TENDERS FOR TREASURY BILLS AND TREASURY BONDS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice, that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office, at the Bank of England, on Friday, the 13th April, 1923, at 1 o'clock, for—

(a) Treasury Bills to be issued under the Treasury Bills Act, 1877, the National Debt Act, 1889, and the War Loan Acts, 1914-1919; and

(b) £4 per cent. Treasury Bonds, repayable at par on the 15th April, 1933.

2. The maximum amount of Treasury Bills and Treasury Bonds to be issued will be £35,000,000. The amount of Treasury Bonds issued will not exceed £3,000,000, but subject to that limit the total amount issued will be divided between Bills and Bonds in such proportions as Their Lordships may determine.

TREASURY BILLS.

3. The Bills will be in amounts of £5,000 or £10,000. They will be dated at the option of the Tenderer on any business day from

Monday, the 16th April 1923, to Saturday, the 21st April 1923, inclusive, and will be payable at three months after date.

4. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

5. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000, and must specify the date on which the Bills required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one penny) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bills of different dates.

£4 PER CENT. TREASURY BONDS, 1933.

6. The Bonds will be in denominations of £50, £100, £200, £500, £1,000 and £5,000. They will be exempt from Corporation Profits Tax, and will in all respects rank *pari passu* with those issued under the Prospectus of the 23rd March 1923. They will be dated at the option of the Tenderer on any business day from Monday, the 16th April 1923, to Saturday, the 21st April 1923, inclusive; the first dividend payable on the 15th October, 1923, will represent in the case of each Bond interest to that date from the date of the Bond.

7. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000, and must specify the date on which the Bonds required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one shilling) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bonds of different dates.

8. Tenders must be made through a London Banker, Discount House or Broker.

9. The persons whose Tenders are accepted

will be informed of the same not later than the following day, and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of Cash or a Banker's Draft on the Bank of England not later than 2 o'clock (Saturday 12 o'clock) on the day on which the relative Bills or Bonds are to be dated.

10. In virtue of the provisions of Section 1 (4) of the War Loan Act, 1919, Members of the House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills and Bonds.

11. Tenders must be made on the printed forms which may be obtained from the Chief Cashier's Office, Bank of England.

12. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

Effective as from 9th April 1923, * except where otherwise shown.

* Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the next full pay period, but in any case not later than 15th April 1923.

SECTION I.—

B.—FEMALE WORKERS when employed in any of the following occupations which come within the scope of the Trade Board as defined in Part IV. of this Schedule:—

- Cocoa Making.
- Boiling Sugar for Boiled Sweets, other than the Boiling of Sugar in Vacuum Pans.
- Brogueing of Hermetically-Sealed Receptacles containing Meat, Poultry, Fish or Soup during the Process of Cooking.
- Hand-Soldering of Hermetically-Sealed Receptacles containing Meat, Poultry, Fish or Soup.
- Tongue Pumping.
- Butchers' or Pork-Butchers' Work in Preparing Meat for Sausages or "Smalls."

Provided that in the case of a worker (other than a worker employed for seasonal work) who enters the trade for the first time at the age of 15 years or over and who cannot suitably be

employed on piece-work, the General Minimum Time-Rate payable during her first three months of employment in the trade shall be 3s. per week of 48 hours less than the General Minimum Time Rate which would otherwise be applicable, and during her second three months of employment in the trade shall be 1s. 6d. per week less than the General Minimum Time-Rate which would otherwise be applicable, in accordance with the provisions of this Section.

NOTE.—The General Minimum Time Rates marked * and the Overtime Rates based thereon have been effective as from 10th July 1922.

PART III.

OVERTIME RATES FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

ALL AGES.

SECTION I.

In accordance with Section 3 (1) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board have declared the normal number of hours of work in the trade to be as follows:—

In Any Week ...	48
On Any Day (other than Saturday) ...	9
On Saturday ...	5

Provided that all hours worked on Sundays and on the days allowed as holidays under Section 35 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, shall be regarded as Overtime to which the Overtime Rates shall apply.

