WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 1st day of November 1921 (N. 15235/21), in the words following, viz. :--

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions and other allowances in the nature thereof payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman or Marine therein shall be paid in such

manner and subject to such restrictions, conditions and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council :

"And whereas we consider that the increased complexity of the electrical and torpedo apparatus employed in Your Majesty's vessels warrants the division of the Electrical Artificer Branch of Your Majesty's Navy into two Branches :

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to sanction the institution of the two Branches described in the attached Schedule with the pay and conditions of service of the existing Electrical Artificer Branch which they will supersede.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal.

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 3rd day of November 1921 (N.P. (4) 779 21), in the words following viz. :-

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, inter alia, that all pay, pensions or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being, or having been an Officer, Seaman or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council :

"And whereas by Your Majesty's Orders in Council dated the 30th March 1917, and 14th January 1919, the Minister of Pensions is authorised to award pensions, allowances and gratuities, on the scales therein laid down, to Seamen and Marines disabled in consequence of service during the Great War, conditionally, inter alia, upon such disablement not being due to the serious negligence or misconduct of the discharged man :

"And whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased by Your Order in Council of 8th May 1919, to sanction the grant, in certain circumstances, of permanent pensions in respect of service, good character badges and medal, character and rank, in addition to the disablement pensions allowable under Your Orders in Council of 30th March 1917, and 14th January 1919, subject to the latter pensions being restricted to the minimum scale corresponding to the degree of disablement:

"And whereas we are of opinion that a similar concession should be made to certain Seamen and Marines who have been granted under the Dispensing Order in Council, dis-ablement pensions at rates which have been reduced on the ground of negligence or mis-

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to authorise us, at our discretion, to apply the provisions of Your Order in Council bearing date the 8th May 1919, to Seamen and Marines who have completed time for Long-Service pension, and have been granted by the Minister of Pensions re-

duced pensions in respect of disablement under Her Late Majesty's Order in Council of 19th December 1881.

" The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their con-currence in this proposal."

# TENDERS FOR LOANS ON TREASURY BILLS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office at the Bank of England on Friday, the 18th November 1921, at 1 o'clock, for Treasury Bills, to be issued under the Treasury Bills Act, 1877; the National Debt Act, 1889; and the War Loan Acts, 1914 to 1919, to the amount of £40,000,000.

2. The Bills will be in amounts of £5,000 or £10,000. They will be dated at the option

of the Tenderer on any date from Monday, the 21st November, to Saturday, the 26th November, inclusive, and will be payable at three months after date.

3. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

4. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000, and must specify the date on which the Bills required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one penny) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bills of different dates.

5. Tenders must be made through a London Banker, Discount House or Broker.

6. The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same not later than the following day, and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of Cash or a Banker's Draft on the Bank of England, not later than two o'clock (Saturday twelve o'clock) on the day on which the relative Bills are dated.

7. In virtue of the provisions of Section 26 of the Finance Act, 1915, Members of the House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills.

8. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.

# THE SALE OF DISEASED PLANTS (SCOTLAND) ORDER OF 1921.

The Board of Agriculture for Scotland, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Destructive Insects and Pests Acts, 1877 and 1907, and of every other power enabling them in that behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered as follows :--

# Definitions.

1. In this Order :---" The Board " means the Board of Agriculture for Scotland; and "Inspector" means an Inspector of the Board of Agriculture for Scotland or of the Local Authority as the case may be.

The expression "Local Authority" means as regards any district the local authority for the district under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914.

The expression "plant" shall include any single tree, shrub, herb or vegetable, and collectively the fruits, seeds, tubers, bulbs, layers, cuttings, or other parts of trees, shrubs, herbs, or vegetables.

#### Prohibition of Sale of Diseased Plants, &c.

2. No person shall sell or offer for sale or cause to be sold or offered for sale for planting, any plant substantially attacked by any insect or pest mentioned in the Schedule to this Order.

## Information to be Given as to Diseased Plants.

3. Every person who has or has had in his possession or under his charge, and every person who as auctioneer, salesman, nurseryman, or otherwise has sold or offered for sale, any plant substantially attacked by any insect or pest mentioned in the Schedule to this Order, shall, if so required in writing by the Board or by the Local Authority or by an Inspector, give the Board or the Local Authority or the Inspector, as the case may be, all such information as he possesses as to the person in whose possession or under whose charge such plant is or has been; provided that any information given under this Article shall not be available as evidence against the person giving the same in any prosecution under this Order, except in respect of an alleged failure to comply with this Article.

