**EDINBURGH BOUNDARIES EXTENSION AND TRAMWAYS ACT, 1920,

BURGH OF EDINBURGH.**

In accordance with the requirements of Subsection (5) of Section 71 of the Edinburgh Boundaries Extension and Tramways Act, 1920, and of Subsection (3) of Section 2 of the Education (Scotland) Act, 1918, intimation is hereby given that the Secretary for Scotland proposes to make an Order in the terms annexed hereto, and that before making the said Order he will consider any objections and representations in writing respecting the same received in the Scottish Office, Whitehall, London, S.W. 1, within a month of the date hereof.

Order by the Secretary for Scotland determining the electoral divisions of the education area of the Burgh of Edinburgh, the number of members to be elected to the educational authority, and the apportionment of these members among the electoral divisions of the education area.

In pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by Subsection (5) of Section 71 of the Edinburgh Boundaries Extension and Tramways Act, 1920, and of Section 2 of the Education (Scotland) Act, 1918, I hereby direct that the electoral divisions of the education area of the Burgh of Edinburgh, the number of members to be elected to the education authority of the said area, and the apportionment of such members among the electoral divisions shall be as follows:—

The Home Secretary hereby gives notice, in pursuance of Section 80 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, that he has certified (1) the manufacture of chemicals (including the manufacture of synthetic colouring matters or their intermediates); (2) the manufacture of explosives in which nitro compounds are used; (3) the extraction of metal by a wet process; (4) the treatment of alkali waste or the drainage therefrom; and (5) the distillation of tar or shale oil or any compound, product or residue of tar or shale oil, to be dangerous, and that he proposes to make regulations to apply to all factories and workshops or parts thereof in which such manufactures and processes are carried on.

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES AS VARIED FOR
CERTAIN CLASSES OF FEMALE WORKERS,
EFFECTIVE AS FROM 31ST DECEMBER 1920†
UNTIL 30TH APRIL 1921.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October 1918, the Trade Board established in Great Britain under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for those branches of the trade as specified in the Trade Boards (Rope, Twine, and Net) Order, 1919, having given due notice on the 15th June 1920 of proposals to vary the General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-work Basis Time-Rates, and Overtime Rates for certain classes of female workers, hereby give notice, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they have varied the General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-Rate Basis Time-

† Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full-pay period, but in any case not later than the 6th January 1921.

Rates, and Overtime Rates set out in the Schedule of their notice, dated 1st April 1920, in respect of those classes of female workers specified in Part I. of the Schedule set out below, such variation to remain in operation up to 30th April 1921, and that the Minimum Rates of Wages as varied are as shown in the Schedule set out below.

And the Trade Board further give notice that they have received notification from the Minister of Labour that he has made an Order, dated 13th December 1920, under Section 4 (2) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, confirming the Minimum Rates of Wages as varied by the Trade Board, and specifying the 31st December 1920† as the date from which such Minimum Rates of Wages shall become effective.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

GENERAL MINIMUM TIME-RATES AND PIECE-WORK BASIS TIME-RATES FOR CERTAIN CLASSES OF FEMALE WORKERS.

For Female Workers (other than Home-workers) of 18 years of age and over, during such time as they are employed in the making of Rope of $1\frac{1}{2}$ in. circumference or over; or on processes preparatory thereto, as specified in the Trade Boards (Rope, Twine, and Net) Order, 1919, when carried on in the same factory or workshop as such making, General Minimum Time-Rate, $10\frac{1}{2}$ d. per hour; Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, $11\frac{1}{2}$ d. per hour.

Provided that the above Minimum Rates of Wages shall not apply to workers employed in making wire rope unless made in the same factory or workshop as hemp or similar rope or core for wire rope, General Minimum Time-Rate, $10\frac{1}{2}$ d. per hour; Piece-work Basis Time-Rate, $11\frac{1}{2}$ d. per hour.

PART II.

OVERTIME RATES FOR CERTAIN CLASSES OF FEMALE WORKERS.

Overtime Rates, calculated on the Minimum Rates set out above in the manner set out in the Schedule to the notice fixing Minimum Rates for Overtime issued by the Trade Board, and dated 1st April 1920, shall apply, in substitution for the above Minimum Rates in respect of all hours worked by the above classes of workers in excess of the number of hours therein declared by the Trade Board to be the normal number of hours of work in the trade.

PART III.

SECTION I.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall be paid clear of all deductions, other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION II.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages.

WHOLESALE MANTLE AND COSTUME TRADE BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

PROPOSAL TO VARY MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR FEMALE WORKERS.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour and dated 31st October 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, and the Trade Boards (Women's Clothing) Order, 1919, as varied by the Trade Boards (Shirtmaking) Order, 1920, for the Wholesale Mantle and Costume Trade in Great Britain as defined in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour and dated 20th November 1919, hereby give notice as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they propose to vary the General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-work Basis Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for Female Workers at present fixed and set out in the Schedule to their Notice dated 19th April 1920, and effective under the Order of the Minister of Labour, dated 17th April 1920, the variations proposed being as shown in the Schedule set out below.

