## TENDERS FOR TREASURY BILLS AND TREASURY BONDS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office at the Bank of England, on Friday, the 15th June, 1923, at 1 o'clock, for

(a) Treasury Bills to be issued under the Treasury Bills Act, 1877, the National Debt Act, 1889, and the War Loan Acts, 1914-1919; and

(b) £4 per cent. Treasury Bonds, repayable at par on the 15th April 1933.

2. The maximum amount of Treasury Bills and Treasury Bonds to be issued will be £35,000,000. The amount of Treasury Bonds issued will not exceed £4,000,000, but subject to that limit the total amount issued will be divided between Bills and Bonds in such proportions as Their Lordships may determine.

### TREASURY BILLS.

3. The Bills will be in amounts of £5000 or £10,000. They will be dated at the option of the Tenderer on any business day from Monday, the 18th June 1923, to Saturday, the 23rd June 1923, inclusive, and will be payable at three months after date.

4. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

5. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000, and must specify the date on which the Bills required are to be dated and the net amount per cent. (being an even

multiple of one penny) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bills of different dates.

### 4 PER CENT. TREASURY BONDS, 1933.

6. The Bonds will be in denominations of £50, £100, £200, £500, £1000, and £5000. They will be exempt from Corporation Profits Tax, and will in all respects rank *pari passu* with those issued under the Prospectus of the 23rd March 1923. They will be dated at the option of the Tenderer on any business day from Monday, the 18th June 1923, to Saturday, the 23rd June 1923, inclusive; the first dividend, payable on the 15th October 1923, will represent in the case of each Bond interest to that date from the date of the Bond.

7. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000, and must specify the date on which the Bonds required are to be dated and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one shilling) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bonds of different dates.

8. Tenders must be made through a London Banker, Discount House or Broker.

9. The persons whose Tenders are accepted will be informed of the same not later than the following day, and payment in full of the amounts of the accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of Cash or a Banker's Draft on the Bank of England not later than 2 o'clock (Saturday 12 o'clock) on

the day on which the relative Bills or Bonds are to be dated.

10. In virtue of the provisions of Section 1 (4) of the War Loan Act, 1919, Members of the House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills and Bonds.

11. Tenders must be made on the printed forms which may be obtained from the Chief Cashier's Office, Bank of England.

12. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.

#### UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE.

##### INSURANCE INDUSTRY SPECIAL SCHEME (AMENDMENT) ORDER, 1923.

THE UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE (INSURANCE INDUSTRY SPECIAL SCHEME) (AMENDMENT) ORDER, 1923, DATED MAY 17, 1923, MADE BY THE MINISTER OF LABOUR UNDER THE UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE ACT, 1923 (13 GEO. 5, C. 2).

Whereas it is provided by Section 10 of the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1923 (hereinafter referred to as "the Act of 1923") that for the purpose of securing in the case of a special scheme that like rates of benefit shall be payable to the person to whom the scheme applies as are payable under the Act of 1923, and that the benefits under the scheme shall otherwise be not less favourable than those provided by the general provisions of the Unemployment Insurance Acts, 1920 to 1922 (but for no other purposes), the Minister of Labour (hereinafter referred to as "the Minister") may, after consultation with the body charged with the administration of the scheme, by order vary or amend the provisions of the scheme, and any such order may provide for consequential amendments as to the rates of contributions and otherwise.

And whereas by the Unemployment Insurance (Insurance Industry Special Scheme) Order 1921, the Insurance Industry Unemployment Insurance Scheme (hereinafter referred to as "the Scheme") was approved by the Minister. And whereas the Incorporated Insurance Industry Unemployment Insurance Board (hereinafter referred to as "the Joint Board") is the body charged with the administration of the Scheme.

And whereas by the Unemployment Insurance (Insurance Industry Special Scheme) (Amendment) Order, 1922 (hereinafter referred to as "the Amendment Order, 1922"), it has been necessary for the purposes mentioned in Section 15 of the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1922, to vary and amend the provisions of the Scheme.

And whereas for the purposes mentioned in Section 10 of the Act of 1923 it is necessary

further to vary and amend the provisions of the Scheme.

Now, therefore, the Minister, after consultation with the Joint Board, hereby makes the following Order:—

1. The variations and amendments of the provisions of the Scheme contained in the Schedule hereto shall have effect as from the twelfth day of April 1923.

