THIS day Sir Thomas Clifford Allbutt, K.C.B., M.D., F.R.S., was, by His Majesty's command, sworn of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and took his place at the Board accordingly.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the Termination of the Present War (Definition) Act, 1918, it is provided that His Majesty in Council may declare what date is to be treated as the date of the termination of the present war, and that the date so declared shall be as nearly as may be the date of the exchange or deposit of ratifications of the treaty or treaties of peace, and that His Majesty may also similarly declare what date is to be treated as the date of the termination of war between His Majesty and any particular State :

And whereas at Saint Germain-en-Laye on

the tenth day of September nineteen hundred and nineteen a treaty of peace between the Allied and Associated Powers and Austria was signed on behalf of His Majesty :

And whereas by the said treaty of peace it was provided that a procès-verbal of the deposit of ratifications should be drawn up as soon as the treaty had been ratified by Austria on the one hand and by three of the principal Allied or Associated Powers on the other, and that from the date of the said procès-verbal the treaty would come into force between the high contracting parties who had ratified it :

And whereas the said treaty having been ratified by Austria and three of the principal Allied and Associated Powers, including His Majesty, such a procès-verbal as aforesaid has been drawn up dated the sixteenth day of July nineteen hundred and twenty :

And whereas treaties of peace with other belligerents not having yet been ratified it is desirable to declare the date which is to be treated as the date of the termination of war with Austria before declaring the date which is to be treated as the date of the termination of the present war :

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said sixteenth day of July shall be treated as the date of the termination of war between His Majesty and Austria.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS it is provided by the Ministry of Transport Act, 1919, that, as from such date or dates as His Majesty in Council may by Order determine, there shall be transferred to the Minister of Transport all powers and duties of any Government Department in relation to—

- (a) Railways,
- (b) Light Railways,
- (c) Tramways,
- (d) Canals, Waterways and Inland Navigations,
- (e) Roads, Bridges and Ferries, and Vehicles and Traffic thereon,
- (f) Harbours, Docks and Piers :

And whereas it is further provided by the said Act that His Majesty may by Order make such incidental, consequential, and supplemental provisions as may be necessary or expedient for the purpose of giving full effect to any transfer of powers or duties as aforesaid, including provisions for the transfer of any property, rights and liabilities held, enjoyed, or incurred by any Government Department in connection with any powers or duties transferred :

And whereas it is further provided by the said Act that for the purposes thereof "Government Department" includes (amongst others) the Commissioners of the Caledonian Canal :

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :—

1. This Order may be cited as "The Ministry of Transport (Commissioners of the Caledonian Canal Transfer of Powers and Property) Order, 1920."

2. The date as from which the powers and duties in relation to the matters aforesaid of the Commissioners of the Caledonian Canal are transferred to the Minister of Transport shall be the 15th day of August 1920.

3. As from that date all the property, rights and liabilities held, enjoyed, or incurred by the said Commissioners shall be transferred to and vested in the Minister of Transport, and such rights and liabilities shall be exercisable by or enforceable against the Minister of Transport in like manner as they would have been by or against the Commissioners if this Order had not been made.

WHEREAS by Section 5 of the Merchant Shipping (Mercantile Marine Fund) Act, 1898, it is, amongst other things, enacted as follows :—

"5.—(1) On and after the commencement of this Act the general lighthouse authorities

shall levy light dues with respect to the voyages made by ships or by way of periodical payment, and not with respect to the lights which a ship passes or from which it derives benefit, and the dues so levied shall take the place of the dues now levied by those authorities.

"(2) The scale and rules set out in the Second Schedule to this Act shall have effect for the purpose of the levying of light dues in pursuance of this Act, but Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, alter, either generally or with respect to particular classes of cases, the scale or rules and the exemptions therefrom."

