WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 26th day of October 1921 (N.P. (2) 330/21), in the words following, viz :—

“Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner and subject to such restrictions, conditions and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council :

“And whereas the Regulations for the government of Your Majesty's Naval Service do not admit of men of the Royal Navy or Royal Marines who were transferred to the Royal Air Force under the provisions of the Air Force (Constitution) Act, 1917, counting their time whilst serving with the Royal Air Force towards promotion and increase of pay in their Royal Naval rating or Royal Marine rank, upon subsequently re-entering into the Royal Navy or Royal Marines, after discharge from the Royal Air Force :

“And whereas we consider that members of the Royal Navy or Royal Marines should be

allowed, at our discretion, to count their service in the Royal Air Force towards promotion and increase of pay upon re-entry into the Royal Navy or Royal Marines after discharge from the Royal Air Force :

“We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to sanction the counting at our discretion of time served by men of the Royal Navy or Royal Marines transferred to the Royal Air Force, towards promotion and increase of pay in the Royal Navy or Royal Marines on re-entry into the Naval Service, or the Corps of Royal Marines the equivalent Naval rating or Marine rank of the rank assigned to the men in the Royal Air Force being agreed upon by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty and the Air Council, subject to the re-entries for—

(1) *Continuous Service* being not later than one month after the date of final discharge from the Royal Air Force.

(2) *Non-Continuous Service* being within the period allowed by the existing Regulations for men re-entering for further service after discharge on completion of a Non-Continuous Service Engagement.

“The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal.”

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

TENDERS FOR LOANS ON TREASURY  
BILLS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office at the Bank of England, on Friday, the 11th November 1921, at 1 o'clock, for Treasury Bills to be issued under the Treasury Bills Act, 1877, the National Debt Act, 1889, and the War Loan Acts, 1914 to 1919, to the amount of £45,000,000.

2. The Bills will be in amounts of £5,000 or £10,000. They will be dated at the option of the Tenderer on any date from Monday, the 14th November, to Saturday, the 19th November, inclusive, and will be payable at three months after date.

3. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

4. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000, and must specify the date on which the Bills required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one penny) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bills of different dates.

5. Tenders must be made through a London Banker, Discount House or Broker.

6. The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same not later than the following day, and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of Cash or a Banker's Draft on the Bank of England not later than two o'clock (Saturday, twelve o'clock) on the day on which the relative Bills are dated.

7. In virtue of the provisions of Section 26 of the Finance Act, 1915, Members of the House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills.

2. For Overtime after the first two hours of Overtime on any day except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, and for all Overtime on Saturdays, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Half.

3. For all time worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be Twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Double Time.

4. For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Quarter, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of sub-paragraphs 2 and 3 of this paragraph.

(b) For Workers other than Learners (as defined in Part V. of this Schedule) employed on Piece-Work :—

Workers (other than Learners) employed on Piece-Work shall receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked, in addition to Piece-Rates, each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary Worker not less than the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable, an amount equal to the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, or to One-Half of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, or to One-Quarter of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the provisions of paragraph (a) of this Section if the Worker had been employed on Time-Work were Double Time, Time-and-a-Half, or Time-and-a-Quarter respectively,

(c) For Learners (as defined in Part V. of this Schedule) employed on Piece-Work :—

Learners employed on Piece-Work shall receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked, in addition to Piece-Rates, each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary Worker not less than the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable, an amount equal to the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, or to One-Half of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, or to One-Quarter of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the provisions of paragraph (a) of this Section if the Worker had been employed on Time-Work were Double Time, Time-and-a-Half, or Time-and-a-Quarter respectively.

## SECTION III.

The Provisions of this Part of this Notice are subject to the proviso that :—

(a) Where it is or may become the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on five days a week the Overtime Rates shall only be payable on such days after 9½ hours have been worked.

(b) Where it is or may become the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on alternate Saturdays, the Overtime Rates in the week in which attendance on Saturday is required shall only be payable after 50 hours have been worked.

