All the subjects in Class I. must be taken up. From Classes II. and III. Candidates may select subjects, one of which must be a language, carrying marks up to a maximum of 10,000, making with the subjects in Class I. 15,000 in all. The same subject may not be selected both in Class II. and in Class III.

No Candidate will be eligible who fails to pass a qualifying examination in Arithmetic and English, and to obtain such an aggregate number of marks in the examination as a whole as to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners.

4. Application for permission to attend an Examination must be made in the writing of the Candidate, at such times and in such manner as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners.

5. A fee of £3 will be required from each Candidate attending an Examination.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that an Open Competitive Examination for situations as Assistant Inspector of Taxes in the Inland Revenue Department will be held in London, Edinburgh, and Dublin on the 13th July 1920, under the foregoing Regulations.

Appointments will be offered to not fewer than 100 of the Candidates highest on the list, provided they obtain the necessary aggregate of marks and are duly qualified in other respects,

No person will be admitted to Examination from whom the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission has not received, on or before the 20th May, an application on the prescribed form, which may be obtained from the Secretary at once.