# Powers of Entry.

4. An Inspector may, upon production if so required of his appointment or authority, enter any premises on which he has reason to believe that an insect or pest mentioned in the Schedule to this Order exists or has recently existed, and examine any plant on such premises.

# Action to be Taken to Prevent Spread of Disease.

5. Any auctioneer, salesman, nurseryman, or other person, on becoming acquainted or being informed by the Board or an Inspector of the Board or of the Local Authority, that he has in his possession or under his charge any plant substantially attacked by an insect or pest mentioned in the Schedule to this Order shall take steps to prevent the sale or movement of such plant except under the authority of an Inspector.

#### Penalties.

- 6. Every person shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds, who---
  - sells or offers for sale or causes to be sold or offered for sale for planting any plant substantially attacked by any insect or pest mentioned in the Schedule to this Order; or
  - (2) fails to take such steps as are required under Article 5 of this Order, or fails to give information as required by Article 3: or
  - (3) wilfully obstructs or impedes any Inspector when acting under this Order.

#### Revocation of Order.

7. The Corky Scab of Potatoes (Scotland) Order of 1914 is hereby revoked.

#### Notification of Order.

8. This Order shall be published by the Local Authority in accordance with any direction given by the Board.

## Application of the Order.

9. This Order shall apply to Scotland.

#### Short Tille.

10. This Order may be cited as the Sale of Diseased Plants (Scotland) Order of 1921.

## Commencement of Order.

11. This Order shall come into operation on the first day of January, 1922.

# THE DESTRUCTIVE INSECTS AND PESTS (SCOTLAND) ORDER OF 1921.

The Board of Agriculture for Scotland, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Destructive Insects and Pests Acts, 1877 and 1907, and of every other power enabling them in that behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered as follows :-

#### Commencement.

1. This Order shall come into operation on the first day of January, Nineteen hundred and Twenty-two.

#### Definitions.

2. In this Order :--- "The Board" means the Board of Agriculture for Scotland ; "Inspector" means an Inspector of the Board of Agriculture for Scotland; and the expression "plant" shall, where the context permits, include any single tree, shrub, herb, or vegetable and collectively the fruits, seeds, tubers, bulbs, layers, cuttings or other parts of trees, shrubs, herbs or vegetables.

#### Restriction on Importation of Plants.

3.-(1) The landing in Scotland from any country other than England and Wales, Ireland and the Channel Islands, of any of the plants mentioned in the First Schedule to this Order is prohibited except in accordance with the conditions specified in the Third Schedule hereto.

(2) The importer of any plant the landing of which is regulated by this Article shall be responsible that the Regulations set out in the Third Schedule to this Order are observed.

(3) This Article shall not apply to any plant the landing of which is authorised by a general licence issued by the Board or by a special licence issued by an Inspector, or to a consignment of a plant to the Board for experimental or scientific purposes.

# Powers of Entry.

4. An Inspector may, upon production if so required of his appointment or authority, enter any premises and examine on such premises any plant which has been landed in Scotland from any country except as aforesaid or on which he has reason to believe that an insect or pest mentioned in the Second Schedule to this Order exists or has recently existed.

#### Precautions to be Adopted in Case of Disease.

5.—(1) An Inspector may at any time and from time to time by a Notice served on the occupier of premises on which he has reason to believe that there is any plant attacked with | (Scotland) Order of 1920 are hereby revoked.

any insect or pest mentioned in the Second Schedule to this Order, require him to adopt such measures for prevention of the spread of the insect or pest as are specified in the Notice.

(2) A Notice under this Article may prescribe the time within which the adoption of any measure thereby prescribed shall be completed.

#### Power to Deal with Living Specimens of Insects or Pests.

6. No person shall land, sell or offer for sale, a living specimen of any insect or pest mentioned in the Second Schedule to this Order, except with the written permission of the Board, and an Inspector may, by a Notice served on any person having in his possession or under his charge any such living specimen, require him to adopt such measures for the prevention of the spread of the insect or pest as are specified in the Notice.

