THE following Address of the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland, convened in General Assembly, having been transmitted by His Grace the Lord High Commissioner to the Right Honourable Robert Munro, His Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, has been by him laid before the King, who was pleased to receive the same very graciously.

TO THE KING'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

May it please Your Majesty,—

We, Your Majesty's most loyal and devoted subjects, Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland, met in General Assembly, have received with deep respect and gratification the most gracious letter with which Your Majesty has honoured us through His Grace the Lord High Commissioner.

We thank Your Majesty for the renewed assurance of sincere regard for the Church of Scotland, of desire for her prosperity and welfare, and confidence in her fitness to discharge her great duties, which Your Majesty has been pleased to express. Such words of confidence and approval from our Gracious Sovereign are very deeply valued by our Church.

On behalf of our people we thank Your Majesty for the warm tribute which Your Majesty has graciously paid to the devoted gallantry and endurance of the sailors, soldiers, and airmen of our Nation throughout the War.

On our part we know that we speak for the whole Nation when we respectfully tender to Your Majesty, to Her Majesty the Queen, and to all the members of the Royal House, our deep and loyal gratitude for the priceless contribution to the National cause which has come from the beloved occupants of the Throne and their Family. The unbroken unity of Sovereign and people throughout the long years of struggle and the true sympathy constantly manifested by our King and Queen in the sorrows of countless homes will never be forgotten.

With profound gratitude do we join with Your Majesty in offering thanks to Almighty God for the great deliverance He hath wrought, for the victory over our foes, and for the approach of peace. That the new era on which our Nation is entering may be worthy of the vast sacrifices made, is our Church's earnest prayer, and to accomplish this will be her steadfast aim. Your Majesty's invitation to the Churches of our land to foster and develop the spirit of brotherhood throughout the community is one which strikes an answering chord in all our hearts, and we assure Your Majesty that no effort on our part will be lacking to help on the fullest development of this most Christian Grace in the life of the Scottish people. That peace on earth and goodwill among men may increasingly prevail both within our own borders and throughout the whole world is, may it please Your Majesty, our fervent desire, and will be in coming days our most active endeavour.

We hail with glad satisfaction the return of His Grace the Duke of Atholl, as Your Majesty's

representative at this General Assembly. His Grace's personal qualities and deep attachment to the Church of Scotland make his presence amongst us exceedingly acceptable.

We have received with gratitude Your Majesty's Royal donation of £2000, which we shall use our best endeavour so to apply as to accomplish the purpose for which Your Majesty has destined it.

That the blessing of Almighty God may rest upon Your Majesty and on Your Majesty's Royal Consort Queen Mary, and that there may be granted to Your Majesties a long succession of years of happy sovereignty over a loyal, devoted, and prosperous people, is, may it please Your Majesty, the earnest prayer of Your Majesty's most faithful, loyal, and obedient subjects, the Ministers and Elders met in this General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

EXPORTS OF GIFTS OF FOODSTUFFS, CLOTHING, &C., TO ENEMY COUNTRIES.

The Board of Trade, on behalf of His Majesty, and in pursuance of the powers reserved in the Trading with the Enemy Proclamations, and all other powers thereunto them enabling, do hereby give and grant licence to all persons residing, carrying on business, or being in the United Kingdom, to supply through the Emergency Committee for the Assistance of Germans, Austrians, and Hungarians in distress, of 27 Chancery Lane, London, W.C. 2, to a person in an enemy country, parcels of foodstuffs, clothing, and materials and articles for mending clothing, provided that such parcels are supplied by way of gift, and that no parcel exceeds eleven pounds (11 lbs.) in weight.

Awarded the Distinguished Service Order.

CANADIAN FORCE.

Capt. Alfred Eastham, M.C., Can. M.G. Corps, attd. Malmoot Coy.