2. This Order may be cited as the Unemployment Insurance (Insurance Industry Special Scheme) (Amendment) Order, 1923, and this Order and the Unemployment Insurance (Insurance Industry Special Scheme) Orders, 1921 and 1922, may be cited together as the Unemployment Insurance (Insurance Industry Special Scheme) Orders, 1921 to 1923.

#### SCHEDULE.

1. The Fourth Special Period defined in paragraph 2 (2) of the Schedule to the Amendment Order, 1922, shall be extended so as to terminate on the seventeenth day of October 1923, instead of on the first day of July 1923, and the provisions of the said Schedule relating to benefit within the Fourth Special Period shall have effect subject to the following modifications:—

(1) The periods for which a person may be authorised to receive out-of-work benefit shall be periods not exceeding in the aggregate forty-four weeks.

(2) Notwithstanding anything in the Scheme no person shall, except by virtue of an authorisation given by the Joint Board under paragraph 3 of the Schedule to the Amendment Order, 1922, as amended by this Order, receive out-of-work benefit in the Fourth Special Period for periods amounting in the aggregate to more than twenty-six weeks, and no person shall, whether by virtue of such an authorisation as aforesaid, or otherwise, receive out-of-work benefit in the Fourth Special Period for periods amounting in the aggregate to more than forty-four weeks.

(3) Where a disabled person, as defined by Sub-section (1) of Section nine of the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1921, is, in the opinion of the Joint Board by reason of his disability unable to undertake whole-time employment, the Joint Board may, notwithstanding the provisions of paragraph 3 (3) (b) of the Schedule to the Amendment Order, 1922, authorise that person to receive out-of-work benefit.

(4) The provisions of paragraphs 3 (1) (b) and 3 (5) of the Schedule to the Amendment Order, 1922, shall cease to have effect, and paragraph 5 (1) (b) of the same Schedule shall have effect with the omission of the words from "or where the benefit" to "within the Fourth Special Period."

2. (1) Clause 7 (1) of the Scheme shall have effect as if for the words "which section" there were substituted therein the words "and

in Section 5 (1) of the Unemployment Insurance Act, 1923, and those sections (except paragraph (b) of Sub-section (2) of Section 7 of the Act."

(2) The Joint Board may by rules provide for the transition from the provisions of Clause 7 (1) of the Scheme to the same provisions as amended by this Schedule, and prescribe that a period of consecutive days shall for the purposes of the Scheme as amended as aforesaid begin or end on such days as may be prescribed, and that such a period may be inclusive or exclusive of Sundays.

3. The following shall be substituted for paragraph 5 of the Second Schedule to the Scheme:—

"5. A period of unemployment shall not be deemed to commence until the date on which the person insured under the Scheme makes application for out-of-work benefit in the manner provided by the Scheme. Provided that rules may be made by the Joint Board for allowing some earlier date to be substituted for the date of application in cases in which good cause is shown for delay in making application."

4. The Joint Board shall, in exercising the powers conferred upon them by this Schedule, give effect to any general direction which may from time to time be given by the Minister.

5. Save as in this Schedule otherwise expressly provided, nothing herein contained shall operate so as to deprive any person of, or to prevent any person from receiving, any out-of-work benefit, which he would have been entitled to receive if the provisions of this Schedule had not come into force.

6. This Schedule shall be construed as one with the Scheme and the Schedule to the Amendment Order, 1922.

JUTE TRADE BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

PIECE-WORK BASIS TIME-RATE AND OVERTIME RATES FOR ALL FEMALE WEAVERS EMPLOYED ON PIECE-WORK IN GREAT BRITAIN OUTSIDE THE AREAS OF ABERDEEN, BARROW-IN-FURNESS, CARNOUSTIE, DUNDEE AND TAYPORT (as defined in Part II. of the Schedule to this Notice).

Effective as from 11th June 1923.\*

\* Should this date not correspond with the beginning of the period for which wages are paid by an employer who pays wages at intervals not exceeding seven days, the rates become effective as from the beginning of the next full pay period, but in any case not later than 17th June 1923.

## SCHEDULE.

## PART I.

PIECE-WORK BASIS TIME-RATE (AS FIXED) AND OVERTIME RATES (AS VARIED) FOR ALL FEMALE WEAVERS EMPLOYED ON PIECE-WORK IN GREAT BRITAIN OUTSIDE THE AREAS OF ABERDEEN, BARROW-IN-FURNESS, CARNoustie, DUNDEE AND TAYPORT (as defined in Part II. of this Schedule).

