PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by Section 8 of "The Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879," it is provided that the following goods may, by Proclamation or Order in Council, be prohibited either to be exported or carried coastwise:—Arms, ammunition and gunpowder, military and naval stores, and any articles which His Majesty shall judge capable of being converted into or made useful in increasing the quantity of military or naval stores, provisions, or any sort of victual which may be used as food for man:

And whereas by Section 17 of the Finance Act, 1921, it is enacted that Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, shall extend to weapons and munitions of war of every description and firearms not being weapons of war, and ammunition for such firearms, as it applies to the goods therein mentioned, and that the said section, as so amended by this section shall extend so as to give power to prohibit the shipment as ship's stores, whether on vessels proceeding to foreign ports or on coastwise voyages, of any of the goods to which the said section applies:

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the 24th March 1921, made in pursuance of Section 8 of "The Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879," the exportation from the United Kingdom of certain articles was prohibited:

And whereas it is expedient that the said Order in Council should be revoked:

And whereas it is expedient to prohibit the exportation or shipment as ship's stores on vessels proceeding to foreign ports of the articles hereinafter enumerated:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

(1) As from the date of this Order the following articles shall be, and the same are hereby prohibited to be exported from the United Kingdom, or to be shipped as ship's stores on vessels proceeding to foreign ports, that is to say:—

- i. Cannon and other ordnance and component parts thereof;
- ii. Carriages and mountings for cannon and other ordnance and component parts thereof;
- iii. Cartridges, charges of all kinds, and component parts thereof;
- iv. Explosives, except the following:—

Amorces;
 Blasting Gelatine;
 Bonbons;
 Detonators;
 Dynamite;
 Electric Detonators;
 Fireworks;
 Fog Signals;
 Gelatine Dynamite;
 Gelnite;
 Monobel;
 Rex Powder;
 Rockite;
 Safety Fuses;
 Super-Cliffite, No. 1;
 Super-Cliffite, No. 2;

Super-Rippite ;
Tonite or Cotton Powder, No. 1 ;
Viking Powder.

- v. Firearms of every description and component parts thereof ;
- vi. Grenades and component parts thereof ;
- vii. Machine Guns, interrupter gears, mountings for machine guns and component parts thereof ;
- viii. Projectiles of all kinds (except air-gun pellets) and component parts thereof ;
- ix. Mines, land or sea, and component parts thereof ;
- x. Depth charges and component parts thereof ;
- xi. Bombs, bombing apparatus, and component parts thereof ;
- xii. Flame-throwers and component parts thereof ;
- xiii. Fuses (other than safety fuses) and component parts thereof ;
- xiv. Torpedoes and component parts thereof ;
- xv. Torpedo tubes, or other apparatus for discharging torpedoes.

Provided always, and it is hereby declared, that this Order shall not apply to any exportation or shipment as ship's stores which shall be expressly permitted by a licence given by the Board of Trade, and in accordance with the conditions (if any) of such licence.

(2) The said Order in Council, dated the 24th March 1921, is hereby revoked.

(3) This Order may be cited as The Arms Export Prohibition Order, 1921.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 6th day of December 1921 (C.E. 6390/21), in the words following, viz. :—

“Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council :

“And whereas His late Majesty was graciously pleased by His Order in Council bearing date the 12th day of August 1907, to sanction the grant of increased retired pay on scales and subject to regulations set forth therein to Officers of the Royal Navy who were placed on the Retired List while serving on the Staff of the Inspection and Experimental Departments or in posts at the Admiralty connected with those Departments :

“And whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased by Your Order in Council bearing date the 28th day of November 1910, to sanction,

subject to certain conditions, the grant of similar increases of retired pay to Officers of the Royal Marines who were seconded for service, and retired while serving, in any of the aforesaid posts :

“And whereas Your Majesty was further graciously pleased by Your Orders in Council bearing dates the 11th day of June 1910, the 10th day of February 1919, and the 25th day of June 1919, to extend the benefits of the Order in Council dated the 12th day of August 1907, to Officers of the Royal Navy who were placed on the retired list while holding certain other appointments specified therein :