For conspicuous gallantry in command of the attacking party at Nadvoista, 19th February 1919. His dispositions were such that none of the enemy escaped, all being killed or captured. He displayed great courage in the hand-to-hand fighting in the village. He later with his force captured Station 22 and the whole of the garrison of the post at the Onda. Throughout he displayed unflinching energy.

Maj. Lawrence Howard MacKenzie, Nova Scotia Regt., attd. Malmoot Coy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in charge of the party which took Segeja, 19th February 1919. The success was due to his arrangements for transport and attack. A distance of 176 versts had to be travelled, and the weather was intensely cold. He took Segeja with slight loss, and the success of the whole operations was largely due to his marked ability for organisation, his sound judgment, and his courage.

Awarded the Military Cross.

T./Lt. George Allan Stuart Lipp, 253rd Coy., M.G. Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during operations on the Vologda front between 3rd August and 17th September 1918. For six weeks he commanded his section with marked ability and success. By his never failing courage and disregard of self he set a fine example to all around him. He also did good work during the operations culminating in the capture of Segeja on 19th February 1919.

CANADIAN FORCE.

Lt. (A./Capt.) Robert Douglas Adams, Can. Engrs.

In N. Russia, between 14th-17th January 1919, he carried out a most dashing reconnaissance with a small patrol. After a seventy-mile march in severe weather he attacked a village which was the Bolshevik headquarters of the district. The whole enemy garrison, which much exceeded his own party in numbers, were killed or captured, and important documents were seized. He showed great gallantry and initiative, and did fine work.

Awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal.

CANADIAN FORCE.

18368 Sjt. R. Macnaughton, 4th Bn., 1st C. Ontario R., attd. Malmoot Coy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty at Nactoviste on February 19th, 1919, while in command of a Lewis gun. He advanced over most difficult country through deep snow under enemy fire. Owing mainly to his judgment and skill the village was cleared of snipers. Later he seized a sleigh and drove his crew over 800 yards of open ice against a strong enemy position. By his courage and quickness in handling his gun the enemy resistance was overcome without loss.

Maj. Frank Fauquier Arnoldi, D.S.O., Can. Fld. Arty.

He has handled his battery on all occasions with marked determination and skill. His work in connection with the retirement from Selyo, and the battle of Toulgas on 11th November 1918, was of a very high order. He has many times made difficult reconnaissances, and to him is largely due the splendid technical fitness and offensive spirit of the battery.

Awarded the Distinguished Service Order.

T./Capt. (A./Maj.) George Henry Gilmore, M.C., R. Suss. R., attd. 2/10th Bn., R. Scots.

For conspicuous gallantry and good leadership in command of the left wing of the Seletskoe Detachment during operations from 25th January to 10th February 1919. Thanks to his ability and presence of mind the retreat was carried out successfully. On 1st and on 7th February he took personal command of important reconnaissances, and directed operations which enabled the force to extricate itself from a difficult situation.

Awarded a Bar to the Military Cross.

T./Capt. John Dalglish Watson, M.C., M.B., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in evacuation of wounded from Toulgas during the period 12th-14th November 1918, under fire and through drift ice with a panic-stricken crew on the river steamer.

(M.C. gazetted 1st January 1918.)

Awarded the Military Cross.

T./Lt. John Victor Card, E. Surr. R.

From 28th December 1918 to 2nd January 1919, north of Turchasova, he did excellent work. He personally led the first attack, and by his conduct and courage contributed materially to the steadiness of the attack and counter-attack of the Naval Brigade.

T./Capt. George William Edwards, R.E.

He was of great assistance in planning and executing defences since November 1918. On 11th November, at Toulgas, when the enemy attacked, he by his courage and energy helped greatly to steady up things when the enemy had almost reached the guns in rear and the situation was critical.

2nd Lt. Alastair Forbes Grant, 2/10th Bn., R. Scots, T.F.

For gallantry and devotion to duty. As adjutant to River Column since its formation he has done excellent service, especially during the very trying period when there was only lamp communication between the columns on each bank of the river. His work has been of very great value to the column in its many engagements, during which he has shown great coolness under fire.