NOTE.—The hours which Female Workers, Young Persons and Children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts and of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

## PART V.

## SECTION I.

For the purpose of this notice the following definitions shall apply :—

A Female Learner is a worker who :—

(a) Is employed by an employer who provides such Learner with reasonable facilities for practically and efficiently learning the branch or branches of the trade (as carried on by the employer subject to the provisions of this section) in which the Learner is for the time being employed; provided that no person shall be deemed to be a Learner if employed for a longer period than six months on any one or more than twelve months on any two or more of the following processes, *viz.*, carrying about; collecting work from benches and machines; lidding-up (other than round boxes); tying-up and nesting :—except in so far as any of the aforementioned processes may be incidental to any other process upon which the worker may be engaged.

(b) Has received a certificate or has been registered in accordance with rules from time to time laid down by the Trade Board, or has made application for such

certificate or registration, which has been duly acknowledged and is still under consideration. Provided that the certification or registration of a Learner may be cancelled if the other conditions of Learnership are not complied with.

Provided that an employer may employ a Female Learner on her first employment without a certificate or registration for a probation period not exceeding eight weeks, but the probation period shall be included in her period of Learnership.

Provided that, notwithstanding compliance with the conditions contained in this Section, a person shall not be deemed to be a Learner if she works in a room used for dwelling purposes and is not in the employment of her parent or guardian.

## SECTION II.

The expression "Homeworker" means a worker who works in her own home or in any other place not under the control or management of the employer.

## PART VI.

The above Minimum Rates shall apply subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to:—

- (a) All Male Workers of the classes specified in Part I. of this Schedule in respect of all time during which they are employed in that branch of the Box Trade in Great Britain which is engaged in the making of boxes or parts thereof, made wholly or partially of paper, cardboard, chip or similar material; and to
- (b) all Female Workers in Great Britain who :
  - (i) Are engaged in manufacturing processes upon boxes or parts thereof made wholly or partially of paper, cardboard, chip or similar material, and generally, to all workers directly connected with such processes; or
  - (ii) Are engaged in transferring material from the store-room to the factory or workshop, and to workers engaged in transferring finished boxes from the factory or workshop to the warehouse, if such workers are also to any considerable extent engaged in connection with the work of distributing the material among, or collection of the

finished boxes from, the workers engaged in the processes of box-making.

They shall not apply to Female Workers who :

- (i) Are wholly or mainly engaged in occupations in a store-room which involves no change in, or treatment of, the material necessary to its being made into boxes; or
- (ii) Are wholly or mainly engaged in a warehouse on occupations directly connected with the storage or despatch of finished boxes which involve no examination or change in the form of such boxes; or
- (iii) Are wholly or mainly engaged in transferring material in bulk from the store-room to the factory or workshop; or
- (iv) Are wholly or mainly engaged in transferring finished boxes from the factory or workshop to the warehouse, or from the warehouse for despatch to customers; or
- (v) Wherever employed are engaged as clerks, telephone attendants, and others whose work stands in relationship to the trade similar to that of such workers.

## PART VII.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

Provided that all hours worked by a worker on Sundays and on Customary Public and Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.

The Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked by a Worker in excess of the declared normal number of hours of work in the trade, shall be as follows :—

(A)—WORKERS EMPLOYED ON TIME-WORK.

- (1) For the first two hours of Overtime on any day, except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Quarter.
- (2) For the second two hours of Overtime on any day except Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Half Times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Half.
- (3) For all time worked on Sundays and Customary Public and Statutory Holidays and for Overtime after the first four hours on any other day the Overtime Rate shall be Twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Double-Time.
- (4) For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter Times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Quarter, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs 2 and 3 of this Part of this Section.

Provided that—

- (a) Where it is or may become the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on five days a week, the Overtime Rates shall only be payable on such days after 9½ hours have been worked.
- (b) Where it is or may become the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on alternate Saturdays, the Overtime Rates in the week in which attendance on Saturday is required shall only be payable after 50 hours have been worked.

(B)—WORKERS EMPLOYED ON PIECE-WORK.

I.—All Male Workers (including Learners) employed on Piece-Work, shall receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked as set out in this Part of this Schedule, in addition to payment at Piece-Rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker not less than the General Minimum Time-Rate applicable, an amount equal to One-Quarter of the General Minimum Time-Rate, to One-Half of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate or to the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the provisions of Sub-section (A) of this Section, if the worker had been employed on Time-Work, were Time-and-a-Quarter, Time-and-a-Half or Double-Time respectively.

