotion to duty.

When operating a telephone in evacuated enemy trenches occupied by his battalion, Cpl. McNamara realised that a determined enemy counter-attack was gaining ground. Rushing to join the nearest post, he made the most effective use of a revolver taken from a wounded officer. Then seizing a Lewis gun, he continued to fire it till it jammed.

By this time he was alone in the post. Having destroyed his telephone, he joined the neacest post, and again displayed great courage and initiative in maintaining Lewis gun fire until reinforcements arrived. _

It was undoubtedly due to the magnificent courage and determination of Pte. McNamara that the other posts were enabled to hold on, and his fine example of devotion is worthy of the highest praise.

No. 5046 L./Cpl. Henry Weale, R. W. Fus. (Shotton, Ches.).

For most conspicuous bravery and initiative in attack. The adjacent battalion having been held up by enemy machine guns, L./Cpl. Weale was ordered to deal with the hostile posts. When his Lewis gun failed him, on his own initiative he rushed the nearest post and killed the crew, then went for the others, the crews of which fled on his approach, this gallant N.C.O. pursuing them.

His very dashing deed cleared the way for the advance, inspired his comrades, and resulted in the capture of all the machine guns.

No. 285242 L./Cpl. Alfred Wilcox, Oxf. & Bucks L.I. (Birmingham).

For most conspicuous bravery and initiative in attack when his company was held up by heavy and persistent machine-gun fire at close range.

On his own initiative, with four men he rushed ahead to the nearest enemy gun, bombed it, killed the gunner, and put the gun out of action. Being then attacked by an enemy bombing party, Cpl. Wilcox picked up enemy bombs and led his party against the next gun, finally capturing and destroying it.

Although left with only one man, he continued bombing and captured a third gun. He again bombed up the trench, captured a fourth gun, and then rejoined his platoon.

Cpl. Wilcox displayed in this series of successful individual enterprises exceptional valour, judgment, and initiative.

No. 42364 L./Cpl. Ernest Seaman, late R. Innis Fus. (Scole, Norfolk).

For most conspicuous bravery and devotion to duty. When the right flank of his company was held up by a nest of enemy machine guns, he, with great courage and initiative, rushed forward under heavy fire with his Lewis gun and engaged the position single-handed, capturing two machine guns and twelve prisoners and killing one officer and two men.

Later in the day he again rushed another enemy machine-gun position, capturing the gun under heavy fire. He was killed immediately after.

His courage and dash were beyond all praise, and it was entirely due to the very gallant conduct of L./C. Seaman that his company was enabled to push forward to its objective and capture many prisoners.

No. 22614 L./Cpl. William Henry Metcalf, M.M., Manitoba R.

For most conspicuous bravery, initiative and devotion to duty in attack, when, the right flank of the battalion being held up, he realised the situation and rushed forward under intense machine-gun fire to a passing Tank on the left. With his signal flag he walked in front of the Tank, directing it along the trench in a perfect hail of bullets and bombs. The machine-gun strong points were overcome, very heavy casualties were inflicted on the enemy, and a very critical situation was relieved.

Later, although wounded, he continued to advance until ordered to get into a shell hole and have his wounds dressed.

His valour throughout was of the highest standard.

No. 12311 Pte. Hugh McIver, M.M., late R. Scots (Newton).

For most conspicuous bravery and devotion to duty when employed as a company runner. In spite of heavy artillery and machine-gun fire he carried messages regardless of his own safety. Single-handed, he pursued an enemy scout into a machine-gun post, and having killed six of the garrison captured twenty prisoners with two machine guns.

This gallant action enabled the company to advance unchecked.

Later, he succeeded at great personal risk in stopping the fire of a British Tank which . was directed in error against our own troops at close range.

By this very gallant action Pte. McIver_ undoubtedly saved many lives.

No. 681139 Pte. Jack Harvey, Lond. R. (Camberwell).

For most conspicuous bravery and disregard of personal danger in attack.

