The Colony of the Gambia.

OVERSEAS TRADE.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF TRADE, DATED 17TH FEBRUARY 1921, UNDER SECTION 3 OF THE OVERSEAS TRADE (CREDITS AND INSURANCE) ACT, 1920 (10 & 11 Geo. 5, c. 29), ADDING AUSTRIA TO THE SCHEDULE TO THAT ACT.

Whereas by Section 1 of the above-mentioned Act the Board of Trade were empowered to grant credits to persons domiciled in, or to Companies incorporated by or under the laws of, the United Kingdom in connection with the export to any country specified in the Schedule to the said Act of goods wholly or partly produced or manufactured in the United Kingdom, subject to the limitations and provisions contained in the said section, and to undertake the business of the insurance of any such goods as aforesaid as therein mentioned:

And whereas by Section 3 of the said Act the Board of Trade were further empowered to add to the said Schedule the name of any country the industrial and financial condition of which has been disorganised by the War:
