(3) Wardmaid at a Hospital, which work entails cleaning wards and bringing in the patient's food in the said Metropolitan Asylums Board's Institutions ;

(4) Baker at a Training Colony ;

(5) Laundry man at a Training Colony,
is such employment as to make the said persons employed persons within the meaning of the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920.

Now, therefore, the Minister, by virtue of the power conferred on him by Section 10 of the said Act, decides that the said employments are not such as to make the said persons employed persons within the meaning of the said Act.

Given under the Official Seal of the Minister of Labour this Sixteenth day of December, in the year One thousand nine hundred and twenty.

Whether the employment by the said Metropolitan Asylums Board of a person as—

(6) Caretaker, whose duty entails cleaning and looking after a Casual Ward, the said Ward not at present being in use, is such employment as to make the said person an employed person within the meaning of the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920.

Now, therefore, the Minister, by virtue of the power conferred on him by Section 10 of the said Act, decides that the said employment is such as to make the said person an employed person within the meaning of the said Act.

Given under the Official Seal of the Minister of Labour this Twenty-first day of December, in the year One thousand nine hundred and twenty.

Whether the employment by the said Metropolitan Asylums Board of persons as—

(7) Motor Driver at an Ambulance Station whose duties are to drive the ambulances owned by the said Metropolitan Asylums Board;

(8) Stableman, at a Bacteriological Laboratory, and as such grooms, feeds and generally attends to the horses kept in connection with the preparation of diphtheria antitoxic serum, is such employment as to make the said persons employed persons within the meaning of the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920.

Now, therefore the Minister, by virtue of the power conferred on him by Section 10 of the said Act, decides that the said employments are such as to make the said persons employed persons within the meaning of the said Act.

Given under the Official Seal of the Minister of Labour this Twenty-second day of December, in the year One thousand nine hundred and twenty.

Whether the employment by the said Metropolitan Asylums Board of persons as—

(9) Stores porter at a Training Colony, and as such receives, checks and issues out stores, food and clothing in the store room in the said Board's Institutions;

(10) Porter at a Training Colony, and as such is engaged in transporting coals and furniture, cleaning windows, and helping to carry patients at the Institutions maintained by the the said Board;

(11) As yard Foreman at a Hospital, and as such is in charge of the stable yard staff and motor drivers in the yards at certain of the said Metropolitan Asylums Board's Institutions,

RULES PUBLICATION ACT, 1893.

In conformity with the provisions of Section 1 of the Statute 56 and 57 Victoria, ch. 66, notice is hereby given that the Secretary of State for India in Council proposes, with the advice and assistance of the Civil Service Commissioners, at the expiry of forty days from the date of this Gazette, to make Rules as shown below, in pursuance of the powers conferred on him by Section 97 (1) of the Government of India Act, 1915-1916, for the revision of Regulations Nos. 7 and 8 of the existing Regulations for the Indian Civil Service Open Competitive Examination.

On account of urgency the Secretary of State in Council has, under Section 2 of the Statute 56 and 57 Victoria, ch. 66, made these Rules to come into operation forthwith as provisional rules to continue in force until Rules have been made in accordance with the provisions of Section 1 of that Act.

RULES.

For Regulations Nos. 7 and 8 of the existing Regulations for Examinations for the Indian Civil Service which stand as follows:—

7. Selected Candidates, before proceeding to India, will be on probation for one year, at the end of which time they will undergo an examination, called the Final Examination, in the following compulsory subjects †:—

1. Indian Penal Code	400
2. Code of Criminal Procedure ..	200
3. The Indian Evidence Act	200
4. Indian History	400
5. The principal Vernacular Language of the Province to which the Candidate is assigned	400

The principal Vernacular Language prescribed for each Province to which Candidates are assigned is as follows:—

For the United Provinces of Agra and Oudh, the Punjab or the Central Provinces—Hindustani.

For Bengal or Assam—Bengali.

(Unless it is the Candidate's mother tongue.)

For Bihar and Orissa—Hindustani.

For Burma—Burmese.

For Bombay—Marathi.

(Unless it is the Candidate's mother tongue.)

For Madras—Tamil or Telugu.

(At the option of the Candidate.)

In Hindustani the Candidate will be required to be acquainted with both the Persian and the Nagari character.

A Candidate assigned to Bengal or Assam, whose mother tongue is Bengali, must offer for examination Hindustani; a Candidate assigned to Bombay, whose mother tongue is Marathi, must offer for examination Hindustani; and a Candidate assigned to Madras, whose mother tongue is either of the languages shown against

his Province, must offer the other for examination.

8. Selected Candidates may in addition offer in the Final Examination one of the following optional subjects :—

CORN PRODUCTION ACT, 1917.

THE DISTRICT AGRICULTURAL WAGES COMMITTEE FOR THE NORTHERN COUNTIES DISTRICT (No. 1).

NOTICE OF THE COMING INTO FORCE OF THE MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR AGRICULTURAL WORKMEN IN THE AREA COMPRISING THE COUNTY OF ORKNEY.

The District Agricultural Wages Committee for the Northern Counties District (No. 1), duly certified by the Board of Agriculture for Scotland under the Second Schedule of the Corn Production Act, 1917, hereby give notice that the following Minimum Rates of Wages for workmen employed in Agriculture for time-work, which were varied and fixed by them on the twenty-sixth day of October 1920, in terms of the Schedule hereto, not having been disallowed by the Central Agricultural Wages Committee for Scotland, have come into force, under Clause 6 of the Second Schedule, with effect from the said twenty-sixth day of October 1920, and will remain in force until cancelled or varied, either wholly or in part, by the Committee.

SCHEDULE.