When the advance of his company was held up by intense machine-gun fire Pte. Harvey at once dashed forward through heavy enemy fire and rushed a machine-gun post, shooting two of the team and bayoneting another. He then destroyed the gun and continued to work his way along the enemy trench, and, single-handed, rushed an enemy dug-out which contained thirty-seven of the enemy and compelled them to surrender. By these two acts of great gallantry he saved his company heavy casualties and enabled the whole of the attacking line to advance.

Throughout the entire operation he showed the most magnificent courage and determination, and, by the splendid example which he set to all ranks, materially assisted in the success of the operation.

No. 14/131 Pte. James Crichton, Auckland R., N.Z.F.

For most conspicuous bravery and devotion to duty, when, although wounded in the foot, he continued with the advancing troops, despite difficult canal and river obstacles.

When his platoon was subsequently forced back by a counter-attack he succeeded in carrying a message which involved swimming a river and crossing an area swept by machinegun fire, subsequently rejoining his platoon.

Later, he undertook on his own initiative to save a bridge which had been mined, and 200

, though under close fire of machine guns and snipers he succeeded in removing the charges, returning with the fuzes and detonators. Though suffering from a painful wound he displayed the highest degree of valour and devotion to duty.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 2nd day of November 1918, in the words following, viz. :--

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being, or having been, an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to

such restrictions, conditions, and provisions, as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas we are of opinion that Officers employed as Shipping Intelligence Officers, or in charge of the Defensive Arming of Merchant Ships, should be paid at consolidated rates in the same manner, and on the same scale, as Officers of Your Majesty's Naval Transport Service:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the Regulations for the payment of these Officers set forth in the annexed Schedule, with effect as from the 1st June 1918.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals.

"SCHEDULE.

"1. The following to be the Grades, Rank and Scale of Pay of Shipping Intelligence Officers" and Officers in Charge of the Defensive Arming of Merchant Ships:—

"3. The consolidated rates to be subject to the usual deduction for commuted retired pay and for gratuity on discharge from Active List. "4. The above rates of pay to apply only to Commissioned Officers of the Military-Branch. Other Officers, including Engineers, to retain their present rates of pay and allowances.

And whereas by Section one, sub-section two, of the said Act, it is provided that any List of persons and bodies of persons, incor-porated or unincorporated, with whom such trading is prohibited by a Proclamation under the said Act may be varied or added to by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of a Secretary of State :

And whereas the Statutory List contained in the last-mentioned Proclamation has been varied and added to by subsequent Orders of Council:

And whereas there was this day read at the Board a recommendation from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs to the effect that the Statutory List should be further varied and added to as set forth in the Schedule hereto.

Now, therefore, Their Lordships, having taken the said recommendation into consideration, are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered,

That the Statutory List be varied and added to as set forth in the Schedule hereto.

Whereof the Bight Honourable Arthur James Balfour, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Controller of the Foreign Trade Department, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

A List (The Conated List, No. 61A) consolidating all previous , up to and including that of the 9th August together with List No. 62 of 23rd August, No. 63 of 6th September, List No. 64 of 20th ember, List No. 65 of 4th October, List 66 of 18th October, List No. 67 of 1st ember, and the List herewith annexed, in all the names which up to this date ncluded in the Statutory List.

Additions to and variations in these Lists will be published at intervals approximately of two weeks.

The Lists are published in the London Gazetteand reproduced in the Board of Trade Journal, and separate copies of all Lists may be obtained at a small cost from the Superintendent of Publications, His Majesty's Stationery Office, Imperial House, Kingsway, W.C.

Note (2). —Where a firm is mentioned in the List, every partner in the firm is also included in the List, and all dealings with any partner in the firm, as well as all dealings with the firm, are prohibited: and conversely, all dealings with a firm, any partner in which is mentioned in the List, are also prohibited.

Note (3).—Where a person or firm mentioned in the List has more than one address in the country, or group of countries under which the name of the person or firm appears, all dealings in that country, or in any country in the group, with such person or firm are prohibited, even in cases where one only of the addresses or one only of the countries is specially mentioned.

