By the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

WHEREAS it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation or Order in Council made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, as amended by the Act now in recital, may, whilst a state of war exists, be varied or added to by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade:

And whereas it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Restriction) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation made under Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, may, whether the Proclamation was made before or after the passing of the Act now in recital, be varied or added to, whilst a state of war exists, by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade:

And whereas by a Proclamation, dated the 10th day of May 1917, and made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, and Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, and Section 1 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, the exportation from the United Kingdom of certain articles to certain or all destinations was prohibited:

And whereas by subsequent Orders of Council, and by the Proclamations dated respectively the 18th day of December 1918, and the 12th day

of March 1919, the said Proclamation was amended and added to in certain particulars:

And whereas there was this day read at the Board a recommendation from the Board of Trade to the following effect:—

That the Proclamation, dated the 10th day of May 1917, as amended and added to by subsequent Orders of Council, and by the Proclamations dated respectively the 18th day of December 1918, and the 12th day of March 1919, should be further amended by making the following amendments in and additions to the Schedule to the same:—

(1) That the following headings should be deleted:—

(A) Aircraft of all kinds and their component parts, together with accessories and articles suitable for use in connection with aircraft;

Chemicals, drugs, dyes, dye-stuffs, and medicinal and pharmaceutical preparations, the following:—

(A) Cinchona bark, its alkaloids and their salts, and preparations of any of these substances;

(A) Copper sulphate;

(B) Coal tar pitch;

Forage and food which may be used for animals, the following:—

(A) Straw;

Provisions and victuals which may be used as food for man, the following:—

(B) Malt sugar (maltose) and articles and preparations containing malt sugar;

(B) Tomato pulp;

(2) That the following headings should be added :—

(A) Aircraft, other than balloons, of all kinds and their component parts, together with accessories and articles suitable for use in connection with aircraft ;

Chemicals, drugs, dyes, dye-stuffs, and medicinal and pharmaceutical preparations, the following :—

(A) Quinine sulphate.

Now, therefore, their Lordships, having taken the said recommendation into consideration, are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the same be approved.

Whereof the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs and Excise, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the consent of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, viz. :—

REGULATIONS RESPECTING OPEN COMPETITIVE EXAMINATIONS FOR THE SITUATION OF TYPIST IN THE GENERAL POST OFFICE, LONDON, AND IN THE INLAND REVENUE DEPARTMENT IN LONDON.

* * * These Regulations are liable to alteration from time to time.

1. The limits of age for this situation are 18 and 30. If an Examination begins in one of the first four months of any year, Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the 1st day of January in that year. If an Examination begins in one of the second four months of any year, Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the 1st day of May in that year. If an Examination begins in one of the last four months of any year Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the 1st day of September in that year.

In reckoning age for Competition, persons who have served for two consecutive years in any Civil situation to which they were admitted with the Certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners may deduct from their actual age any time not exceeding five years which they may have spent in such service.

Persons transferred to situations in the Post Office from a Telephone Company or Municipal Telephone Undertaking, on the absorption of such Company or Undertaking by the Post Office, may reckon, as if it were service in a situation to which they were admitted with the Certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners, their continuous service in the Post Office, as well as so much of their previous continuous service in the Telephone Company or Undertaking (or in any Telephone Company or Municipal Telephone Undertaking previously absorbed by it) as was rendered in situations for which a Civil Service Certificate is ordinarily required.

2. At each Examination the number of Candidates to be selected will be such as may from time to time be fixed.

3. Candidates will be required to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners—

(a) That they are unmarried, or widows.

(b) That they are duly qualified in respect of health and character.

No person will be eligible who is not a natural-born British subject, and the child of a father also a natural-born British subject.

4. Candidates must be at least five feet in height.

5. Persons holding situations in the Civil Service must obtain the permission of the authorities of their Department to attend the examination, dated before the commencement of the competition.

