BY THE KING.

A PROCLAMATION

REVOKING A PROCLAMATION, DATED THE 17TH DAY OF JULY 1917, PROHIBITING THE EXPORTATION FROM THE UNITED KINGDOM OF DESIGNS FOR AIRCRAFT.

GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation, dated the seventeenth day of July 1917, made in pursuance of Section 8 of the Customs and Inland

Revenue Act, 1879, and Section 1 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, We thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to prohibit the exportation from the United Kingdom of the following articles, that is to say, drawings, designs, specifications, and other descriptions in writing of any kind of aeroplanes or other aircraft, or of engines, or other accessories of aircraft;

And Whereas it appears to Us that the said Proclamation should be revoked:

Now, therefore, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, hereby proclaim, direct, and ordain, that the said Proclamation of the seventeenth day of July 1917 shall be, and the same is hereby, revoked.

Given at Our Court at Buckingham Palace, this Tenth day of February, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and nineteen, and in the Ninth year of Our Reign.

GOD SAVE THE KING.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-eighth day of November nineteen hundred and fourteen, His Majesty was pleased to make regulations (called the "Defence of the Realm Regulations") under the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Act, 1914, for securing the public safety and the defence of the realm:

And whereas the said Act has been amended by the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) Act, 1915, the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) (No. 2) Act, 1915, and the Munitions of War Act, 1915, and other enactments:

And whereas the said regulations have been amended by various subsequent Orders in Council:

And whereas it is expedient further to amend the said regulations in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following amendments be made in the said regulations:—

1. The following regulation shall be substituted for Regulation 39DD:—

"39DD.—(1) Except under and in pursuance of a licence granted by the Shipping Controller, no British ship registered in the United Kingdom shall proceed to sea on any voyage whatsoever, and no British ship whatsoever shall proceed to sea from any port in the United Kingdom: Provided that the foregoing provisions shall not apply (a) to sailing ships, (b) to steamers of less than 500 tons gross tonnage, or (c) to steamers proceeding to sea on voyages from a port in the British Islands to any other port in the British Islands.

(2) A licence under this regulation may be

granted in respect of ships of any class, or voyages of any class, or in respect of any special ship or ships, or any special voyage or voyages, and may be granted so as to be in force for any time and subject to any terms or conditions specified therein. At the time that application for a licence is made a copy of any charter party entered into in respect of the voyage for which the application is made shall be forwarded to the Shipping Controller.

(3) If any ship obtains or attempts to obtain clearance outward for the purpose of proceeding, or attempts to proceed, or proceeds, to sea in contravention of this regulation, or if in the case of any ship there is a failure to comply with any terms or conditions contained in a licence granted under this regulation in respect of that ship, the owner, the disponent, the agent and the master thereof, shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations, and if the ship is at the time of the commission of the offence, or is subsequently at any time, found at any port of, or within the territorial waters adjacent to, the United Kingdom, it may be detained in the same manner as if it were a ship liable to be detained under the Merchant Shipping Acts, 1894 to 1916.

(4) There shall be included in every contract for the charter of any ship to which this regulation applies a provision making the validity of the contract or charter party conditional upon the granting from time to time of such licences as may be required under this regulation.

(5) In this regulation the expressions 'ship' and 'British ship' have the same meaning as in the Merchant Shipping Acts, 1894 to 1916, and the expression 'disponent' in relation to any ship includes any person responsible for the management or control of the ship."

2. Regulation 39DDD is hereby rescinded and shall be omitted.

3. This Order shall come into operation on the thirty-first day of March nineteen hundred and nineteen.

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Royal Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions, as are, from time to time, directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas it was found necessary, in order to carry out certain urgent works of the most vital importance, to establish a Corps of Royal Marine Engineers consisting of—

- (a) A small Corps Headquarters ;
- (b) A large Works Headquarters ;
- (c) Ten Works Companies ;
- (d) One Miscellaneous Trades Company :

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the establishment of the Corps of Royal Marine Engineers with pay and allowances at the rates shown below :—

"To Officer Commanding—Graded as Assistant Adjutant General—

Pay at the rate of £750 a year.

"To Engineer Officers and Men—

Pay at rates authorised for Royal Engineers in Your Majesty's Army.

"To Ex-Army Men enlisted in the Royal Marine Engineers—

Payment of Bounty in respect of enlistment as authorised for Your Majesty's Army.

"To Royal Marine Officers, Warrant Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers, and Men employed with the Royal Marine Engineers, but not in receipt of pay at rates authorised for Royal Engineers in Your Majesty's Army—Payment of Allowances as follow :—

WHEREAS it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation or Order in

Council made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, as amended by the Act now in recital, may, whilst a state of war exists, be varied or added to by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade :

And whereas it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Restriction) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation made under Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, may, whether the Proclamation was made before or after the passing of the Act now in recital, be varied or added to, whilst a state of war exists, by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade :

And whereas by a Proclamation, dated the 10th day of May 1917, and made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, and Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, and Section 1 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, the exportation from the United Kingdom of certain articles to certain or all destinations was prohibited :

And whereas by subsequent Orders of Council, and by a Proclamation, dated the 18th day of December 1918, the said Proclamation was amended and added to in certain particulars :

And whereas there was this day read at the Board a recommendation from the Board of Trade to the following effect :—