T./Lt. Robert Alexander Moire Hastings, R. Highrs., attd. 2/10th Bn., R. Scots.

For conspicuous gallantry and initiative in getting his platoon into action when the battery was attacked in the rear by a large force of the enemy on 11th November 1918. He personally reconnoitred the approach to the position under very severe rifle and machine-gun fire. On other occasions he has done excellent patrol work, and always shown a fine example to his men.

Capt. Robert Lynn Heard, R.G.A.

For gallantry in action. Throughout the fighting round Taraseva he displayed great courage, and did excellent work, especially on 29th January 1919, when it was due to his untiring efforts and example that his second gun was withdrawn just before the enemy entered the village.

Lt. Norman Scotson Henshaw, R.E., T.F.

On the night 1st-2nd January 1919, near Turchasova, he was the last man to leave the advanced post and barricade. From 28th December 1918 to 2nd January 1919 he rendered valuable assistance, showing great gallantry and devotion to duty. The fact that the force did not suffer heavy casualties was mainly due to his efforts and untiring work.

T./Capt. John Arnot Walker Penman, 2/10th Bn., R. Scots.

Between 26th September and 9th October 1918 he organised defences of Middle Borok, and held the village against determined attacks on 7th, 8th, and 9th October, driving the enemy away by well-timed counter-attacks, during which he personally accounted for several of them. He held the village until it was in flames from fire of enemy gun boats. He showed most conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty.

Lt. John Peter, R.A.M.C., Spec. Res., attd. 17th Bn., L'pool R.

For gallantry and devotion to duty during the attack on enemy positions near Kodish on 7th February 1919. Under heavy fire he attended to the wounded and placed them on sleighs. It was largely due to his fine conduct that the wounded were promptly evacuated and many lives saved.

2nd Lt. James Saunders, R.G.A., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty throughout the operations at Tarassovo and Shred Mekrenga, 25th and 30th January and 10th February 1919. The detachment has been very much encouraged by his personal example and energy, and their efficiency in action has been largely due to the coolness and disregard of danger always shown by him.

T./Lt. (A./Capt.) Leonard William Shute, 1st Bn., R. Scots Fus., attd. 2/10th Bn., R. Scots.

For conspicuous gallantry during the enemy's attack on Toulgas, in moving between where his platoons were engaged and the artillery position under continuous heavy fire. His courage and good leadership were undoubtedly responsible for the fine work done by his company on this occasion.

2nd Lt. Samuel Spencer, Hamps. Yeo., attd. 2/10th Bn., R. Scots.

For gallantry and devotion to duty in charge of the evacuation of the wounded from Borok in October 1918. Thanks to his untiring energy and devotion under fire all wounded were evacuated safely. At all times his work has been a source of great encouragement to those under him.

Capt. (A./Maj.) Frank Mortimer Taylor, R.A.M.C., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty on 30th December 1918, at Kodish, when he urged his sleigh drivers into Kodish through severe fire. He thus established a dressing station, collecting and tending the wounded under difficult and dangerous conditions.

CANADIAN FORCE.

Lt. William John Bradshaw, Can. Fd. Arty.

For conspicuous gallantry in leading his small force against a greatly superior attacking force, holding the artillery position against overwhelming odds until reinforcements could be sent. The action of himself and those under him was undoubtedly the primary factor in the repulse of the Bolshevik Forces.

Lt. John Stewart M'Rae, 68th Bty., Can. Fd. Arty.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. On night, 5th-6th January, when Kodish was evacuated by the troops holding the line, he collected his spare men at the battery and led them forward to fill in the gap and so protect his guns. He then went further forward and led straggling troops to forward positions. His coolness and fine example were of great assistance at a critical moment.

Capt. Oliver Alexander Mowat, 68th Bty., Can. Fd. Arty.

