WHEREAS by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-eighth day of November, nineteen hundred and fourteen, His Majesty

was pleased to make regulations (called "the Defence of the Realm Regulations") under the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Act, 1914, for securing the public safety and the defence of the realm; which regulations have been amended by various subsequent Orders in Council:

And whereas it is expedient that the regulation hereinafter mentioned should cease to have effect:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that Regulation 30BB shall be revoked.

WHEREAS at St. Germain-en-Laye, on the 10th day of September 1919, a Treaty of Peace with Austria (hereinafter referred to as "the Treaty") was signed on behalf of His Majesty:

And whereas it was provided in the Treaty that the property of nationals of the former

Austrian Empire within the territory or under the control of an Allied or Associated State might be constituted a pledge for enemy liabilities upon the conditions laid down in the Treaty :

And whereas by the Treaty of Peace Act, 1919, it was provided that His Majesty might make such appointments, establish such offices, make such Orders in Council, and do such things as appeared to Him to be necessary for carrying out the Treaty, and for giving effect to any of the provisions thereof :

And whereas by Treaty, grant, usage, sufferance, or other lawful means, and by Decree of His Highness the Sultan of Egypt, His Majesty has power and jurisdiction in Egypt :

And whereas there is now in Egypt certain property of nationals of the former Austrian Empire under the control of His Majesty, and it is expedient to make provision for charging such property with the payment of the liabilities for which it may be constituted a pledge by the Treaty in the manner hereinafter provided :

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890, or otherwise in Him vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :—

1. All property, rights and interests in Egypt belonging to nationals of the former Austrian Empire at the date when the Treaty comes into force (not being property, rights or interests acquired under any general licence issued by or on behalf of His Majesty) and the net proceeds of their sale, liquidation, or other dealings therewith, so far as such property, rights and interests or such net proceeds are vested in or otherwise under the control of the custodian of enemy property or other British authority under the Trading with the Enemy Acts or the Trading with the Enemy Proclamations issued from time to time by the General Officer Commanding-in-Chief the British Forces in Egypt, are hereby charged :—

(a) First, with payment of the amounts due in respect of claims by British nationals with regard to their property, rights and interests, including companies and associations in which they are interested in territory of the former Austrian Empire, or debts owing to them by Austrian nationals, and with payment of any compensation awarded by the Mixed Arbitral Tribunal or by an arbitrator appointed by that Tribunal in pursuance of paragraph (e) of Article 249 of the Treaty, and with payment of claims growing out of acts committed by the former Austro-Hungarian Government or by any Austrian authorities since the 28th July 1914, and before the 12th August 1914.

(b) Secondly, with payment of the amounts due in respect of claims by British nationals with regard to their property, rights and interests in the territories of Germany, Hungary, Bulgaria and Turkey in so far as those claims are not otherwise satisfied. Provided that any particular property, rights or interests so charged may at any time, if the High Commissioner thinks fit, be released from the charge so created.

2. In the application and enforcement of the charge created by this Order the claims of or debts owing to British nationals resident or

carrying on business in Egypt shall enjoy priority over the claims of or debts owing to other British nationals.

3. All decisions of the Mixed Arbitral Tribunal constituted under Section VI. of Part X. of the Treaty, if within the jurisdiction of that Tribunal, shall be final and conclusive, and binding on all courts.

4. For the purpose of enforcing the attendance of witnesses before the Mixed Arbitral Tribunal, whether sitting in Egypt or not, and compelling the production before the Tribunal of documents, the High Commissioner shall have power to issue orders which shall have the like effect as if the proceedings before the Tribunal were an action in the Supreme Court, and the order were a formal process issued by that Court in the due exercise of its jurisdiction, and shall be enforceable by that Court accordingly, and disobedience to any such order shall be punishable as contempt of court.

