

7. A fee of £4 5s. will be required from every candidate.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice, that an Open Competitive Examination will be held in London, Edinburgh, Bristol, and Leeds under the foregoing Regulations, commencing on the 13th February 1923.

The number of situations to be filled will be the number vacant at the time of declaring the result of the Examination.

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the consent of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, viz. :—

**TEMPORARY (RECONSTRUCTION) REGULATIONS  
FOR THE SELECTION OF PREVENTIVE MEN IN  
THE WATERGUARD SERVICE OF THE CUSTOMS  
AND EXCISE DEPARTMENT.**

1. *Application: Fee.*—Candidates must make application on the appropriate Form, which may be obtained from the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, 6 Burlington Gardens, London, W. 1. Every candidate sending in an Application Form must at the same time pay the prescribed fee of five shillings.

2. *Age.*—Candidates must be at least 20 years of age at the date of the examination described below, and must have been born on or after the 2nd September 1894.

3. *Nationality.*—Every candidate must be a natural-born British subject and the child of a father also a natural-born British subject, provided that exception to the latter condition may be made in the case of candidates who served in His Majesty's Armed Forces during the War.

4. *Military Service.*—Candidates must have

served in His Majesty's Naval, Military or Air Forces during the War.

5. *Education.*—Candidates must satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners that their Educational qualifications are such as would afford a reasonable prospect of success in competitive examinations for these situations, that is, that they have attained a standard equal to that represented by a complete course in an ordinary Public Elementary School.

6. *Qualifying Examination.*—Those candidates who on their Application Forms are adjudged by the Civil Service Commissioners to be eligible will undergo a qualifying examination in the following subjects:—

English (including Writing and Spelling),  
Reading Manuscript,  
Arithmetic,  
Geography,

and those whom the Civil Service Commissioners judge to approximate to the standard of ability usually obtained from competitive examinations for these situations will be considered as qualified to appear before the Selection Board. Success in the qualifying examination will not in itself confer any claim to appointment.

7. *Competitions.*—Candidates who pass the qualifying examination will be summoned to an interview before a Selection Board, and on the result of that interview the Selection Board will prepare a list of candidates, in order of merit, sufficient in number to fill such vacancies as have been reported or may be reported within a period to be fixed by the Commissioners. Other things being equal, preference will be given to candidates who are, or have been, temporarily employed in the Government service.

8. *Health and Character.*—Selected candidates will be required to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners as to their health and character. They must be in good health, must possess good eyesight and hearing, and must be physically capable of performing the active duties of the Waterguard Service.

9. *Warning.*—Any attempt on the part of a candidate to enlist support for his application through Members of Parliament, or other influential persons, will disqualify him for appointment. The Selection Board will disregard spontaneous recommendations from persons who are not personally acquainted with the candidate's work, whether at school, in the Forces or otherwise.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that a Competition (Qualifying Examination followed by Selection Board) will be held under the foregoing Regulations. The Qualifying Examination will be held at Bristol, Edinburgh, Hull, Liverpool, London, Newcastle-on-Tyne and Southampton, commencing on the 27th February 1923.

No person will be admitted to Examination from whom the Secretary of the Civil Service Commission has not received, on or before the 11th January 1923, an application, in the Candidate's own handwriting, on a prescribed form, which may be obtained from the Secretary at once.