And whereas by divers Orders in Council the said Scale was altered by reducing each of the dues thereby authorised to be levied by the respective amounts referred to in the respective Orders in Council, but by Order in Council dated the 30th March 1916, the respective Orders in Council referred to were repealed for the purpose of once more giving full effect to the Scale and Rules set out in the Second Schedule to the Act above referred to :

And whereas by Order in Council dated the 30th day of July 1919, it was provided that each of the dues authorised to be levied by the said Scale should, as from the 1st day of January 1919, be subject to an increase of Forty per cent. beyond the amount of the dues specified in the said Scale :

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that the Scale and Rules set out in the said Second Schedule should be further altered in manner hereinafter appearing :

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in exercise of the powers conferred upon Him by the hereinbefore recited Section, and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that each of the dues authorised to be levied by the said Scale shall, as from the 1st day of April 1920, be subject to an increase of One Hundred per cent. beyond the amount of the dues specified in the said Scale in lieu of the increase of Forty per cent. mentioned in the said Order in Council dated the 30th day of July 1919, and the said dues as so further increased shall be levied and the Rules construed accordingly.

WHEREAS by the Representation of the People Act, 1918 (hereinafter referred to as "the Act"), as amended by the Representation of the People (Amendment) Act, 1918, power is conferred on His Majesty to make provision for various matters by Order in Council :

And whereas by the Representation of the People Order, His Majesty was pleased by Order in Council to make provision for various matters under the Act :

And whereas by Section 40 (2) of the Act any Order in Council made thereunder may be revoked or varied as occasion requires by any subsequent Order in Council :

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon Him by the Act, and of all other powers enabling Him in that behalf, is pleased, by and by with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :—

The Representation of the People Order shall be amended as follows :—

1. The following proviso shall be inserted at the end of Rule 1A :—

“Provided also that a person whose name is contained in List C shall not, unless his name is contained also in List B, be deemed to be a person whose name appears on the electors lists so as to enable him to object to the registration of any person under Rule 12 in the First Schedule to the Act.”

2. The following Rule shall be inserted after Rule 6A :—

Merchant Seamen and Fishermen.

“6B. Where the name of any merchant seaman or fisherman has been placed on the absent voters list in pursuance of a claim in that behalf, his name shall be placed on the absent voters list for each subsequent register, so long as he continues to be registered for the same qualifying premises and the registration officer is satisfied that he continues to be a merchant seaman or fisherman, as the case may be, unless he gives notice in writing to the registration officer that he does not wish his name to be placed on the list.”

3. The following words shall be inserted in Schedule III. immediately after the heading of form XI. (Form of Register) :—

“The Form of Register in the County Borough of Belfast shall be the same as that prescribed for use in England and Wales. Elsewhere in Ireland the Form of Register shall be as follows :—

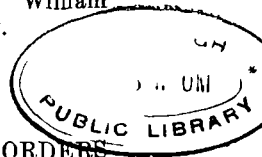

In accordance with Article 289 of the Treaty of Versailles of the 28th June 1919, notice was given to the German Government on 25th June 1920, that the following bilateral treaties between the British Empire and Germany are revived from the date of this notice :—

I. *Extradition.*

(a) Treaty signed in London on the 14th May 1872, between Great Britain and Germany for the mutual surrender of fugitive criminals.

(b) Treaty signed in Berlin on the 17th August 1911, relating to the extradition of fugitive criminals between certain British Protectorates and Germany.

II.—*Parcel Post.*

Agreement signed in London on the 3rd November 1894, and in Berlin on the 14th November 1894, between the British and German Post Offices concerning the exchange of parcels by parcel post; with the modifications subsequently effected directly between the respective postal administrations, including the Exchange of Notes between those administrations dated respectively the 24th January 1920, and the 6th February 1920, in regard to the method of settlement of accounts.

III.—*Money Orders.*

(a) Agreement signed in London on the 9th January 1908, and in Berlin on the 8th February 1908, between the Post Office of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and the Post Office of the German Empire for the exchange of money orders, including the modification effected by Exchange of Notes between the British and German postal administrations dated respectively the 24th January 1920, and the 6th February 1920, in regard to the method of settlement of accounts.

The use of the words "German Protectorates" and "German Postal Agencies in foreign countries" in Article 1, 5, 8, and 17 is contrary to the stipulations of the Treaty of Versailles. These words are therefore not included in the revival and must be regarded as excised from the Agreement.