5. Sections IV., V. and VI. of Part X. of the Treaty relating to property, rights and interests, to contracts, prescriptions and judgments, and to the Mixed Arbitral Tribunal, and all provisions of the said Treaty affecting or relating to the charge created by this Order shall have full force and effect as law.

6. The time at which the periods of prescription or limitation of right of action referred to in Article 252 of the Treaty shall begin again to run shall be at the expiration of ten months after the coming into force of the Treaty, and the period to be allowed within which presentation of negotiable instruments for acceptance or payment, and notice of non-acceptance or non-payment or protest may be made under Article 253, shall be ten months from the coming into force of the Treaty.

7. Rules made during the war by any recognised exchange or commercial association providing for the closure of contracts entered into before the war by an enemy, and any action taken thereunder are hereby confirmed, subject to the provisos contained in paragraph 4 (a) of the Annex to Section V. of Part X. of the Treaty.

8. The power under the Egypt Order in Council, 1915, to make King's Regulations shall extend to the issue of regulations for the purpose of enforcing the charge created by this Order, and for making such arrangements as may be required for establishing and assessing the claims and debts for the payment of which the property charged is rendered liable, and for the payment, in whole or in part, of the sums due.

9. In this Order the term "British nationals resident or carrying on business in Egypt" means persons who are subject to the Egypt Order in Council, 1915, and who are so resident or carrying on business.

10. Egyptian nationals resident or carrying on business in Egypt shall share in the benefit of the charge created by this Order on the same terms as British nationals resident or carrying on business in Egypt, provided that during the war such Egyptian nationals were treated by the former Austro-Hungarian Government as enemies and that their property was subjected by the former Austro-Hungarian Government to exceptional war measures.

11. The expression "nationals of the former Austrian Empire" does not include persons who, within six months of the coming into force of the Treaty, show that they have acquired,

ipso facto in accordance with its provisions, nationality of an Allied or Associated Power, including those who, under Articles 72 and 76 of the Treaty, obtained such nationality with the consent of the competent authorities, or who, under Articles 74 or 77 thereof, acquired such nationality by virtue of previous rights of citizenship.

12. The Treaty of Peace (Austria) Order, 1920, shall not apply to Egypt, except so far as may be consistent with the provisions of this Order or of any Proclamation issued by the General Officer Commanding-in-Chief the British Forces in Egypt, or with any rules or directions given thereunder.

13. This Order may be cited as the Egypt (Treaty of Peace), Austria Order in Council, 1920, and shall be read as one with the Egypt Order in Council, 1915.

14. This Order shall be deemed to have had effect as from the date when the Treaty of Peace came into force.

“Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions, as are from time to time directed by Order in Council :

“And whereas by Your Majesty's Order in Council bearing date the 22nd day of January 1920, it is provided that an allowance of 2s. 6d. a day shall be paid to Officers above the rank of Sub-Lieutenant who are appointed to depot ships for duty with Submarines, such allowance to cover all periodical embarkation in Submarines :

“And whereas we consider that provision should be made for the payment of a continuous allowance to Officers below the rank of Lieutenant similarly appointed whose duties require them to proceed to sea in Submarines periodically and that such payment should be at a lower rate than that authorised for the Officers referred to in the preceding paragraph :

“We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to approve with effect from the 11th day of June 1920, the payment of an allowance of 1s. 6d. a day to all Officers below the rank of Lieutenant who have been, or may hereafter be, appointed to Depot Ships for duty with Submarines.

“The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's

Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal.”

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

“And whereas we are of opinion that the rate of allowance payable to Naval ratings acting as Schoolmasters (a) in the absence of Naval Schoolmasters allowed by complement, and (b) in Harbour or Shore Establishments should conform with the rate applicable in the case of ratings acting as Naval Schoolmasters in ships in which no Naval Schoolmaster is allowed :

“We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the payment in such cases of an allowance of 8d. a day, with effect from the 1st of May 1919.

“The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal.”