SECTION II.

The Minimum Rates for Overtime to apply in respect of all hours worked by Male and Female Workers, in excess of the declared normal number of hours, shall be as follows:—

(A) For Male and Female Workers employed on Time-Work:—

(1) For the first two hours of Overtime on any day except Sunday and the holidays specified above the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter Times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Quarter.

(2) For Overtime after the first two hours of Overtime on any day, except Sunday and the holidays specified above, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-

Half Times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Half.

(3) For all time worked on Sunday and the days allowed as holidays under Section 35 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, the Overtime Rate shall be Twice the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Double-Time.

(4) For all hours worked in any week in excess of 48 the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter Times the General Minimum Time-Rate otherwise applicable, *i.e.*, Time-and-a-Quarter, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs (2) and (3) of Sub-Section (A) of this Section.

Provided that—

(a) Where it is or may become the established practice of an employer only to require attendance on five days a week, the Overtime Rate shall only be payable on such days after 9½ hours have been worked.

(b) Where it is or may become the established practice of an employer to require attendance only on alternate Saturdays, the Overtime Rate shall not be payable in the week on which attendance on Saturday is required until 50 hours have been worked.

(B) For Male and Female Workers employed on Piece-Work:—

I. (1) Male Workers of 24 years of age and over;

(2) Female Workers of 24 years of age and over of the classes specified in Section I. B. of Part I. of the Schedule to this Notice; and

(3) All other Female Workers of 18 years of age and over:

Who are employed on Piece-Work shall receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked, in addition to payment at Piece-Rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary Worker not less than the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable, an amount equal to One-Quarter of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, One-Half of the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate or the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the provisions of Sub-Section (A) of this Section if the Worker had been employed on Time-Work were Time-and-a-Quarter, Time-and-a-Half or Double Time respectively.

II. (1) Male Workers under 24 years of age;

(2) Female Workers under 24 years of age of the classes specified in Section I B of Part I of the Schedule to this Notice; and

(3) All other Female Workers under 18 years of age:

Who are employed on Piece-Work shall receive in respect of each hour of Overtime worked, in addition to payment at Piece-Rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary Worker not less than the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applicable, an amount equal to One-Quarter of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, One-Half of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate or the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable under the provisions of Sub-Section (A) of this Section if the Worker had been employed on Time-Work were Time-and-a-Quarter, Time-and-a-Half or Double Time respectively.

NOTE. — The employment of Female Workers, Young Persons and Children is subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts; of the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920, and of the Education Acts, 1918 and 1921.

PART IV.

SECTION I.

The respective Minimum Rates of Wages set out in this Schedule apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts and to Section II of this Part of this Notice, to all workers in Great Britain in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Sugar Confectionery and Food Preserving) Order, 1913, as varied by the Trade Boards (Grocery and Provisions) Order, 1920, excluding the covering and filling of biscuits, wafers and cakes with chocolate or sugar confectionery, viz: The making of Sugar Confectionery, Cocoa, Chocolate, Jam, Marmalade, Preserved Fruits, Fruit and Table Jellies, Meat Extracts, Meat Essences, Sauces and Pickles; the preparation of Meat, Poultry, Game, Fish, Vegetables and Fruit for sale in a preserved state in tins, pots, bottles and similar receptacles; the processes of wrapping, filling, packing and labelling in respect of articles so made or prepared, *excluding* the covering and filling of biscuits, wafers and cakes with chocolate or sugar confectionery; and *excluding* also certain processes or operations which form part of the Grocery and Provisions Trade as defined for the purpose of the application of the Trade Boards Acts.

SECTION II.

The above Minimum Rates do *not* apply to Clerks, Salesmen, Saleswomen, Travellers, Engineers, Carpenters, Vanmen, Watchmen, Outside Messengers, Cleaners of Premises, Timekeepers, or to any workers whose work stands in a relationship to the trade similar to that of the foregoing excluded classes.