## II.—Female Workers :—

- (i) Female Workers other than Learners employed on Piece-Work shall receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked as set out in this Part of this Schedule in addition to payment at Piece-Rates each of which would yield in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary worker not less than the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable, an amount equal to one-quarter of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, to one-half of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, or to the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the provisions of Sub-section (A) of this Section, if the worker had been employed on Time-Work, were Time-and-a-Quarter, Time-and-a-Half or double-Time respectively.
- (ii) Female Learners employed on Piece-Work shall receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked as set out in this Part of this Schedule, in addition to payment at Piece-Rates, each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker not less than the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable, an amount equal to One-Quarter of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, to One-Half of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, or to the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the provisions of Sub-Section (A) of this Section, if the worker had been employed on Time-Work, were Time-and-a-Quarter, Time-and-a-Half, or Double-Time respectively.

NOTE.—The hours which Female Workers, Young Persons and Children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshops Acts, and of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

### PART V.

#### SECTION I.

For the purpose of this Notice the following definitions shall apply :—

A Machine Tackler is a male person who is engaged in setting, adjusting, and keeping running Paper Bag Machines and in superintending and carrying through all other operations that can be performed in whole or in part by such machines.

#### SECTION II.

A Male Learner is a worker under 21 years of age, who while employed is engaged during the whole or a substantial part of his time in learning some branch or process of the trade.

#### SECTION III.

A Female Learner is a worker who—

- (i) Is employed by an employer who provides such Learner with reasonable facilities for practically and efficiently learning the branch or branches of the trade in

which the Learner is for the time being employed ; and

- (ii) Has received a certificate or has been registered in accordance with rules from time to time laid down by the Trade Board, or has made application for such certificate or registration, which has been duly acknowledged and is still under consideration. Provided that the certification or registration of a Learner may be cancelled if the other conditions of learnership are not complied with.

Provided that an employer may employ a Female Learner on her first employment without a certificate or registration for a probation period not exceeding eight weeks, but the probation period shall be included in her period of learnership.

Provided also that notwithstanding compliance with the conditions contained in this Section, a person shall not be deemed to be a Learner if she works in a room used for dwelling purposes, and is not in the employment of her parent or guardian.

#### SECTION IV.

The expression "Homeworker" means a worker who works in her own home or in any other place not under the control or management of the employer.

### PART VI.

#### SECTION I.

Subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, the respective Minimum Rates of Wages set out in this Schedule shall apply to all Workers in Great Britain in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Paper Bag) Order, 1919, and set out in Section II. below.

#### SECTION II.

The Paper Bag Trade as specified in the Trade Boards (Paper Bag) Order, 1919, is as follows :—

The manufacture from paper (including gauze-lined or cloth-lined paper) of any bag or container without a gummed flap, including the operations of packing, parcelling, warehousing, receiving, store-keeping, despatching, time-keeping, lift-operating, and cleaning, when these operations are carried on in connection with paper-bag manufacture and including the printing of paper bags when the printing apparatus is attached to the making apparatus, but excluding the manufacture of bags or containers with ungummed flaps (for use in the transmission of printed matter or samples) when made by the same processes as gummed envelopes and excluding the manufacture of receptacles from cardboard, such as boxes, cartons or skillets.

### PART VII.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages are to be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

The Minister of Labour has given his consent to the issue of this Notice.

PART II.

PROPOSED VARIATION OF GENERAL MINIMUM TIME-RATES FOR MALE IMPROVERS (AS HEREIN DEFINED) IN TENTING OR DRESSING.

A Male Improver in Tenting, that is to say, a male worker who has completed a term of four years apprenticeship in accordance with the provisions of this Schedule with regard to Male Apprentice Tenters, shall receive during the first year of his employment as a Tenter, subsequent to the completion of his apprenticeship, 40s. per week.

A Male Improver in Dressing, that is to say, a male worker who has completed a term of three years apprenticeship in accordance with the provisions of this Schedule with regard to Male Apprentice Dressers, shall receive during the first year of his employment as a Dresser, subsequent to the completion of his apprenticeship, 32s. per week.

PART III.

DEFINITION OF "WEEK."

SECTION I.

(a) In the case of classes of whole-time workers employed by the week or longer period, whose customary working week consists of a number of hours less than 48 but not less than 44, "a week" means a week of the number of hours customarily worked by the class in question.