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the

Admiralty, dated the 23rd day of September 1920, in the words following, viz. :—

“Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council :

“And whereas we have had under consideration the Regulations governing the entry of Naval Cadets, Special Entry, which provide for the payment by the parents of an allowance at the rate of £50 a year during the period of training as a Cadet, viz., for a period of one and a half years :

“And whereas we are of opinion that it is desirable to remit this allowance in certain cases in order to widen the field of selection to include candidates from the Lower Deck, who are at present excluded by lack of means from entry into the Commissioned Ranks of Your Majesty's Navy :

“We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction, in such necessitous cases as we consider desirable, the payment of this allowance from Naval Funds.

“The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal.”

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, wages, pensions, bounty money, grants, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in His Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an officer, seaman, or marine, or to the widow or any relative of a deceased officer, seaman, or marine, shall be paid in such manner and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council :

And whereas under section 2, subsection (1) of the Ministry of Pensions Act, 1916, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that there shall be transferred to the Minister of Pensions the powers and duties of the Admiralty with respect to pensions and grants to persons who have served as officers or men, and to their widows, children, and other dependants, and to persons who have

served in the Nursing Service of any of His Majesty's Naval Forces, other than service pensions, so far as such pensions and grants are payable out of moneys provided by Parliament, and not provided exclusively for the purpose of Greenwich Hospital, and that His Majesty may by Order in Council make such adaptations in the enactments relating to such powers and duties as aforesaid as may be necessary to make them exercisable by the Minister of Pensions and his officers, and may fix the time or times as from which the several powers and duties are to be transferred to him :

And whereas it has been represented to His Majesty by the Minister of Pensions that it is desirable to make further provision in regard to the pensions of commissioned and subordinate officers of His Majesty's Naval, Marine, and Reserve Forces disabled in consequence of former wars, and to the pensions and allowances of widows and children of such officers whose deaths have resulted from former wars, and to the pensions of members of His Majesty's Naval Nursing Service disabled in consequence of former wars :

And whereas the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals :

Now, therefore, His Majesty, having taken the said proposals into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve thereof and to sanction the following Regulations, that is to say :—

1. The retired pay being paid on the 1st day of April 1919, under the Regulations for the government of His Majesty's Naval Service, to an officer in respect of a disability due directly and wholly to service in a former war may be increased by the difference between such retired pay and the retired pay which he might receive, according to the degree of his disablement as certified, under the Order in Council of the 29th September 1917, if he were subject to the provisions of such Order in Council.

2. The pensions and compassionate allowances awarded to the widows and children of officers below the rank of Commander who were killed in action or died within two years as the result of wounds received in action in former wars, or who were drowned or suffered violent death in an immediate act of duty in a former war, or died from the effects of any injury or disease caused by extraordinary exposure or exertion on service in a former war within two years after first being certified to be ill or being so injured, and being paid on the 1st day of April 1919, may be increased to the rates which might have been awarded under the second and fifth columns of the Second Schedule to the Regulations annexed to the Order in Council of the 29th September 1917.

3. The pensions being paid on the 1st day of April 1919, under the Regulations for the government of His Majesty's Naval Service, to any member of His Majesty's Royal Naval Nursing Service in respect of a disability due directly and wholly to service in a former war may be increased by the difference between such pension and the pension which she might receive, according to the degree of her disablement as certified, under the Order in

Council of the 29th September 1917, if she were subject to the provisions of such Order in Council.

4. In these Regulations, unless the context otherwise requires—

(1) "Certified" means certified by a Medical Officer or Board of Medical Officers appointed by the Minister of Pensions for the purpose.

(2) "Order in Council of the 29th September 1917," refers to the Order in Council of that date relating to the retired pay of commissioned officers and the families of such deceased officers.

(3) Any reference to the provisions of the Order in Council of the 29th September 1917, shall include references to such provisions as amended by any other Order in Council, so far as may be applicable.

5. The Minister of Pensions shall be the sole interpreter of these Regulations, and shall give such instructions as he may deem expedient for giving effect thereto.