For conspicuous gallantry and resource on 15th December 1918, at Kodema, when in charge of the operations, in addition to being in charge of an 18-pounder. He brought artillery fire to bear on the village at a range of 800 yards, under heavy rifle and machine-gun fire, with marked success. He has previously done good work.

Lt. John Roberts, Can. Fd. Arty.

For conspicuous gallantry and ability in October 1918, in helping to lead infantry in a successful attack; and also in ably carrying out his artillery duties in connection with the operations on the Seletskoe front in December. His work has always been of a very high order.

Lt. John Douglas Winslow, Can. Fd. Arty.

For conspicuous gallantry and determination during operations at Udst Padenga in January 1919. When the enemy attacked heavily this officer with a few men took charge of an abandoned gun, and, in face of heavy fire, manned and fired the gun over open sights until the order was given for retirement. He fought the gun throughout the withdrawal to Shenkursk.

Awarded a Bar to the Distinguished Conduct Medal.

CANADIAN FORCE.

302618 Gnr. W. Birkett, D.C.M., 16th Bde.,
Can. Fd. Arty.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Near Yevsievskaia, on 1st March, a wounded messenger was lying some 350 yards from the gun position. This man volunteered to go to the man's assistance and obtain his message. This he successfully accomplished under heavy rifle and machine-gun fire. Throughout the day he behaved splendidly.

(D.C.M. gazetted in this Gazette.)

Awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal.

66228 L./C. A. Abrams, 2/10th Bn., R.
Scots (St. Helens).

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. From 1st September to 31st October 1918 he was constantly employed on patrols and dangerous services, for which he was ever the first to volunteer, and conducted himself with marked courage in every engagement. On 9th October he volunteered to go on patrol on the heels of the retreating enemy, and his information rendered possible a successful counter-attack.

26335 Pte. E. Crook, 252nd Coy., M.G. Corps
(Bolton).

For great gallantry in action. He was in charge of a blockhouse during the four days of the enemy attack on Tarassovo, being under heavy shell fire during that time. On the last day he repulsed three attempts to capture his post, inflicting heavy casualties on the enemy. He remained at his post until almost surrounded before bringing his section and gun safely away. He showed great courage, and set a splendid example to others.

66222 Sjt. F. G. Hofman, 2/10th Bn., R.
Scots (Liverpool).

For most conspicuous gallantry and determination on October 6th-8th, 1918, at Middle Borok. This N.C.O., with two men, held a completely isolated Lewis gun post under heavy and continuous fire, repulsing three determined attacks, and materially contributing to the success of the defence of the village until it was burnt to the ground by enemy gun fire.

66002 Sjt. J. Peet, 2/10th Bn., R. Scots
(Devon.).

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty under heavy rifle and machine-gun fire. He successfully carried out all orders, and set a splendid example to the men. During previous operations he has always done excellent work.

87985 Sjt. S. Todoreca, 6th Bn., Midd'x R.
(U.S.A.).

For conspicuous gallantry and ability. He has done excellent work as a patrol leader, being daring and resourceful. Throughout operations at Tulgas during November and December 1918, he has been a prominent factor in several patrol actions near enemy's lines, in which enemy patrols were driven

back, casualties inflicted, and enemy block-houses destroyed.

CANADIAN FORCE.

41438 Sjt. W. F. Armstrong, M.M., 16th
Bde., Can. Fd. Arty.

For marked gallantry and devotion to duty in command of his gun, which he ran out of the pit, faced the rear, and fired for 6 hours over open sights. He set a splendid example to the rest of his men; one man was killed beside the gun, and there were a number of bullet hits on the shield. He showed complete disregard for his personal safety.

302618 Gnr. W. Birkett, 16th Bde., Can.
Fd. Arty.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty as gunlayer of 18 pr. gun on armoured train from October 14th-17th, 1918. When engaging the enemy armoured train he showed great coolness and ability under accurate fire, setting an admirable example and materially assisting in twice driving off the enemy train. On 16th, when engaging the enemy's position at V.P. 445 over open sights, by a burst of rapid fire he assisted in inflicting many losses on the enemy and in driving off the train.

