WHEREAS it is provided by the Ministry of Transport Act, 1919, that as from such date or dates as His Majesty in Council may by Order determine there shall be transferred to the Minister of Transport all powers and duties of any Government Department in relation to—

- (a) Railways.
- (b) Light Railways.
- (c) Tramways.
- (d) Canals, Waterways, and Inland Navigations.

(e) Roads, Bridges, and Ferries, and Vehicles and Traffic thereon.

(f) Harbours, Docks, and Piers.

And whereas it is further provided by the said Act that His Majesty in Council may by Order except from such transfer any particular powers or duties or provide for the exercise or performance of any power or duty so excepted by the Minister of Transport concurrently or in consultation with or at the instance of the Government Department concerned or by the Government Department concerned concurrently or in consultation with the Minister of Transport :

And whereas it is further provided that His Majesty may by Order make such incidental, consequential, and supplemental provisions as may be necessary or expedient for the purpose of giving full effect to any transfer of powers or duties as aforesaid :

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order and it is hereby ordered as follows :—

1. This Order may be cited as the Ministry of Transport (Board of Trade Exception of Powers) Order, 1919.

2. The date upon which the powers as aforesaid of the Board of Trade are transferred to the Minister of Transport shall be the twenty-third day of September 1919.

3. The particular powers and duties specified in the Schedule to this Order shall be

excepted from the powers and duties of the Board of Trade transferred by the said Act to the Minister of Transport.

SCHEDULE.

Powers and duties of the Board of Trade in relation to matters aforesaid excepted from transfer under this Order.

All powers and duties under the following enactments :—

The Lands Clauses Acts—

Section 36 of the Railway Company's Act, 1867.

Sections 3, 7, 20, 25, and 31 of the Railway and Canal Traffic Act, 1888.

Sections 5 and 13 of the Light Railways Act, 1896.

Powers and duties so far as they relate to navigation under the following enactments :—

Preliminary Enquiries Act, 1851.

Harbour Transfer Act, 1862.

Sections 7 to 11 of the General Pier and Harbour Acts Amendment Act, 1862.

Any Local, Special or Private Act.

Powers and duties under Section 8 (in regard to appointment of two Commissioners after consultation with persons and associations concerned in the use of the River Thames as a place of recreation) and sub-sections (1) and (2) of Section 27 of the Port of London Act, 1908.

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order and it is hereby ordered as follows :—

1. This Order may be cited as the Ministry of Transport (Ministry of Health Exception of Powers) Order, 1919.

2. The date on which the powers as aforesaid of the Minister of Health are transferred to the Minister of Transport shall be the twenty-third day of September 1919.

3. There shall be excepted from such transfer

(i) the powers and duties of the Minister of Health in regard to the matters aforesaid of giving sanction to the borrowing of money by Local Authorities ;

(ii) the powers and duties of the Minister of Health under the Housing Acts, 1890 to 1919 ;

(iii) the powers and duties of the Minister of Health with respect to the confirmation of by-laws made by Local Authorities other than by laws made under Section 26 of the Highways and Locomotives (Amendment) Act, 1878, and by-laws made under Section 6 of the Locomotives Act, 1898.

Provided that in the exercise of the powers so excepted so far as they relate to roads, bridges, vehicles, and traffic thereon, the Minister of Health shall act in consultation with the Minister of Transport.

2. The date as from which the powers and duties in relation to the matters aforesaid of the Road Board are transferred to the Minister of Transport shall be the twenty-third day of September 1919.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by sub-section (1) of Section 11 of the Ministry of Health Act, 1919, it is enacted that the Act shall come into operation upon such day or days as may be appointed by Order in Council, and that different days may be appointed for different purposes and provisions of the Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, in pursuance of the Ministry of Health Act, 1919, and of all other powers enabling Him in that behalf, is pleased to order; and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The appointed day shall be the first day of October 1919, in the case of the following paragraphs of the said Act, namely:—

(a) Paragraph (c) of sub-section (1) of Section 3 of the Act, which relates to the powers of the Board of Education with respect to attending to the health of expectant mothers and nursing mothers, and of children who have not attained the age of 5 years, and are not in attendance at schools recognised by the Board of Education; and

(b) Paragraph (f) of the same sub-section, which relates to powers of supervising the administration of Part I. of the Children Act, 1908, heretofore exercised by the Secretary of State.

