## TENDERS FOR LOANS ON TREASURY BILLS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office at the Bank of England on Friday, the 16th December 1921, at 1 o'clock, for Treasury Bills to be issued under the Treasury Bills Act, 1877, the National Debt Act, 1889, and the War Loan Acts, 1914 to 1919, to the amount of £45,000,000.

2. The Bills will be in amounts of £5000 or £10,000. They will be dated at the option of the Tenderer on any date from Monday, the 19th December, to Saturday, the 24th December, inclusive, and will be payable at three months after date.

3. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

4. Each tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000, and must specify the date on which the Bills required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one penny) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bills of different dates.

5. Tenders must be made through a London Banker, Discount House or Broker.

6. The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same not later than the following day, and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of Cash or a Banker's Draft on the Bank of England not later than two

o'clock (Saturday twelve o'clock) on the day on which the relative Bills are dated.

7. In virtue of the provisions of Section 26 of the Finance Act, 1915, Members of the House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills.

8. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.

## FACTORY AND WORKSHOP ACT, 1901.

The Home Secretary hereby gives notice, in pursuance of Section 80 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, that he has formally certified the construction of buildings and constructional work in connection with buildings for the purpose of which machinery worked by steam, water or other mechanical power is used, to be dangerous, and that he proposes to make Regulations to apply to all buildings in course of construction, alteration, repair or demolition, to which the provisions of the Act apply.

## TRADE BOARDS ACTS, 1909 AND 1918.

### LAUNDRY TRADE BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR FEMALE WORKERS AS VARIED AND MADE EFFECTIVE FROM 12TH DECEMBER 1921,\* TOGETHER WITH MINIMUM RATES WHICH ARE NOT AFFECTED BY THE VARIATION AND WHICH REMAIN IN OPERATION.

The Schedule to this Notice sets out the Minimum Rates of Wages for all Female Workers in Great Britain and incorporates:—

(1) The General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates, Guaranteed Time-Rates and Overtime Rates for Female Workers in Great Britain (excluding the Administrative County of Cornwall and the Orkney and Shetland Islands) as varied by the Trade Board and confirmed by Order of the Minister of Labour specifying the 12th day of December 1921,\* as the date from which they should become effective.

(2) The Overtime Rates for Female Workers in the Administrative County of Cornwall and the Orkney and Shetland Islands as varied by the Trade Board and confirmed by Order of the Minister of Labour specifying the 12th day of December 1921,\* as the date from which they should become effective.

(3) The General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-work Basis Time-Rates and Guaranteed Time-

\*NOTE.—Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full pay period, but in any case not later than 18th December 1921.

Rates for Female Workers in the Administrative County of Cornwall and the Orkney and Shetland Islands, contained in the Notice W. (5) issued by the Trade Board and dated 4th November 1920, which remain unaffected by the variation.

Female Workers, other than those specially employed for emergency work or whose employment is of a casual nature:—

#### General Minimum Time-Rates.

1. Workers of 18 years of age and over with not less than 12 months' experience, 7½d. per hour.
2. Workers of 18 years of age and over with less than 12 months' experience. See Part I., Section I. of the Schedule set out below.
3. Workers under 18 years of age. See Part I., Section I. of the Schedule set out below.

#### Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates.

Female Workers of all ages, 9d. per hour.

#### Guaranteed Time-Rates for Piece-Workers.

1. Workers of 18 years of age and over, 6½d. per hour.
2. Workers under 18 years of age. See Part I., Section III. of the Schedule set out below.

#### Overtime Rates for Time-Workers.

See Part I., Section IV. of the Schedule set out below.

Female Workers specially employed for emergency work or whose employment is of a casual nature. See Part II. of the Schedule set out below.

The Rates in full as legally enforceable are set out in detail in the Schedule below.

### SCHEDULE.

#### PART I.

FEMALE WORKERS EMPLOYED IN GREAT BRITAIN OTHER THAN THOSE SPECIFIED IN PART II.

#### SECTION I.

##### General Minimum Time-Rates.

- Workers under 15 years of age, 12s. per week of 48 hours, i.e. 3d. per hour.
- Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 16s. per week of 48 hours, i.e. 4d. per hour.
- Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 20s. per week of 48 hours, i.e. 5d. per hour.
- Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 25s. per week of 48 hours, i.e. 6½d. per hour.
- Workers of 18 years of age and over, 30s. per week of 48 hours, i.e. 7½d. per hour.

Provided that:—

- (a) The Minimum Rate for Workers of 16 and under 18 years of age who have had less than six months' experience in the laundering of articles of any description, or the processes and operations incidental thereto, in any laundry which is carried on by way of trade or for the purpose of gain, or carried on as ancillary to another business, shall be:—

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 16s. per week of 48 hours, i.e. 4d. per hour.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 20s. per week of 48 hours. *i.e.* 5d. per hour.

- (b) The Minimum Rate for Workers of 18 years of age and over who have had less than 12 months' experience in the branches of trade specified in paragraph (a) above shall be:—

During the period of employment required to complete the 1st six months of such experience, 25s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.* 6½d. per hour.

During the period of employment required to complete the 2nd six months of such experience, 27s. 6d. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.* 6¾d. per hour.