6. These Regulations shall have effect as from the 1st day of April 1919, provided that any increase of retired pay, pension, or allowance by virtue of any subsequent Order in Council shall begin from the date when such Order in Council takes effect.

And whereas under section 2, subsection (1), of the Ministry of Pensions Act, 1916, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that there shall be transferred to the Minister of Pensions the powers and duties of the Admiralty with respect to pensions and grants to persons who have served as officers or men, and to their widows, children, and other dependants, other than service pensions, so far as such pensions and grants are payable out of moneys provided by Parliament, and not provided exclusively for the purpose of Greenwich Hospital, and that His Majesty may by Order in Council make such adaptations in the enactments relating to such powers and duties as aforesaid as may be necessary to make them exercisable by the Minister of Pensions and his officers, and may fix the time or times as from which the several powers and duties are to be transferred to him:

And whereas it has been represented to His Majesty by the Minister of Pensions that it is

desirable to make further provision in regard to the pensions of Commissioned Warrant Officers and Warrant Officers (including Royal Marine Gunners) of His Majesty's Naval, Reserve, and Marine Forces disabled in consequence of former wars, and to the pensions and allowances of widows and children of such officers whose deaths resulted from former wars:

And whereas the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, having taken the said proposals into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve thereof and to sanction the following Regulations, that is to say:—

1. The pension being paid on the 1st day of April 1919, under the Regulations for the government of His Majesty's Naval Service, to an officer of warrant rank in respect of a disability due directly and wholly to service in a former war may be increased by the difference between such pension and the pension which he might receive, according to the degree of his disablement as certified, under the Order in Council of the 29th September 1917, if he were subject to such Order in Council.

2. The pension and compassionate allowances awarded to the widows and children of officers of warrant rank who were killed in action or died within two years as the result of wounds received in action in former wars, or who were drowned or suffered violent death in an immediate act of duty in a former war, or died from the effects of any injury or disease caused by extraordinary exposure or exertion on service in a former war, within two years after first being certified to be ill or being so injured, and being paid on the 1st day of April 1919, may be increased to the rates which might have been awarded under Articles 11 (1) and 12 (1) of the Order in Council of the 29th September 1917.

3. In these Regulations, unless the context otherwise requires:—

(1) "Officer of warrant rank" has the meaning assigned to it in the Order in Council of the 29th September 1917, as far as applicable.

(2) "Certified" means certified by a Medical Officer or Board of Medical Officers appointed by the Minister of Pensions for the purpose.

(3) "Order in Council of the 29th September 1917," refers to the Order in Council of that date relating to the pensions of officers of warrant rank and the families of such deceased officers.

(4) Any reference to the provisions of the Order in Council of the 29th September 1917 shall include references to such provisions as amended by any other Order in Council, so far as may be applicable.

4. The Minister of Pensions shall be the sole interpreter of these Regulations, and shall give such instructions as he may deem expedient for giving effect thereto.

5. These Regulations shall have effect as from the 1st day of April 1919, provided that any increase of pensions or allowance by virtue of any subsequent Order in Council

shall begin from the date when such Order in Council takes effect.

STATUTORY RULES AND ORDERS,

DEFENCE OF THE REALM.

THE LOCAL AUTHORITIES (GAS AND COAL) (SCOTLAND) ORDER, 1920, DATED OCTOBER 16, 1920, MADE BY THE SECRETARY FOR SCOTLAND UNDER REGULATIONS 2J AND 2JJ OF THE DEFENCE OF THE REALM REGULATIONS.

