

THE REPRESENTATION OF THE PEOPLE (ADAPTA-
TION OF ACTS, No. 3) (SCOTLAND) ORDER,
1920, DATED 7TH JUNE 1920.

Whereas by Section 42 of the Representation of the People Act, 1918 (hereinafter referred to as "the Act"), the provisions of the Sixth Schedule to the Act with respect to the adaptation of Acts have effect for the purpose of adapting the law to the provisions of the Act, and by paragraph 7 of the said Schedule it is provided that as respects Scotland, the Secretary for Scotland may by Order make such further adaptations in the provisions of any Act as may seem to him necessary to make those provisions conform with the provisions of the Act, and that any Order so made shall operate as if enacted in the Act:

And whereas certain adaptations in the provisions of the Glasgow Corporation (General Powers) Act, 1896, appear to me, the undersigned, His Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, to be necessary to make the said provisions conform with the provisions of the Act:

Now, therefore, in pursuance of my powers in that behalf, I hereby Order as follows:—

Article I. The following adaptations shall be made in the provisions of Section 12 of the Glasgow Corporation (General Powers) Act, 1896, that is to say:—

- (i) Subsection (1) of the said Section shall be deleted.
- (ii) In Subsection (2) the words from "and the town clerk" to "such parish" inclusive, shall be deleted.
- (iii) In Subsection (5) the words from "preparation" to "incurred in the" (where second occurring) inclusive, shall be deleted, and the word "any" shall be inserted immediately before the words "such parish" (where second occurring).

Article II. This Order may be cited as the Representation of the People (Adaptation of Acts, No. 3) (Scotland) Order, 1920.
