TENDERS FOR TREASURY BILLS AND TREASURY BONDS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice, that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office, at the Bank of England, on Friday the 7th April 1922, at 1 o'clock, for

(a) Treasury Bills to be issued under the Treasury Bills Act, 1877; the National Debt Act, 1889; and the War Loan Acts, 1914-1919; and

(b) £5 per cent. Treasury Bonds, repayable at par on the 1st February 1927.

2. The maximum amount of Treasury Bills and Treasury Bonds to be issued will be £60,000,000. The amount of Treasury Bonds issued will not exceed £15,000,000, but subject to that limit the total amount issued will be divided between Bills and Bonds in such proportions as their Lordships may determine.

TREASURY BILLS.

3. The Bills will be in amounts of £5000 or £10,000. They will be dated at the option of the Tenderer on any business day from Monday the 10th April 1922, to Saturday the 15th April 1922 inclusive, and will be payable at three months after date.

4. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

They will be exempt from Corporation Profits Tax and will in all respects rank *pari passu* with those issued under the Prospectus of the 21st January 1922. PART II.

OVERTIME RATES—MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS—ALL AGES.

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board have declared the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows :—

In any week 48

Provided that all hours worked by a worker on Sundays and on generally recognised district Holidays not exceeding six in number in any one year shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—The Minimum Rates for Overtime for all Male and Female Workers in respect of hours worked by a worker in excess of the normal number of hours declared by the Trade Board, as set out in Section I. of this Part of this Schedule, are as follows :—

- (1) For all time worked on Sundays and on generally recognised district Holidays not exceeding six in number in any one year, the Overtime Rate shall be twice the minimum rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Double Time.
- (2) For all time worked in excess of 48 hours in any week the Overtime Rate shall be one-and-a-half times the minimum rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Half, except in so far as Double Time is payable under the provisions of paragraph (1) of this Section.

NOTE.—The hours which Female Workers, Young Persons and Children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts, and of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

PART III.

APPLICABILITY OF MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES.

The above respective Minimum Rates of Wages apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts; to all workers in Scotland in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Aerated Waters) Order, 1919, that is to say :—

The manufacture, wherever carried on, of mineral or aerated waters, non-alcoholic cordials, flavoured syrups, unfermented sweet drinks and other similar beverages, and the manufacture in unlicensed premises of brewed liquors, *including* :—

- (a) the operations of bottle washing, bottling and filling and all other operations preparatory to the sale of any of the aforesaid liquors in bottles, jars, syphons, casks or other similar receptacles; and *including* also
- (b) the operations of bottle washing, bottling and filling, and all subsidiary operations preparatory to the sale in bottles, jars or other similar receptacles of cider, ale, stout, porter and other alcoholic beers, where all or any of such last-mentioned operations are, or is, conducted or carried on in association with or in conjunction with all or any of the operations specified under (a) above so as to form a common or interchangeable form of employment for workers, and whether the two sets of operations or any of them are, or is, carried on simultaneously or not.

PART IV.

SECTION I.—The above General Minimum Time-Rates and Overtime Rates must be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

SECTION II.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages, and are operative only during the periods specified or until such time as they are cancelled or varied.

Every occupier of a factory or workshop or of any place used for giving out work to outworkers shall, on receipt of this Notice, post up and keep posted up a sufficient number of true copies thereof in prominent positions, in every factory, workshop, or place used for giving out work in such a manner as to ensure that in each case the Notice shall be brought to the knowledge of all workers employed by him or on his premises who are affected thereby. PART II.

OVERTIME RATES FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

SECTION I.—In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board have declared the normal number of hours of work per week in the trade to be 48.

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.—The minimum rates for Overtime in respect of hours worked by a worker in excess of the declared normal number of hours of work in the trade shall be as follows :—

- For the first two hours of overtime in any week (excluding all hours worked on Sundays), the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter times the Minimum rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Quarter.
- For overtime after the first two hours of overtime in any week (excluding all hours worked on Sundays), the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Half times the minimum rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Half.
- For all hours worked on Sundays the Overtime Rate shall be Twice the minimum rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Double-Time.