(b) In all other cases "a week" means a week of 48 hours.

SECTION II.

For the purpose of calculating the hourly rate applicable in respect of each hour of employment the rates set out in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule must be divided:—

(a) In the case of the workers referred to in Section I. (a) of this part by the number of number of hours per week customarily worked by the class in question.

(b) In all other cases by 48.

SECTION III.

Payment at not less than the hourly rate calculated as described in Section II. of this Part must be made for all hours of employment whether in excess of the customary working week or not, except for those hours in respect of which a higher rate is payable under the overtime provisions specified in part IV. below.

PART IV.

PROPOSED VARIATION OF OVERTIME RATES FOR MALE APPRENTICES AND IMPROVERS IN TENTING AND DRESSING.

Overtime Rates, calculated on the proposed General Minimum Time-Rates specified in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule in the manner set out in the Schedule to the Notice F.H.(6) issued by the Trade Board and dated 21st October 1921, shall apply in substitution for the rates set out in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule, in respect of all hours worked in excess of the number of hours declared by the Trade Board in the Schedule to the Notice F.H.(6), dated 21st October 1921, to be the normal number of hours of work in the trade.

## PART V.

For the purpose of the application of the Minimum Rates set out in Parts I., II., and IV. of this Schedule, an Apprentice is defined as being a male worker of 16 years of age or over who:—

- (a) Is employed during the whole of his time in accordance with the provisions of this Schedule under an Indenture (duly stamped) for a period of four years in the case of apprentice tenters or for a period of three years in the case of apprentice dressers, in the form prescribed by the Trade Board as set out in Part VI. of this Schedule, and
- (b) Has been registered with the Trade Board in accordance with rules from time to time laid down by the Trade Board, or has made an application for such registration which has been duly acknowledged, and is still under consideration.

Provided that:—

- (i) The registration may be cancelled if the other conditions of apprenticeship are not complied with.
- (ii) An employer may employ a worker at the minimum rates and under the special conditions for apprentices without registration for a probation period not exceeding twelve weeks; but in the event of such worker being continued thereafter at his employment as an Apprentice, the probation period shall be included in his period of apprenticeship.

## PART VI.

FORM OF INDENTURE OF APPRENTICESHIP PRESCRIBED BY THE ABOVE TRADE BOARD.

- (a) That he will keep the Apprentice as his Apprentice during the said term and to the best of his power, skill and knowledge instruct the Apprentice or cause him to be instructed in the section of the Flax and Hemp Trade known as \_\_\_\_\_

- (b) That he will keep the Apprentice under his own supervision or place him under a fully qualified Journeyman (or Journeymen).
- (c) That he will pay to the Apprentice every week during the said term wages in accordance with the appropriate scale of wages as fixed and as varied from time to time for Male Apprentices by the Trade Board, subject always to the wages being paid pro rata in the event of the Employer being unavoidably compelled to work short time for any period, and provided that should the period of short time last for four continuous months the parties may agree to cancel the Indenture.
- (d) That, in the event of the Apprentice being absent from work through ill health and in receipt of sickness benefit under the National Insurance Act or through unemployment within the meaning of the Unemployment Insurance Act, the Employer shall not be bound to pay wages to the Apprentice in accordance with Clause 2 (c) of this Indenture.
- (e) That if the Employer shall die or become permanently incapacitated through illness or injury (to be certified by a fully qualified Medical Practitioner), or cease to carry on the said trade of \_\_\_\_\_ before the expiration of the said term of apprenticeship, then and in any such case, the Employer or his Executors or his Administrators, as the case may be, shall, after obtaining the consent and approval of the Guardian and of the said Apprentice, which consent and approval shall not be unreasonably withheld, use all reasonable efforts to find another suitable employer for the Apprentice to take over this Indenture.
- (f) That in the event of the death, incapacity or removal of the Guardian from the district in which the Apprentice resides, it shall be open to the Apprentice to propose to the Employer in writing that the Indenture be cancelled, and the Employer shall not unreasonably withhold his consent to the cancellation of the Indenture on these grounds.
- (g) That he will not hold the Apprentice liable to make good the value of any work which he may spoil whilst learning his trade, except in the case of wilful or malicious damage
- (h) That he will cause the Apprentice to attend during the terms of this Indenture such approved technical classes as may be agreed by the parties concerned in the Indenture, the Apprentice to suffer no loss of wages by reason of such attendance or by reason of his attendance at school in accordance with the Education Act, 1918, and the time so spent to be reckoned as an equivalent part of the usual working hours and not extra thereto.
- (i) That he will supply the Apprentice forthwith, upon its execution, with a true copy of this Indenture.