34728 Vet.-Sjt. F. J. Frape, Can. A.V.C.,
attd. Can. Fd. Arty.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He played a decisive part in the first phase of the attack. Gathering together a number of drivers, he took charge and fought stubbornly, falling back slowly in face of superior numbers. He himself accounted for several of the enemy, this work contributing largely to the saving of the situation. By this check on the enemy time was given for preparation of the defence of the guns.

2100340 Gnr. J. N. Jordan, 16th Bde., Can.
Fd. Arty.

For conspicuous gallantry near Yevsievskaia on 1st March. He volunteered to take a message to the village, having previously repaired the telephone wire many times when cut by shell fire. In taking the message he was shot through both legs; he raised himself and signalled back his inability to go on. He showed great pluck and coolness.

89733 Cpl. R. L. Seaman, 16th Bde., Can.
Fd. Arty.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He was in charge of the forward signallers and advanced with the infantry engaged in the attack on Kodish, 30th December. He was responsible for communication with front line and company headquarters, and several times went forward in front of infantry under heavy fire to establish his line. It was due to his untiring energy and splendid example that communication was kept up. Throughout the operations he behaved admirably.

300812 Cpl. F. E. Wheeler, 16th Bde., Can.
Fd. Arty.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He did excellent work in the first phase of the

attack. He collected a number of drivers about him and fell slowly back through the town, inflicting casualties on the enemy, and himself accounting for six. This first check to the enemy did much towards saving the day. Later he took a party to the beach and brought back small arm ammunition though heavily sniped all the way.

WIRELESS DIRECTION FINDING STATIONS.

1. Wireless direction finding (D.F.) stations are stations set up ashore equipped with receiving apparatus which enables them to ascertain the direction from which wireless signals transmitted by another station emanate.

2. The accuracy with which bearings can be taken depends on the conditions outlined below ;

but, although in general the bearings taken by a station within the sector over which it is designed to work can generally be considered accurate to within two degrees, the administrations controlling these stations cannot accept any responsibility for the consequences of a bearing being inaccurate.

3. It is, however, pointed out that if at least three D.F. stations can be employed and if they are so situated as to give interesting bearings, considerable reliance can be placed upon the result of 3 simultaneous bearings thus obtained, provided that the "triangle of error" (sometimes called the "cocked hat") formed by the intersection of the bearings is small.

4. In order to obtain the greatest possible degree of accuracy, it is important that the ship should not transmit with too much power. Signals should, however, be fairly strong and clear ; great care must be taken to keep the note and strength steady, and to pay strict attention to spacing.

5. It must be borne in mind that it is impossible for the majority of existing D.F. stations to distinguish between a bearing and its reciprocal (i.e., there is always a possible error of 180°), and that bearings are often unreliable at night and in very bad weather, also when the direction runs roughly parallel with the coast line.

6. The methods of asking for and giving bearings and the waves to be used will shortly be standardised by International agreement ; and the particulars of the D.F. stations will eventually appear in the International list of Radiotelegraph stations. Meanwhile, each country is publishing regulations governing the use of its own D.F. stations as set out below.

7. It should be noted that there are two principal systems of D.F. stations at present in use, viz. :—

- (a) Where each D.F. station is fitted with transmitting and receiving gear and works independently of others.
- (b) Where several D.F. stations (all of them usually near a harbour entrance or difficult passage) are linked together by special land telegraph lines, being thus controlled by one station which alone is fitted with transmitting apparatus. (The controlling station in such cases is not necessarily a D.F. station, but may be an ordinary coast station.

REGULATIONS FOR CANADIAN AND NEWFOUNDLAND D.F. STATIONS.

8. The following independent D.F. stations are established :—

9. These stations keep watch and take bearings on the 600-metre wave.

10. A ship requiring a bearing should call the D.F. station required, and transmit a government message requesting the bearing.