NOTE.—The hours which females, young persons and children are allowed to work are subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts, and of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

PART III.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all male and female workers in Great Britain, as specified above, in respect of all time during which they are employed in any section of the Cotton Waste Branch of the Waste Materials Reclamation Trade as defined in the Regulations made by the Minister of Labour, dated 27th August 1920, that is to say :—

1. The collecting, sorting or grading of cotton waste when carried on in an establishment in which such operations are the main or principal business.
2. The following operations when carried on in or in association with or in conjunction with any establishment of the kind specified in paragraph 1 above :—
 - (a) The willowing, machining, breaking-up, scouring or putting down mixings of cotton waste ;
 - (b) The collecting, sorting or grading of any of the materials or articles, other than cotton waste, specified in paragraph 1 or paragraph 2 of the Appendix to the Trade Boards (Waste Materials Reclamation) Order, 1920 ;*
 - (c) The operations specified in paragraph 3 of the Appendix to the above-mentioned Order, other than those specified in sub-paragraph (a) above.†
3. The operations of receiving, packing, compressing, teagling, craning, despatching or warehousing when carried on in association with or in conjunction with any of the operations included in paragraphs 1 and 2 above.

But excluding :—

- (i) Any of the operations mentioned in paragraphs 1, 2 and 3 above when carried on in the establishment in which the waste materials are produced or in which they are used as raw materials for further manufacture ;
- (ii) The making or repairing of sacks or bags when carried on in a factory or workshop engaged solely or mainly in the making or repairing of sacks or bags.

* *List of Materials and Articles :—*

Rags, waste paper, paper stock ; woollen, worsted, jute, flax, hemp or other textile waste ; textile clippings or cuttings ; used bags, sacks or sacking ; scrap rubber ; scrap iron or other scrap metal ; fur cuttings ; rabbit skins ; bones or fat ; used tins ; broken glass or earthenware ; discarded clothing (including head-gear or foot-gear) ; discarded textile articles ; old ropes ; used bottles or used jars.

† *List of Operations :—*

The ripping of worn clothes for rags ; the picking of old ropes ; the trimming of paper salvage ; the washing of used bottles or used jars ; the washing of used tins ; the breaking of scrap metal ; the drying of rabbit skins ; the making or repairing of sacks or bags ; the willowing, pulling, scouring, carbonising or putting down mixings of textile waste (other than cotton waste).

PART IV.

SECTION I.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages must be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

SECTION II.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages or to agreements made or that may be made between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of the Minimum Rates.

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows :—

Declaration of Prohibited Area.

(1) The area described in the Schedule hereto is hereby declared to be a Prohibited Area for the purposes of the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Control of Movement) Order of 1920, and the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Great Britain) Order of 1922 (No. 9), shall be read and have effect as if that area were so declared in that Order and ceased to form part of any area, for the time being, included in the Second Schedule thereto.

Short Title.

(2) This Order may be cited as the FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE (GREAT BRITAIN) ORDER OF 1922 (No. 14).

FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE (GREAT
BRITAIN) ORDER OF 1922 (No. 15).

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows :—

Application of Order to Scheduled Districts.

1. Parts I., III. and IV. of the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Control of Movement) Order of 1920, hereinafter referred to as "the principal Order," are hereby applied, subject to the modifications hereinafter appearing, to the several districts described in the First Schedule hereto, each of which shall be a Scheduled District for the purposes of that Order.

Prohibited Area.

2. The area described in the Second Schedule hereto shall be a Prohibited Area for the purposes of the Principal Order.

Movement into Scheduled Districts.

3. Notwithstanding anything contained in the Principal Order, animals may be moved by road or rail into any Scheduled District described in the First Schedule hereto from premises in any of the areas described in the Fourth Schedule hereto (hereinafter referred to as "Free Areas") for any purpose, if accompanied throughout the movement by a licence granted under this Order.

Prohibition of Movement out of Infected Areas Specified in Third Schedule.

4. Notwithstanding anything contained in the Principal Order, or this Order, no cattle, sheep, goats or swine shall be moved, except as provided in Article 5 of this Order, out of any of the areas described in the Third Schedule hereto (hereinafter referred to as "Infected Areas"), except direct to a slaughterhouse situate in any Scheduled District described in the First Schedule hereto, and then only if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted under this Order.

Movement from one Scheduled District to another for Immediate Slaughter.

5. Notwithstanding anything contained in the Principal Order, an animal may be moved from any premises situate within any Scheduled District described in the First Schedule hereto to any slaughterhouse in another such Scheduled District, if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted under this Order. Provided that in all such cases the animal shall be moved as far as practicable by railway and shall not be untrucked or moved on any road in any of the Free Areas.

Holding of Farm Sales.