“And whereas under Schedule V. of Your Majesty's Order in Council bearing date the 22nd day of January 1920, fresh regulations regarding the ages of compulsory retirement and rates of retired pay of Officers of the Royal Navy and Royal Marines were approved with a view to assimilating as far as practicable the conditions of service and rates of retired pay of Officers of the Royal Navy and Royal Marines :

“And whereas we are of opinion that it is desirable to amend the provisions of the aforesaid Orders in Council bearing dates the 12th day of August 1907, the 28th day of November 1910, the 11th day of June 1910, the 10th day of February 1919, and the 25th day of June 1919, with a view to—

(a) assimilating the conditions of service of Officers of the Royal Navy and Royal Marines in any of the appointments therein referred to in accordance with the principle prescribed in the Order in Council bearing dated the 22nd day of January 1920, quoted above ;

(b) extending the provisions of the several Orders regarding increases of retired pay, so that they may apply to Officers of the Royal Navy and Royal Marines who may be appointed from the Retired List to any of the posts referred to, as well as to those retired while serving in any such posts ; and

(c) extending the provisions of the said Orders as thus amended to Officers serving on the Staff of the Compass Department of the Admiralty.

“We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to sanction the cancellation, without prejudice however to the validity of any increases of retired pay already granted thereunder, of all the aforesaid Orders in Council, except that dated the 22nd day of January 1920, and the substitution thereof of the regulations set forth in the Schedule annexed thereto.

“The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals.

“SCHEDULE.

“REGULATIONS RESPECTING THE RETIRED PAY OF RETIRED OFFICERS OF THE R.N. AND R.M. SERVING IN THE INSPECTION, EXPERIMENTAL AND COMPASS DEPARTMENT AND IN CERTAIN SIMILAR POSTS.

“1. These regulations have effect from the 1st February 1919, and apply to all Officers of the R.N. and R.M. who were serving on that date in any of the posts (except those on the Staff of the Compass Department) referred to in rule 2 as well as to all Officers appointed to any

of them thereafter. As regards Officers on the Staff of the Compass Department they have effect from the 1st April 1920, and apply to all Officers then serving as well as those subsequently appointed.

" 2. The posts to which these regulations apply are:—

(a) All posts on the Staff of the Inspection and Experimental Departments and all posts at the Admiralty connected with those Departments;

(b) The posts of Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent of the R.N. Torpedo Factory at Greenock;

(c) The posts of Superintendent of Torpedo Experiments and First Technical Assistant to the said Superintendent at Stokes Bay;

(d) The post of Technical Assistant to the Director of Armament Supply for Duty as Ordnance Inspector of Depots and Factories; and

(e) All posts on the Staff of the Compass Department at the Admiralty.

" 3. Service in any of the aforesaid appointments before retirement from the R.N. or R.M. will count for increase of retired pay under the ordinary regulations from time to time in force for Officers on the active lists of the R.N. and R.M. and increased retired pay under these regulations will accrue only in respect of service rendered in any of the appointments after retirement from the R.N. and R.M.

" 4. The retired pay of all retired Officers of the R.N. and R.M. serving in any of these appointments will be suspended during such service and their service will count for increase of retired pay on the scales and subject to the conditions set forth hereunder, subject, however, to the proviso that an Officer of the R.M. who at the date of his retirement from the R.M. had earned retired pay in excess of the maximum at that date permissible in the case of a Lieutenant Commander, R.N., shall not count his further service for increase of retired pay.

" 5. All Officers in any of the appointments referred to in these regulations who have not previously been discharged to retired pay at their own request or for some other reason, will be liable to such discharge on attaining 60 years of age.

" 6. An Officer who is discharged to retired pay at his own request, or on completion of any period for which he may have been appointed or as unfit for further employment from any cause other than those specified in rule 7 may have the retired pay earned by his service before retirement from the R.N. or R.M. increased by one-sixtieth of the pay and allowances of the appointment held on discharge for each complete year of service after retirement in any of the appointments to which these regulations relate.