2. The Interpretation Act, 1889, applies for the purpose of the interpretation of this Order as it applies for the interpretation of an Act of Parliament.

3. This Order may be cited as the Ministry of Health Act, 1919 (Date of Commencement) Order (No. 2), 1919.

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the before-mentioned Act, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as "The Consular Fees (Amendment) Order in Council, 1919."

2. The following fee is hereby established, and shall be deemed to be substituted for Fee No. 75 in Part II. of the Table of Fees annexed respectively to "The Consular Fees (General) Order in Council," "The China (Consular and Marriage Fees) Order in Council, 1906," and "The Japan (Consular and Marriage Fees) Order in Council, 1906":—

"75. *Visa* of a passport valid for a single journey, five shillings (5s.).

"Ditto, valid for more than a single journey one pound (£1)."

3. In all copies of the Orders in Council referred to in the preceding articles which may be printed after the commencement of this Order, the fee directed by this Order to be varied in the tables of fees annexed to the said Orders shall be thus varied.

And the Right Honourable Arthur James Balfour, O.M., one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein.

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give
notice that the following Regulations are pub-
lished with the consent of the Lords Commis-
sioners of His Majesty's Treasury, viz. :—

REGULATIONS RESPECTING OPEN COMPETITIVE
EXAMINATIONS FOR THE SITUATION OF
FEMALE SORTING ASSISTANT IN THE GENERAL
POST OFFICE, LONDON, AND IN THE GENERAL
REGISTER OFFICE, LONDON.

*These Regulations are liable to alteration for
future examinations.*

1. The limits of age for these situations are
15 and 18. If an Examination begins in one
of the first six months of any year, Candidates
must be of the prescribed age on the first day
of April in that year. If an Examination
begins in one of the last six months of any

year, Candidates must be of the prescribed age
on the first day of October in that year.

In reckoning age for competition, persons
who have served for two full consecutive years
in any Civil situation to which they were ad-
mitted with the Certificate of the Civil Service
Commissioners may deduct from their actual
age any time not exceeding five years which they
may have spent in such service.

Persons transferred to situations in the Post
Office from a Telephone Company or Municipal
Telephone Undertaking, on the absorption of
such Company or Undertaking by the Post
Office, may reckon as if it were service in a
situation to which they were admitted with the
Certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners,
their continuous service in the Post Office, as
well as so much of their previous continuous
service in the Telephone Company or Under-
taking (or in any Telephone Company or Muni-
cipal Telephone Undertaking previously ab-
sorbed by it) as was rendered in situations for
which a Civil Service Certificate is ordinarily
required.

2. Candidates will be required to satisfy the
Civil Service Commissioners—

(a) That they are unmarried or widows.

(b) That they are duly qualified in respect
of health and character.

No person will be eligible who is not a natural-
born British subject, and the daughter of a
father also a natural-born British subject.

3. At each Examination the number of
Candidates to be selected will be such as may
from time to time be fixed.

4. The Examination will be in the following
subjects, viz. :—

1. Reading MS.
2. Writing.
3. Spelling.
4. Arithmetic.
5. Geography.

Candidates must pass in Writing and obtain
such an aggregate number of marks as to satisfy
the Civil Service Commissioners.

5. No Candidate will be admitted to Examina-
tion who does not, at such time as may be fixed
by the Civil Service Commissioners, produce
an undertaking signed by her parent or
guardian, that she will, if successful, reside
either with her parents or guardians, or with
relations or friends approved by such parents or
guardians.

6. Candidates for the Post Office Service
must be at least 5 feet in height.

7. Persons holding situations in the Civil
Service must obtain the permission of the
authorities of their Department to attend the
Examination, before the commencement of the
competition.

