NOTICE is hereby given that His Majesty's Lord High Commissioner to the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland will hold a Levée at His Majesty's Palace of Holyrood House, at 10.30 A.M., on Tuesday the 24th day of May, being the first day of Meeting of the General Assembly, on which occasion all those holding His Majesty's Commission or other Gentlemen are required to appear in Uniform Military Service Dress (with Swords), Court, Highland or Evening Dress.

There will be no Procession but Their Graces will drive in semi-state by the Calton Hill, Princes Street, and the Mound.

WHEREAS it is, among other things, enacted by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, that the Legislature of any British Possession may by any Act of Ordinance, confirmed by His Majesty in Council, repeal wholly or in part any provisions of the said Act (other than those of the third part thereof which relate to emigrant ships) relating to ships registered in that Possession, but that any such Act or Ordinance shall not take effect until the approval of His Majesty has been proclaimed in the Possession or until such time thereafter as may be fixed by the Act or Ordinance for the purpose:

And whereas it is also enacted by the said Act that the Legislature of a British Possession may by any Act or Ordinance regulate the coast-ing trade of that British Possession, subject in every case to the following conditions:—

(a) The Act or Ordinance shall contain a suspending clause providing that the Act or Ordinance shall not come into operation until His Majesty's pleasure thereon has been
