PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 12th day of June 1920, in the words following, viz. :—

“Whereas Your Majesty has been graciously pleased to sanction the provision and maintenance of a Naval Force by the Dominion of Canada and to approve of such Naval Force being designated the Royal Canadian Navy :

“And whereas provision has been made by the Parliament of the Dominion of Canada for the application to the Royal Canadian Navy of the Naval Discipline Act, 1866, as amended by any subsequent enactment, and of the Regulations for the government of the Royal Navy for the time being in force as regards disciplinary matters and for the coming into operation in relation to the Royal Canadian Navy of the Naval Discipline (Dominion Naval Forces) Act, 1911 :

“And whereas it is desirable that the Officers of the Royal Canadian Navy shall be interchangeable with those of the Royal Navy and that all such Officers shall rank with those of the Royal Navy according to their rank and the dates of their Commissions :

“And whereas this object will be secured if the Officers of the Royal Navy and the Royal

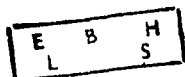
Canadian Navy have Commissions which will be effective both in the Royal Navy and in the Royal Canadian Navy :

“And whereas subject to Your Majesty's approval, it has been agreed between us and the Government of the Dominion of Canada that Commissions which may be granted for service in Your Majesty's Fleet, whether by us or by the Governor-General of the Dominion of Canada, shall include service both in the Royal Navy and in the Royal Canadian Navy, and that all Naval Commissions hitherto issued, whether by us or in accordance with the law in force in the Dominion of Canada shall be deemed to have been issued for service in Your Majesty's Fleet :

“We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to declare Your approval of the agreement aforesaid and to authorise us to grant Commissions for service in Your Majesty's Fleet as hereinafter defined to any Officers of the Royal Navy and to authorise the Governor-General of the Dominion of Canada to grant Commissions for service in Your Majesty's Fleet as hereinafter defined to any Officers of the Royal Canadian Navy :

“And we also beg leave humbly to recommend that your Majesty may by such Order in Council declare that in all future Commissions that may be granted in the Royal Navy or the Royal Canadian Navy the expression “Service in Your Majesty's Fleet” shall include service in the Royal Navy and in the Royal Canadian Navy :

“And further that all Naval Commissions



issued, hitherto, whether by us or in accordance with the law in force in the Dominion of Canada, may be deemed to have been issued for service in Your Majesty's Fleet as above defined."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 9th day of June 1920, in the words following, viz. :—

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council :

"And whereas by Your Majesty's Order in Council, dated the 22nd day of January 1920, it was enacted, *inter alia*, that an allowance of 2s. 6d. per diem should be paid to Surgeon Lieutenants, Surgeon Lieutenant-Commanders, and Surgeon Commanders who have specialised in certain professional subjects, provided in the case of Surgeon Commanders that they are not appointed solely for such specialist duties and that the number of such officers to whom the said allowance is payable at any one time is limited to 44, in the following proportion :—

Anæsthetists	not to exceed	6
Ophthalmology	" "	13
Ear and Throat	" "	13
Genito-Urinary and Venereal	" "	6
Physical Training	" "	6

"And whereas we are of opinion that the said allowance should also be payable to Officers who have specialised in Bacteriology and Pathology, and that the number of Officers to whom the said allowance is payable at any one time should be increased to 46 and should not be confined to any particular number in any particular subject provided the total number of 46 is not exceeded :

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the payment of an allowance of 2s. 6d. per diem to Surgeon Lieutenants, Surgeon Lieutenant-Commanders, and Surgeon Commanders who have specialised in professional subjects as indicated below, pro-

vided that the said allowance is not paid to more than 46 Officers at any one time and, in the case of Surgeon Commanders, that they are not appointed solely for such specialist duties :—

Anæsthetists.
Ophthalmology.
Ear and Throat.
Genito-Urinary and Venereal.
Physical Training.
Bacteriology.
Pathology.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 16th day of June 1920, in the words following, viz. :—

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council :

"And whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, bearing date the 19th day of July 1912, to approve of the institution of the rank of Mate with a view to the advancement of Warrant Officers and Petty Officers to Commissioned Rank at an earlier age than was possible under previous regulations :

"And whereas by Your Majesty's Order in Council, dated 21st January 1914, sanction was given, *inter alia*, for Acting Mates (E), failing to qualify for confirmation as Mate (E), to be regarded as eligible for promotion to Artificer Engineer, irrespective of qualifying service, if not already holding that rank :

"And whereas we are of opinion that it is desirable that promotion from the Lower Deck to Commissioned Rank should be obtainable at an earlier age than is at present possible, in order that Officers so promoted may have fuller opportunity of reaching high rank in Your Majesty's Service ; and further that any Acting Mates (E), not promoted from Warrant Rank, who revert to their former ratings after failing to qualify for confirmation for the rank of Mate (E), should be required to fulfil the same conditions for pro-

motion to Warrant Rank as are applicable to other candidates :

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to sanction the following proposals :—

"1. Leading Seamen, Leading Signalmen, and Leading Telegraphists, as well as Warrant Officers and Petty Officers, to be eligible for selection for the rank of Acting Mate.

"Candidates finally selected by the Admiralty to be promoted to the rank of Acting Mate on appointment to undergo their courses.

"Acting Mates to be confirmed with their original seniority on satisfactorily completing all their courses.

"2. The provision in the Order in Council of 21st January 1914, for Acting Mates (E), not promoted from Warrant Rank, who fail to qualify for confirmation to the rank of Mate (E) and are reverted to their former ratings, to be promoted to Warrant Rank irrespective of qualifying service, to be cancelled.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals where necessary."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 14th day of June 1920, in the words following, viz. :—

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council :

"And whereas payment of Separation Allowances and kindred allowances in respect of members of Your Majesty's Marine Force borne on the books of Your Majesty's Ships during the period of hostilities has been duly sanctioned by Your Majesty's Orders in Council but payment of those allowances in respect of Marines not so borne has not yet received such sanction :

"And whereas when borne on shore strength Marines are subject to the provisions of the Army Act and of the Regulations and Orders for the Army, and Separation and kindred Allowances have, in consequence, been paid in respect of Marines while borne for service on shore at rates

sanctioned from time to time by Your Majesty's Royal Warrant :

"And whereas in view of the conditions of Service which render Marines liable to serve afloat as well as on shore, and in order to avoid confusion, the Naval Regulations generally govern the issue of payment in respect of Marines on shore strength, whilst the rates payable are those in force for Your Majesty's Army :

"And whereas we consider it undesirable that such difference between rates payable in respect of Marines serving afloat and those on shore strength shall be continued :

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to sanction the payments of Separation Allowance, Family Allowance, Parents' Allowance, London Allowance and Allotment Concession, which have already been effected at rates in force for Your Majesty's Army, and such further payments of these Allowances and their issue under Navy Regulations as may be so made up to the 30th September 1920, in respect of members of Your Majesty's Marine Force while not borne on the books of Your Majesty's Ships :

"As from 1st October 1920, Marines on shore strength to be entitled to Separation Allowances at the same rates and under the same conditions as may then be applicable to Seamen and Marines borne on the books of Your Majesty's Ships.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by treaty, grant, usage, sufferance, and other lawful means, His Majesty the King has jurisdiction in China :

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in that behalf by "The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890," or otherwise, in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :—

1. This Order may be cited as "The China Order in Council, 1920," and shall be read as one with "The China Order in Council, 1904" (hereinafter called the "Principal Order"), and with any Order amending the same.

2. The words in Article 119 (f) of the Principal Order "not exceeding, as regards any matters provided for by 'The Consular Salaries and Fees Act, 1891,' fees fixed and allowed from time to time by any Order in Council made under that Act" are repealed.

3. The words in Article 164 of the Principal Order "shall, if not paid in British gold, be paid in China in British or Mexican dollars at the rate of exchange fixed periodically by the Treasury" are repealed, and the following words are substituted therefor:—

"shall, if not paid in British gold, be paid in China in dollar currency at the rate of 10 dollars to the pound sterling."

4. Any fee paid previous to the making of this Order shall be deemed to be valid if paid in accordance with the provisions of Articles 2 and 3 of this Order.

5. This Order shall take effect on the day on which it is first exhibited in the public office of the Supreme Court at Shanghai.

And the Right Honourable George Nathaniel, Earl Curzon of Kedleston, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein.

WHEREAS by "The Consular Salaries and Fees Act, 1891," His Majesty the King is authorised, by Order in Council, to fix the fees to be taken in respect of any matter or thing done by a consular officer in the execution of his office, and to vary such fees by way of increase or decrease, and to abolish fees and to create new fees:

And whereas by "The China (Consular and Marriage Fees) Order in Council, 1906," the several fees set forth in the tables annexed to the said Order were established, and it was provided that the said tables and notes thereto should be construed as part of the said Order:

And whereas it is expedient to amend the said notes in certain respects:

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the before-mentioned Act, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of his Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as "The China (Consular and Marriage Fees) Order in Council, 1920."

2. Note 5 to the tables annexed to "The China (Consular and Marriage Fees) Order in Council,

1906," is repealed, and the following provision is substituted therefor:—

"5. The above fees, if not paid in British gold, are to be paid in China in dollar currency at the rate of 10 dollars to the pound sterling."

3. Any fee paid previous to the making of this Order shall be deemed to be valid if paid in accordance with the provisions of Article 2 of this Order.

4. This Order shall take effect on the day on which it is first exhibited in the public office of the Supreme Court at Shanghai.

And the Right Honourable George Nathaniel, Earl Curzon of Kedleston, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein.

PROFITEERING.

ORDER OF THE TRADE BOARD, DATED JUNE 11, 1920, UNDER SECTION 2 OF THE PROFITEERING ACT, 1919 (9 & 10 GEO. 5, C. 66), AMENDING THE REGULATIONS AND DIRECTIONS AS TO THE CONSTITUTION, POWERS, AND PROCEDURE OF LOCAL COMMITTEES AND JOINT LOCAL COMMITTEES ESTABLISHED BY LOCAL AUTHORITIES.

Whereas under Section 2 of the Profiteering Act, 1919, the Board of Trade are empowered to authorise Local Authorities to establish Local Committees and to make Regulations and give directions as to the constitution, powers, and procedure of the Local Committees so established :

And whereas by Order dated the 9th September 1919,* the Board of Trade did authorise Local Authorities to establish Local Committees, and did make the Regulations set out in the Schedule to the said Order giving directions as to the constitution, powers, and procedure of the Local Committees established by Local Authorities :

And whereas by Order dated the 2nd October 1919,† the Board of Trade did make Regulations and did give directions as to the constitution, powers, and procedure of such Joint Local Committees as may from time to time be established by two or more Local Authorities with the consent of the Board of Trade :

And whereas by Order dated the 24th November 1919,‡ the Board of Trade did rescind Regulations 3, 6, 13, 15, 16, and 30 of the Regulations made on the 9th September 1919 and 2nd October 1919 respectively, and did make the Regulations set out in the Schedule to that Order in lieu of the Regulations thereby rescinded :

And whereas it is now deemed expedient further to amend the said Regulations :

Now, therefore, the Board of Trade in exercise of the above recited powers do hereby rescind Regulation 22 of the Regulations made on the 9th September 1919 and 2nd October 1919 respectively, and do hereby revoke the said Order dated the 24th November 1919, and do hereby rescind Regulations 3, 6, 13, 15, 16, and 30 set out in the Schedule to the said Order, and do hereby make the Regulations set out in the Schedule to this Order in lieu of the Regulations hereby rescinded, and the Board of Trade do further hereby rescind Regulations 29 and 31 of the Regulations dated the 9th September 1919, and 2nd October 1919 respectively.

SCHEDULE.

AMENDED REGULATIONS FOR LOCAL COMMITTEES AND JOINT LOCAL COMMITTEES UNDER THE PROFITEERING ACTS, 1919 AND 1920.

3. In the appointment of members of the Local Committee the Local Authority shall provide that not fewer than two members of the Committee shall be women.

The Local Authority shall also provide for the

adequate representation of labour and of the retail trade on each Local Committee.

6. The Local Committee may appoint a Clerk and with the consent of the Board of Trade such other officers as may be considered necessary, and the Clerk may take proceedings on behalf of the Local Committee in a Court of Summary Jurisdiction.

13. Notices and other documents required to be delivered to the Local Committee shall be sent to the Office of the Clerk of the Local Committee, and may be delivered at or sent by post to that office. Notices required to be sent to a complainant or to a respondent may be sent by post to or delivered at such person's place of business or usual or last known place of abode.

15. The complaint shall be made in writing to the office of the Clerk to the Local Committee, and shall be delivered at, or sent by post, so as to be delivered at, that office within four days of the date of the sale or transaction which is the subject of complaint or where the complaint is in respect of a hire purchase transaction at any time during the currency of the agreement or within four days of the date upon which the final payment under the agreement is due to be paid, or in any case within such extended time as may be allowed by the Local Committee in any particular case, provided that in no case shall the time be extended beyond fourteen days without the consent of the Board of Trade.

16.—(I.) The Local Committee shall, within seven days of the receipt of a complaint or within such extended time as may be allowed by the Board of Trade in any particular case, forward to the respondent a copy of the complaint with an intimation that if a *prima facie* cause of complaint is disclosed on the preliminary investigation he will receive due notice of the date, time, and place of the hearing of the complaint.

(II.) The written complaint shall be considered by the Local Committee, and in any case in which the Local Committee are of opinion that the complaint does not give the required particulars, or does not disclose *prima facie* grounds for hearing the complaint, it shall be competent to the Local Committee (a) after giving the complainant an opportunity of being heard to dismiss the complaint without calling upon the respondent; or (b) to notify the complainant that unless further and better particulars or grounds of complaint, as the case may be, be given, the complaint will be dismissed; and in the latter case unless such further and better particulars, or grounds of complaint, as appear to the Committee to justify further action on their part, are delivered to them not more than three days after such notification has been sent to the complainant, or within such extended time as may be allowed by the Local Committee, the complaint shall be dismissed.