## SECTION I.

*Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate.*

All Female Weavers of the class specified in Part II. of this Schedule, 7½d. per hour.

NOTE.—In cases where a Female Weaver to whom the above Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate applies, is employed on piece-work each piece-rate paid must be such as would yield, in the circumstances of the case, not less than 7½d. per hour to an ORDINARY WORKER, *i.e.*, a worker of ordinary skill and experience in the class of work in question.

## SECTION II.

*Overtime Rates.*

A Female Weaver of the class specified in Part II. of this Schedule shall, in respect of each hour worked in excess of the normal number of hours of work in the trade, as declared by the Trade Board and set out in their Notice J. (26), dated 6th February 1923, receive, in addition to piece-rates each of which would yield, in the circumstances of the case, not less than 7½d. per hour to an ordinary worker, an amount equal to one-half of, or the full amount of, the General Minimum Time-Rate which would have been applicable to the worker if she had been employed on time work, according as the Overtime Rate which would have been payable if the worker had been employed on time work were Time-and-a-half or Double Time.

## PART II.

The above Minimum Rates apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all female weavers employed on piece-work in

Great Britain OUTSIDE the following areas, namely:—

- (a) the Municipal Burgh of Aberdeen;
- (b) the County Borough of Barrow-in-Furness;
- (c) the Area of Carnoustie, *viz.*, the Burgh of Carnoustie and the Parish of Barry and the Parish of Panbride;
- (d) the Area of Dundee, *viz.*, the Municipal Burgh of Dundee and the Parish of Liff and Benvie, the Parish of Mains and Strathmartine, the Parish of Dundee and that part of the Parish of Monifieth which lies south and west of Dighty Water; and
- (e) the Area of Tayport, *viz.*, the Burgh of Tayport and the Parish of Ferry-Port-on-Craig;

in respect of all time during which they are employed in any branch of the trade specified in the Trade Boards (Jute) Order, 1919, and set out in Part VI. of the Schedule to the Trade Board's Notice J. (26), dated 6th February 1923.

## PART III.

The above Minimum Rates of Wages must be paid clear of all deductions other than deductions under the National Insurance Act, 1911, as amended by any subsequent enactments or deductions authorised by any Act to be made from wages in respect of contributions to any Superannuation or other Provident Fund.

If the yarn as measured within the reed (including selvages) is narrower than this, one-sixth of the total difference in inches between the yarn width and the total reed space shall be added to the cloth width.
- (ii.) For looms of a total reed space exceeding 80 inches no allowance shall be made for cloth the yarn width of which (including selvages) in the reed is within 10 inches or 10 per cent. of the total reed space, whichever is the greater. If the yarn as measured within the reed (including selvages) is narrower than this, one-sixth of the difference in inches between the yarn width on the one hand and the total reed space less 10 inches or 10 per cent. (whichever is the greater) on the other hand, shall be added to the cloth width.

SECTION V.

THE GENERAL MINIMUM PIECE-RATES SPECIFIED IN SECTIONS I., II., AND III. OF THIS PART ARE SUBJECT TO PAYMENT OF THE FOLLOWING EXTRAS:—

- (a) Where the weaver strips the cloth off the cloth pin, two per cent. (2 per cent.).
- (b) Where the weaver ties on, 1 9-16d. per 100 threads.
- (c) Where the weaver does any fileying an extra shall be paid to be mutually arranged between master and worker, provided that such extra shall be at not less than the appropriate minimum time rate fixed by the Trade Board.

 3 per cent. for each centre selvage thereafter.

Where the number of threads in the warp is increased above the normal build for which payment is made, the width of cloth to be paid for shall be that which the threads would give if not crowded.

FOR THE PURPOSE OF THE GENERAL MINIMUM PIECE-RATES SET OUT IN THIS NOTICE:—

- (a) A single loom weaver is a weaver who actually tends only one loom, other than a weaver of the class defined in (b) (ii.) below;
- (b) A double loom weaver is a weaver who—
  - (i.) is actually tending two looms, or
  - (ii.) regularly tends two looms, but who, owing to a stoppage of one of the looms, tends only one loom for an aggregate period not exceeding  $8\frac{3}{4}$  hours in any one week, or for a continuous period not exceeding  $8\frac{3}{4}$  hours;
- (c) The Standard Fabric is  $10\frac{1}{2}$  oz. 40 in. 11 porter 13 shots per inch when chested finished: Hessian;
- (d) The Standard Length is 100 yards (36 inch measure) of yarn laid;
- (e) The Standard Width is 40 inch of finished cloth.