Nore (4).—Trading is prohibited under the Trading with the Enemy Proclamations of 25th June and 10th November 1915, with any person or firm of enemy nationality resident or carryingon business in China, Siam, Persia, Morocco, Liberia, or Portuguese East Africa. Persons or firms in the United Kingdom are thereforeprohibited from trading with any person or firm of enemy nationality in any of those countries, aven though such person or firm is not mentioned by name in the Statutory List.

Note (5).—In order to minimise as far aspossible any inconvenience which may be caused to British traders by the dislocation of export trade owing to the inclusion in the Statutory List of a former connection, the Foreign Trade-Department is collecting and classifying the names of non-enemy firms who may be able to act as substitutes for firms mentioned in the Statutory List. A considerable amount of information is already available at the Foreign Trade Department, and it is in many cases pos-

sible to suggest the names of satisfactory substitutes for individual firms on the Lists, without the necessity of referring the matter abroad. The Department is, however, prepared on application to inquire of His Majesty's Representatives abroad for the names of suitable substitutes. When the applicant wishes this done by telegraph he is required to undertake to pay the cost of telegraphic correspondence. It would greatly facilitate the work of the Foreign Trade Department if applicants in making inquiries would specify the particular trade or trades for which substitutes are required. General inquiries for new connections abroad should be addressed to The Comptroller-General, Department of Overseas Trade (Development and Intelligence), 73 Basinghall Street, London, E.C. 2.

NOTE (6).—The Statutory List for each country is telegraphed, on the day of issue, to His Majesty's Representative in that country, who is instructed to notify accordingly British Consular Officers, to whom persons abroad should apply for information as to names on the List. Persons and firms in the United Kingdom with agencies or branches abroad would, however, be well advised to furnish such agencies or branches with issues of the List as they appear. The names on the Lists for all countries in Central or South America are also notified to His Majesty's Ambassador at Washington, who transmits them to H.M. Consul-General at New York and to other centres in the United States likely to be interested.

NOTE (7).—It is not unusual for firms in Holland and the Netherland East Indies to be registered under names commencing with de-scriptive terms such as "Handel Maatschappy" (Trading Company) or "Naamlooze Venootschap" (Limited Liability Company). In such cases it has been found more convenient to publish the firm under its proper name, followed by the general descriptive term "Handel Maatschappy" or "Naamlooze Venootschap" (N.V.) as in the case of an English company. For instance, Handel Maatschappy van den Berg & Company, and Naamlooze Venootschap de Komeet v/h Dumonceau Frères will be found under "Berg" and "Komeet" respectively, and not under "Handel" or "Naamlooze."

Order of the Minister of Munitions, dated 9th day of November 1918, under Section 2 of the Munitions of War Act, 1917, revoking the Order of the 12th day of December 1917 (S. R. & O. 1917, No. 1324), prohibiting the employment of certain classes of munition workers.

The Minister of Munitions, in pursuance of the powers vested in him by Section 2 of the Munitions of War Act, 1917, and of all other powers enabling him in this behalf, hereby makes the following Order:

1. The Order made by the Minister on the 1.2th day of December 1917 (S. R. & O. 1917, No. 1324), which prohibited the employment of certain classes of munitions workers on nonmunitions work without the consent of the Minister, is hereby revoked.

2. For the purposes of Section 2 of the Munitions of War Act, 1917, the Minister hereby consents to the employment on work which is not work on or in connection with munitions work of the following class of workmen, that is to say, workmen who have since the passing of the Munitions of War Act, 1917, been employed on or in connection with munitions work of a class specified in paragraph (a) of sub-section 1 of section 9 of the Munitions of War (Amendment) Act, 1916.

3. This Order shall come into force on the 11th day of November 1918, and may be cited as the Ex-Munition Workers Employment Order, 1918.

ARMY COUNCIL ORDER.

THE SOLE LEATHER (CONDITIONS OF SALE) Order, 1918.

