

200596 Sjt. P. Williams, 1/4th Bn., S. Lan. R., T.F. (Warrington).

Since February, 1915, he has served continuously with gallantry and devotion to duty. He has repeatedly been in command of important working parties under heavy fire.

25391 C./S./M. R. T. Williams, M.M., 17th Bn., R.W. Fus. (Holywell).

On the 4th November, 1918, during the attack on Mormal Forest, he was untiring in his efforts in assisting his officer commanding his company. He displayed the greatest courage in reorganising the company under heavy fire, and was wounded whilst so doing. His gallantry on this and many previous occasions was a pattern to all ranks.

17262 Sjt. T. Williams, 3rd Bn., M.G. Corps (Mowbray).

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Early in the attack on Seranvillers, on 8th October, 1918, his officer was wounded, and he pushed on to give covering fire to the attacking infantry. When the objectives were gained he placed his guns for the defence of the final objective, and very materially assisted in beating off an enemy counter-attack with Tanks.

13435 A./B./Q./M./S. W. Williams, 119th Bn., 27th Bde., R.F.A. (Cardiff).

For great gallantry and devotion to duty. On 22nd October, 1918, at Briastre, when the enemy put down a very heavy barrage on the wagon line, he immediately took charge and by very skilful handling managed to get the whole wagon line clear of the shelling, with the exception of four horses, which were killed.

320121 Sjt. W. Williams, 24th Bn., Welsh R. (Nantgaredig).

For gallant and able leadership on 7th September, 1918, during the advance from Templeux la Fosse. When his company suffered heavy casualties from enemy barrage he reorganised two platoons, pushed on and obtained his objective. But for his initiative the line would have been held up.

414726 2/Cpl. D. McL. Williamson, 423rd (W. Lancs.) Fd. Coy., R.E., T.F. (Kirkintilloch).

For gallantry during the advance in October and November, 1918, in making forward reconnaissances in close contact with the enemy, provided valuable information as regards the condition of roads and bridges.

81392 Cpl. W. Williamson, 13th Bn., R. Fus., attd. 112th T.M. Bn. (Salford).

In action he has always proved himself to be a keen, fearless and capable leader, full of initiative and remarkably cheerful under the most adverse circumstances. He has always been a good influence in the battery.

1102 Pte. T. H. Willis, VII. Corps, Cyc. Bn., A.C.C. (Crondall).

For conspicuous gallantry and good work under shell fire whilst on traffic control duty on the Ypres-Zonnebeke road. On 28th September, 1918, he pushed forward his post as the advance progressed to the extent of three kilometres, controlling traffic over

badly shelled and mine-cratered roads, and materially assisting in the advance of guns and ammunition.

301487 S./S./M. T. Wills, 14th Bn., Tank Corps (Musbury, Devon).

He has shown conspicuous devotion to duty and gallantry at all times. He has always set a grand example of courage and discipline, and in action has displayed considerable power of command and leadership.

268329 Sjt. A. Wilson, 1/7th Bn., R. Highrs., T.F. (Kirknewton).

For conspicuous gallantry and good leadership. As platoon serjeant he has on many occasions cleared up difficult situations through his power of leadership. In particular he carried out very gallant and valuable work during the month of October.

19062 Sjt. (A./C./Q./M./S.) E. G. Wilson, 16th Bn., R.W. Fus. (Ruabon).

His work has at all times maintained a high standard. During active operations he was up in the front line with rations and often came under heavy fire, acting with utter disregard of his own safety.

241679 Sjt. H. Wilson, 1/8th Bn., Notts. & Derby. R., T.F. (Chesterfield).

For courage and devotion to duty during the actions at Bellenglise on 29th September, 1918, Montbrehain on 3rd October, and Regnicourt on 17th October, 1918. In the first action he did most excellent work. In the other two actions he was in command of his platoon, which he led, gaining and consolidating all objectives.

3191 R./Q./M./S. H. J. Wilson, 4th Bn., K.R.R.C. (Kingston-on-Thames).

He has done exceptionally good work in the field during the recent heavy fighting, in which the battalion has been engaged, 3rd October-11th November, 1918. He has never failed to get rations up to the men in the firing line, though continually faced with situations of the greatest danger and difficulty, demanding the exercise of determination.

6/40563 Cpl. (A./Sjt.) R. Wilson, 6th Bn., Cam. Highrs. (Dalmeir).

He on two occasions at Soissons, in July, 1918, and again at Hulluch in September, 1918, in the absence of an officer, had full control of a platoon during active operations. On both occasions he displayed conspicuous gallantry in the leading of his men, always showing sound judgment.

7499 Pte. (A./Sjt.) T. Wilson, 2nd Bn., R. Highrs. (Lochgelly). (PALESTINE)

He has taken part in every action which the battalion has been engaged in throughout the war, and his conduct has been no less conspicuous for gallantry and devotion to duty under fire than for unvarying endurance and good work on many hard and trying marches, especially on the 19th-20th September, 1918.

22102 Sjt. W. Wilson, 58th Bn., M.G. Corps (Bolton).

During the fighting on the Somme he has on several occasions taken charge of a sub-