Example :—A ship S.S. "Nonsuch," call sign XYZ, calls up Chebucto Head in the ordinary way and, on receiving "K" (go on), makes the message as follows :—

"Call" S Radio Nonsuch 1, 5, 10 (day of month) 10.50 M (time) = Officer in charge Chebucto Head = Request bearing = Master + XYZ.

11. The D.F. station will then acknowledge receipt of the message and, if not ready to take the bearing at once, will direct the ship to wait.

12. When ready to take the bearing, the D.F. station will make "K" (go on), whereupon the ship will make the figure "2" 30 times, commencing with the "Call" and ending with the "Cross" and her own call signal.

13. If the D.F. station is not satisfied with the bearing, it will make the "repeat" sign (?) and the ship will again make the figure "2" as above, but only 20 times.

14. In default of such request for a repetition, the D.F. station does not transmit until it is ready to give the bearing. To do so, the station calls the ship and sends (as a government message) the TRUE bearing of the ship from the station in degrees from 0° to 359°, the angles being measured from true north (0°) clockwise through true east (90°), true south (180°), and true west (270°).

REGULATIONS FOR D.F. STATIONS IN THE UNITED STATES.

15. The following independent D.F. stations are established :

16. The above independent stations are available for use at ranges within 100 miles ; and they keep watch and take bearings on 600 metres wave.

18. These stations are available for use at about 30 miles range from the harbour entrance. They keep watch and take bearings on the 600 metre wave.

19. The ship calls up the station or stations

required, and requests her bearing or position by means of the abbreviations shown below.

Signal.	Meaning.
QTE ?	What is my true bearing ?
QTE	Your true bearing is—degrees from—D.F. station.
QTF ?	What is my position ?
QTF	Your position is latitude—, longitude—.

20. The station will, if necessary, direct the ship to wait and, when ready for taking the bearing, will make "K" (go on).

21. The ship will then transmit :—

- (i.) Her own call signal repeated for 30 seconds.
- (ii.) A "dash" 5 seconds long.
- (iii.) Her own call signal thrice.
- (iv.) A "dash" 5 seconds long.
- (v.) Her own call signal thrice, then a "dash," and so on for one complete minute (*i.e.*, for 1½ minutes in all), finishing with "K" (go on).

22. The station then calls the ship, and makes "QTE" followed by the true bearing in degrees (0° to 359°) as in para. 14, and the name of the D.F. station which obtained the bearing, or else "QTF" and the position in latitude and longitude. All numbers will be spelt out in words.

23. The ship acknowledges receipt by repeating back, in figures, the bearing or bearings or the position as the case may be.

24. When working with independent stations ships should always ask for bearings. Controlling stations may be requested to give bearings or positions as the master may elect.

NOTES.—(1) Peterhead, Berwick and Flamborough are linked by a special land line enabling any one to control the other two if required.

26. All the above D.F. stations keep watch and take bearings on the 450 metres wave (*see note*). Except as shown in the notes they all work as independent stations and can transmit, as well as receive, on 450 metres.

Note.—Ships with Marconi apparatus can adjust their transmitting gear very nearly to this wave (using reduced power) by cutting out half the primary transmitting condenser and adjust-

ing the A.T.1, till the earth lamp shows maximum current in the aerial. The primary slider should be "all in."

27. The actual procedure to be adopted by ships requiring bearings will depend upon what stations are concerned. It should be observed that if the stations to be called do not all keep watch on the same wave (*e.g.*, Malin Head and Larne), bearings should be asked for separately. If on the other hand the stations to be called all keep watch on the same wave (*e.g.*, Lizard and Carnsore), they should be called up together and the bearings taken in one operation. If, however, two or more stations are linked by special land lines (*e.g.*, Peterhead and Berwick), only one of them should be called up (*i.e.*, the nearest of them which is fitted with transmitting apparatus). In such cases, however, the ship must specify in the preliminary signal the D.F. stations which are required to supply bearings.