Whereas by the Leather (Control) No 3 Notice, 1917, and the Leather (Control) No. 4 Notice, 1917, the Army Council gave notice of their intention to take possession of certain Sole and Upper Leather:

And whereas certain of the said Sole and Upper Leather has been or may be released for sale and manufacture for Naval and Military purposes under certain conditions imposed by or on behalf of the Director of Raw Materials :

And whereas it is expedient that certain of the said Leather should be released for sale and manu-

facture for purposes other than Naval and Military purposes :

And whereas by Regulation 2JJ of the Defence of the Realm Regulations it is provided that the Board of Trade shall have the like powers as are given to the Food Controller under Regulations 2B, 2F to 2J inclusive and 7 as respects any article of commerce not being an article of food where it appears to the Board necessary or expedient to exercise any of those powers for the purpose of encouraging, maintaining or regulating the supply of any such article which is required by the public or by any section of the public:

And whereas such powers include the power to make arrangements with any Government Department for the exercise by that Department of the powers of the Board of Trade:

And whereas it appears to the Board of Trade necessary and expedient for the purpose of encouraging, maintaining and regulating the supply of Sole Leather which may be required by the public or by any section of the public that the sale of so much of the said Leather as may be released for sale and manufacture for purposes other than Naval and Military purposes should be permitted upon certain conditions:

And whereas the Board of Trade have made arrangements with the Army Council for the exercise by the Council on behalf of the Board. of Trade of the powers of the Board of Trade under the said Regulations with respect to Sole Leather:

And whereas by the Sole Leather (Conditions of Sale) Order, 1917, the Army Council authorised upon certain conditions the sale and delivery of and payment for certain Sole Leather:

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the powers . conferred upon them by the Defence of the Realm Regulations, and of every other Power enabling them in that behalf, the Army Councilhereby authorise and permit as from the date hereof until further notice the sale and delivery of and payment for such Sole Leather of the description indicated in the Schedule "A" hereto, annexed as may be or may have been released for sale and manufacture for other than Naval or Military purposes, subject to the following conditions, that is to say :-

1. The provisions of the Sole Leather (Conditions of Sale) Order, 1917, shall be deemed to apply to the sale and delivery of and payment for any Leather of the description indicated in the Schedule hereto annexed in substitution for the Schedule annexed to the said Order.

2. This Order may be cited as the Sole Leather (Conditions of Sale) Order, 1918.

SALE OF STRAW FOR THATCHING IN GREAT BRITAIN.

In pursuance of the powers conferred on them by the Defence of the Realm Regulations and of all other powers thereunto enabling them, notwithstanding anything contained in the Army Council Order of the 30th July 1918, prohibiting the lifting of hay and straw in England and Wales, or the Army Council Order of the 21st August 1918, prohibiting the lifting of hay and straw in Scotland, the Army Council do hereby order :-

That where a farmer is desirous of purchasing straw (other than oat straw) from a producer for the purpose of thatching ricks of corn or hay, he may do so, subject to the following conditions :-

1. The purchaser must deliver to the seller a Certificate stating-

(a) The quantity of straw required, which must not exceed three tons in any one instance. (b) That the straw is required for thatching

ricks of hay or corn and for no other purpose.

2. The Certificate must be signed by the purchaser and must give his address together with the name and address of the seller.

3. When the whole of the straw for which the Certificate is given has been removed, the seller must forward the Certificate to the D.P.O.S of the county concerned, whose address is given in the said Army Council Orders of the 30th July 1918, and the 21st August 1918.

4. The price paid for such straw shall not exceed the maximum stack price laid down by any Army Council Order that may for the time being be in force, together with any actual cost incurred for tying, or carting a distance further than the nearest railway station.

2. The day and week shall be the ordinary number of hours per day and per week re-spectively at present worked in the area.

3. The area comprises the Counties of Dumfries, Kirkcudbright and Wigtown.

4. The foregoing Minimum Rates shall not apply to "Agricultural Students" or disabled Soldiers or Sailors being trained in Forestry,
