### RATES OF INTEREST ON LOCAL LOANS.

#### MINIMUM RATES OF WAGES FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS.

This Notice sets out the Minimum Rates of Wages for Male and Female Workers as varied by the Trade Board and confirmed by an Order of the Minister of Labour, dated 24th April 1923, together with the Minimum Rates (as set out in the Schedule to the Trade Board's Notice O. (13), dated 25th July 1922) which are not affected by the variation and which remain in operation.

This Notice takes the place of all previous Notices fixing, varying, Minimum Rates of Wages issued by the Trade Board. or cancelling

The Minimum Rates of Wages set out in the Schedule below are effective as follows:-

- 1. The General Minimum Time-Rate for Home-Workers specified in Part IV., Section II. of the Schedule below, as from 27th March 1922; and the General Minimum Piece-Rates for Home-Workers specified in Part IV., Section I., as from 31st July 1922.
- 2. In all other cases (with the exception of the General Minimum Time-Rates marked † and the Overtime Rates based thereon, which became effective as from 1st November 1922) as from 1st May 1923.\*
- \* Note.—Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period from which

wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates shall become effective as from the beginning of the next full pay period, but in no case later than 7th May 1923.

#### GENERAL MINIMUM TIME-RATES.

FOR ALL MALE WORKERS (OTHER THAN HOME-WORKERS):—

- (1) Certain Special Classes of Workers of 21 years of age and over, 1s. 5d., 1s. 3½d., or 1s. 1d. per hour (according to occupation). (See Part I., Section I. (1), (2), (3) of the Schedule below.)
- (2) All other Male Workers of 21 years of age and over, 103 d. per hour.
  (3) Male Workers under 21 years of age (according to age). See Part I., Section I. (5) of the Schedule below.

FOR ALL FEMALE WORKERS (OTHER THAN HOME-WORKERS):—

- (1) Charge Hands (as specified in Part I., Section II. (1) of the Schedule below), 7<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>d. per hour.
- (2) All other Female Workers of 21 years of age and over, 6½d. per hour.
- (3) Female Workers under 21 years of age (according to age). See Part I., Section II. (2) of the Schedule below.

#### PIECE-WORK BASIS TIME-RATE.

FOR ALL FEMALE WORKERS (OTHER THAN HOME-WORKERS), 74d. per hour.

OVERTIME RATES. See Part III. of the Schedule below.

MINIMUM RATES FOR HOME-WORKERS. See Part IV. of the Schedule below.

#### PART II.

### PIECE-WORK BASIS TIME-RATES FOR ALL FEMALE WORKERS (OTHER THAN HOME-WORKERS).

Piece-Work Basis Time Rate. Per hour.

For all Female Workers ... ...  $7\frac{1}{2}d$ .

In the case of all Female Workers employed on Piece-Work each piece-rate paid must be sufficient to yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an Ordinary Worker, i.e., a worker of ordinary skill and experience in the class of work in question, at least 7½d, per hour.

#### PART III.

### OVERTIME RATES FOR MALE AND FEMALE WORKERS (OTHER THAN HOME-WORKERS).

#### SECTION I.

In accordance with Section (3) (i.) (c) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, the Trade Board have declared the Normal Hours of Work in the Trade to be as follows:—

Provided that all time worked on Sundays and on Statutory Holidays shall be regarded as Overtime to which Overtime Rates shall apply.

#### SECTION II.

The Minimum Rates for Overtime for all Male and Female Workers (other than Homeworkers), in respect of time worked by a worker in excess of the declared normal number of hours of work in the trade shall be as follows:—

- A .- Male and Female Workers employed on Time-Work :-
  - (a) For all time worked on Sundays and Statutory Holidays, the Overtime Rate shall be Twice the minimum rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Double-Time.
  - (b) For all time worked in excess of 4½ hours on Saturday, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Half times the minimum rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Time-and-a Half, notwithstanding that the total number of hours worked in the week does not exceed 47.
  - (c) For all time worked in excess of 47 hours in any week, the Overtime Rate shall be One-and-a-Quarter times the minimum rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Time-and-a-Quarter for the first ten hours, and One-and-a-Half times the minimum rate otherwise applicable, i.e., Time-and-a-Half thereafter, except in so far as higher Overtime Rates are payable under the provisions of paragraphs (a) and (b) of this Sub-Section.
- B.—Female Workers employed on Piece-Work:—
- A Female Worker employed on piece-work shall receive in respect of all Overtime worked, in addition to piece-rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker, not less than the appropriate Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate, as set out in Part II. of this Schedule, a sum equivalent to the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, to One-Half of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, or to One-Quarter of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, according as the Overtime Rate, which would be payable under the provisions of Part A of this Section, if the worker were employed on Time-Work, were Double-Time, or Time-and-a-Half, or Time-and-a-Quarter respectively.
- C.—Male Workers employed on Piece-Work :—

A Male Worker employed on Piece-Work shall receive in respect of all Overtime worked, in addition to piece-rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an ordinary worker, not less than the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate as set out in Section I. of Part I. of this Schedule, a sum equivalent to the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, or to One-Half of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, or to One-Quarter of the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate, according as the Overtime Rate payable under the provisions of Part A of this Section, if the worker were employed on Time-Work, were Double-Time, or Time-and-a-Half, or Time-and-a-Quarter, respectively.

#### PART IV.

SECTION II.

#### GENERAL, MINIMUM TIME-RATE FOR HOME-WORKERS.

General Minimum Time-Rate. Per hour.

All Home-Workers ... 6d.

SECTION III.

Where Home-workers are employed on piece-work to which the General Minimum Piece-Rates set out in Section I. of this Part are applicable, they must be paid not less than such piece-rates. Where Home-workers are employed on piece-work to which the General Minimum Piece-Rates set out in Section I. of this Part are not applicable, each piece-rate must be sufficient to yield, in the circumstances of the case, at least the equivalent of the General Minimum Time-Rate of 6d. per hour specified in Section II., to an Ordinary Worker, i.e., a Home-worker of ordinary skill and experience in the class of work in question.

For the purpose of this Notice, the expression "Home-worker" means a worker who works in his or her own home or in any other place not under the control or management of the employer.

#### PART V.

#### APPLICABILITY OF MINIMUM RATES.

The above minimum rates of wages apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers in Great Britain in respect of all time during which they are employed

in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Pin, Hook and Eye and Snap Fastener) Order, 1919, that is to say:—

The manufacture of pins, hairpins, hooks and eyes, haircurlers, snap fasteners, or safety pins, from the following metals in wire or sheet form:—

Aluminium, copper, iron, lead, steel, tin, zinc or alloys of any two or more of the above metals.

Including: -

(a) The capping of safety pins.(b) The operation of pin sticking.

(c) Packeting, boxing or carding of any of the above articles wherever carried on.

(d) Packing, dispatching, warehousing or other operations incidental to or appertaining to the manufacture of any of the above articles.

But excluding: -

(e) The manufacture of steel hatpins or shanks for steel toilet pins, wherever carried on.

#### PART VI.

#### SECTION I.

The above minimum rates of wages must be paid clear of all deductions, other than deductions under the National Insurance Act 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments, or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

#### SECTION II.

The above minimum rates of wages are without prejudice to workers who are earning higher rates of wages, or to agreements made or that may be made between employers and workers for the payment of wages in excess of these minimum rates of wages.

Note.—The employment of Women, Young Persons and Children is subject to the provisions of the Factory and Workshop Acts; the Employment of Women, Young Persons and Children Act, 1920; and the Education Acts, 1918 and 1921.