6.—(1) No sale of cattle, sheep, goats or swine shall be held on any farm premises in any Scheduled District for the purposes of the Principal Order, unless it is authorised by a licence granted by the Local Authority under this Article. Provided that no such sale shall be licenced to be held on any premises situate within a radius of two miles from any place which is, for the time being, declared to be a place infected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease.

(2) No licence shall be granted by an Inspector of a Local Authority for the movement of any animals from any sale held with a licence of the Local Authority granted under this Article to any premises which are situated within a radius of two miles from any place which is, for the time being, declared to be a place infected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease.

(3) The route to be specified by the Inspector granting or countersigning a licence for the movement of an animal from a sale held with a licence of the local Authority under this Article shall be such that at no point shall the animal be moved otherwise than by railway within a radius of two miles of any place which is, for the time being, declared to be a place infected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease. If no such route is practicable, the Inspector shall not grant or countersign a licence.

(4) A licence for movement of animals from a sale held with a licence of the Local Authority under this Article may, subject to the foregoing provisions, be granted for the movement of animals out of any Infected Area, provided that the place of destination is in an adjoining Infected Area which is comprised in the same Scheduled District.

(5) No licence shall be granted under the principal Order for the movement of animals to any farm premises for the purpose of sale thereon

Disinfection and Cleansing of Vehicles used for the conveyance of animals in Infected Areas.

7.—(1) Any float, cart, van or other vehicle (other than a railway truck) used for the conveyance of any animal or carcase thereof (not being a dressed carcase) into, within, or out of any Infected Area shall, as soon as practicable after each occasion on which it is so used, and before any other animal is placed therein, be disinfected and cleansed by, and at the expense of, the person using the same for such purpose in the manner following:—

(a) The floor of the vehicle, and all other parts thereof with which any animal or its droppings have come in contact, and all dung, litter or other thing that has been in contact with or used by such animals whilst being conveyed therein, shall be thoroughly saturated with carbolic acid or other suitable disinfectant.

(b) The same parts of the vehicle shall thereafter be scraped and swept out, and all dung, litter and sweepings shall be effectually removed from contact with animals and buried or otherwise destroyed.

(2) Every rope, net or other apparatus used in connection with any such conveyance of animals as aforesaid otherwise than on a railway shall, as soon as practicable after being so used, and before being used for other animals, be disinfected to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Local Authority by being thoroughly saturated with a

solution of carbolic acid or other suitable disinfectant.

(3) If the person using any such vehicle or thing for the conveyance of an animal fails to disinfect and cleanse it as required by this Article, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894, and it shall be lawful for the Local Authority, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the offence, to cause such vehicle or thing to be disinfected and cleansed and to recover summarily the expenses of such disinfection and cleansing from such person.

(4) Where the power of causing any vehicle or thing to be disinfected and cleansed under this Article is exercised by a Local Authority, the owner of the vehicle or thing and the person using the same shall give all reasonable facilities for that purpose, and any person failing to give such facilities shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Slaughter within 48 hours of Animals moved with a Licence to a Slaughterhouse.

8. Where animals are moved with a licence under the Principal Order of this Order authorising their movement to a slaughterhouse, the animals on arrival at the slaughterhouse shall be detained therein until slaughtered, and shall be slaughtered therein within forty-eight hours of their arrival thereat.

Modification of Principal Order as regards Granting of Movement Licences.

9.—(1) A Movement Licence granted under the Principal Order or this Order shall be granted only by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the premises to which the animals are to be moved are situate. Except as provided in the Animals (Landing from Ireland) Order of 1922, a licence so granted shall not be available unless and until it is countersigned by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District from which the animals are to be moved, who shall in every case endorse upon the licence the route by which the animals are to be moved and the date and time of the countersignature. No licence shall be granted or countersigned by an Inspector of any Local Authority if in his opinion it is undesirable to grant or countersign it, or if the intended movement is to or from any premises situate within a radius of two miles of any place which is for the time being declared to be a place infected with foot-and-mouth disease, or if the intended movement would involve movement on a road which is within a radius of two miles of any such place.

(2) A movement licence granted under this Order shall be available for three days from the time it is countersigned, and no longer.

(3) In the case of every movement of animals authorised by a licence under this Order, the licence shall accompany the animals throughout the movement.

Movement of Animals into any part of Great Britain not within any Scheduled District.

10. No cattle, sheep, goats or swine shall be moved by rail or otherwise into any of the Free Areas from any Scheduled District described in the First Schedule or from any other Free Area, except that animals may be moved between premises in Free Area No. 2 and premises in

Free Area No. 1, provided that such movement does not involve movement on a road in any Scheduled District.