6. Persons who have entered upon or completed a course of education or training for the occupation of teacher, on account of which grants are payable from the Exchequer, will not be

qualified to receive appointments until the consent of the Board of Education in England, the Committee of Council on Education for Scotland, or the Commissioners of National Education, Ireland, as the case may be, given in conformity with the rules sanctioned by the Lords of the Treasury, has been notified to the Civil Service Commissioners.

7. No Candidate will be admitted to Examination who does not, at such time as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners, produce an undertaking, signed by her Parents or Guardians, that she will, if successful, reside either with her parents or guardians, or with relations or friends approved by such parents or guardians.

8. The Examination will be in the following subjects, viz. :—

1. Writing.
2. Spelling.
3. English Composition.
4. Copying Manuscript.
5. Arithmetic (first four rules, simple and compound, including English weights and measures, and reduction).
6. Typewriting.

No Candidate will be regarded as qualified who does not pass to the satisfaction of the Civil Service Commissioners in each of the above-mentioned subjects.

The Civil Service Commissioners may, at their discretion, restrict the examination in Typewriting to such a number of candidates at the head of the list resulting from the marks awarded for the work in the other subjects as they may think fit. The marks awarded for Typewriting to the candidates examined in that subject will be added to the marks awarded to those same candidates for their work in five other subjects. The Examination in Typewriting, as well as the Examination in the other subjects, will be held at such time and places as the Civil Service Commissioners may appoint.

9. Application for permission to attend an Examination must be made at such times and in such manner as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners.

10. A fee of 2s. 6d. will be required from every Candidate attending an Examination.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that an Open Competitive Examination for situations as Typist in the General Post Office, London, and in the Inland Revenue Department in London, will be held in London, Edinburgh, and Dublin, under the foregoing Regulations, commencing on the 12th August 1919.

Appointments will be offered to not fewer than 41 of the Candidates highest on the list, provided they obtain the necessary aggregate of marks and are duly qualified in other respects.

No person will be admitted to Examination from whom the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission has not received, on or before the 10th July, an application, in the Candidate's own handwriting, on a prescribed form, which may be obtained from the Secretary at once.

ORDER OF THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD FOR SCOTLAND, applying Section I. of the Venereal Disease Act, 1917, to Certain Districts and Burghs in the County of Argyll.

To all whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by Section I. of the Venereal Disease Act, 1917, it is enacted as follows :—

“ 1. (1) In any area in which this Section is in operation, a person shall not, unless he is a qualified medical practitioner, for reward either direct or indirect, treat any person for venereal disease, or prescribe any remedy therefor, or give any advice in connection with the treatment thereof, whether the advice is given to the person to be treated or to any other person.

“ (2) This Section shall operate in any area to which it is applied by Order of the Local Government Board, or, in Scotland and Ireland, the Local Government Board for Scotland and Ireland respectively :

“ Provided that no Order shall be made in respect of any area until a scheme for the gratuitous treatment of persons in that area suffering from venereal disease has been approved by the Local Government Board, or in Scotland and Ireland, the Local Government Board for Scotland and Ireland respectively, and is already in operation.”

And whereas the Local Government Board for Scotland have approved a scheme for the gratuitous treatment of persons suffering from venereal disease within the area of the following Districts and Burghs in the County of Argyll, which scheme came into operation on the fifteenth day of May, Nineteen hundred and nineteen, *videlicet* :—

- (1) The Ardnamurchan District of the County of Argyll.
- (2) The Cowal District of the County of Argyll;
- (3) The Islay District of the County of Argyll;
- (4) The Kintyre District of the County of Argyll;
- (5) The Lorn District of the County of Argyll;
- (6) The Mid-Argyll District of the County of Argyll;
- (7) The Mull District of the County of Argyll;
- (8) The Burgh of Inverary;
- (9) The Burgh of Lochgilphead;
- (10) The Burgh of Tobermory.

Now therefore we, the Local Government Board for Scotland, by this our Order, declare that Section One of the Venereal Disease Act, 1917, shall operate from and after the First day of August, Nineteen hundred and nineteen, within the said area.
