GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE CHURCH OF SCOTLAND, 1920.

NOTICE is hereby given that His Majesty's Lord High Commissioner to the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland will hold a Levée at His Majesty's Palace of Holyrood House, at 10.30 A.M., on Tuesday the 18th day of May, being the first day of Meeting of the General Assembly, on which occasion all those holding His Majesty's Commission or other Gentlemen are required to appear in Uniform Military Service Dress (with Swords), Court, Highland or Evening Dress.

There will be no Procession but Their Graces will drive in semi-state by the Calton Hill, Princes Street, and the Mound.

His Grace will attend Divine Service in the High Church on Sunday the 23rd of May.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Order of His Majesty in Council, bearing date the thirtieth day of May 1919, and known as the East Africa Order in Council, 1919, it was amongst other things provided that as from the coming into operation of the said Order the Seventh Article of the East Africa Order in Council, 1906, should be revoked, and the following Article should be substituted therefor, that is to say:—

“VII. There shall be a Legislative Council in and for the Protectorate, constituted in such manner as may be directed by any Instructions under His Majesty's Sign Manual and Signet, and as may be provided by any law for the time being in force in the Protectorate.

“From and after the date of the coming into operation of this Order, the present Legislative Council shall cease to exist.”

And whereas by the said Order in Council it was further provided that that Order should be published in the Official Gazette of the East