Offences.

11. If anything is done or omitted to be done in contravention of this Order, the owner and the person for the time being in charge of the animal in respect of which, as the case may be, the same is done or omitted to be done, and the occupier of the premises concerned shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or omissions, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Revocation.

12. The Orders described in the Fifth Schedule hereto are hereby revoked.

Commencement.

13. This Order shall come into operation on the first day of April nineteen hundred and twenty-two.

14. This Order may be cited as the FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE (GREAT BRITAIN) ORDER OF 1922 (No. 15).

ORDER OF THE MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 29TH MARCH 1922.)

FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE (GREAT BRITAIN) ORDER OF 1922 (No. 16).

The Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in him under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling him in this behalf, hereby orders as follows:—

Movement of Wintering Sheep.

1. Notwithstanding the provisions of the Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Control of Movement) Order of 1920 (hereinafter referred to as "the Principal Order"), or of the Foot-and Mouth

Disease (Great Britain) Order of 1922 (No. 15) (hereinafter referred to as "Order No. 15"), sheep may be moved from wintering quarters situate in any scheduled district described in the First Schedule to Order No. 15, but not situate in the county of Berwick or within any Infected Area which is for the time being included in the Third Schedule to Order No. 15, to any other premises in Great Britain subject to and in accordance with the following provisions of this Order, but not otherwise.

2. The sheep shall be required to be accompanied by a licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the premises to which the sheep are to be moved are situate.

3. Before such licence is available it shall be countersigned by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District from which the sheep are to be moved.

4. The sheep shall be moved as far as practicable

able by railway or by vessel. The Inspector countersigning the licence and the Inspector granting the licence shall respectively specify the routes by which the sheep are to be moved to the railway station for the purpose of entraining and from the railway station or landing place, as the case may be, nearest to the place of destination.

5. No licence shall be granted for the movement of sheep under this Order from or to any premises situate within a radius of two miles from any place which is for the time being declared to be a place infected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease, and the route to be specified by the Inspectors as aforesaid shall be such that at no point shall the sheep be moved by road within a radius of two miles of any place which is for the time being declared to be a place infected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease.

6. Before any licence is countersigned under this Order the sheep to be moved shall be individually examined by a Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the sheep are within forty-eight hours before the movement commences, and no licence shall be countersigned unless the sheep have been certified by the Inspector to be free from any suspicion of Foot-and-Mouth Disease.

7. On arrival of the sheep at the railway station or landing place nearest to the place of destination, the sheep shall, before being dispersed to their intended destination for summer grazing and before being brought into contact with any other animals, be examined again by a Veterinary Inspector of the Local Authority.

Disinfection of Railway Trucks and Vessels.

8.—(1) Every railway truck or other railway vehicle in which sheep are to be placed for the purpose of movement with a licence under this Order shall, not more than twenty-four hours before the sheep are placed therein, be thoroughly sprayed or soured with liquid disinfectant under the supervision, and to the satisfaction, of an Inspector of the Local Authority.

(2) All parts of a vessel used for carrying sheep moved with a licence under this Order, and all fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils used for or about the animals, shall, not more than twenty-four hours before the sheep are placed therein, be thoroughly sprayed or soured with liquid disinfectant under the supervision, and to the satisfaction, of an Inspector of the Local Authority.

(3) The liquid disinfectant used for the purposes of this Article shall be—

(a) a 1 per cent. (minimum) solution of chloride of lime (containing not less than 30 per cent. of available chlorine); or

(b) a 5 per cent. (minimum) solution of carbolic acid (containing not less than 95 per cent. of actual carbolic acid); or

(c) a disinfectant equal in disinfective efficiency to the above-mentioned solution of carbolic acid.

(4) Nothing in this Article shall interfere with the operation of the provisions of the Animals (Transit and General) Order of 1912 as to the cleansing and disinfection of railway trucks or other railway vehicles, or of vessels or parts thereof, used for the conveyance of animals on a railway or by water.

Offences.

9. If any sheep is moved, or anything is done, or omitted to be done, in contravention of this Order, the owner and the person for the time being in charge of the animal in respect of which the same is done, or omitted to be done, or in respect of Article 8, the railway company or shipping company carrying the sheep, as the case may be, shall each according to and in respect of his or their own acts or omissions, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Commencement.

10. This Order shall come into operation on the fifth day of April nineteen hundred and twenty-two.

Short Title.

11. This Order may be cited as the FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE (GREAT BRITAIN) ORDER OF 1922 (No. 16).
