### TENDERS FOR TREASURY BILLS AND TREASURY BONDS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office, at the Bank of England, on Friday, the 7th July 1922, at 1 o'clock, for

(a) Treasury Bills, to be issued under the Treasury Bills Act, 1877; the National Debt Act, 1889; and the War Loan Acts, 1914-1919; and

(b) £4 10s. per cent. Treasury Bonds, repayable at par on the 15th April 1932.

2. The maximum amount of Treasury Bills and Treasury Bonds to be issued will be £50,000,000. The amount of Treasury Bonds issued will not exceed £5,000,000, but subject to that limit the total amount issued will be divided between Bills and Bonds in such proportions as Their Lordships may determine.

### TREASURY BILLS.

3. The Bills will be in amounts of £5000 or £10,000. They will be dated at the option of the Tenderer on any business day from Monday, the 10th July 1922, to Saturday, the 15th July 1922, inclusive, and will be payable at three months after date.

4. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

5. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000, and must specify the date on which the Bills required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one penny) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bills of different dates.

### £4 10s. PER CENT. TREASURY BONDS, 1932.

6. The Bonds will be in denominations of £50, £100, £200, £500, £1000, and £5000. They will be exempt from Corporation Profits Tax, and will in all respects rank *pari passu* with those issued under the Prospectus of the 21st April 1922. They will be dated at the option of the Tenderer on any business day from Monday, the 10th July 1922, to Saturday, the 15th July 1922, inclusive; the first dividend payable on the 15th October 1922, will represent in the case of each Bond interest to that date from the date of the Bond.

7. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000 and must specify the date on which the Bonds required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one shilling) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bonds of different dates.

8. Tenders must be made through a London Banker, Discount House or Broker.

9. The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same not later than the following day, and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of Cash or a Banker's Draft on the Bank of England not

later than 2 o'clock (Saturday 12 o'clock) on the day on which the relative Bills or Bonds are to be dated.

10. In virtue of the provisions of Section 1 (4) of the War Loan Act, 1919, Members of the House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills and Bonds.

11. Tenders must be made on the printed forms, which may be obtained from the Chief Cashier's Office, Bank of England.

and *Including* also:

- (b) the operation of bottle-washing, bottling and filling, and all subsidiary operations preparatory to the sale in bottles, jars or other similar receptacles of cider, ale, stout, porter and other alcoholic beers, where all or any of such last-mentioned operations are, or is, conducted or carried on in association with or in conjunction with all or any of the operations specified under (a) above so as to form a common or interchangeable form of employment for workers, and whether the two sets of operations or any of them are, or is, carried on simultaneously or not.

NOTE.—The employment of female workers, young persons and children is subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts, and to the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920.

## PART V.

SECTION I.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages must be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

SECTION II.—The above Minimum Rates of Wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages or to agreements made or that may be made between employer and workers for the payment of wages in excess of the Minimum Rates.

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations have been approved by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, viz.:—

REGULATIONS RESPECTING OPEN COMPETITIVE EXAMINATIONS FOR THE SITUATION OF TYPIST IN THE CIVIL SERVICE.

*\*\*These Regulations are liable to alteration from time to time.*

1. The limits of age for this situation are 18 and 28. If an Examination begins in one of the first four months of any year Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the 1st day of January in that year. If an Examination begins in one of the second four months of any year Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the 1st day of May in that year. If an Examination begins in one of the last four months of any year Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the 1st day of September in that year.

In reckoning age for competition, persons who have served in any civil situation to which they were admitted with the Certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners, may deduct from their actual age any time not exceeding two years which they may have spent in such service.

Persons transferred to situations in the Post Office from a Telephone Company or Municipal Telephone Undertaking, on the absorption of such Company or Undertaking by the Post Office, may reckon, as if it were service in a situation to which they were admitted with the Certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners, their continuous service in the Post Office, as well as so much of their previous continuous service in the Telephone Company or Undertaking (or in any Telephone Company or Municipal Telephone Undertaking previously

absorbed by it) as was rendered in situations for which a Civil Service Certificate is ordinarily required.

2. At each Examination the number of Candidates to be selected will be such as may from time to time be fixed.

3. Candidates will be required to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners—

(a) That they are unmarried or widows.

(b) That they are duly qualified in respect of health and character.

No person will be eligible who is not a natural-born British subject, and the child of a father also a natural-born British subject; provided that exception may be made in the case of a person serving in a civil situation to which he was admitted with the Certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners.

4. Persons upon whose training for the occupation of teacher public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate education authority has been notified to the Civil Service Commissioners.

5. The Examination will be in the following subjects, viz. :—

1. English.

2. Arithmetic.

3. Typewriting.

4. One of the following :—French, German, Shorthand.

*No Candidate will be regarded as qualified who does not pass to the satisfaction of the Civil Service Commissioners in English and in Typewriting.*

The Civil Service Commissioners may, at their discretion, restrict the Examination in Typewriting to such a number of Candidates at the head of the list resulting from the marks awarded for the work in the other subjects as they may think fit. The Scottish Board of Health, in pursuance of the above Regulations, hereby give notice that, for the purposes of those Regulations the Official Certificate of which the details are set forth in the representation or design in the Schedule appended to and forming part of this Notice, is declared to be admissible, from the date of the publication of this Notice, in the manner, to the extent, and subject to the rules and conditions prescribed in this Notice, as evidence that the pig from which has been derived the meat in relation to which such Certificate is used, has been certified by a competent authority in the place of origin to be free from disease at the time of slaughter, and that the meat has been certified by the like authority to have been dressed or prepared, and packed, with the needful observance of all requirements for the prevention of danger arising to public health from the meat as an article of food ;

And further, with respect to the manner, to the extent, and to the rules and conditions in, to, and subject to which every Official Certificate is admissible as evidence for any such purpose as is hereinbefore described, the Scottish Board of Health hereby prescribes as follows, that is to say :—

(i) An Official Certificate used in relation to foreign meat, or in relation to a box, case, receptacle or package containing foreign meat, shall be admissible as aforesaid only where the meat is derived from a pig.

(ii) An Official Certificate in the form of a label shall be admissible as aforesaid only where the label is securely affixed or attached to any foreign meat, or to any box, case, receptacle or package containing foreign meat ; and where the label so affixed or attached has not in any other circumstances, or on any other occasion, been used as an Official Certificate.

(iii) In this Notice, any word or expression to which a special meaning is assigned by the Public Health (Foreign Meat) Amending Regulations (Scotland), 1909, has the same meaning as in those Regulations.