" 7. An Officer who is discharged to retired pay on account of age, or medical unfitness, or abolition of office, or reduction or re-organisation of establishment, may have the retired pay earned by his service before retirement from the R.N. or R.M. increased:—

(a) if with ten or more years' service after retirement in any post to which these regulations relate, by one-sixtieth of the pay and allowances of the appointment held on discharge for each complete year of service after retirement;

(b) if with less than ten years' service after retirement in any post to which these regulations relate, by one-fiftieth of the pay and allowances of the appointment held on discharge for each complete year of service after retirement, provided that the total addition shall not exceed ten-sixtieths of such pay and allowances.

" 8. For the purposes of rules 6 and 7 service on the retired list before the 1st February 1919, in any post to which these regulations relate may reckon for increase of retired pay in the case of any Officer who was then so serving.

" 9. Officers on the Active List of the R.M. who are appointed to any of the posts to which these regulations relate shall be seconded from the Corps of the R.M. until they reach the rank of Lieutenant Colonel then they will become supernumerary. They will be subject to the same rules as regards qualifications for promotion and retirement for age in any rank as other Officers of the R.M."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the Mercantile Marine (Uniform) Order, 1918, His Majesty in Council was pleased to prescribe a uniform to be worn by the British Mercantile Marine:

And whereas by the British Mercantile Marine Uniform Act, 1919, provision was made for prohibiting the improper use of the British Mercantile Marine uniform:

And whereas the provisions of the said Act apply to the uniform prescribed by the Mercantile Marine (Uniform) Order, 1918, and any other or further uniform which may be prescribed by Order in Council in connection with the British Mercantile Marine:

And whereas it is expedient that the national standard uniform for the British Mercantile Marine should be such as is hereinafter prescribed:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

(1) The Uniform of the British Mercantile Marine shall be such as is set forth in the Schedule to this Order: Provided that where, on the 4th day of September 1918, the Masters and Officers of the Ships belonging to any Company or Firm were accustomed to use a cap with a distinctive badge, that badge may, if the Company or Firm so desire, be substituted, in the case of persons whilst serving on board, or employed on the business of, Ships belonging to that Company or Firm, for the cap badge prescribed in the said Schedule.

(2) The persons entitled to wear the Uniform so prescribed shall be Masters and Officers of the Mercantile Marine holding certificates from the Board of Trade, Uncertificated Junior Officers of the Mercantile Marine qualifying for their first certificate, and Surgeons, Pursers, Wireless Operators, Cadets, and Apprentices of the Mercantile Marine, and Petty Officers and other Ratings of the Mercantile Marine specifically mentioned in the said Schedule, but no other persons whatsoever.

(3) The Uniform to be worn by any person whilst employed in any position or rank on board any Ship shall be the Uniform appropriate to that position or rank, without reference to the class of certificate which he may hold.

(4) A member of the Mercantile Marine temporarily unemployed shall be entitled to wear the Uniform appropriate to the highest rank in which he has at any time been previously employed, but any person entitled to wear the standard Uniform as laid down in Article (2) when employed ashore (other than as a Marine or Engineer Superintendent) is not entitled to

wear the Standard Uniform in the course of such employment.

(5) No person entitled to wear the Uniform shall, when on board Ship, in port, or on shore, be dressed partly in Uniform and partly not in Uniform.

(6) This Order shall apply only as respects persons who are or who have been employed on British Ships registered at ports in the British Islands.

(7) The Mercantile Marine Uniform Order, 1918, is hereby revoked; but nothing in this Order shall prevent a person who is entitled to wear a British uniform from wearing a uniform complying with the provisions of the Order hereby revoked of which he was in possession at the date of this Order.

(8) This Order shall come into operation on the day of the promulgation thereof.

(9) This Order may be cited as "The Mercantile Marine (Uniform) Order, 1921."

(3) The space between each row of lace, mohair, or braid, is to be $\frac{3}{8}$ inch, except when there are 2 rows only, in which case the space between them is to be $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches. The insertion should be $\frac{1}{2}$ inch in width on each side of the stripe, and should entirely fill the centre of the diamond, but in the case of chief engineers, the space between the two middle rows is to be entirely filled with purple cloth, the top and bottom rows to be edged with the same, $\frac{1}{8}$ inch wide.