## SECTION II.

The work to which the General Minimum Piece-Rates set out in this Notice are applicable, includes the making good of weaving faults by the weaver, in accordance with the hitherto accepted practice of the trade, and the other usual duties performed by the weaver, such as keeping the loom clean and removing the waste from it.

## SECTION III.

The above General Minimum Piece-Rates apply to the weaving of all Hessian, floor-cloth and linoleum goods, other than those woven in looms the reed space of which is 32 inches or narrower.

NOTE.—In the case of workers employed in the areas specified in Part IV. of this Schedule, upon fabrics to which no General Minimum Piece-Rates are applicable, each Piece-Rate paid must be such as will yield, in the circumstances of the case, to an *Ordinary Worker*, not less than the appropriate General Minimum Time-Rate.

In accordance with the Regulations made under Section 18 of the Trade Boards Act, 1909, by the Minister of Labour, and dated respec-

tively 31st October 1918, and 1st August 1922, the Trade Board established in Great Britain under the Trade Boards Act, 1918, for the Trade specified in the Trade Boards (Rope, Twine and Net) Order, 1919, as varied by the Trade Boards (Made-Up Textiles) Order, 1920, **HEREBY GIVE NOTICE**, as required by Section 3 (5) of the Trade Boards Act, 1918, that they **PROPOSE TO VARY** the Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate and Overtime Rates for certain classes of male workers employed in the Net Section of the Trade, and the Overtime Rates for certain classes of female workers employed in Hand Machine Braiding, the proposed Minimum Rates being as shown in the Schedule set out below.

The Minister of Labour has given his consent to the issue of this Notice.

#### PART I.

**PROPOSED PIECE-WORK BASIS TIME-RATE AND OVERTIME RATES FOR MALE WORKERS EMPLOYED IN THE NET SECTION OF THE TRADE AS CHARGE HANDS OR AS NET RIGGERS.**

**SECTION I.**—The proposed Piece-Work Basis Time-Rate for male workers employed in the NET SECTION of the Trade as CHARGE HANDS or as NET RIGGERS is 1s. 0½d. per hour.

**PROPOSED OVERTIME RATES FOR FEMALE WORKERS EMPLOYED IN HAND MACHINE BRAIDING ON PIECE-WORK.**

The proposed Overtime Rates, to apply in the case of female workers employed on piece-work on work to which the General Minimum Piece-Rates fixed for Hand Machine Braiding and set out in the Schedule to the Trade Board's Notice R. (33), dated 22nd February 1923, are applicable, in substitution for such Piece-Rates in respect of all hours worked in excess of the number declared by the Trade Board in Part II. of the Schedule to the said Notice R. (33) to be the normal number of hours of work in the Trade, are calculated on such General Minimum Piece-Rates in the manner specified in Part II. of the Schedule to the said Notice R. (33) subject to the substitution of the additional payments of 1½d. per hour, 3½d. per hour, and 7d. per hour in place of the additional payments of 1½d. per hour, 3½d. per hour, and 6½d. per hour respectively as specified in Section II. of Part II. of the Schedule to the said Notice R. (33).

#### PART III.

The above proposed Minimum Rates of Wages shall apply, subject to the provisions of the Trade Boards Acts, to all workers of the classes in question employed on piece-work on work within the scope of the Trade Boards (Rope, Twine and Net) Order, 1919, as varied by the Trade Boards (Made-Up Textiles) Order, 1920, and set out in Section II. of Part V. of the Schedule to the Trade Boards Notice R. (32), dated 22nd February 1923.

The Trade Board will consider any **OBJECTIONS** to the above **PROPOSAL TO VARY** which may be lodged with them within two months from the 12th day of June 1923. Such objections should be in writing, and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address), and should be sent to The Secretary of the Rope, Twine and Net Trade Board (Great Britain), 1 Whitehall Gardens, London, S.W. 1.

It is desirable that the Objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.