3. In consideration of the premises, the Guardian and the Apprentice jointly and severally covenant with the Employer as follows:—

- (a) That the Apprentice shall truly and faithfully during the said term serve the

Employer as his Apprentice, and his secrets keep, and shall diligently attend to the said trade and at all times willingly obey the lawful and reasonable commands of the Employer, and shall not absent himself from the Employer's service without leave.

- (b) That the Apprentice shall not do any damage or knowingly suffer any damage to be done to the goods, moneys or other property of the Employer.
- (c) That the Apprentice shall willingly perform all such shop duties as are usually done by Apprentices.
- (d) That the Apprentice shall attend such continuation classes between the hours of 9 a.m. and 7 p.m. as the Employer desires, provided that the Apprentice suffer no loss of wages by reason of such attendance.
- (e) That in case the Apprentice shall at any time during the said term be wilfully disobedient to lawful orders or commands of the said Employer, or be slothful or negligent or shall otherwise grossly misbehave himself towards the Employers, then it shall be lawful to cancel this Indenture and discharge the said Apprentice.

4. Any matter in dispute between the parties arising out of the interpretation or application of the terms of the clauses of this Indenture shall be submitted to the Chairman of the Trade Board for the time being with a view to a settlement.

## SECTION II.

- (a) In the case of classes of whole-time workers employed by the week or longer period, whose customary working week consists of a number of hours less than 48 but not less than 40 a "week" means a week of the number of hours customarily worked by the class in question.
- (b) In all other cases a "week" means a week of 48 hours.

## SECTION III.

For the purpose of calculating the hourly rate applicable in respect of each hour of employment, the rates set out above must be divided—

- (a) In the case of the workers referred to in Section II. (a) above by the number of hours per week customarily worked by the class in question:
- (b) In all other cases by 48.

## SECTION IV.

Payment at not less than the hourly rate, calculated as described in Section III., must be made for *all* hours of employment (not merely for those constituting a "week" as described in Section II.), except in so far as higher rates are payable under Part II. below.

## PART II.

PROPOSED VARIATION OF OVERTIME RATES  
FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS (ALL  
AGES).

In lieu of the Overtime Rates as at present fixed, Overtime Rates calculated on the Proposed Minimum Rates specified in Part I. of this Schedule in the manner set out in Part III. of the Notice M.D. (3) issued by the Trade Board, dated 5th November 1920, shall apply in substitution for the Proposed Minimum Rates otherwise applicable, as set out in Part I. of this Schedule, in respect of all hours worked in excess of the number of hours declared by the Trade Board in the above-mentioned Notice M.D. (3), to be the normal number of hours of work in the Trade.

## PART III.

DEFINITIONS OF CLASSES OF WORKERS  
AND AREAS.

SECTION I.—For the purpose of this Schedule the following definitions shall apply:—

- (a) A Foreman is a person who is employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Milk Distributive) Order, 1920, and to whom is deputed the duty of exercising supervising authority over

workers exceeding 5 in number (exclusive of the foreman) working in any shop, department, or other branch of the trade.

- (b) A Roundswoman is a female person in charge of a round or rounds.
- (c) A Shop Assistant is a male or female person wholly or mainly employed in a shop in serving customers and/or in checking in and out.

SECTION II.—The proposed rates set out in the respective Scales A, B and C in Part I. of this Schedule shall apply as follows:—

Scale A.—(a) To all areas administered by Rural District Councils and (b) to all areas administered by Municipal Borough Councils and Urban District Councils which according to the most recent Census had a population of less than 10,000; but so as in neither case to apply to any area within the Metropolitan Police District.

Scale B.—To all areas other than those to which Scales A. and C. apply.

Scale C.—To the area comprising the City of London and the Metropolitan Police District.

Provided that the rate applicable to a roundswoman or roundswoman shall be determined by reference to the area in which the greater part of his or her round of distribution lies.