28. The following abbreviations are to be used:—

Signal.	Meaning.
QTE ? ..	"What is my true bearing from you (or from —) ?"
QTE ..	"Your true bearing from me (or from —) was — degrees."

29. The ship calls the station or stations on the appropriate wave, making "QTE ?" in conjunction, if necessary, with the call signals of the stations from which bearings are required and also (if the call is not made on 450 metres) by the figures "450," signifying that the ship will shift to 450 metres for the taking of the bearing. The ship then awaits instructions.

Example 1.

A ship whose call signal is XYZ requires bearings from Peterhead (BVL) and Berwick (BVG) and thinks that the latter is nearest.

The ship, having first shifted to 450 metres, calls Berwick thus:—

"Call" BVG BVG de XYZ QTE BVL BVG ?

She then awaits instructions.

Example 2.

The ship requires a bearing from Seaview (BXX). The ship has to use 600 metres to call Malin Head (GMH).

She calls on 600 metres, thus:—

"Call" GMH GMH de XYZ QTE BXX ? 450.

She then gets ready to shift to 450 metres and awaits instructions.

30. The station or stations called then make the necessary arrangements and, when ready, answer in alphabetical order of their call signals (if more than one was originally called) and make "K" (go on) preceded by "450" if 450 had been made in the original call.

Example 1.

Berwick, in Example 1 above, warns Peterhead by land line and, when both are ready, makes on 450 metres:—

"Call" XYZ de BVG K.

Example 2.

Malin Head, in Example 2 above, warns

Seaview by land line and then makes on 600 metres:—

"Call" XYZ de GMH 450 K.

Malin Head then shifts to 450 metres so as to be ready to give the result when received by wire from Seaview.

31. On receiving "K," the ship, having shifted transmitting wave to 450 metres (if not already done), then makes her own call signal for 45 seconds and awaits the result.

Example 1.

The ship, in Example 1 above, makes on 450 metres:—

"Call" BVG de XYZ XYZ XYZ, &c. (for 45 seconds) XYZ.

Example 2.

The same as Example 1, reading GMH for BVG.

32. The station or stations then reply (in alphabetical order if more than one) either asking the ship to repeat (?) or giving the result. The result is given by the signal QTE followed as necessary by the call signal and by a group of three figures (000 to 359) indicating the true bearing from 0° to 359°, reckoned as in paragraph 14, of the ship from the station. Several bearings can be combined into one message, each bearing immediately following the call signal of the station which took it. The time of handing in is always expressed in Greenwich mean time for all messages giving bearings to merchant ships.

Example 1.

Peterhead, in Example 1 above, is not satisfied with the bearing and informs Berwick. Berwick makes on 450 metres:—

"Call" XYZ de BVG ?

The ship at once complies by making on 450 metres:

"Call" BVG de XYZ XYZ XYZ, &c. (for 45 seconds) XYZ.

Peterhead is then satisfied that the bearing is 130° and informs Berwick, while Berwick finds that its own result is 37°. Berwick therefore makes 450 metres:

"Call" XYZ XYZ de BVG 1 9. 45 M (time = QTE BVL 130 BVG 037 + BVG.

Example 2.

Seaview, in Example 2 above, gets a satisfactory bearing of 329° and informs Malin Head. The latter makes on 450 metres:—

"Call" XYZ XYZ de GMH 2 10.46 S (time) = QTE BXX 329 + GMH

Example 3.

Had the ship merely asked Lizard (BVY) for a bearing, Lizard, finding it to be 246°, would make on 450 metres:—

"Call" XYZ XYZ de BVY 1 7.6 M (time) = QTE 246 + BVY.

33. The ship, on receiving the result, acknowledges receipt in the ordinary way, and makes the "end of work" sign. This sign is then repeated by the station or stations concerned. It is important that the "end of work" sign should not be omitted, since it not only indicates

that the operation is finished, but it also shows that all concerned are about to resume watch on their normal wave.