#### Service of Notices, &c.

7. For the purpose of this Order a Notice shall be deemed to be served on any person if it is delivered to him personally or left for him at his last known place of abode or business or sent through the post in a letter addressed to him there; and a Notice purporting to be signed by an Inspector shall be prima facie evidence that it was signed by him.

#### Information to be Given as to Diseased Plants or Parts Thereof.

8. Every person who has or has had in his possession or under his charge any plant which is attacked by any insect or pest mentioned in the Second Schedule to this Order, and every person who as auctioneer, salesman, or otherwise has sold or offered for sale any such plant shall, if so required in writing by the Board or an Inspector, give to the Board or Inspector all such information as he possesses as to the persons in whose possession or under whose charge the plant is or has been; provided that any information given under this Article shall not be available as evidence against the person giving the same in any prosecution under this Order, except in respect of an alleged failure to comply with this Article.

#### Offences.

9. (1) Every person shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds, who does any act in contravention of this Order or the Regulations in the Third Schedule to this Order or any Notice served on him under this Order, or fails to do any act which he is required to do by this Order or the said Regulations or any such Notice.

(2) This Article does not apply to the landing or attempted landing of anything in contravention of this Order the penalty for which is provided by Section one of the Destructive Insects Act, 1877, as amended by the Destructive Insects and Pests Act, 1907.

#### Revocation of Orders.

10. The Destructive Insects and Pests Order of 1910 (in so far as it applied to Scotland) and Article 9 of the American Gooseberry Mildew

11. This Order shall apply to Scotland.

12. This Order may be cited as the Destructive Insects and Pests (Scotland) Order of 1921.

#### Third Schedule.

REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE IMPORTATION OF PLANTS, OR PARTS THEREOF, INTO SCOTLAND.

# 1. Nature of Contents of Packages to be Declared.

Each package must have attached thereto a label showing the exact nature of the plants, or parts thereof, contained in the package. This may be part of the copy certificate of inspection, if attached to the package.

# 2. Inspection and Certification as a Condition of Entry.

(a) In the case of an importation of plants, or parts thereof, from a country where a recognised service of plant inspection is maintained, each package must have attached thereto or be accompanied by a copy certificate issued at the time of packing, by a duly authorised official of the country from which it is exported, stating the date of inspection (which must be not more than thirty days prior to the date of shipment) and that the plants, or parts thereof, covered by the certificate have been thoroughly inspected by him or under his direction, and found, or believed to be, healthy and free from the injurious insects and pests mentioned in the Second Schedule to the Order. In the case of potatoes, other than "new potatoes," the copy certificate must also declare that Wart Disease has not occurred on the place where the potatoes were grown, or within 500 yards thereof (approximately  $\frac{1}{2}$  kilometre). For the purpose of these Regulations the expression "new potatoes" means potatoes landed on or before the thirtyfirst day of July in the year in which they have been lifted. New potatoes must be accompanied by a declaration in writing by the exporter or importer thereof that they have been lifted in the current year.

An Inspector of the Board of Agriculture for Scotland may open and examine the contents of any package imported into Scotland, notwithstanding the fact that the package may have attached thereto or be accompanied by the duly authorised copy certificate.

(b) In the case of an importation of plants, or parts thereof, from a country where no recognised service of plant inspection is maintained, and in the case of a package of plants, or parts thereof, to which a copy certificate as above mentioned is not attached, or which is not accompanied by such copy certificate, the plants, or parts thereof, will be detained until they have been examined by an Inspector of the Board of Agriculture for Scotland, either at the port of entry or at a suitable place designated by the Inspector, and found to be healthy and free from the insects and pests mentioned in the Second Schedule to this Order.

3. Any imported plants, or parts thereof, which, on inspection, are found to be unhealthy or attacked by any insect or pest mentioned in the Second Schedule to this Order, and which, in the judgment of the Inspector, cannot be cleaned by disinfection or other treatment, shall, with the packing and package, either be destroyed or returned to the country of exportation by the importer thereof.

When disinfection or other treatment of the plants, or parts thereof, is allowed, it shall be carried out by the importer, and under the supervision of an Inspector of the Board of

Agriculture for Scotland, either at the port of entry or at a suitable place designated by the Inspector, and no part of the consignment shall be delivered to the importer without the written consent of the Inspector. All charges for storage, cartage and labour incident to inspection and disinfection, other than the services of the Inspector hmself, shall be paid by the importer.