PART V.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages must be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enact-

ments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

Signed by Order of the Trade Board and in pursuance of Orders of the Ministry of Labour confirming the Minimum Rates as varied by the Trade Board and set out above and specifying the dates provided in this Notice, as the dates from which they should become effective.

The above Rates are Minimum Rates and do not prevent the payment of higher rates of Wages.

Every Occupier of a factory or workshop or of any place used for giving out work to outworkers shall, on receipt of this Notice, post up and keep posted up a sufficient number of true copies thereof in Prominent Positions in the factory, workshop or place used for giving out work, in such manner as to ensure that in each case the Notice shall be brought to the knowledge of all workers employed by him, or on his premises, who are affected thereby. Penalty for Non-compliance a fine not exceeding 40s.

THE ROADS ACT, 1920.

COUNTY OF PERTH.

Notice is hereby given that on the fourth day of April 1923 the Minister of Transport made an Order under Section 7 (4) of the Roads Act, 1920, in respect of a highway in the County of Perth.

The Order, which will come into force on the twentieth day of April 1923, and will remain in force until the 31st day of October 1924, is to the following effect:—

No person shall drive or cause to be driven on the Crieff-Locheearnhead North Road between St. Fillans Hotel and the District Boundary at Ogle Burn (hereinafter referred to as "the said road") any mechanically propelled vehicle which has an unladen weight exceeding three tons or which has seats for more than twenty persons exclusive of the driver:

Nothing in the Order shall prevent the driving on the said road of—

- (i) Any vehicle which is being used for the purposes of agriculture in connection with land adjoining or lying near to the said road;
- (ii) Any vehicle which is being used for the conveyance of goods or merchandise to or from any house, building or other premises situate on or adjacent to the said road; or
- (iii) Any vehicle which is being used in connection with the maintenance, improvement or reconstruction of the said road.

Civil Service Commission.

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following regulations have been approved by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and will come into force on the 1st May 1923, viz. :—

GENERAL REGULATIONS RESPECTING APPOINTMENT TO HIS MAJESTY'S CIVIL ESTABLISHMENTS UNDER THE ORDER IN COUNCIL OF 22ND JULY 1920.

N.B.—*These Regulations are liable to alteration at any time.*

Whereas by Order in Council (hereinafter referred to as a "Principal Order") dated 22nd July 1920, it is provided that (subject to the exception therein mentioned) the qualifications of all persons proposed to be appointed whether permanently or temporarily to any situation or employment in any of His Majesty's Civil Establishments, shall before they are appointed be approved by the Civil Service Commissioners, and no person shall be so appointed until a certificate of his qualification has been issued by the Commissioners;

And whereas it is provided by Clause 4 of the Principal Order that the Commissioners may, subject to the approval of the Treasury, make regulations prescribing the manner in which persons are to be admitted to His Majesty's Civil Establishments or to any situation or class of situations therein, and the conditions on which the Commissioners may issue certificates of qualification for the purposes of the Principal Order;

And whereas it is provided by Clause 8 of the Principal Order that Articles 2 and 10 of the Consolidated Order in Council, dated 10th January 1910, shall be repealed as from the date on which the Principal Order came into operation, and that the other provisions of the Orders recited in the Principal Order should be repealed as from the date on which regulations are made under the Principal Order repealing or re-enacting with or without modifications those provisions;

Now, therefore, the Civil Service Commissioners with the approval of the Treasury, make the following regulations.

These regulations prescribe the conditions on which the Commissioners may issue certificates of qualification for admission to any situation or employment in His Majesty's Civil Establishments. These regulations are General Regulations applicable to both sexes and all situations. Words importing the masculine gender or the male sex in these Regulations denote either sex unless exception be made in the context.

Age.

1. Every candidate shall satisfy the Commissioners that he is within the limits of age (if any) already prescribed or hereafter in due form prescribed for the situation or employment to which he desires to be admitted. From the actual age of the candidate such deduction shall be made on account of military service, civil service, or otherwise, as is laid down in regulations for the situation or class or group of situations to which he desires to be admitted.

