TENDERS FOR LOANS ON TREASURY BILLS.

- 1. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice, that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office at the Bank of England on Friday, the 20th January 1922, at 1 o'clock, for Treasury Bills to be issued under the Treasury Bills Act, 1877, the National Debt Act, 1889, and the War Loan Acts, 1914 to 1919, to the amount of £50,000,000.
- 2. The Bills will be in amounts of £5000 or £10,000. They will be dated at the option of the Tenderer on any date from Monday, the

23rd January, to Saturday, the 28th January inclusive, and will be payable at three months after date.

- 3. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.
- 4. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000, and must specify the date on which the Bills required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one penny) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bills of different dates.
- 5. Tenders must be made through a London Banker, Discount House or Broker.
- 6. The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same not later than the following day, and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of Cash or a Banker's Draft on the Bank of England not later than two o'clock (Saturday twelve o'clock) on the day on which the relative Bills are dated.
- 7. In virtue of the provisions of Section 26 of the Finance Act, 1915, Members of the House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills.
- 8. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE.

Courts of Referees Amending No. 2 Regula-TIONS, 1921.

THE UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE (COURTS OF Referees) (Amending) (No. 2) Regulations, 1921, DATED NOVEMBER 14, 1921, MADE BY THE MINISTER OF LABOUR UNDER THE UN-EMPLOYMENT INSURANCE ACT, 1920 (10 & 11 GEO. 5, c. 30) (a).

Whereas the Minister of Labour, by virtue of the powers conferred on him by the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1920, has made the Unemployment Insurance (Courts of Referees) Regulations, 1920 (b) (hereinafter referred to as the Principal Regulations) for regulating certain matters with reference to the constitution and procedure of Courts of Referees. And whereas the said Principal Regulations have been amended by the Unemployment Insurance (Courts of Referees) (Amending) Regulations, 1921 (c):

And whereas it is expedient further to amend the said Principal Regulations:

Now, therefore, the Minister of Labour, by virtue of the powers conferred on him by the said Act and of all other powers enabling him in that behalf, hereby makes the following Regulations for amending the said Principal Regulations :-

- (a) These Regulations, although statutory, are provisional only. Permanent Regulations will be made later.
 - (b) S.R. & O., 1920, No. 2116. (c) S.R. & O., 1921, No. 594.

- 1. At the end of paragraph (4) of Regulation 2 of the Principal Regulations as amended by the said Unemployment Insurance (Courts of Referees) (Amending) Regulations, 1921, there shall be inserted the words:-
 - " or whilst he is himself claiming unemployment benefit or is claiming payment out of public funds under any scheme for making payments to discharged seamen, marines, soldiers, or airmen in respect of unemploy-
- 2. Where by these Regulations any Regulations or words are directed to be added to or omitted from the Principal Regulations or to be substituted for any other Regulations or words in the Principal Regulations, copies of the Principal Regulations, printed under the authority of His Majesty's Stationery Office after these Regulations come into force, may be printed with the Regulations or words added, omitted, or substituted as these Regulations require, and with the Regulations and paragraphs thereafter numbered in accordance with such direction; and the Principal Regulations shall be construed as if they had, at the time at which these Regulations come into force, been made with such additions or omissions.
- 3. These Regulations may be cited as the Unemployment Insurance (Courts of Referees) (Amending) (No. 2) Regulations, 1921, and shall come into force on the date hereof.

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

This Notice sets out all the Minimum Rates of Wages which have been fixed or varied by the Trade Board and confirmed by the Minister of Labour and which are at present effective under the Trade Boards Acts, and takes the place of all Notices fixing and varying minimum rates of wages previously issued by the Trade Board.

The Minimum Rates of Wages set out in the Schedule below are effective as follows:—

- 1. The General Minimum Time-Rates and Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates for the classes of female workers specified in Sections I. and II. of Part I.-B and in Section I. of Part II.-B respectively of this Schedule, and the Overtime Rates based thereon from 14th January 1922. j
- 2. In all other cases as from 14th October 1921.

† Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days the rates become effective as from the beginning of the next full pay period, but in any case not later than 20th January 1922.

GENERAL MINIMUM TIME-RATES.

SPECIAL CLASSES OF SKILLED MALE WORKERS of 21 years of age and over, 1s, 6d., 1s. 8d., 1s. 81d., 1s. 91d. or 1s. 10d. per hour, according to occupation and length of

PIECE-WORK BASIS TIME-RATES.