4. Exporters in foreign countries should send, at the time of issue, the original certificate together with particulars setting out the number of packages, nature of plants or parts thereof, name of vessel by which they are consigned,

# JUTE TRADE BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

#### PROPOSAL TO VARY MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated 31st October 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Board Act, 1918, for the Jute Trade in Great Britain, as specified in the Trade Boards (Jute) Order, 1919, hereby give notice that, seeing that the specified period of operation of the General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates set out in the Notice J.13A issued by the Trade Board, and dated the 8th September 1921, of the variation of the General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for Male and Female Workers set out in the Trade Board's Notices J. (2), J. (5) and J. (8), dated 3rd June 1920, 22nd October 1920, and 1st April 1921, respectively, will expire on 8th January 1922, and seeing that the Trade Board gave notice on 6th October 1921, of Proposal again to Vary the said rates set out in the Notices J. (2), J. (5) and J. (8) by providing that the period of operation of the minimum rates set out in the above-mentioned Notice J.13A shall be extended for a further period from 9th January to 8th February 1922, inclusive, they again Propose to Vary, as from 9th February 1922, the said rates set out in the Notices J. (2), J. (5) and J. (8), the Proposed Minimum Rates being as shown in the Schedule set out below.

Overtime Rates calculated on the Proposed General Minimum Time-Rates specified in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule in the manner specified in Part III. of the Schedule to the Trade Board's Notice J.13A, dated 8th September 1921, shall apply in substitution for the Proposed General Minimum Time-Rates set out in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule in respect of all hours worked by Male and Female Workers employed on Time-Work in excess of the number of hours declared by the Trade Board in Part III. of the Schedule to the said Notice J.13A to be the normal number of hours of work in the trade.

#### PART IV.

#### General Minimum Time-Rate based on Week of 48 Hours.

The Proposed General Minimum Time-Rates set out in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule are weekly rates based on a week of 48 hours and are subject to a proportionate adjustment according as the number of hours of employment in any week is less than 48.

# PART V.

Definition of Female Weaving Learner.

For the purpose of this Notice a Female Weaving Learner means a Female Worker who is:---

- (a) Definitely and effectively learning weaving under the immediate instruction of a Weaving Mistress; and
- (b) Employed under conditions such that she shall cease to be employed on time-work and shall be employed on piece-work at the earliest date practicable.

# PART VI.

# Definition of Trade to which Trade Boards Acts apply.

The above Proposed Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all male and female workers in Great Britain in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Jute) Order, 1919, and set out in Part VI. of the Schedule to the Trade Board's Notice J.13A, dated 8th September 1921.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above Proposal to Vary which may be lodged with them within two months from 11th November 1921. Such Objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address) and should be sent to the Secretary of the Jute Trade Board (Great Britain), 7-11 Old Bailey, London, E.C. 4. It is desirable that the Objections should state precisely and so far as possible, with reasons, what is objected to.

In the case of all workers employed on Piece-Work, each Piece-Rate paid shall be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker (*i.e.*, a worker of ordinary skill and experience in the class of work in question) not less than the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable.

# PART IV.

# OVERTIME RATES-MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS (ALL AGES).

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board have declared the normal number of hours of work in any week to be 48.

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and the holidays as defined hereafter shall be regarded as Overtime to which Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—The Minimum Rates for Overtime to apply in respect of hours worked by a worker in excess of the declared normal number of hours of work in the trade shall be as follows, clear of all deductions :—

# (a) Workers employed on Time-Work.

- (1) For the first ten hours' Overtime in any week the Overtime Rate shall be one-and-a-quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Quarter.
- (2) For Overtime after the first ten hours of Overtime in any week the Overtime Rate shall be one-and-a-half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Timeand-a-Half.

Provided that for all time worked on Sundays, on Christmas Day as respects England and Wales, on New Year's Day as respects Scotland, and on Statutory Bank Holidays (but not including Good Friday when Easter Monday is not worked, and not including Easter Monday when Good Friday is not worked) the Overtime Rate shall be twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Double-Time.

(b) Workers employed on Piece-Work.