In pursuance of the powers conferred on me by Regulation 2j as read with Regulation 2jj of the Defence of the Realm Regulations and by arrangement with the Board of Trade, I hereby order as follows:—

(1) In this Order the expression "Local Authority" shall mean the Council of a County or Burgh or any District Committee to which a County Council shall delegate its powers under the Coal (Emergency) Order, 1920.*

(2) I hereby confer and impose upon the Local Authority and upon such of their officers as they may designate or appoint for the purpose the powers and duties necessary to provide for the due discharge within their district, in conformity with the Defence of the Realm Regulations, of the functions assigned to Local Authorities by the Gas and Coal (Emergency) Order, 1920,† the Lighting, Heating and Power (Emergency) Order, 1920,‡ and the Coal (Emergency) Order, 1920.

(3) (a) Any expenses incurred by a Local Authority in the execution of this Order shall be defrayed out of the public health general assessment, provided that such expenses shall not be reckoned in any calculation as to the statutory limit of that assessment.

(b) Where any Local Authorities have combined for any of the purposes of this Order, any expenses incurred by these Local Authorities under this Order shall be defrayed in such proportions as may be agreed upon or in default of agreement as may be determined by me.

(4) A District Committee, Parish Council, Education Authority or other local body may make available without charge, or on such terms as may be agreed, to a Local Authority or to any Committee appointed by the Authority, any of their premises and the services of any of their officers for the purposes of the Gas and Coal (Emergency) Order, 1920, the Lighting, Heating and Power (Emergency) Order, 1920, and the Coal (Emergency) Order, 1920.

(5) This Order may be cited as the Local Authorities (Gas and Coal) (Scotland) Order, 1920.

COMMUNICATION BETWEEN CREDITORS
AND DEBTORS OF BRITISH AND AUSTRIAN NATIONALS.

TREATY OF PEACE (AUSTRIA) ORDER,
1920.

The Administrator of Austrian Property, pursuant to Section 1 (ii) of the Treaty of Peace (Austria) Order, 1920, hereby licenses direct communication between British creditors and Austrian debtors with regard to the adjustment of accounts or settlement of pre-war debts, or debts arising out of pre-war transactions or contracts, due by Austrian nationals to British nationals. The draft of the agreement embodying the terms of the proposed settlement must be submitted in duplicate to the Administrator for his approval, and such approval in writing obtained before any such agreement can be entered into.

Apart from the penalties incurred by the breach of this licence, no agreement for the settlement of such debts or claims will be valid or binding on the parties in the absence of such written approval.

The Administrator also hereby licenses communication in writing between British debtors and Austrian creditors with regard to pre-war debts or debts arising out of pre-war transactions or contracts, with the sole object of ascertaining particulars of indebtedness between the parties, provided that no proposal or suggestion is made for the payment or settlement of such debts except through the Clearing Offices, and that the party so communicating shall retain true copies of such communications and the original replies thereto and hand the same to the Administrator on demand at any time.

Any direct communication outside the scope of this licence is an offence punishable by fine and/or imprisonment.

As a result of discussions which took place in London between the Board of Trade and the Austrian Minister of Finance, the attached memorandum was communicated to the Austrian Government by His Majesty's Representative at Vienna, on the 27th August.

In reply, a note dated the 2nd October has been received by His Majesty's Representative from the Austrian Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, of which a translation is given below.

"By a note dated August 27th, 1920, His Britannic Majesty's Government made known the conditions subject to which Section 3 and the annex thereto of Part X. of the Treaty of St. Germain between the United Kingdom and the British Colonies and Protectorates, with the exception of Egypt on the one hand, and the Austrian Republic on the other, would be applied."

"The Government of the Austrian Republic would accept those conditions with an expression of thanks, and declare it will take the necessary steps to ensure their observance and execution by the Austrian Republic and its citizens in so far as the United Kingdom and India and New Zealand, which have notified their adhesion within the time appointed, are concerned. The Austrian Government, however, takes this opportunity of expressing the hope that still further facilities will be granted to it and to its citizens as regards the settlement of private pre-war debts."