SCHEDULE.

PART I.

PROPOSED VARIATION OF GENERAL MINIMUM TIME-RATES FOR FEMALE WORKERS.

SECTION I.—Female Workers (other than Learners as specified in Section II. of this Part of this Schedule), namely:—

(a) Workers other than those specified in Sub-Section (b) of this Section:—

Proposed Variation.

(i) Workers other than Home-Workers as defined by the Trade Board in the above-mentioned Notice dated 19th April 1920, from $8\frac{1}{2}$ d. per hour to 10d. per hour.

(ii) Home-Workers (as so defined), from $8\frac{1}{2}$ d. per hour to 10d. per hour.

(b) Workers employed as Cutters, Trimmers, and Fitters-up (as defined by the Trade Board in the above-mentioned Notice dated 19th April 1920):—

Workers under 19 years of age, from $8\frac{1}{2}$ d. per hour to 10d. per hour.

Workers of 19 and under 20 years of age, from 9d. per hour to $10\frac{1}{2}$ d. per hour.

Workers of 20 years of age and over, $9\frac{1}{2}$ d. per hour to 11d. per hour.

Provided that in the event of any Female Worker being employed for the first time as a Cutter, Trimmer or Fitter-up at or over the age of 19 years, the rate to be paid during the first two months of her employment shall be at 1d.

per hour less than the General Minimum Time-Rate appropriate to her age, as set out in Sub-Section (b) of this Section.

SECTION II.—Female Learners (as defined by the Trade Board in the above-mentioned Notice dated 19th April 1920):—

(a) Learners other than those specified in Sub-Section (b) of this Section:—

The General Minimum Time-Rate for Learners under 14 years of age shall be varied from 2½d. to 2¼d. per hour. Such learners shall from the age of 14 be entitled to the amounts shown in Column I. above, all employment prior to that age being disregarded.

(b) Learners who are occupied wholly or mainly in:—(a) Fitting-up, (b) Hooking-up material composed solely of Cotton or Linen to be used in making overalls and other similar washable garments:—

Proposed Variation, per week of 48 hours.

When employed under 16 years of age, from 15s. to 16s.

When employed at 16 and under 17 years of age, from 18s. to 20s.

When employed at 17 and under 18 years of age, from 22s. to 26s.

SECTION III.—The Weekly rate for Learners as set out in Section II. of this Part of this Schedule are based on a week of 48 hours, and are subject to a proportionate decrease according as the number of hours of employment in any week is less than 48.

PART II.

PROPOSED VARIATION OF PIECE-WORK BASIS TIME-RATES FOR FEMALE WORKERS.

Female Workers (other than Cutters, Trimmers, and Fitters-up, as specified in Section I. (b) of Part I. of this Schedule, and other than Learners occupied in Fitting-up and Hooking-up, as specified in Section II. (b) of Part I. of this Schedule):—

Proposed Variation.

(a) Workers other than Home-Workers as

defined by the Trade Board in the above-mentioned Notice, dated 19th April 1920, from 9½d. per hour to 11d. per hour.

(b) Home-Workers (as so defined), from 9½d. per hour to 11d. per hour.

In-cases where a worker is employed on Piece-work, each Piece-rate paid must be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, not less than 11d. per hour to an ordinary worker. Provided that in determining as to whether any Piece-rate satisfies this condition, regard shall be had to the earnings of workers other than Learners only.

PART III.

PROPOSED VARIATION OF OVERTIME RATES FOR FEMALE WORKERS.

Overtime Rates calculated on the Minimum Rates specified in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule in the manner specified in Part III. of the Schedule to the above-mentioned Notice, dated 19th April 1920, shall apply, in substitution for the rates set out in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule, in respect of all hours worked in excess of the number of hours declared by the Trade Board in the Schedule to the above-mentioned Notice, dated 19th April 1920, to be the normal number of hours of work in the Trade.

NOTE.—The hours which females, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts.

PART IV.