MALE WORKERS (all classes), 10 per cent. above the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rates. ALL FEMALE WORKERS employed as Polishers or as Drop Stampers, 1s. per hour.

ALI, FEMALE WORKERS employed as Hand-Brush Japanners who are capable of finishing all classes of work, Hand-Brush Lacquerers who are capable of finishing all classes of work, Blow-Pipe Braziers, or Solderers using ordinary Hand-Iron or Blow-Pipe with bar solder, 11d. per hour.

ALL OTHER FEMALE WORKERS of 18 years of age or over, 9d. per hour.

- Section IV.—For the purpose of the above Rates the following definitions shall apply:—
 - BRAZIERS: A Brazier of Grade I. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on brazing and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. or Grade III. as hereinafter defined.
 - A Brazier of Grade II. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Brazier and who is an expert in brazing in all classes of metal except aluminium.
 - A Brazier of Grade III. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II., as above defined, is also an expert in brazing aluminium OR is a charge hand with the duty of being responsible for all work and order in the shop.
 - BURNISHERS: A Burnisher of Grade I. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on burnishing and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. or Grade III. as hereinafter defined.
 - A Burnisher of Grade II. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Burnisher and who is an expert hook and straight Burnisher at the vice and satisfactorily burnishes deep thin shell work at the lathe.
 - A Burnisher of Grade III. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II., as above defined, is an expert in speed and quality in all classes of work OR is a charge hand with the duty of being responsible for all work and order in the shop.
 - DROP-STAMPERS: A Drop-Stamper of Grade I. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on drop-stamping and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. or Grade III. as hereinafter defined.
 - A Drop-Stamper of Grade II. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Drop-Stamper and who undertakes all classes of deep or shallow work in all strengths of the metal used.
 - A Drop Stamper of Grade III. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II., as above defined, is an expert in all classes of work OR is a charge hand with the duty of being responsible for all work and order in the shop.
 - DIPPERS who are also BRONZERS: A Worker of Grade I. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on dipping and bronzing and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. or Grade III. as hereinafter defined.
 - A Worker of Grade II. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years' experience as a Dipper and Bronzer and who is an all-round Dipper and Bronzer and also does art bronzing and colouring, or electro-plating or has a knowledge of electro-plating.
 - A Worker of Grade III. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II., as above defined, also has an expert knowledge of art bronzing or metal colouring or electro depositing and solutions OR is a charge hand with the duty of being responsible for all work and order in the shop.
 - BRASS POLISHERS:—A polisher of Grade I. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over employed on polishing and not fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. or Grade III. as hereinafter defined.
 - A Polisher of Grade II. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who has had not less than six years experience as a Polisher and is an expert in all processes of any class of common work and can emery bob and mop best work.
 - A Polisher of Grade III. is a Male Worker of 21 years of age or over who, in addition to fulfilling the conditions of Grade II. as above defined, is also an expert in all processes of both common and best work OR is a charge hand with the duty of being responsible for all work and order in the shop.

SECTION II.—The Minimum Rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked by a worker, whether employed on time-work or on piece-work in excess of the declared normal number of hours shall be as follows:—

(a) For all hours worked on Sundays and Statutory Holidays the Overtime Rate shall be twice the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., DOUBLE-TIME.

(b) For all hours worked in excess of four-and-a-half on Saturday, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Half times the Minimum Rate otherwise applicable, i.e., TIME-AND-A-HALF, notwithstanding that the total number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 47.

(c) For all hours worked in excess of 47 in any week, the Overtime Rate shall be equivalent to TIME-AND-A-QUARTER, for the first two hours and TIME-AND-A-HALF thereafter, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of Sub-Sections (a) and (b) of this Section.

Note.—(1) The hours which female workers, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts, and of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

(2) The Minimum Rates for Overtime set forth in Section II. of this Part of this Schedule are effective, as respects workers to whom the General Minimum Time-Rates and Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates marked * apply, as from 14th January 1922.

PART IV.

Section I.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in Great Britain in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Stamped or Pressed Metal Wares) Order, 1919.