(b) Arrangement between the Money Order Department of the Government of India and the Post Office Department of the German Empire, signed in Berlin the 20th May 1880, and in Simla the 22nd June 1880, for the exchange of money orders.

CORSET TRADE BOARD.

PROPOSAL TO VARY GENERAL MINIMUM TIME-RATES, PIECE-WORK BASIS TIME-RATES, AND OVERTIME RATES FOR FEMALE AND MALE WORKERS.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour and dated 31st October 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Corset Trade as specified in the Trade Boards (Corset) Order, 1919, hereby give notice, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they propose to Vary the General Minimum Time Rates, Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for Female and Male Workers, at present fixed and set out in the Schedules to their Notices dated the 26th November 1919, and 12th March 1920, the proposed Variations in the Minimum Rates of Wages being as shown in the Schedule set out below.

The Minister of Labour has given his consent to the Notice of Proposal to Vary being given.

Workers of 21 and under 22 years of age—General Minimum Time-Rates, from 1s. 0d. to 1s. 1½d.; Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates, from 1s. 3½d. to 1s. 5d.

Workers of 20 and under 21 years of age—General Minimum Time-Rates, from 10½d. to 11½d.; Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates, from 1s. 3½d. to 1s. 5d.

Workers of 19 and under 20 years of age—General Minimum Time-Rates, from 9d. to 10½d.; Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates, from 1s. 3½d. to 1s. 5d.

Workers of 18 and under 19 years of age—General Minimum Time-Rates, from 7½d. to 8½d.; Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates, from 1s. 3½d. to 1s. 5d.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age—General Minimum Time-Rates, from 6d. to 6½d.; Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates, from 1s. 3½d. to 1s. 5d.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age—General Minimum Time-Rates, 5d. from to 5½d.; Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates, from 1s. 3½d. to 1s. 5d.

Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age—General Minimum Time-Rates, from 4d. to 4½d.; Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates, from 1s. 3½d. to 1s. 5d.

Workers under 15 years of age—General Minimum Time-Rates, from 3d. to 3½d.; Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates, from 1s. 3½d. to 1s. 5d.

Male Workers commencing employment in the Corset Trade for the first time at and over the age of 19 years may serve a period of six months at 8d. per hour, and thereafter a period of six months at 9½d. per hour.

On the expiration of one year's service in the trade, these workers shall receive such rates as their age may entitle them to under the foregoing provisions.

PART II.

PROPOSED VARIATION OF OVERTIME RATES FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

Overtime Rates, calculated on the Proposed Minimum Rates specified in Part I. of this Schedule, in the manner set out in Part III. of

- (d) All warehousing, packing, or other operations incidental to or appertaining to the manufacture of any of the above-mentioned articles.

PART IV.

SECTION I.

The above proposed General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates and Overtime Rates shall be paid clear of all deductions, other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act, to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

SECTION II.

The above proposed Minimum Rates are without prejudice to Workers who are earning higher rates of wages or to agreements made or that may be made between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of the Minimum Rates.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above Proposals to Vary which may be lodged with them within two months from the 22nd July 1920. It is desirable that the Objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour and dated 31st October 1918, the Trade Board established in Great Britain under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods Trade, as specified in the Trade Boards (Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods) Order, 1920, hereby give Notice, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they propose to fix General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for Female Workers and to declare the Normal Number of Hours of Work in the Trade for the purpose of the application of the Overtime Rates, as set out below :—

PART I.

PROPOSED GENERAL MINIMUM TIME-RATES FOR
FEMALE WORKERS.

SECTION I.

For Workers of 14 and under 14½ years of age, 15s. 0d. per week of 48 hours.

For Workers of 14½ and under 15 years of age, 16s. 0d. per week of 48 hours.

For Workers of 15 and under 15½ years of age, 17s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.

For Workers of 15½ and under 16 years of age, 19s. 0d. per week of 48 hours.

For Workers of 16 and under 16½ years of age, 21s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.