- (1) as respects each of the first ten hours of Overtime in any week, a sum equivalent to onequarter of the General Minimum Time-Rate which would be applicable if the worker were employed on time-work;
- (2) as respects each hour in excess of ten hours of Overtime in any week, a sum equivalent to one-half of the General Minimum Time-Rate which would be applicable if the worker were employed on time-work;
- (3) as respects each hour of employment on Sundays, on Christmas Day as respects England and Wales, on New Year's Day as respects Scotland, and on Statutory Bank Holidays (but not including Good Friday when Easter Monday is not worked, and not including Easter Monday when Good Friday is not worked) a sum equivalent to the General Minimum Time-Rate which would be applicable if the worker were employed on time-work.

NOTE.—The hours which female workers, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts and of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

# PART V.

A Learner is a worker under 21 years of age, who, while employed, is engaged during the whole or a substantial part of his or her time in learning some branch or process of the trade.

# PART VI.

SECTION I.—Subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts the respective Minimum Rates of Wages set out in this Schedule apply to all male and female workers of the classes specified above in respect of all time during which they are employed in Great Britain in any branch of the trade specified in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour, dated 20th October 1919, and as set out below.

The trade as specified in the above-mentioned Regulations is as follows :----

SECTION II.—The manufacture wherever carried on of Perambulators, Invalid Carriages (including Spinal Carriages), or Folding Push Cars : including :—

- (a) The manufacture of fittings or accessories where made in association with or in conjunction with perambulators, invalid carriages, folding push cars or wheels intended for use on these articles;
- (b) the manufacture of wheels, excluding cycle wheels, intended for use on perambulators, invalid carriages or folding push cars;
- (c) the manufacture of motor cycle side car bodies where made in association with or in conjunction with perambulators, invalid carriages or folding push cars;
- (d) the repair of perambulators, invalid carriages or folding push cars when carried on in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture thereof;
- (e) the manufacture of toy perambulators, toy wheel barrows, toy scooters, nursery yachts, toy cycles, toy carts, toy horses, dolls' houses or other similar toys, when carried on as a subsidiary branch of work in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of perambulators, invalid carriages or folding push cars, so as to form a common or interchangeable form of employment for the workers;
- (f) packing, warehousing, or despatching, or other similar operations incidental to the manufacture of any of the above-named articles;

but excluding :---

(g) the manufacture of motor scooters;

(h) the manufacture of wicker or cane bodies for perambulators, invalid carriages or folding push cars, when such manufacture is carried on in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of other wicker or cane articles so as to form a common or interchangeable form of employment for the workers.

# PART VII.

SECTION I.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages are to be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

SECTION II.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages or to agreements made or that may be made between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of the Minimum Rates.

(6) dated 11th November 1921, as shown in the Schedule set out below.

The weekly Rates for Learners set out in this Section are based on a week of 48 hours and are subject to a proportionate adjustment according as the number of hours of employment in any week is less than 48.

\* NOTE.—The General Minimum Time-Rates at present fixed and set out in the Notice I. (6) are for Male and Female Workers employed in learning one or more of the operations specified in Section I., Section II., and Sub-sections (A) (B) and (C) of Section III. of Part I. of this Schedule.

# PART III.

# PROPOSED VARIATION OF PIECE-WORK BASIS TIME-RATES.

In lieu of the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates at present fixed, the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate for each of the classes of workers specified in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule shall be 10 per cent. above the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate proposed as set out in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule.

# PART IV.

# PROPOSED VARIATION OF OVERTIME RATES.

Overtime Rates calculated on the appropriate proposed minimum rates set out in Parts I., II. and III. of this Schedule, in the manner specified in Part IV. of the Schedule to the Notice I. (6) issued by the Trade Board and dated 11th November 1921, shall apply in substitution for the appropriate proposed rates set out in Parts I., II. and III. of this Schedule, in respect of all hours worked in excess of the number of hours declared by the Trade Board in the Schedule to the above-mentioned Notice I. (6) to be the normal number of hours of work in the trade.

# PART V.

The above proposed Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all Male and Female Workers in respect of all time during which they are employed in Great Britain in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Perambulator and Invalid Carriage) Order, 1919, as set out in Part VI. of the Schedule to the above-mentioned Notice I. (6).

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above Proposal to Vary which may be lodged with them within two months from 12th November 1921. Such Objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to the Secretary of the Perambulator and Invalid Carriage Trade Board (Great Britain), 7-11 Old Bailey, London, E.C. 4.

It is desirable that the Objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.