All male workers of 21 years and over, 41s. per week.

All male workers between 18 and 21 years, 36s. per week.

Boys between 16 and 18 years, 21s. per week.

Boys under 16 years, 15s. per week.

Female workers over 18 years, 24s. per week.

Female workers over 18 years who are casually employed, 4s. per day.

Girls between 16 and 18 years, 20s. per week.

Girls under 16 years, 15s. per week.

The area of employment affected by the foregoing rates consists of the County of Orkney.

The District Agricultural Wages Committee have varied and fixed the foregoing rates on the footing that the number of working hours is the number of hours customarily wrought in the district in which the workman is employed.

None of the foregoing rates applies to Disabled Service Men under Training in Forestry or to Agricultural Students, and these classes are excluded from the foregoing rates.

The rates specified in the foregoing Schedule are inclusive of the value of any benefits or advantages which may be reckoned as part payment of wages in lieu of payment in cash.

Applications for Permits of Exemption from the operation of the minimum wage provisions of the Corn Production Act under the Proviso to Section 5 (3) should be addressed to The Secretary, District Agricultural Wages Committee for the Northern Counties District, 14 Orlig Street, Thurso, from whom forms of application for a Permit can be obtained.

Complaints under Section 6 regarding the inadequacy of payments for piece-work and complaints under Section 7 regarding infringement of the Orders fixing Minimum Rates should be sent to the same address.

* Section 8 of the Corn Returns Act, 1882, provides that where returns of purchases of British Corn are made to the local inspector of Corn Returns in any other measure than the imperial bushel or by weight or by a weighed measure, that Officer shall convert such returns into the imperial bushel, and in the case of weight or weighed measure the conversion is to be made at the rate of sixty imperial pounds for every bushel of wheat, fifty imperial pounds for every bushel of barley, and thirty-nine imperial pounds for every bushel of oats.

NOTE.—The above prices are based on returns received from Inspectors during the week named. They represent on the whole the average prices ruling in the preceding week.

BURGH OF MILNGAVIE.

REVISION, ALTERATION, AND EXTENSION OF THE BURGH BOUNDARIES.

A PETITION by the Provost, Magistrates, and Councillors of the Burgh of Milngavie has been presented to The Honourable The Sheriff of the County of Dumbarton, craving his Lordship:—

(First) To revise, alter, and extend the boundaries of the said Burgh for the purposes of the Burgh Police (Scotland) Acts, and the Town Councils (Scotland) Acts, and to define in a written Deliverance the new boundaries of the said Burgh in manner following, *videlicet*:—Commencing at the south at the junction of the Old Town Road with the Glasgow Road; thence north-eastward along the east side of Glasgow Road to the Old Road into Dougalston; thence eastward along the south side of the Old Road to a point opposite the fence on the east side of the Barloch Farm Road; thence

northward straight across the Old Road to a point about 215 feet or thereby south of Baldernock Road; thence east-north-eastwards through enclosures 7196 and 187 to a point about 990 feet or thereby from the aforementioned point; thence northwards through enclosures 187, 174, 173, 171, and 170 to a point on the south side of Strathblane Road about 160 feet or thereby measuring eastwards from the east side of the Road of Access to Barloch Farm; thence westward along the south side of Strathblane Road to the east side of the Road of Access to Barloch Farm; thence across Strathblane Road to the south-west corner of field 168; thence northwards along the west fence of field 168 to the boundary wall of Craigmaddie Reservoir; thence north-westward along the boundary wall of Craigmaddie Reservoir to the top of 800; thence south-westwards along said boundary wall for a distance of 70 feet or thereby; thence westward to the west side of Road 801 leading to Mugdock Reservoir; thence northward along the east boundary of enclosure 803 to the north-east corner of said enclosure; thence westward along the north boundaries of enclosures 803 and 149 until it reaches the north-east corner of enclosure 146; thence north-westward along the north boundary of enclosure 146 until it reaches the north-west corner; thence southward along the west side of enclosure 145 for a distance of 280 feet or thereby; thence westwards across Mugdock Road and straight to the north-west corner of field 808; thence south-south-westward towards Clobberfield House until it reaches the centre of the Allander Water; thence along the centre of said water to a point in line with the fence between fields 769 and enclosure 811 at Clobberfield Lodge; thence south-westward along said fence to the east side of Road 766 and across said Road to the point where the fence between field 765 and plantation 813 joins the Road; thence north-westward along the north-west boundary of enclosure 766 until it reaches the north-west corner of same enclosure; thence along the west-north-west boundary of enclosure 765 to the south-west corner; thence in a straight line crossing Craigton Road and passing through enclosures 767, 764, and 738a to the north-west corner of enclosure 739; thence in a south-westerly direction along the west boundary of enclosure 739 until it reaches a point opposite on the fence in enclosure 740; thence in a south-easterly direction until it meets the wall between enclosures 740 and 742; thence eastward in a straight line to the north-east corner of enclosure 742; thence south-westwards along the west boundary of enclosure 736; thence across Craigdow Road 701 and along the west boundaries of enclosures 702, 703, and 686, to the south-east corner of enclosure 699; thence westward along the south boundary of enclosure 699 until it meets the west-south-west boundary of enclosure 686a; thence south-eastward along the west boundaries of enclosures 686, 671, and 652 until it reaches the south-west corner of enclosure 652; thence in a north-easterly and afterwards in an easterly direction along the southern boundaries of enclosures 652 and 648 until it reaches the south-east corner of the last-mentioned enclosure; thence along the west side of Glasgow Road 627 to a point opposite the commencement; thence across Glasgow Road from the last-mentioned point to the point of commencement.
