In pursuance of the powers conferred on him by the Trade Boards Acts, 1909 and 1918, the Minister of Labour is pleased to establish a Trade Board for the Hair, Bass and Fibre Trade in Great Britain, as specified in the Trade Boards (Hair, Bass and Fibre) Order, 1919, namely:—

The drafting, dressing or mixing of bass, whisk or similar fibres or horse hair or other hairs and the curling or weaving of hair or fibre or of mixed hair and fibre, and all preparatory, finishing, warehousing or packing operations incidental to or appertaining to all or any of the above processes, but excluding any of the above operations or processes where they are carried on in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of brushes or brooms, and excluding also the dressing of animal skins.

ACQUISITION OF LAND (ASSESSMENT OF COMPENSATION) FEES RULES, 1920.

In pursuance of subsection (6) of section three of the Acquisition of Land (Assessment of Compensation) Act, 1919, the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury hereby make the following rules:—

1. (1) These rules may be cited as the Acquisition of Land (Assessment of Compensation) Fees Rules, 1920.

(2) In these rules the expression "the Act" means the Acquisition of Land (Assessment of Compensation) Act, 1919.

2. On every application for the selection of an arbitrator made in accordance with the rules made under the Act by the Reference Committee there shall be paid the fee of £1.

3. (1) On an award made by an official arbitrator under the Act there shall be paid a fee calculated by reference to the amount awarded to the claimant in accordance with the following scale:—

SCALE OF FEES ON AWARDS.

Amount Awarded.	Amount of Fee.
Not exceeding £200	£5, 5s.
Exceeding £200 but not exceeding £500	£5, 5s., with an addition of £1, 1s. in respect of every £50 or part of £50 by which the amount awarded exceeds £200.
„ £500 but not exceeding £1000	£11, 11s., with an addition of £1, 1s. in respect of every £100 or part of £100 by which the amount awarded exceeds £500.
„ £1000	£16, 16s., with an addition of £1, 1s. in respect of every £200 or part of £200 by which the amount awarded exceeds £1000, but not exceeding in any case £105.

(2) In addition to the fee payable under the scale aforesaid, there shall, where the hearing before the arbitrator in respect of any claim or matter referred to him occupies more than one day, be paid for each day or part of a day after the first day a further fee on the following scale:—

Amount Awarded.	Amount of Fee.
Not exceeding £500	£5, 5s.
Exceeding £500 and not exceeding £5000	£10, 10s.
„ £5000 „ „ £20,000	£21, 0s.
„ £20,000	£42, 0s.

For the purpose of the foregoing provision—

Any time spent by the arbitrator in viewing any land which is the subject matter of the proceedings before him shall be treated as part of the hearing.

A day shall be taken to be a working period of five hours.

* Section 8 of the Corn Returns Act, 1882, provides that where returns of purchases of British Corn are made to the local inspector of Corn Returns in any other measure than the imperial bushel or by weight or by a weighed measure, that Officer shall convert such returns into the imperial bushel, and in the case of weight or weighed measure the conversion is to be made at the rate of sixty imperial pounds for every bushel of wheat, fifty imperial pounds for every bushel of barley, and thirty-nine imperial pounds for every bushel of oats.