8. Persons who have entered upon or com-
pleted a course of education or training for
the occupation of teacher, on account of which
grants are payable from the Exchequer, will
not be qualified to receive appointments until
the consent of the Board of Education in Eng-
land, the Committee of Council on Education
for Scotland, or the Commissioners of National
Education, Ireland, as the case may be, given
in conformity with rules sanctioned by the
Lords of the Treasury, has been notified to the
Civil Service Commissioners.

9. Application for permission to attend an

Examination must be made at such time and in such manner as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners.

10. A fee of 3s. will be required from every Candidate attending an Examination.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that an Open Competitive Examination will be held in London, under the foregoing Regulations, on the 27th November 1919.

Appointments will be offered to not fewer than 100 of the Candidates highest on the list, provided they obtain the necessary aggregate of marks and are duly qualified in other respects.

No person will be admitted to Examination from whom the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission has not received, on or before the 30th October 1919, an application on the prescribed form, which may be obtained from the Secretary at once.

TRADE BOARDS ACTS, 1909 AND 1918.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour and dated 31st October 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, in Great Britain, for the Branches of Trade specified in the Trade Boards (Brush and Broom) Order, 1919, hereby give Notice as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they propose to fix General Minimum Time Rates, Piece-Work Basis Time Rates and Overtime Rates, and to Declare the Normal Number of Hours of Work in the Trade for the purpose of the application of the Overtime Rates as follows:—

SECTION I.

Proposed General Minimum Time-Rates for Male Workers.

- A. For Male Workers of 21 years of age and over who are employed in one or more of the following operations or branches of work, and who have had not less than three years' experience in one or more of the following operations or branches of work, that is to say: "Pan" (Hair and Bass), "Hairs," "Finishing" (*i.e.*, the work of all wood-workers employed in finishing or part-finishing brushes or brooms by hand or machine), "Boring" (Hand and Machine Boring), "Drawing," "Bone Brush Cutting," "Bone Brush Fashioning," "Bone Brush Drilling," "Bone Brush Profiling," "Bone Brush Polishing," the manufacture of Painting Brushes, the manufacture of Whitewash, Tar, and Miscellaneous Brushes, 1s. 5½d. per hour.
- B. For Male Workers of all ages who have served an apprenticeship of not less than five years in one or more of the operations or branches of work specified in paragraph A above, 1s. 5½d. per hour.
- C. For all other Male Workers:
 - Workers of 21 years of age and over, 1s. 2d. per hour.
 - Workers of 20 and under 21 years of age, 1s. 0d. per hour.
 - Workers of 19 and under 20 years of age, 10d. per hour.
 - Workers of 18 and under 19 years of age, 8d. per hour.

Workers of 17½ and under 18 years of age, 7½d. per hour.

Workers of 17 and under 17½ years of age, 6½d. per hour.

Workers of 16½ and under 17 years of age, 6d. per hour.

Workers of 16 and under 16½ years of age, 5½d. per hour.

Workers of 15½ and under 16 years of age, 4¾d. per hour.

Workers of 15 and under 15½ years of age, 4d. per hour.

Workers of 14½ and under 15 years of age, 3½d. per hour.

Workers under 14½ years of age, 3d. per hour.

Provided that the rates set out in paragraph C. above shall *not* apply to apprentices.

SECTION II.

Proposed General Minimum Time-Rates for Female Workers.

For Workers of 21 years of age and over, 8¼d. per hour.

For Workers of 18 and under 21 years of age, 8d. per hour.

For Workers of 17½ and under 18 years of age, 7½d. per hour.

For Workers of 17 and under 17½ years of age, 6½d. per hour.

For Workers of 16½ and under 17 years of age, 6d. per hour.

For Workers of 16 and under 16½ years of age, 5½d. per hour.

For Workers of 15½ and under 16 years of age, 4¾d. per hour.

For Workers of 15 and under 15½ years of age, 4d. per hour.

For Workers of 14½ and under 15 years of age, 3½d. per hour.