NOTE.—The minimum rates of wages fixed by

the Trade Board and at present in operation apply as follows :—

Scale A.—To areas administered by Rural District Councils, but not to any town or village having a population exceeding 10,000 within any Rural District Council area.

Scale B.—To all areas other than those to which Scales A. and C. apply.

Scale C.—To London; that is to say the City of London and the Metropolitan Police Districts, except such parts as are administered by a Rural District Council.

#### PART IV.

The above proposed Minimum Rates of wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in England and Wales in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Milk Distributive) Order, 1920, as set out in Part VI. of the Board's Notice M.D. (3), dated 5th November 1920.

#### PART V.

SECTION I.—The above proposed General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

SECTION II.—The above proposed Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages, to workers of greater skill or length of experience, or to agreements made or that may be made between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of these Minimum Rates of Wages.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above proposals which may be lodged with them within two months from 5th November 1921. Such Objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Milk Distributive Trade Board (England and Wales), 7-11 Old Bailey, London, E.C. 4.

It is desirable that the Objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

In pursuance of the powers conferred on him by the Trade Boards Acts, 1909 and 1918, the Minister of Labour is pleased to establish a Trade Board for the Sack and Bag Trade in Great Britain as specified in the Trade Boards (Sack and Bag) Order, 1920, namely :—

The making from woven fabrics of corn sacks, flour sacks, coal sacks, sugar sacks, cement bags, sand bags, nail bags, potato bags, seed bags, and similar sacks or bags, or the repairing thereof ;

including—

(a) the following and similar operations (whether performed by hand or machine) known in the trade as—

(i) Folding (or hooking), cutting, machining, turning ;

(ii) Brushing, selecting, mending ;

(iii) Branding, tarring, bundling ;

(b) the warehousing of, the packing of, and similar operations in regard to sacks or bags of the kind, mentioned above, when carried on in association with or in conjunction with the making or repairing thereof ;

(c) the warehousing of, the packing of, and similar operations in regard to any other articles when carried on in or in association with or in conjunction with any business, establishment, branch, or department mainly engaged in any of the operations mentioned in paragraph (b) above ;

but excluding—

1. any of the operations mentioned above when carried on in association with or in conjunction with the weaving of jute, flax, or hemp, or the dyeing, bleaching, or finishing of jute, flax, or hemp, yarn, or cloth ;

2. any of the operations mentioned above when carried on in or in association with or in conjunction with any business, establishment, branch, or department mainly engaged in a business in which the sacks or bags are used as containers for other articles, the production or sale of which forms part of the business ;

3. the making of rope-bound coal or coke sacks when carried on in association with or in conjunction with any business, establishment, branch, or department engaged in the making of made-up textile articles other than sacks or bags, whether rope-bound or not, of the kind mentioned in this order ;

4. any of the operations mentioned in paragraph (b) above when carried on in or in association with or in conjunction with any business, establishment, branch, or department mainly engaged in the warehousing of, the packing of, and similar operations in regard to made-up textile articles other than sacks or bags, whether rope-bound or not, of the kind mentioned in this order ;

5. operations included in the Trade Boards (Waste Materials Reclamation) Order, 1920.

## UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE ACT, 1920.

### REFERENCES TO THE HIGH COURT OF JUSTICE UNDER SECTION 10 (1).

Pursuant to paragraph 6 of the Unemployment Insurance (Determination of Questions) Regulations, 1920, the Minister of Labour hereby gives notice of his intention to refer to the High Court for decision the following questions that have arisen in applications made to him for his decision under Section 10 of the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920, namely, whether the Employment of a person as a—

Private Secretary.

Porter employed to clean a hospital and deliver messages and answer calls.

River-keeper on a private estate.

Attendant at a museum to open and close the galleries and to dust and keep tidy the objects exhibited.

Trainer of greyhounds employed by the owner of a private kennel of greyhounds.

Gamekeeper on a private estate.

Caretaker employed by the Standing Joint Committee of a County Council to take charge of their offices.

Huntsman, first whip, 2nd whip, and stableman, and kennelman, all employed by the Master of a Hunt on behalf of the Hunt Committee.

Porter employed to take charge of the entrance lodge at a hospital and to record the names of all visitors to the patients.

Stores porter employed at a hospital to supervise the issue and receipt of all stores and the cutting up of meat, etc.