## SECTION II.

### *Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate.*

Female Workers (all ages), 9d. per hour.

## SECTION III.

### *Guaranteed Time-Rates for Piece-Workers.*

Workers under 15 years of age, 12s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.* 3d. per hour.

Workers of 15 and under 16 years of age, 16s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.* 4d. per hour.

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 18s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.* 4½d. per hour.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 22s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.* 5½d. per hour.

Workers of 18 years of age and over, 25s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.* 6¼d. per hour.

Provided that:—

The Minimum Rates for Workers of 16 and under 18 years of age who have had less than six months' experience in the branches of trade specified in paragraph (a) of the proviso to Section I. above shall be:—

Workers of 16 and under 17 years of age, 16s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.* 4d. per hour.

Workers of 17 and under 18 years of age, 20s. per week of 48 hours, *i.e.* 5d. per hour.

## SECTION IV.

### *Overtime Rates for Time-Workers.*

(i) The Trade Board have declared in accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Normal Number of Hours of Work in the Trade to be as follows:—

In any week, 48 hours.

On Saturday, 5 hours.

Provided that:—

All hours worked on Sundays and on Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

(ii) The Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked by a Female Worker employed on time work in excess of the declared normal number of hours of work in the trade shall be as follows:—

(a) For all hours worked in excess of 5 on Saturday, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.* Time-and-a-Quarter, for the first two hours, and One-and-a-Half times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Half thereafter, notwithstanding that the total

number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

(b) For all time worked on Sundays and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be Twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Double-Time, notwithstanding that the total number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

(c) For all hours worked in excess of 48 in any week, the Overtime Rate shall be Time-and-a-Quarter for the first two hours and Time-and-a-Half thereafter, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of Sub-Sections (a) and (b) of this Section.

(d) The Overtime Rates shall not apply to Piece-Workers.

Provided that, where, in the case of workers to whom the Shops Act applies, the day which under that Act constitutes the weekly short day (half-holiday) is a day other than Saturday, and in the case of other workers another day is substituted for Saturday, under the provisions of Section 43 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, the above provisions shall apply as though such half-holiday or short day were substituted for Saturday and Saturday were substituted for such half-holiday or short day.

Provided also that in cases in which another day is substituted for a Statutory Holiday under the provisions of Section 35 of the Factory Act, 1901, the above provisions shall apply as though such other day were the Statutory Holiday and the Statutory Holiday were an ordinary working day.

NOTE.—The hours which women, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts, and to the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

## PART II.

FEMALE WORKERS IN GREAT BRITAIN SPECIALLY EMPLOYED FOR EMERGENCY WORK, OR WHOSE EMPLOYMENT IS OF A CASUAL NATURE.

## SECTION I.

### *General Minimum Time-Rates.*

For Workers under 18 years of age, 7½d. per hour.

For Workers of 18 years of age and over, 8d. per hour.

## SECTION II.

### *Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate.*

Female Workers (all ages), 9½d. per hour.

## SECTION III.

### *Overtime Rates for Time-Workers.*

(i) The Trade Board have declared the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be the same as for workers comprised within Part I. of this Schedule.

(ii) The Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked by a Female Worker employed on time-work in excess of the declared normal number of hours of work in the trade shall be as follows:—

(a) For all hours worked in excess of 5 on Saturday, the Overtime Rate shall be

One-and-a-Quarter Times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Quarter, notwithstanding that the total number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.

- (b) For all hours worked on Sundays and Statutory Holidays the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Half Times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Half, notwithstanding in both cases that the total number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 48.
- (c) For all hours worked in excess of 48 in any week, the Overtime Rate shall be Time-and-a-Quarter for the first two hours and Time-and-a-Half thereafter except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of Sub-section (b) of this Section.
- (d) The Overtime Rates shall not apply to Piece-Workers.

Provided that where, in the case of workers to whom the Shops Act applies, the day which under that Act constitutes the weekly short day (half-holiday) is a day other than Saturday, and in the case of other workers another day substituted for Saturday, under the provisions of Section 43 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, the above provisions shall apply as though such half-holiday or short day were substituted for Saturday and Saturday were substituted for such half-holiday or short day.

NOTE.—The hours which women, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts, and to the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

### PART III.

#### SECTION I.

The Minimum Rates set out in this Notice shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Board Acts, to all Female Workers employed in the areas and of the classes specified in Parts I. and II. of this Schedule in respect of all times during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Laundry) Order, 1919 (that is to say, the laundering of articles of every description and all processes and operations incidental thereto performed by way of trade or for the purpose of gain), as varied by the Trade Boards (Women's Clothing) Order, 1919, the Trade Boards (Shirtmaking) Order, 1920, and the Trade Boards (Linen and Cotton Handkerchief and Household Goods and Linen Piece Goods) Order, 1920, by virtue of which all processes of laundering and other similar operations incidental to or appertaining to the making of the articles specified in the Appendices to the three last-mentioned Orders are excluded from the scope of the Trade Boards (Laundry) Order, 1919.

#### SECTION II.

The Minimum Rates of Wages set out in this Schedule shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect

of contributions to any superannuation or other provident fund.

The Minimum Rates set out in this Schedule are without prejudice to Workers earning higher rates of wages.