That the articles indicated in the Proclamation of the 10th day of May 1917, as amended and added to by subsequent Orders of Council, and by the Proclamation of the 18th day of December 1918, as being prohibited to be exported to all destinations in European and Asiatic Russia and in other foreign countries in Europe and on the Mediterranean, except France and French Possessions, Italy and Italian Possessions, Belgium, Portugal, Greece, Serbia, Roumania, Spain, Morocco, and Palestine and Syria as far north as a line from Alexandretta to Aleppo inclusive, and as far east as the Hejaz railway inclusive, and to all ports in any such foreign countries, should be prohibited to be exported to all destinations in European and Asiatic Russia and in other foreign countries in Europe and on the Mediterranean, except France and French Possessions, Italy and Italian Possessions, Belgium, Portugal, Greece, Serbia, Roumania, Spain, Morocco, Palestine and Syria as far north as a line from Alexandretta to Aleppo inclusive, and as far east as the Hejaz railway inclusive, Czecho-Slovakia, Alsace-Lorraine, and the portions of Austria-Hungary and territories on the left bank of the Rhine in the occupation of the Armies of the Associated Governments, and to all ports in any such foreign countries.

Now, therefore, their Lordships, having taken the said recommendation into consideration, are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the same be approved.

Whereof the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs and Excise, the Director of the War Trade Department, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

ADMIRALTY NOTICE TO MARINERS.

SCOTLAND, WEST COAST.

Former Notice.—No. 1486 of 1918; hereby cancelled.

Mariners are hereby warned that, under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Regulations have been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and are now in force:—

(1) *Firth of Clyde—Prohibited Area; Traffic Regulations.*

I. PROHIBITED AREA.

Position.—Denure harbour, lat. $55^{\circ} 24\frac{1}{2}'$ N., long. $4^{\circ} 45\frac{1}{2}'$ W.

The undermentioned area off Denure harbour is prohibited to all traffic. The area is enclosed by lines joining the following positions:—

- (a) Lat. $55^{\circ} 25' 25''$ N., long. $4^{\circ} 48' 10''$ W.
- (b) Lat. $55^{\circ} 24' 45''$ N., long. $4^{\circ} 47' 00''$ W.
- (c) Lat. $55^{\circ} 24' 23''$ N., long. $4^{\circ} 48' 45''$ W.

II. TRAFFIC REGULATIONS.

Position.—Dunoon bank, lat. $55^{\circ} 56\frac{3}{4}'$ N., long. $4^{\circ} 54\frac{1}{2}'$ W.

Vessels entering or leaving the Clyde must pass between two Trawlers, situated as under-mentioned, which mark the gateway in the obstruction that now exists between Cloch point and Dunoon.

(a) Eastern Trawler:

Position.—On east side of Dunoon bank, at a distance of 8 cables and 66 yards, 281° (*N. 61^{\circ} W. Mag.*), from Cloch lighthouse.

Description.—The hull of this vessel is painted red.

Fog-signal.—This vessel will sound on her steam whistle *four blasts every two minutes*, thus (— — — —), alternately with the fog-signal sounded by the western Trawler.

(b) Western Trawler:

Position.—On west side of Dunoon bank,

at a distance of one cable, 272° (N. 70° W. Mag.), from the eastern Trawler.

Description.—The hull of this vessel is painted green.

Fog-signal.—The vessel will sound on her steam whistle *three* long blasts *every two minutes*, alternately with the fog-signal sounded by the eastern Trawler.

The above-mentioned gate Trawlers will display signals, as shown on the accompanying diagram, to indicate whether the gate is open to inward or outward bound traffic, or whether the gate is closed.

A Trawler with hull painted black is moored a short distance to the northward of the gate Trawlers, and on the western side of the passage.

No vessels are to approach to within a distance of half a mile of the gateway until the special signals are hoisted, indicating that the passage is open for them; neither are inward-bound vessels to approach within this distance when the signals are displayed for outward-bound vessels, and vice versa.

Speed must not exceed 10 knots, and vessels are cautioned to keep a mid-channel course when passing through the gateway.

Outward-bound vessels are to approach the gateway on a 196° (S. 34° W. Mag.) course, leaving the black and white chequered light-buoy with *occulting green* light, situated three-quarters of a mile, 27° (N. 45° E. Mag.), from the gateway, on their port hand.

Similarly, inward-bound vessels must steer to the eastward for the Examination anchorage and Kempock point, as soon as they have passed clear of the gateway.

Variation.—18° W.

(2) *Caledonian Canal—Traffic Regulations no longer in force.*

The traffic regulations for the Caledonian canal, published in the former Notice, are no longer in force.

Note.

This Notice to Mariners is a revision of the former Notice quoted above.

CAUTION.

The District Agricultural Wages Committee for the Counties of the Lothians and Peebles, duly certified by the Board of Agriculture for Scotland under the Second Schedule of the Corn Production Act, 1917, hereby give notice that the following Minimum Rates of Wages for Workmen employed in "Agriculture" (as defined in Section 17 (1) of said Act) for time-work (according to the present customary hours) which were fixed by them on the 18th October 1918 and 18th January 1919, in terms of the Schedule hereto, not having been disallowed by the Central Agricultural Wages Committee for Scotland within the period prescribed by the Board, have come into force under Clause 6 of said Second Schedule, with effect in the case of women from 18th October 1918 and in all the other cases from 18th January 1919, and will remain in force until cancelled or varied, either wholly or in part, by the Committee.

 - Women of 18 years of age and upwards, 20s. per week.
 - Girls between 16 and 18 years of age, 17s. per week.
 - Girls under 16 years of age, 12s. per week.
2. Area of employment affected by the rates.
 - The Counties of the Lothians and Peebles.
3. Exceptions.
 - These rates do not apply to Students in "Agriculture."