His Britannic Majesty's Government having given notice that they adopt Section 3 and the annex thereto of Part X. of the Treaty of St. Germain as between Austria on the one hand and the United Kingdom and the British Colonies and Protectorates, with the exception of Egypt, on the other hand, and being desirous of affording all opportunity to the Austrian Government for the full execution of their obligations thereunder, are prepared to agree that the said Section and annex shall be subject in their application to the provisions set out below.

H.M. Government expect that the Austrian Government will agree to accept notice of the adoption of the said Section and annex as between Austria and any of the British Dominions or India if given at any time within a period of one month from the present date.

(1) Notwithstanding the provisions of Article 248 (a) of the Treaty of St. Germain, direct communication may be permitted with the consent of the two Clearing Offices between the interested parties with regard to the settlement of debts due by Austrian nationals to British nationals. Such settlements may be permitted with the sanction of the Clearing Offices in each case.

The British Clearing Office will be prepared to consider applications made before 31st March 1921 for the release of property, rights and interests chargeable under paragraph 4 of the annex to Article 249 of the Treaty with a view to the settlement of debts by amicable arrangement, provided that the proportion of the assets so to be released to the amount of the debts removed by the arrangement from the operation of the Clearing Offices is not such as, in the opinion of the British Clearing Office, will have the effect of reducing the dividend payable from Austrian property subject to the charge to British creditors generally.

(2) The proceeds of liquidation of Austrian property, rights and interests and cash assets of Austrians, within the territories of the British Empire in respect of which notice has been given of the adoption of the Clearing Office system, will be credited to the Austrian Government in the account referred to in paragraph 11 of the annex to Article 248.

Similarly, the proceeds of liquidation of British property, rights and interests, and cash assets of British nationals, for which the Austrian Government is liable to account in accordance with the provisions of Section IV. of Part X. of the Treaty of St. Germain, shall be credited to the British Government in this account. Compensation awarded by the Mixed Arbitral Tribunal under paragraph (e) of Article 249 shall also be credited in the same account.

(3) H.M. Government expect that the Austrian Government will use its best endeavours to collect the debts due through the Clearing Offices from its nationals to British nationals as promptly as possible. This requirement applies, in the case of debts originally payable in kronen, only to the original amount in kronen of such debts with interest thereon at the rate provided by Section III. of Part X. of the Treaty.

His Britannic Majesty's Government will not require payment of the balances referred to in paragraph 1 of the annex to Article 248 within the periods therein prescribed. In return the Austrian Clearing Office shall pay to the British Clearing Office not later than the 31st March and the 30th September in each year beginning with the year 1921 the sterling value of the amounts collected from Austrian nationals during the previous six months, the sum to be paid in each half-year being not less than 250,000 pounds sterling or the sterling equivalent of 140,000,000 kronen, whichever of the two is the greater. Each of the first eight minimum payments to be made may, however, be reduced to the extent of 100,000 pounds or the sterling equivalent of 56 million kronen by the amounts previously paid in cash, direct by Austrian debtors to British creditors in accordance with arrangements sanctioned by the Clearing Offices, and provided out of funds which are not chargeable under the Treaty.

Such payments shall continue until the balance against Austria in the account above referred to, with simple interest at 5 per cent., shall have been fully met.

The payment to be made by 31st March 1921, shall include the sterling value at the current rate of exchange of the proceeds of liquidation and cash assets of British nationals referred to in Article 249 (b) (1) of the Treaty of Peace.

(4) H.M. Government propose that the detailed arrangements for the restitution of British property in Austria should form the subject of a further agreement to be arrived at at the earliest possible date.

(5) Subject to the right of the British authorities to refuse permission in any particular case and to the Laws for the time being in force, Austrian nationals will be permitted upon request notified to the appropriate British authority to bid at any sale by auction of their property in the United Kingdom.

(6) It is to be understood that none of the above provisions affect the liability of the Austrian Government under the Treaty of Peace in respect of the currency and rate of exchange at which monies shall be credited through the Clearing Offices.