2. If no limit of age is prescribed by Regulations for the situation or class or group of situations concerned, the candidate shall satisfy the

Commissioners that his age is suitable to the duties of the post which he seeks; but no person not already holding an established post shall be appointed to an established situation at an age exceeding 50 without the consent of the Treasury.

3. On the application of the Head of a Department and with the approval of the Treasury, the Commissioners may, if they are satisfied that there is due and sufficient cause, extend the upper prescribed limit of age for any candidate, except in an open competition.

Health.

4. Subject to the provisos appended to this clause every candidate shall satisfy the Commissioners that he is free from any physical defect or disease that would be likely to interfere with the proper discharge of his duties.

Provided that where an officer holding a pensionable situation in any of His Majesty's Civil Establishments is nominated by the Head of a Department for the issue of a certificate of qualification in respect of his promotion in the same Department, or of his transfer to another Department, the Commissioners may, at their discretion, if they see fit, grant their certificate of qualification on being satisfied that he is fully qualified in respect of age, character, knowledge and ability, without requiring evidence as to freedom from physical defect or disease, provided they are satisfied that the situation to which he is promoted or transferred does not require a higher degree of physical capacity than the situation which he already holds.

Provided also that in the case of persons whose health has been impaired by reason of service in His Majesty's Forces during the Great War, the Commissioners may on the conditions and in the manner prescribed by the Order in Council of 22nd March 1918, issue modified (War) Certificates and Special Recommendations which shall have effect as laid down in that Order and as if that Order had been part of the Regulations now made under the Order of 22nd July 1920.

Character.

5. Every candidate shall satisfy the Commissioners that his character is such as to qualify him for the situation or employment which he seeks.

Knowledge and Ability.

6. Every candidate shall satisfy the Commissioners that he is qualified in respect of knowledge and ability to discharge the duties of the situation which he seeks.

7. The tests shall be such as are prescribed by the regulations (if any) for the situation or group of situations to which the candidate desires to be admitted.

The normal method of entry will be by means of competitive examinations, according to regulations framed or to be from time to time framed by the Civil Service Commissioners, and approved by the Treasury, open to all persons of the requisite age, health, character, and other qualifications prescribed in the said regulations who may be desirous of attending the same upon application made at the time and in the manner prescribed and subject to the payment of the fees from time to time prescribed. Such examinations shall be held at such periods, and for such situations or groups of situations, as the

Commissioners with the approval of the Treasury, shall from time to time determine.

8. Where in exceptional cases no regulations have been made prescribing tests for the situation in question, the candidate shall satisfy the Commissioners in such manner as (having regard to the nature of the duties to be performed) they in their discretion may require of his fitness in respect of knowledge and ability for the duties of the post that he is seeking.

9. Where tests are prescribed for any situation, the regulations will lay down whether they shall be qualifying tests of candidates nominated by the Head of a Department, or competitive tests, and if competitive whether among candidates nominated by the Head of a Department or open to all persons who satisfy the conditions prescribed, and whether by examination or by examination and interview or by interview or otherwise.

10. The Commissioners may, if they think fit, dispense wholly or partly with any examination, competitive or qualifying, prescribed for any situation or groups of situations if one or other of the following conditions be fulfilled:—

(a) That the Head of the Department and the Treasury consider after inquiry in the Civil Service that for a particular situation qualifications wholly or in part professional, or otherwise peculiar and not ordinarily to be acquired in the Civil Service, are required. The relevant particulars of every such case shall be published in the London Gazette and included in the Annual Report of the Civil Service Commissioners.

(b) That the candidate or group of candidates concerned having been employed in a quasi-permanent capacity on work which has proved to be of a permanent character, and having given throughout a sufficient period of trial proof of fitness to perform the duties required, are put forward with the approval of the Treasury by the Head of the Department for establishment.

(c) That it has been proved to the satisfaction of the Treasury and the Commissioners that the transfer or promotion of an established Civil Servant from one post to another not in customary course of promotion is desirable in the interests of the public service.