(4) Masters and Chief Engineers will wear two interlaced chevrons, one pointing upwards and one downwards, and formed by the two inner of the four rows of the distinction lace. Other (deck and engineer) Certificated Officers, together with Surgeons and Assistant Surgeons, Senior Pursers, and Assistant Pursers, will wear one diamond of $\frac{3}{8}$ -inch plain gold lace (or black mohair), and First Wireless Operators one diamond of $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch gold Russia braid (or black braid), with open centre, and an outside measurement (angle to angle) of $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches, imposed on the distinction lace. Uncertificated Junior Officers (deck and engineer) will wear a single chevron pointing downwards and formed by the single row of distinction lace.

The foregoing chevrons should have an outside measurement of $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches at the base.

(5) Chief Refrigerating Engineers, holding 1st class certificate, should wear the same uniform as a 2nd Engineer.

Second Refrigerating Engineers, holding 2nd class certificate, should wear the same uniform as a 3rd Engineer.

Uncertificated Refrigerating Engineers, Electricians and Boilermakers qualifying for their first certificate, may wear the Uniform of Uncertificated Junior Engineers.

2. GREAT COAT.

For all Officers, Cadets and Apprentices.

Blue Cloth. Length to come to 14 inches from the ground. Double breasted. Six buttons on each side to button four buttons, the bottom button not to come below the level of hips. A plait down the back with an opening at the bottom 18 inches long with a fly and three small plain buttons. A cloth strap behind with a button hole at each end, and two corresponding uniform buttons to confine the waist to required size. Stand and fall collar with hook and eye in collar seam. Edges of coat to be double stitched; the shoulders fitted with straps for rank stripes, when worn.

3. FROCK COAT.

For all Officers—but not Cadets or Apprentices.

Blue cloth, double breasted, with padded turn-down collar; cut for six buttons, but to have five buttons on each breast, to button four buttons, the width of lapel to be 3 inches at

fourth button, tapering to $2\frac{1}{4}$ inches at waist seam; two buttons on the hips with side edges in plait of skirt extending half-way down the skirt, with a button at bottom of each side edge; for Officers 5 feet 9 inches in height, length of coat 38 inches, with a proportionate variation for difference in height. The proportionate variation in length of skirt for each inch of difference in height is $\frac{1}{4}$ of an inch. Lining, black material. Round cuffs, and rank stripes on the sleeves. A black morocco leather belt $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches wide with gilt buckles of same design as standard cap badge can be worn optionally.

4. UNDRRESS COAT.

For all Officers, Cadets, and Apprentices.

Blue cloth, with padded turn-down collar; the length to be sufficient to cover the hips; double breasted with five buttons at equal distance on each side, to button four buttons. Pockets without flaps at the sides, in line with the lower button, and one outside left breast pocket. An opening 5 inches long at the bottom of each side seam.

Round cuffs; rank stripes on the sleeves.

5. WORKING UNDRRESS JACKET.

Blue serge, single breasted, stand collar, with hook and eye at neck, five buttons at the front, and an opening at bottom of each side seam 5 inches long. A patched pocket on each breast without flaps. Shoulder straps for rank stripes in black mohair.

6. WHITE UNDRRESS COAT.

White drill, single breasted, stand collar, with hook and eye at neck, five buttons at the front, and an opening at bottom of each side seam 5 inches long. A patched pocket on each breast, without flaps. Shoulder straps for rank stripes.

7. MESS JACKET.

Blue cloth, double breasted, six buttonholes in each row, four on the turn and two below, padded turn-down collar; slightly reached over the hips with a rounded peak behind; two pockets with welts at the side. Round cuffs with rank stripes.

8. WHITE MESS JACKET.

White linen of the same shape as the blue jacket but with a roll collar, two buttons in each row, and two buttonholes on either side to correspond with the buttons, to be worn linked with two No. 2 size buttons connected by a ring. Shoulders fitted with straps for rank stripes.

9. SHOULDER STRAPS.

For all Officers—but not Cadets or Apprentices.

Blue cloth with rank stripes, $\frac{1}{4}$ inch wide,

and coloured cloth, according to rank or branch. Straps to be 5 inches long, $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches wide, and to have a No. 3 button on top.