22. If upon the hearing of the complaint, the Local Committee are satisfied that a profit has been made or sought, which is in view of all the circumstances unreasonable, the Local Committee shall declare the price which would yield a reasonable profit, and shall require the seller to repay to the complainant any amount paid by the complainant in excess of such price, and they may also take proceedings against the seller before a Court of Summary Jurisdiction.

Provided always that in declaring the price which would yield a reasonable profit the profit

sought or obtained shall not be deemed unreasonable :—

- (a) In the case of a seller who was in the same way of business before the war, if the percentage rate of profits sought or obtained does not exceed the percentage rate of profit obtained by him upon the sale of similar articles before the war due consideration being given to the relative costs and charges of carrying on the business ; and (b) in the case of a seller who was not in the same way of business before the war, if the percentage rate of profit sought or obtained by him does not exceed the average percentage rate of profit obtained by sellers in that way of business under similar conditions on the sale of similar articles before the war, due consideration being given to the relative costs and charges of carrying on the business.

The above-mentioned proviso shall not apply in any case where the profit in respect of any transaction has been fixed by a scheme approved by the Board of Trade under Section 1 of the Profiteering (Amendment) Act, 1920.

And further provided that where any scheme has been approved by the Board of Trade under Section 1 of the Profiteering (Amendment) Act, 1920, any profit sought or obtained on the sale of any article to which the scheme relates which does not exceed such profit as is allowed by the scheme shall not be deemed to be unreasonable.

TRADE.

The Fruit, Vegetable, and Flower Distributive Trade, that is to say :—

1. The wholesale or retail sale for use or consumption off the premises of any one or more of the commodities specified in the schedule hereto in or in connection with any establishment or business or branch or department in which such sale is the main or principal business of the establishment or business or branch or department ;

2. The sale or hire of growing plants, when such sale or hire is transacted in or in association, with an establishment or business or branch or department of the kind specified in paragraph 1 above ;

3. The following operations when performed in or in association with an establishment or business or branch or department of the kind specified in paragraphs 1 or 2 above, by a worker usually employed in or in association with such establishment, or business or branch or department :—

- (a) the sale of any goods other than those specified in the schedule hereto ;
- (b) the designing or making of wreaths, boquets, or similar articles from natural or artificial flowers, the preparation of fancy baskets of artificial flowers or raw fruit, or the executing of decorations with natural flowers, foliage or growing plants ;
- (c) cooking, preparing or serving of food or drink for consumption by the public ;
- (d) carting of coal or any goods or the removal of furniture ;

including :—the following or similar operations when incidental to or carried on in conjunction with the business specified in paragraphs 1, 2, or 3 above :—

- (i) checking, testing, grading, weighing, measuring ;
- (ii) cleaning goods ;
- (iii) barrelling, buddling, bagging, boxing, basketing, parcelling, packeting, packing, unpacking ;
- (iv) labelling, ticketing ;
- (v) collecting, despatching, delivering ;
- (vi) horse or motor-keeping, care of vehicles ;
- (vii) warehousing, storing, cold-storing, stock-keeping ;
- (viii) portering, loading, unloading, lift or hoist operating, time-keeping ;
- (ix) heating, cleaning, premises cleaning, adjusting or sharpening implements, cleaning receptacles or utensils ;
- (x) stacking, window or showcase dressing ;
- (xi) bunching, mossing, wiring, potting, shell-ing trimming, watering ;
- (xii) clerical work, commercial travelling or canvassing ;

- (b) the sale of goods for export and operations incidental thereto, except when carried on in conjunction with the sale of goods for distribution within the United Kingdom ;
- (c) operations of cleaning or maintenance of premises and operations performed at docks, wharves, warehouses or elsewhere,

- when such operations are performed by workers not directly employed by employer engaged in a business of the kind specified in paragraphs 1, 2 or 3 above;
- (d) operations performed on board ships by workers who form part of the crew;
- (e) operations performed by workers employed by wholesale merchants or brokers who do not employ warehouse workers or carters;
- (f) the transport of goods by common carriers;
- (g) operations performed by workers engaged in any industry or trade concerned exclusively with carting and operations incidental thereto;
- (h) Post Office business;
- (i) operations in agriculture within the meaning of the Corn Production Act, 1917;
- (j) sales and operations included in the Trade Boards (Milk Distributive) Order, 1920.