For Workers of 16½ and under 17 years of age, 24s. 0d. per week of 48 hours.

For Workers of 17 and under 17½ years of age, 27s. 0d. per week of 48 hours.

For Workers of 17½ and under 18 years of age, 31s. 0d. per week of 48 hours.

For Workers of 18 years of age and over, 36s. 0d. per week of 48 hours.

Provided that—

(a) In the case of workers entering the trade for the first time between the ages of 16 and 18 years, the General Minimum Time-Rates payable during the first six months' period of employment shall be 2s. per week of 48 hours less than the General Minimum Time-Rates otherwise applicable as set out above. Such workers on completing six months' employment in the trade shall be entitled to the General Minimum Time-Rates applicable to their age as set out in the foregoing Table.

(b) In the case of workers entering the trade for the first time at or over the age of 18 years, the General Minimum Time-Rates payable during the first twelve months' period of employment shall be as follows :—

- (i) During 1st three months' period of employment, 24s. 0d. per week of 48 hours.
- (ii) During 2nd three months' period of

employment, 27s. 0d. per week of 48 hours.

(iii) During 3rd three months' period of employment, 30s. 0d. per week of 48 hours.

(iv) During 4th three months' period of employment, 33s. 0d. per week of 48 hours.

Such workers on completing twelve months' employment in the Trade shall be entitled to the General Minimum Time-Rate of 36s. per week of 48 hours.

SECTION II.—The proposed General Minimum Time-Rates set out in Section I. of this Part of this Notice are based on a week of 48 hours, and shall be subject to a proportionate deduction according as the number of hours spent by a worker in the factory or workshop in any week is less than 48.

PART II.

PROPOSED OVERTIME RATES FOR FEMALE
WORKERS.

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board propose to declare the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows :—

In any week	48
On Saturday	4½
On any other week-day	9

Provided that all hours worked by a worker on Sundays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—The proposed Minimum Rates for Overtime for all Female Workers in respect of hours worked by a worker in excess of the normal number of hours of work in the trade proposed to be declared by the Trade Board as set out in Section I. of this Part of this Notice, shall be as follows :—

- (a) For the first two hours' Overtime on any day except Sunday, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter times the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, i.e. Time-and-a-Quarter.
- (b) For Overtime after the first two hours of Overtime on any day except Sunday, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Half times the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, i.e. Time-and-a-Half.
- (c) For all time worked on Sunday, the Overtime Rate shall be Twice the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, i.e. Double-Time.
- (d) For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter times the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, i.e. Time-and-a-Quarter, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs (b) and (c) of this Section.

The Overtime Rates shall be payable where on any day (not being a Sunday) the number of hours worked exceeds nine, or in the case of Saturday exceeds 4½, notwithstanding that the number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

SECTION III.—The provisions of this Part of this Notice are without prejudice to the

payment of Overtime Rates after a lesser number of hours than those declared by the Trade Board to be the normal number in the trade, in cases where such lesser number of hours constitutes the number customarily worked in the establishment.

NOTE.—The hours which female workers, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts.

PART III.

The above proposed Minimum Rates shall apply subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts to all Female Workers in respect of any time during which they are employed in Great Britain in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods) Order, 1920, that is to say :—

1. The making of such articles as are specified in (a) and (b) below, from linen or cotton or mixed linen and cotton fabrics (excepting knitted fabrics), or from other textile fabrics when the work is carried on in establishments mainly engaged in the making of such articles from the before-mentioned fabrics, viz. :—

(a) Handkerchiefs (including Mufflers or Flags when made in association or in conjunction with handkerchiefs) ;

(b) Bed-Linen, Towels, Dusters, Table-napery, Bed-spreads, Tea-cloths, Table-centres, Sideboard-covers, Cushion-covers, or similar household articles ; including all or any of the following operations :—

- (i) Hooking, cutting or tearing the material ;
- (ii) Vice-folding ;
- (iii) Machine hemming, hem-stitching, spoking, over-locking, tambouring, button-holeing, and other plain or fancy machine stitching ;
- (iv) All processes of embroidery or decorative needlework done by machine, whether before or after the making of the articles of the description specified above ;
- (v) The following processes if done by machine :— Thread-drawing, thread-clipping, top-sewing, scalloping, nickelling and paring ;
- (vi) All processes of laundering, smoothing, folding, ornamenting, boxing, finishing, warehousing, packing and other similar operations incidental to or appertaining to the making of the articles of the description specified above.