For Workers under 14½ years of age, 3d. per hour.

Provided that in the case of any worker who enters the trade for the first time at or over the age of 16 and who is employed on time work, the minimum rates payable during the worker's first twelve months' employment shall be the respective minimum rates set out above appropriate to a worker six months younger, in lieu of the rates otherwise applicable.

SECTION III.

Proposed Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates for Female Workers.

(a) For Female Workers other than Home Workers, 9¼d. per hour.

(b) For Female Home Workers, 9¼d. per hour.

The Piece-Work Basis Time Rates are for the purpose of securing as respects each of the above-mentioned classes of workers that, in the case of all female workers employed on piece-work, each piece rate paid shall be such as would yield in the circumstances of the case, not less than 9¼d. an hour to an ordinary worker.

SECTION IV.

Proposed Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers whether employed on Time-Work or on Piece-Work.

1. In accordance with Section 3 (i) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board pro-

pose to declare the normal number of hours of work to be as follows:—

In any week	48
On any day (other than Saturday)	9
On Saturday	5

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

2. And the Trade Board propose to fix Overtime Rates in respect of hours worked by a worker whether engaged on Time-work or on Piece-work in excess of such normal number of hours as follows, that is to say:

- (a) For the first two hours Overtime on any day, except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to *time-and-a-quarter*, that is to say, one-and-a-quarter times the minimum rate otherwise applicable.
- (b) For Overtime after the first two hours of Overtime on any day, except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to *time-and-a-half*, that is to say, one-and-a-half times the minimum rate otherwise applicable.
- (c) For all time worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to *double time*, that is to say, twice the minimum rate otherwise applicable.
- (d) For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48, the Overtime Rates shall be *time-and-a-quarter for the first two hours and time-and-a-half thereafter*, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraph 2 (a), (b), and (c) above.

Provided that where it is or may become the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on five days a week, the Overtime rate shall only be payable where on any day the number of hours worked exceeds 9½.

Provided also that where it is or may become the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on alternate Saturdays, the normal number of hours for the week in which attendance on Saturday is required shall be deemed to be 50.

SECTION V.

The above minimum rates shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION VI.

- (a) For the purpose of this Notice the expression "Home Worker" means a worker who works in his or her own home or in any other place not under the control or management of the employer.
- (b) For the purpose of this Notice the expression "Apprentices" means Indentured Ap-

prentices and Unbound Learners employed under an agreement, written or verbal, providing for the proper instruction of the Learner in one or more of the operations or branches of work specified in Section I. (A) above for a period of not less than five years, and the expression "Apprenticeship" shall have a corresponding meaning.

SECTION VII.

The above rates shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts and of this Notice, to all Workers (including Home Workers) in Great Britain who are employed during the whole or any part of their time in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Brush and Broom) Order, 1919, that is to say, the manufacture of brushes (other than feather brushes) or brooms, *including* the following operations, where all or any of them are carried on in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of such Brushes or Brooms:

- (a) The drafting, dressing or mixing of bass, whisk or similar fibres or animal bristles or hair and the working or wood, bone, ivory or celluloid;
- (b) All finishing, warehousing, packing or other operations incidental to or appertaining to the manufacture of such Brushes or Brooms,

but *excluding* the following operations:

The sawing and turning of wood as a preliminary operation to the manufacture of such brushes or brooms, the making of metal parts and the mounting of brushes with metal or tortoise-shell backs.

Provided that the rates shall not apply to workers employed as Carmen, Engineers, Powermen, Enginemen or Stokers.

SECTION VIII.

THE ABOVE MINIMUM RATES ARE WITHOUT PREJUDICE TO WORKERS WHO ARE EARNING HIGHER RATES OF WAGES.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above Proposals which may be lodged with them within two months from the 23rd September 1919.

Such Objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Brush and Broom Trade Board (Great Britain), 5 Chancery Lane, London, W.C. 2.

It is desirable that the Objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

Application for further information as to the rates proposed to be fixed should be made to the Secretary of the Trade Board.