The Ophthalmic Optical Trade, that is to say :—

1. The operations of making, repairing, or altering spectacles, eye-glasses, or lorgnettes, or any of the component parts of spectacles, eye-glasses, or lorgnettes, when carried on in or in connection with any establishment, or business, or branch, or department, or workroom, in which the workers are mainly engaged in such making, repair, or alteration :

Including the operations known in the trade as :—

grinding, polishing, cleaning, moulding, pitching, mounting, smoothing, truing, surfacing, ranging, cutting, clipping, edging, preparing, drilling, examining, fitting, testing, roughing, emery-washing, bevelling, grooving, checking, wire-bending, assembling, adjusting, soldering, glazing, welding, stamping, rivetting, cementing, splicing, softening, filing, finishing, or similar operations ;

but excluding the operations of making, repairing or altering frames or handles of material other than metal, except when carried on in association with or in conjunction with the operations specified above.

2. The warehousing of, the packing of, and similar operations in regard to any articles when carried on in or in association with or in conjunction with any establishment or business, or branch, or department, or workroom, in which the workers are mainly engaged in any of the operations included in paragraph 1.

AERATED WATERS TRADE BOARD (SCOTLAND).

GENERAL MINIMUM TIME-RATES AND OVERTIME RATES (AS FIXED AND AS VARIED) FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS. EFFECTIVE AS FROM 18TH OCTOBER 1920.*

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October 1918, the Trade Board established in Scotland under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Aerated Waters Trade, as specified in the Trade Boards (Aerated Waters) Order, 1919, having given due Notice on 5th July 1920, of Proposal to Vary the General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for certain classes of Male and Female Workers, hereby give notice as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they have varied the General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates as set out in their Notice dated 11th June 1920, in their application to certain classes of Male and Female Workers specified in the Schedule hereto, and that the Minimum Rates of Wages as Varied, together with the Minimum Rates of Wages which remain unaffected by the Variation, are shown in the Schedule set out below which is incorporated herewith.

The Trade Board further give Notice that they have received notification from the Minister of Labour that he has made an Order dated 14th October 1920, under Section 4 (2) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, confirming the Variation of the Minimum Rates by the Trade Board and specifying 18th October 1920,* as the date from which the Variation of such Minimum Rates shall become effective.

* NOTE.—Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full pay period, but in any case not later than 24th October 1920.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

GENERAL MINIMUM TIME-RATES.

SECTION I.—Male Workers.

(A) Minimum Rates, effective as from 14th June 1920, which are unaffected by the Variation :—

For Workers under 16 years of age, 4½d. per hour.

For Workers of 16 years and under 17 years of age, 5½d. per hour.

For Workers of 17 years and under 18 years of age, 6½d. per hour.

For Workers of 18 years and under 19 years of age, 7½d. per hour.

For Workers of 19 years and under 20 years of age, 9½d. per hour.

For Workers of 20 years and under 21 years of age, 11½d. per hour.

(B) Minimum Rates as Varied, effective as from 18th October 1920 :—

For Workers of 21 years of age and over, 1s. 3d. per hour.

SECTION II.—Female Workers.

(A) Minimum Rates, effective as from 14th June 1920, which are unaffected by the Variation :—

For Workers under 16 years of age, 4½d. per hour.

For Workers of 16 years and under 17 years of age, 5½d. per hour.

For Workers of 17 years and under 18 years of age, 6½d. per hour.

(B) Minimum Rates as Varied, effective as from 18th October 1920 :—

For Workers of 18 years of age and over :—

(a) Who have not completed six months' employment in the trade, 7½d. per hour.

(b) Who have completed six months' employment in the trade, 8d. per hour.

PART II.

OVERTIME RATES—MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS
—ALL AGES.