Stoker in an engine house employed by the Governors of a college to provide hot water, lighting and heating for a residential building.

Painter employed by a college in the upkeep and repair of the outside and inside of the residential buildings.

Cobbler employed by the Governors of an

Orphan Home and School in repairing the boots of the boys and girl inmates.

Dairymaid employed on the home farm of a large estate.

Greenkeeper of a members' golf club.

Second hand employed on a private yacht.

Groom employed in private racing stables.

Under Rules 5 and 18 of the Rules of the Supreme Court for regulating appeals and references to the High Court under the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920, Section 10, any person who claims to be affected by the decisions to be given in the above-mentioned cases may apply to the Judge for leave to intervene.

The cases have been set down in the High Court and will probably be heard about the middle of November. In the event of any person desiring to intervene, all the necessary information and documents can be obtained by applying to the Solicitor to the Ministry of Labour, 3 Richmond Terrace, Whitehall, S.W. 1.

DECISIONS OF THE HIGH COURT ON THREE APPEALS AND FOUR REFERENCES MADE UNDER SECTION 10 (1) OF THE UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE ACT, 1920.

*Club Servants.*

On the 30th June 1921 the High Court allowed an appeal by the Junior Carlton Club against the decisions of the Minister under Section 10 of the Act that servants employed in various capacities in that Club were employed persons within the meaning of the said Act. The Judge held that the employment of the servants in question fell within the terms of the exception laid down in paragraph (b) of Part II. of the First Schedule to the Act, which excepts employment in domestic service except where the employed person is employed in any trade or business carried on for the purposes of gain, and that contributions were not, therefore, payable in respect of them.

*Servant employed in Schools.*

On the 10th of October 1921 the High Court allowed appeals against the decisions of the Minister under Section 10 of the Act that persons employed as follows were employed persons within the meaning of the said Act:—

1. *At Rugby School—*

(1) Butler, employed by the Headmaster in the School Boarding House.

(2) Cook, employed by a Housemaster to cook for his whole household, including 50 school-boys.

(3) Cleaner, employed by the Governors of Rugby School to look after certain School premises used as classrooms for educational purposes only.

2. *By the Proprietors of Farnborough Private Preparatory School as—*

(1) Lady Housekeeper.

(2) Matron.

(3) Dormitory Maid.

(4) Laundryman.

(5) Pantrymaid.

(6) Cook.

The Judge held that the employment of all these servants fell within the terms of the exception laid down in paragraph (b) of Part II. of the First Schedule to the Act, being employment in domestic service and not in a trade or business carried on for the purposes of gain, and that consequently they were not required to be insured.

On the same date the Minister referred to the High Court for decision the questions whether persons employed—

3.—(1) as a cook at a Boarding House carried on in connection with the *Brigg Grammar School*, a Secondary School grant-aided by the Board of Education, the conduct of the Boarding House in question forming one of the terms of the Head Master's engagement, and the fees being fixed by the Governing Board, the Board of Education and the County Council;

(2) As housemaid at a Boarding House carried on by a branch of the Y.M.C.A., where a profit is made, such profit being devoted to the work of the branch,

were, or were not, employed in a business carried on for the purposes of gain within the meaning of paragraph (b) of Part II. of the First Schedule to the Act.

The Judge held that the persons in question were not employed in a business carried on for the purposes of gain within the meaning of the Act, and that, consequently, the employment, being employment in domestic service, fell within the terms of the exception laid down in paragraph (b), and no contributions under the Act were accordingly payable in respect of such employment.

*Agriculture.*

On the 10th and 11th October, the Minister referred to the High Court for decision the question whether persons employed:—

(1) As a repairer of fences, gaps in hedges, posts and rail fencing and iron fencing upon a private agricultural estate, the greater part of which is let out to tenants;

(2) As a carter employed by the owner of an agricultural estate to haul home-grown timber, quarried stone tiles, and other materials for repairs to agricultural buildings on the estate, and to haul stone quarried on the estate for the repair of accommodation roads to the farms,

were employed in agriculture within the meaning of paragraph (a) of Part II. of the First Schedule to the Act.

The Judge held that the employment of the persons in question fell within the terms of the exception laid down in paragraph (a) of Part II. of the First Schedule to the Act, being employment in agriculture, and, consequently, no contributions under the Act were payable in respect of such employment.