10. TROUSERS.

Blue cloth for frock or undress coat. Blue serge for working jacket, and white duck or drill material for white undress coat.

11. WAISTCOATS.

Blue cloth, single-breasted, with six buttons.

For wear with blue mess jacket—Blue cloth, single-breasted, cut low, with roll collar and four buttons.

For wear with white jacket—White marcella, the same pattern as the blue waistcoat.

12. BUTTONS.

A gilt-raised round button, with a plain rim encircling a rope rim, surrounding an anchor without cable rove through a Naval Crown. (Registered Design No. 664, 376.)

(1) 8 10 of an inch in diameter (or in button maker's measure 35 lines, relief 7 lines).

(2) 15/20 of an inch in diameter (or in button maker's measure 30 lines, relief 6 lines).

(3) 13 20 of an inch in diameter (or in button maker's measure 25 lines, relief $5\frac{1}{2}$ lines).

They are to be worn as follows :—

Size No. 1 on all coats. Size No. 2 on jackets. Size No. 3 on waistcoats and shoulder straps.

13. CAP AND COVER.

For all Officers, Cadets, and Apprentices.

Cap :—Blue cloth, with three blue cloth welts, $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches total depth, diameter across the top $8\frac{1}{4}$ inches, for a cap fitting $21\frac{3}{4}$ inches in circumference, the top to be $\frac{1}{8}$ inch larger or smaller in diameter for every $\frac{1}{4}$ inch the cap may vary in size of head above or below the before-mentioned standard, e.g., a cap $22\frac{1}{4}$ inches in circumference, diameter across the top $8\frac{1}{2}$ inches; cap 21 inches in circumference, diameter $7\frac{7}{8}$ inches. The sides to be made in four pieces, and to be $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches deep between the welts; a black mohair braid band, $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches wide, placed between the two lower welts, the join of the band to be in front so as to be covered by the badge, the upper side of the mohair band to be left unsewn to admit of bottom edge of white cover being slipped under when required.

The cap set up on a band of stiff leather, or other material, $1\frac{3}{4}$ inches deep.

The use of steel cap stretchers is prohibited.

Cover :—The cap cover to be of white ribbed marcella.

Peak: For Masters.—Covered with blue cloth, and bound with patent leather, and embroidered on the front edge with laurel leaves in gold $\frac{1}{4}$ inch wide.

For all other Officers, Cadets, and Apprentices.—Patent leather without embroidery.

The peak to drop at an angle of 45 degrees, and to be 2 inches deep in the middle when worn with embroidery, and $1\frac{3}{4}$ inches when plain.

Chin Stay for all Officers, Cadets, and Ap-

prentices :—Black patent leather $\frac{3}{8}$ inch wide, buttoned on to two black cloth buttons placed immediately behind the corners of the peak.

14. CAP BADGE.

Gold Naval Crown over silver anchor (without cable); the anchor on red oval cushion with gold rope rim, surrounded below and at the sides by gold oak-leaves and acorns. The whole on a backing of Navy Blue cloth. (Registered Designs, Nos. 657,203 and 675,204.)

15. FOUL WEATHER COAT AND HAT.

A black oilskin and sou-wetser of the usual pattern.

16. NECKTIES, COMFORTERS, &c.

Neckties :—With frock-coats or undress—a plain black silk or satin tie, $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 inches wide.

With mess undress—a plain black silk or satin tie, 1 inch wide.

Comforter, shirt and collar :—To be white.

17. GLOVES.

Plain, brown dogskin, or brown buckskin, with great-coat, undress coat, and working undress jacket.

Plain, white, with frock-coat and mess jacket.

18. BOOTS.

Black boots or shoes with all Uniforms other than white undress, with which white shoes may be worn.

B. FOR PETTY OFFICERS AND OTHER RATINGS HEREINAFTER MENTIONED.

1. CAP.

Usual pattern with peak.

2. BADGE.

Standard cap badge as for Officers, but without surround of oak-leaves and acorns. Standard cap badge in silver for stewards on cargo vessels.

3. DRESS JACKET.