In every case falling within any of the classes (a), (b), (c), the Commissioners shall require such evidence as they think desirable to satisfy them of the fitness of the candidate in respect of knowledge and ability.

(d) That the Head of the Department has satisfied the Treasury and the Civil Service Commissioners that the admission of a particular candidate to a specified situation is for special and exceptional reasons justified by the needs of the public service and the proved merit of the individual. The relevant particulars of every such case shall be published in the London Gazette and included in the Annual Report of the Civil Service Commissioners.

Reinstatement and Reduction.

11. In any case in which the Head of a Department with the approval of the Treasury

nominates a candidate for reinstatement in the Civil Service or for appointment to a situation inferior to that which he already holds the Commissioners may dispense with any further test of knowledge and ability.

Nationality.

12. Every candidate shall satisfy the Commissioners that he or she is a natural-born British subject and the son or daughter of a father also a natural-born British subject. Provided that exception may be made—

(a) In the case of candidates who are serving in a civil situation to which they were admitted with the certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners.

(b) In the case of persons who, being British subjects, and having served in His Majesty's Armed Forces in the Great War between 4th August, 1914, and 11th November, 1918, are serving and have served for not less than six months in unestablished uncertificated employment which in normal course, by departmental custom or by the grant of establishment to an unestablished class, confers a claim to nomination singly or by limited competition for established and certificated appointment and are nominated for that established and certificated appointment.

(c) In the case of persons serving in unestablished uncertificated employment which in normal course, by departmental custom or by the grant of establishment to an unestablished class, confers a claim to nomination singly or by limited competition for established and certificated appointment, who are nominated for that established and certificated appointment, and who satisfy the rule in respect of nationality for established appointment which was in force when their unestablished service began, and

(d) In the case of natural-born British subjects who served in His Majesty's Armed Forces in the Great War between 4th August, 1914, and 11th November, 1918.

A candidate will not be eligible for assignment or appointment to the Foreign Office or services under the control of the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs unless he is a natural-born British subject and born within the United Kingdom or in one of the self-governing Dominions of parents also born within those Territories, except when the circumstances are such as to justify a departure from the general rule, in which case provided the candidate satisfies the conditions prescribed by the preceding paragraphs of this regulation he may be admitted to appointment or competition by special permission of the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs.

Fees.

13. Candidates shall pay fees in such manner at such times and in such amounts as the Commissioners with the approval of the Treasury have prescribed or shall from time to time prescribe in regulations or other notice published in the London Gazette.

The Commissioners may, with the like approval, exempt from the payment of fees such classes of persons as they may think fit

to exempt. Every such exemption shall be published in the London Gazette.

The Commissioners, with the like approval, may, by notice in the London Gazette, cancel any preceding notice therein, or any part thereof, and may, by such or by any further notice, vary the amount of the fees to be paid by persons attending examinations held by them, or the manner, or the time, of paying such fees, or the classes of persons required to pay them, or exempted from paying them.

Repeal.

14. Articles 3, 4, 5, 7, 9 and 11 of the Consolidated Order in Council of the 10th January, 1910, and the associated Orders in Council of the 22nd March, 1918, 23rd October, 1918, 18th December, 1918, and 9th December, 1919, are hereby repealed.

Provided that all Regulations and rules for the admission of candidates to situations in the Civil Service made by the Commissioners under the Order in Council of 10th January, 1910, or under other Orders and still in force, are hereby confirmed, and shall remain in force until fresh or amended regulations or rules are made by the Commissioners under the Orders in Council of 22nd July, 1920, or one of them.

Note as to procedure for settling Regulations for particular situations, classes of situations, or groups of situations.

Subject in both cases to the provisos in Clause 2 of the Principal Order above mentioned.

(a) Regulations as to conditions of entry into any situation, class of situations, or group of situations, peculiar to one Department, will be agreed between the Head of the Department and the Civil Service Commissioners and submitted to the Treasury for their approval.

(b) Regulations as to conditions of entry to any class of situations or group of situations common to two or more Departments will be framed by the Civil Service Commissioners and submitted to the Treasury for their approval.