2. The making-up in linen warehouses or in establishments mainly engaged in linen lapping, of linen or mixed linen and cotton or other textile fabrics in the piece, or of linen or mixed linen and cotton or other textile cut from the piece, including :—Measuring, cutting, lapping ornamenting boxing, warehousing, packing and similar operations.

PART IV.

SECTION I.—The above proposed General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates shall be paid clear of all deductions, other

than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION II.—The above proposed Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages.

WIRELESS METEOROLOGICAL INFORMATION TO AND FROM SHIPS AT SEA.

GENERAL REMARKS.

Former Notice.—No. 1000 of 1920; hereby cancelled.

1. It is earnestly hoped that all concerned will assist in making the wireless meteorological service a success. Negotiations are now in hand to extend and unify the system of collecting weather data by wireless from ships at sea all over the world, and at the same time to organise the free transmission of weather bulletins from a sufficient number of wireless stations to admit of ships being constantly supplied with reliable

weather reports and forecasts wherever they may be.

2. It should be borne in mind that the needs of ships at sea in regard to information regarding the weather will march hand in hand with the requirements of aircraft. The importance of this service will therefore be constantly increasing, and its success or failure will largely depend upon the co-operation of ships at sea in providing the data without which accurate forecasting is impossible. The matter does not depend solely upon the efforts of the ships selected to furnish the data. The essence of success lies in rapidity in passing such data by wireless from the ship to the coast station, and thence to the central meteorological office. It follows, therefore, that all ships not taking an active part in supplying data should use the greatest care not to interfere with the transmission of the wireless messages to the shore.

3. The following particulars refer to the scheme now being undertaken by the British Meteorological Office. This Notice will, however, be subject to revision from time to time, and endeavours will be made to include in each revision all information available to date of the weather bulletins issued by the wireless stations of the world. Earnest endeavours are being made to obtain international agreement as to the form of these weather bulletins and to the methods and times of transmissions. It is hoped that the messages will eventually all be made in an international code at fixed times, so arranged that a ship with only one wireless operator will be able to read them. A similar scheme for time signals is being evolved.

COLLECTION OF WEATHER DATA FROM SHIPS.

4. Certain ships are being asked to supply data regularly three times a day and in addition to the regular observations, which are taken at 0100, 0700 and 1300 Greenwich time and sent as soon as possible to Malin head (GMH) or Valentia (GCK) coast stations, these ships may, on request from either of these coast stations, send special data messages at other times.

5. Precise instructions as to the procedure for ships which intend to send a data message, together with the necessary code, will be issued at an early date.

ISSUE OF WEATHER BULLETINS TO SHIPS.

6. A wireless *weather bulletin* may contain both or either of the following :—

- (a) A *weather report*, which is an official statement of existing weather conditions; and/or
- (b) A *weather forecast*, which is an official opinion of probable future weather conditions.

7. The accompanying schedule of wireless weather bulletins is intended to provide, in a form suitable to give all information required by the wireless operator, a complete and up-to-date list of all weather bulletins transmitted at fixed times by wireless stations throughout the world. The same information will be found in detail in the Sailing Directions and in the International List of Radiotelegraph Stations (the Berne List).

8. The times given in the third column of the schedule are expressed in the 4-figure notation

employed for signalling during the war. The term "G.M.T." here means the civil mean time of the meridian of Greenwich, with the day commencing at midnight and the hours reckoned from 00 to 23.

9. Operators are reminded that Article 45 of the International Service Regulations imposes the general obligation of not interfering with reception of weather bulletins by other ships.

10. Certain other stations not shown in the schedule supply weather bulletins *on demand*, generally at reduced charges. Particulars will be found in the Berne List.