The above proposed Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the

Trade Boards Acts, to all female workers in respect of all time during which they are employed in Great Britain in any branch of the trade specified in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour, dated 20th November 1919, that is to say :—

Women's, Girls', and Children's Ready-made and Wholesale Bespoke Tailoring, and all Women's, Girls', and Children's Retail Bespoke Tailoring carried on in a factory where garments are made up for three or more retail establishments, and any other branch of women's, girls', and children's tailoring which is not included within the scope of the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Trade Board.

including :—

(1) All operations and processes of cutting, making, or finishing by hand or machine of coats, costumes, tailored skirts, coat-frocks, mantles, service clothing, or similar garments made by tailoring processes ;

(2) (a) The altering, repairing, renovating, or re-making of any of the above-mentioned tailored garments, except where included within the scope of the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Trade Board ;

(b) The cleaning of such garments where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the altering, repairing, renovating, or re-making of the garments ;

(3) The lining with fur of any of the above-mentioned garments where carried out in association with or in conjunction with the making of such garments ;

(4) (a) All processes of embroidery or decorative needlework where carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making, altering, repairing, renovating, or re-making of any of the above-mentioned tailored garments other than hand-embroidery or hand-drawn thread work on garments made of linen or cotton or of mixed linen and cotton ;

(b) The following processes if done by machine, namely, thread-drawing, thread-clipping, top-sewing, scalloping, nickelling, and paring ;

(5) Warehousing, packing, and all other operations incidental to or appertaining to any of the above-mentioned branches of tailoring ; but excluding :—

(1) Those branches of Women's or Girls' Bespoke Tailoring and all operations or processes covered by the Trade Boards (Tailoring) Order, 1919 ;

(2) The making of headgear ;

(3) The making of rubberised or oilskin garments ;

(4) Warehousing, packing, and other similar operations carried on in shops mainly engaged in the retail distribution of articles of any description that are not made on the premises.

PART V.

SECTION I.—The above proposed Minimum Rates of Wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subse-

quent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

SECTION II.—The above proposed Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers earning higher rates of wages, or to agreements made, or that may be made, between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of these Minimum Rates of Wages.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above proposal to Vary which may be lodged with them within two months from 21st December 1920. Such Objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Wholesale Mantle and Costume Trade Board (Great Britain), 5 Chancery Lane, London, W.C. 2.

It is desirable that the Objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

AND EXCISE) WARRANT, 1920.

Whereas by the Foreign Parcels (Customs and Excise) Warrant (1914), dated the 21st day of May 1914, provision was made for the delivery from premises licensed for the rectifying and compounding of spirits by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs and Excise for transmission by Parcel Post to places out of the United Kingdom of such tinctures as the said Commissioners might from time to time allow;

And whereas it is desirable to make provision for the delivery from premises licensed for the rectifying and compounding of spirits by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs and Excise for exportation or drawback by Parcel Post of such spirits of wine and "tinctures" as defined by Section 4 of the Revenue Act, 1906, as the said Commissioners may from time to time allow, and it is desirable to make provision for the delivery from the premises of exporters for exportation on drawback by Parcel Post of such British manufactured saccharin, coffee, chicory, coffee and chicory mixtures, and British refined sugar as the said Commissioners may from time to time allow;

We, the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers conferred on us by the 14th Section of the Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, made on the recommendation of the said Commissioners and of His Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by their respectively signing the same), order, direct, and declare as follows:—

1. The provisions of sections 100, 102, 104, and 114 of the Customs Consolidation Act, 1876, of Section 7 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, and of the Foreign Parcels (Customs) Warrant, 1885, shall not apply to parcels of spirits of wine or such tinctures as aforesaid delivered from premises licensed for the rectifying and compounding of spirits nor to British manufactured saccharin, coffee, chicory, coffee and chicory mixtures and British refined sugar delivered from the premises of exporters thereof for exportation on drawback by the Foreign and Colonial Parcel Post.

2. The provisions of Sections 117 and 118 of the Customs Consolidation Act, 1876, shall apply to such parcels with the modification that the proper Officer of Customs and Excise shall in place of certifying the shipment and exportation of the goods certify that the certificate of posting hereinafter mentioned has been duly received; and instead of a declaration by the exporter or his agent that the goods

have been actually exported and not relanded there shall be a declaration by the exporter or his agent that the goods have been duly delivered to an Officer of the Post Office in accordance with the provisions of this warrant.

3. Every such parcel on its removal to the Post Office shall be accompanied by an authority for its exportation on drawback by parcel post signed by an Officer of Customs and Excise.

4. The Officer of the Post Office accepting such parcel, duly accompanied by the authority aforesaid, shall give the sender a certificate on such authority of the posting of the parcel.

5. The delivery of such parcels from the premises licensed for the rectifying and compounding of spirits as aforesaid of spirits of wine or tinctures and of the said other articles from the premises of the exporter shall be subject to such security and to such special conditions as to the said Commissioners of Customs and Excise may from time to time prescribe.

6. If any claim shall be made on the Postmaster-General for compensation in respect of the loss of or damage to any such parcel, that claim shall, in the absence of proof to the contrary, be deemed to be conclusive evidence that such parcel has not been duly exported, and that its contents have gone into consumption in the United Kingdom, and any drawback paid shall be repaid by the exporter.

7. The Foreign Parcels (Customs and Excise) Warrant, 1914, is hereby revoked.

8. This Warrant shall come into operation on the 1st day of November 1920.

9. This Warrant may be cited as the "Foreign Parcels (Customs and Excise) Warrant, 1920."