SECTION II.—The Trade as specified in the above-mentioned Order is as follows:—

The manufacture from metals (other than precious metals) by the processes of cold stamping or cold pressing (including cutting or piercing) of cabinet fittings, window fittings, curtain accessories, stationers' sundries, drapers' sundries, fittings for gas or electric light, fittings for suit-cases or handbags or purses, buckles, eyelets, ferrules, labels, collar studs, tie-clips, thimbles, photograph frames, stamped chains, bells, fancy nails (excluding the shanks), parts of safety razors (excluding the blades), parts of braces or suspenders, corset steels or busks, whistles, tin-openers, medals or any similar articles or metal parts of such articles:

Including: -

(a) The operations of annealing, hardening, barrelling, polishing, bronzing, nickelling, lacquering, japanning, non-vitreous enamelling, tinning or assembling, where these operations are carried on in association with or in conjunction with the manufacture of such stamped or pressed metal articles:

(b) The operations of carding, boxing, packeting, labelling, weighing, packing, warehousing or despatching, where these operations are incidental to or appertaining to the manufacture of

such stamped or pressed metal articles :-

But Excluding:

(a) The operations specified in the Trade Boards (Hollow-ware) Order, 1913;

(b) The making of buttons or any operations incidental thereto;

(c) The making of coffin furniture or any operations incidental thereto;

i) The making of pins, hairpins, hooks and eyes, hair-curlers, snap fasteners or safety pins or any operations incidental thereto;

(e) The making of steel pens and the making of stationers' metal sundries or other similar metal articles when carried on as a subsidiary branch of work in association with or in conjunction with the making of steel pens, so as to provide a common or interchangeable form of employment for the workers;

(f) The minting of coinage of the realm;

(g) The process of hand-embossing.

PART V.

SECTION I.—The above Minimum Rates of wages shall be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

Section II.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages or to agreements made or that may be made between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of these minimum rates of wages.

PROPOSAL TO VARY THE MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR MALE WORKERS IN THE COFFIN FURNITURE SECTION OF THE TRADE FOR PERIODS DEPENDENT UPON THE COST OF LIVING INDEX FIGURE.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour and dated 31st October 1918, the Trade Board established under the Trade Boards Acts, 1909 and 1918, for the branches of trade specified in the Trade Boards (Coffin Furniture and Cerement Making) Order, 1919, hereby give notice, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they Propose to Vary the General Minimum Time-Rates, Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates, and Overtime Rates for Male Workers in the Coffin Furniture Section of the trade at present effective and set out in the Schedule to the Notice issued by the Trade Board and dated 10th September 1921, as set out in the Schedule below, the Minimum Rates to be operative in the manner and for the periods specified therein.

This Notice is issued with the consent of the Minister of Labour.

PROPOSED VARIATION OF PIECE-WORK BASIS TIME-RATES.

The Trade Board Propose to Vary the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates for all Male Workers of 21 years of age or over in the Coffin Furniture Section of the Trade at present effective, and set out in Part II. of the Schedule to the Notice issued by the Trade Board dated 10th September 1921, so that the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rates shall be as follows:—

For the Periods during which the Cost of Living Index
Figure is not less than 76 and not more than 113

12½% above the General Minimum
Time-Rate applicable.

For the Periods during which the Cost of Living Index
Figure is not less than 63 and not more than 75 ... 15% above the General Minimum
Time-Rate applicable.

PART III.

PROPOSED VARIATION OF OVERTIME RATES.

Overtime Rates calculated on the Minimum Rates proposed above in the manner set out in the Schedule to the Notice issued by the Trade Board and dated 10th September 1921, shall apply in substitution for the above-mentioned proposed Minimum Rates for Male Workers in the Coffin Furniture Section of the Trade in respect of all hours worked in excess of the number of hours therein declared by the Trade Board to be the normal number of hours of work in the Trade.

PART IV.

GENERAL.

Section I.—The average percentage Increase in the Cost of Living Figure mentioned in this Notice refers to the Average Percentage Increases since July 1914 in Retail Prices in the United Kingdom (all items) as published each month by the Ministry of Labour in the "Labour Gazette."

Section II.—Except as regards the date from which the proposed minimum rates may first be made effective by an Order of the Minister of Labour the proposed minimum rates applicable during each of the periods referred to above shall become payable from the first pay day in the week following the 20th day in each calendar month.

No variation is proposed by the Trade Board in the Provisions of the above-mentioned Notice dated 10th September 1921, relating to Female Workers.

The Trade Board will consider any Objections to the above Proposals which may be lodged with them within two months from the 16th day of January 1922. Such Objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to The Secretary of the Coffin Furniture and Cerement Making Trade Board (Great Britain), 7-11 Old Bailey, London, E.C. 4.

It is desirable that the Objections should state precisely, and, so far as possible, with reasons, what is objected to.