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board have declared the normal number of hours of work in the Trade to be as follows :

In any week 48

Provided that all hours worked by a worker on Sundays and on generally recognised district Holidays, not exceeding six in number in any one year, shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—The Minimum Rates for Overtime for all Male and Female Workers in respect of hours worked by a worker in excess of the normal number of hours declared by the Trade Board, as set out in Section I. of this Part of this Notice, shall be as follows :—

(1) For all time worked on Sundays and on generally recognised district Holidays, not exceeding six in number in any one year, the Overtime Rate shall be Twice the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.* Double Time.

(2) For all time worked in excess of 48 hours in any week the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Half times the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.* Time-and-a-Half, except in so far as Double Time is payable under the provisions of paragraph (1) of this Section.

NOTE.—The hours which Female Workers, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts.

PART III.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in Scotland in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Aerated Waters) Order, 1919, that is to say :—

The manufacture, wherever carried on, of mineral or aerated waters, non-alcoholic cordials, flavoured syrups, unfermented sweet drinks and other similar beverages, and the manufacture in unlicensed premises of brewed liquors.

Including :—

(a) The operations of bottle washing, bottling and filling, and all other operations preparatory to the sale of any of the aforesaid liquors in bottles, jars, syphons, casks or other similar receptacles ; and

Including also :—

(b) The operations of bottle washing, bottling and filling, and all subsidiary operations preparatory to the sale in bottles, jars or other similar receptacles of cider, ale, stout, porter and other alcoholic beers, where all or any of such last-mentioned operations are or is, conducted or carried on in association with or in conjunction with all or any of the operations specified under (a) above so as to form a common or interchangeable form of employment for workers, and whether the two sets of operations or any of them are, or is carried on simultaneously or not.

PART IV.

SECTION I.—The above General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

SECTION II.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages.

PUBLIC HEALTH SCOTLAND.

CRAIGLOCKHART POORHOUSE SMALLPOX DETENTION ORDER, 1920, MADE BY THE SCOTTISH BOARD OF HEALTH UNDER SECTION 79 OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH (SCOTLAND) ACT, 1897.

Whereas an outbreak of smallpox has occurred in the poorhouse belonging to the City Parish of Edinburgh, known as the Craiglockhart Poorhouse, in the County of Midlothian, and the persons suffering from smallpox have been directly or indirectly in contact with the other inmates and residents in the said poorhouse :

And whereas persons who have been directly or indirectly in contact with such persons are now inmates of the Edinburgh City Parish Children's Home, known as Balgreen House, in the City of Edinburgh (hereinafter referred to as “the Children's Home”);

Now, therefore, the Scottish Board of Health, in virtue of the powers competent to them under Section 79 of the Public Health (Scotland) Act, 1897, and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf, Do Hereby Make the following Order :

1. (1) This Order may be cited as the Craiglockhart Poorhouse Smallpox Detention Order, 1920, and shall have effect for fourteen days from the date hereof, without prejudice to the power of the Board by Order to continue the operation of this Order for a further period.

(2) In this Order, unless the context otherwise requires, “Board” means the Scottish Board of Health.

“Poorhouse” means the Craiglockhart Poorhouse, including the administrative and other buildings in connection therewith other than the Porter's Lodge at Comiston Road, Edinburgh.

2. (1) No person who is or becomes during the operation of this Order, an inmate of or resident in the Poorhouse or the Children's Home shall leave the grounds of the Poorhouse or the grounds of the Children's Home, as the case may be, without the authority in writing of Alfred Maxwell Williamson, M.D., B.Sc., Medical Officer of Health for the City of Edinburgh, whom failing, of Claude B. Ker, M.D., Resident Physician, Edinburgh City Hospital.

(2) Any person aggrieved by the refusal of an authority under the preceding paragraph shall be entitled within forty-eight hours of such refusal to appeal to the Board, who shall be entitled to give such authority, and the decision of the Board shall be final.

3. The authority for the purpose of enforcing the provisions of this Order shall be (a) as respects the Poorhouse, the Suburban District Committee of the County Council of Midlothian, and (b) as respects the Children's Home, the Corporation of the City of Edinburgh.
